PASSENGER LINE Spearman Men Will Run Auto Pas-senger Line from Amarillo to Lib-eral via. Spearman Every Day. n


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

County Agent Column DALLAM COUNTY MAN FOR REPRESENTATIVE

How many harvest hands do you need? The County Agent will try to aid you in getting harvest hands if you will leave your name and number of hands that you want. I have letters from cooks, stackers, etc. wanting work in this country. The U. S. Department of Labor is co-operating in securing hands for harvest.

The Vice-Presidents of the Hans-ford County Fair Association met Saturday afternoon at Spearman. They decided to have Community Exhibits from each community. The Vice Presidents will be in charge of each community, and will be expect-ed to see that each community has exhibits to fill out a score card in the agricultural department.

Now is the time to gather up your bundles of grain for this exhibit. Every person that has good grain should hand pick four bundles of grain that measure from 3 to 5 inches in diameter, and send or bring them to the County Agent or Mr. Berkley. BUILD A REPUTATION FOR QUALITY OF EGGS

Standard Bred Stock and Attention to Details Will Increase the In-come from the Chickens.

(By Myrtle Murray, Poulty Special-ist, Extension Service A. & M. Col-lege, College Station, Texas.)

Does your community have a reputation for producing a good quality of eggs If not, why not? Do you rush your eggs to market be-fore they spoil? Or do you market your eggs regularly, you know that if the dealer keeps them several days that they will not spoil on his hands or the customer to whom he sells? Do you market eggs of all sizes, shapes and color, then wonder why you do not get a good price? why you do not get a good price?

why you do not get a good price? Are you doing your part in build-ing and maintaining a reputation in your community for the production of choice eggs? If you are, you are not keeping scrub chickens. They do not lay a great quantity of eggs, neither do they produce that choice egg that is demanded by the best markets. markets.

BUILD WITH STANDARD BRED STOCK

BRED STOCK Successful marketing of eggs be-gins and ends with the hen. Suc-cessful poultrymen have found that "it takes the best to produce the best" and only the best commands peak prices. Naturally inferior stock, poorly fed and housed, is not expected to produce a superior qual-ity of eggs. It is a well known fact that standard bred poultry, properly housed and fed, produces a greater profit for the amount of capital in-vested than most any other agricul-tural crop. Therefore, isn't it a good investment for every farmer to keep a sufficient number of well chosen standard-bred-to-lay hens, and to feed and care for them in such a manner that he will be en-abled to realize a healthy profit?

HIGH PRODUCTION

Every normal hen lays a few eggs. The well bred, well cared for hen lays many. Generally speaking it requires about 100 eggs to pay for the upkcep of a hen for one year. The production above 100 can reasonably be considered a pro-fit. Therefore, the greater the pro-fuction the greater the profit. Max-

the male bird from your flock when the hatching season is over. According to 1920 census reports of the U. S. Department of Agricul-ture there were about 64,970,00 doz-en eggs produced in Texas. Five percent loss that year emounted to en eggs produced in Texas. Five percent loss that year amounted to about 3,248,900 dozen. Estimating the average value of these eggs at 25 cents per dozen, that loss was about \$814,240. This would more than pay the salary, one year, of every public school teacher (both rural and city) in the county hav-ing the largest number of school children in the state. Don't you think it will pay to produce infertile eggs? eggs?

CLEANLINESS

Eggs should be absolutely clean Eggs should be absolutely clean, To produce clean eggs the nests and premises must be kept clean. Do not wash eggs. Fresh eggs are pro-vided with a coating that closes the pores of the shells, this preventing evaporation and absorption of odors. When they are washed, this coating is removed and the new laid egg looses it's fresh sweet flavor that dis-tinguishes it from an old egg. Never wash eggs.

SHELL TEXTURE

The shell should be firm and smooth; and should not be mottled or contain ridges or crack places.

GRADED EGGS

GRADED EGGS The best egg markets demand graded eggs. The main factors con-sidered in grading eggs are fresh-ness, cleanliness, weight, uniformity of size, shape and color. There are two colors of eggs, white and brown. If eggs are white they should be chalky white. If they are brown they should all be the same shade of brown. Mr. Chas. E. House, Mana-ger of Branches, Poultry Produc-ers of Central California, in a re-cent address to a poultry meeting made the following statement re-garding grading of eggs: "I think I have spoken to our

"California is recognized as a producer of fancy white eggs—and by careful selection it has been possible for us to build up an en-viable reputation on the New York market for eggs with chalk white shells. As a rule the white egg trade of the East is very critical, consequently uniform quality, size and style are very important fac-tors, and if anyone of these points is defective it is used against the product as a talking point to lower the price.



Why not pur-chase egg scales and begin grading your eggs this year and help raise the standard for quality of eggs in your community? "Swat the roos-ter." Produce infertile eggs only. Keep eggs in a cool place. Market often, and gradually improve your flock until you can market eggs in sufficient quantity that are clean and fresh and graded.



PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

Pensions.
Senate Joint Resolution No. 10




