





THE WAY BACK TO THE BIBLE

The speaker who made the

gestion at a recent great meeting of Sunday school workers that it would be a good thing if we could introduce into our course of study a department for imparting a knowledge of the bible, may have had something of sarcasm in his heart, and yet it does seem as if there is a great need that there should be an awakening on the part of many people as to the imprince of really studying the bible.

Some time ago one of our great religious papers contained an article tending to show that men and women are losing the faith of their fathers and wondering what could be done about it. A number of instances were given in which men had in the time of tribulation confessed that they had lost the faith their fathers and mothers had and wished they knew the way to find it. It certainly is worth while to think of this for a moment for there can be no possible doubt that our Sunday schools are missing the mark in more cases than we know. How can we Ind our way back to an earnest widespread and effective st.dy of the Word of God.

It has been given me to live in both country and city and I am fully convinced that there is a better knowledge of the bible away out on the farms than there is in the cities of our country. We can see how that might well be. There is more time in the country, that is true; but that fact does not wholly account for the better Bible knowledge we find here. The secret of it is that men want to know God, the nearer they live to Him. And it does seem as if in the quiet country we are nearer-God than we are in the city.

Then, does it not seem as if the first thing to be done, in city and in country, is to bring men to a sense of the nearness of God and a strong desire to know more about Him? If we do not care for any person or anything, we are not very apt to want to think or learn about that thern they will care enough about Him and His book.

In may schools there are those

every day to studying about Him and His book.

In many schools there are those young and old, who really love to read the bible and are happiest when they are thinking about sacred things together on the Sabbath day. Whereever this is true I am sure that it will be found that those who have this love for the bible and devotion to bible study have for their teachers men and women in whose hearts the love for all things pure and true and holy shines most brightly. It cannot be otherwise than that a sincerely devoted teacher will inspire his pupils, be they young or old, with a desire to learn more and more about God and His kingdom.

What we need most of all, it seems to me, is more such teachers, more fathers and mothers who see the importance of finding the way back to the old faith, and more ministers with

What we need most of all, it seems to me, is more such teachers, more fathers and mothers who see the importance of finding the way back to the old faith, and more ministers wie shall, with all their hearts, impress the value of bible study.

Just now I have in mind a certain Sunday school connected with a church, which has always, from its very founding, stood as a lighthouse in the city. Often has the remark been made, "that church has always had a strong spiritual life; its prayer meetings have been well sustained, and it has an enviable place in the community life."

Could anything be more enviable than that. I never have heard it that I have not been proud that it was really true that this church and school have such a good name in the life of the city. Tell us the secret? Simply this: The heart of the minister and those who united with him in organizing that church and Sunday school were warm with a love for God's Word and all it stands for. Through all the forty or more years since this lighthouse was set up in that part of the city, good men have worked hard to keep alive in the hearts and minds of all, young and old, a love for the bible. They love it. They see its worth to the life of individuals and the city at large. When men want to know the bible they will know it. Most of all we need and must have a longing for God, and a sense of dependence upon Him. Let it be the first aim of every teacher, every parent, to see the importance of knowing God in His beauty, His will not be long before we will have once more a nation of bible students for that is the way back to faith and service.—The Convention Teacher.
