



THE SPEARMAN COUNTRY

Your attention is called to the wonderful possibilities offered by the Spearman country, composed of all of Hansford county, north one-half of Hutchinson county, and the west part of Ochitre county, Texas. Hansford is the middle county in the north tier of counties in the Panhandle of Texas, and comprises 860 square miles. CLIMATE

The climate of this section of Texas is unex-celled. The winters are mild and the summers are cool, especially the nights, and mosquitoes and other annoying insects are practically unknown. The altitude is 3,000 feet, insuring a very health-ful climate. There is positively no malaria, which is a drawback to lower altitudes.

RAINFALL

The rainfall for the past ten years has averaged from 22 to 24 inches per annum, being sufficient to produce all ordinary crops adapted to the altitude.

HOG RAISING

Hog raising is one of the most important branches of stock farming in the Spearman coun-try. Cholera and diseases of all kinds common to the hog are practically unknown among the breed-ers here. The cheapness with which maize, Kafir and barley can be raised, together with the continu-ed high market, make this branch of the industry highly profitable.

POULTRY

In these days of diversification on the farm poultry has come to be recognized as one of the most profitable forms of livestock production. In no other part of the country will you find poultry of a higher standard than in Hansford county. Practically every farm has a flock and the farmers are finding them a source of income beyond their expectations.





How to Avoid Grade Crossing Accidents

Automobile drivers, when approaching railroad crossings, should go into second speed. Then look and listen. Absolute control thus is assured. Stop or go ahead, as conditions warrant.

seventy-four injured at highway crossings on the Santa Fe Railway.

These regrettable accidents might have been avoided if these motorists had been careful.

The rapid increase in these grade-crossing accidents is due to the greatly increased and general use of the automobile in the hands of drivers ignorant or willfully disregardful of the perils which attend careless driving. Sometimes it is the careless driver alone who pays the penalty, but usually innocent ones pay it in part or entirely.

During 1923 one hundred and three persons were killed and four hundred controlled; but the opposite seems to be the case. An experienced driver of horses describes the proper method of approaching a railroad crossing asfollows: "Gather up the reins tight, take out the whip, and bring the horses to a walk." An experienced automobilist advises: "Always go into second speed."

The method is precisely the same in either case. The driver has absolute control, can stop or go ahead as conditions demand, and is alert to the situation.

If all drivers would but adopt this simple rule and adhere to it faithfully the problem would be solved. What a saving there would be of priceless human life, of road crossings than horses, because they lost forever!

You are urged to give this "Safety First" suggestion most earnest consideration. Better be safe than sorry.

HORSE NOT SUBJECT TO TAIL LIGHT, DEFENSE AVERS IN DAMAGE SUIT

Equestrian,, Sued by Autoist, Holds Animal is Not a "Vehicle."

The contention that a man, when riding horseback after dark, should equip his steed with a white head-light and a red tail-light, is neither based on law nor "horse sense," Col. Joseph G. Miller, 32 Portland place, maintained in a reply filed in Circuit Court yesterday to augment his suit for damages against H. F. Meyer, a fur dealer, whose automobile collided violently with the rear of Col. Miller's mount while he was taking an early morning ride near

Forest Park January 24, 1924.

Col. Miller and his horse, not being equipped with fenders, were jarred to the street by the impact and as result he later brought suit for \$10,000 against the fur dealer.

Calls Horse "Vehicle."

Meyer answered the suit several Meyer answered the suit several days ago by contending that since the accident occurred about an hour before day break, Miller was neg-ligent in failing properly to equip his horse with a tail light. To sup-port his contention Meyer quoted force a section of a city ordingance his horse with a tail light. To support his contention Meyer quoted

in effect at the time declaring a
horse to be a "vehicle." He further
showed that the law required all
vehicles to have tail lights; hence
Miller's mount should have been provided with one. He charged Miller
with negligence and asked that the
suit be dismissed at the plaintiff's
cost.

But Everett P. Griffin of the firm of Nagel & Kirby, council for Miller, replied to the answer yesterday by maintaining that Meyer's pleading is "frivolous" and does not even display good "horse sense."

He futher contends that if by any consideration a ridden horse shall have white lights and red tail light, then the ordinance is "unreasonable, oppressive and void, because a horse is physically so constructed that neither head lights or tail lights could be attached to his front or







CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS

Consolidated schools are increasing in number; one-room schools are disappearing; and more school money is being spent for transportation of pupils each year. Data on consolidated schools shoy that 1,628 were formed in the school year 1921-22. Fourteen states did not report the number of consolidations that year. Among the 14 are Ohio, Kansas, North Carolina, and Maryland, known to be making considerable progress in consolidation. The most accurate figures obtainable show that there were 11,890 consolidated schools in the United States in 1920. Estimating an increase of Consolidated schools are increas solidated schools in the United States in 1920. Estimating an increase of at least 3,000 in the next wo years, here were in 1920 approximately 15,000 consolidated schools. Louisiana, Indiana, and Ohio each reports over 1000 such schools; Texas, Virginia and Mississippi each more than 600. There were 187,951 one-room schools reported in 1920. Two years later the estimated number was 179,450, a decrease of 8,501. Most of this dechease is due to consolidation.—Waco Times Herald.



SPEARMAN'S WATER LIGHT AND ICE PLANT

Renders Efficient Service at Small Cost-Ample Fire Fighting Apparatus, and Trained Firemen

The accompanying illustration shows the water tower of the Municipal plant of the City of Spearman,

The town has suffered several severe fire losses in the past and the City council deemed it advisable to call an election for the purpose of voting bonds for the erection of a water works system and electric light plant. In this undertaking for civic improvement, the council had the full co-operation of the commercial club as well as the citizens in general. Only three votes were cast against the bond issue for the water works

improvement.

The final work on these improvements has been completed, and we are justly proud of the accomplishment. The tower stands 150 feet above the ground level and can be seen for miles in any direction from the city. Its capacity is seventy five thousand gallons, and the water is gotten from deep wells by deep well pumps which deliver water at the rate of seventy five gallons per minute.

The maximum water line on the tower is one hundred forty feet, which gives an excellent pressure for commercial use and for fire protection. The tested pressure, for fire protection, is sixty three pounds per square inch at the nozzle of the fire




