


The regular threshing-time slump in the price of wheat is upon us. It will last until the grain kings in Chicago and Dulut think they have gathered in all the wheat from the farmers who have to sell in order to pay their notes at the bank. Then the price will rise to tempt other holders of wheat to sell. The price now being offered for wheat is, of course, less than cost of production. It is very unwise econ-ony which, year after year, pays the most important producer in the whole economic system, a price for his pro-duct which will eventually ruin him. Yet you can hardly blame Mr. Armour and Mr. Barnes for getting wheat as cheaply as possible. It is possible that they do go too far in pounding down the price, but that is natural to a position of power. Producers of wheat should not be so supine as to permit Mr. Armour and Mr. Barnes to put down the price of wheat every harvest.
