GROWTH OF AN EMPIRE WITHIN A COMMONWEALTH


The hardy pioneers who carved out of this unchartered area of the great Panhandle-Plains region, suf-fered untold hardships and many sacrifices. They loved this counsacrifices. They loved this coun-try because it was so hard to conquer. We love it partly because it is so easy to make a living in. Few people who have never visited the Panhandhe-Plains section of Texas, I dare say, have little conception of what this country has to offer to the farmer stockman merchant and farmer, stockman, merchant and manufacturer. Less than 25 per cent of the till-

Less than 25 per cent of the thr-able land in the Panhandle is in a state of cullivation, though each year hundreds of progressive fam-ilies are arriving in the Panhandle to secure homes. No section, known to civilized man, can boast of a larger body of tillable land than is found in the northwestern (Panof a larger body of tillable land than is found in the northwestern (Pan-handle) section of Texas Acres, even millions of acres of land—rich tillable land—may be found in one body. It is possible to plow a fur-row a hundred miles long without a stop. And the beauty of it all is the fact that the land is all fertile. When this land is seeded it is very prolific. For this reason to-gether with many others, homeseek-ers are turning their tyes toward the great. Texas Panhandle—the country which, without a doubt, offers an op-portuntiy to every man who is will-ing to work. There is sufficient which, without a doubt, offers an op-portunity to every man who is will-ing to work. There is sufficient farm land in the country now, which is idle, to furnish a home for a hun-dred thousand farmers and then each farmer will have more land than is customary in the average farming sections of America.

sections of America. This territory contains approximately twenty million acres of land ranging in price from \$15. to \$100. per acre, and when figured out the average price per acre settles ap-proximately at the \$25.00 mark.

Climate conditions are very favor-able in the Panhandle for farming and stock raising. The southern portion of the cott on fields yield their hundreds of thousands of bales of this staple product and the extension of cotton growing in the north plains is increasing annually. Figures obtained from the last Federal Census show that with only one seventh of the total area of the Federal Census show that with only Federal Census show that with only state we produce one sixth of the state we produce one sixth of the cattle raised in the state, nearly one third of the wheat and almost two thirds of the kaffir and maize. 





### **BODY CAPACITY IS CAUSE OF ANNOYANCE**

Methods by Which Its Effects May Be Avoided - Possible Reasons for Fading Signals.

Questions have been asked regarding an apparent phenomenon in tun-ing. The phenomenon in the case is that just as the operator tuned in his station and removed his hands from the knob, the signals faded out; or it may have been the other way around, and if the operator touches his set while listening to a concert, the sig-

This while face out. This while some stations run into it guite frequently, others are not sothered at all. Those living close to a broadcasting station will never by bethered with it as it can accurate with bothered with it as it only occurs with a very close tuning. It is explained by the fact that the capacity of the body coming in contact with the set, which is very finely tuned, is thrown out of adjustment by the outside in-ductance. ductance.

There are several ways to guard against it, and one of the best is to line the inside of the panel with tin foll or aluminum foil and ground it. In pasting the tin foil on the back of the panel, it is cut away from all binding posts, switch points or rods to prevent short circuiting the set. There is one exception to this, and that is the ground binding post. If the tin foll is pasted over this, it is, of course, auto-

satically grounded. Shellac will do to make the foll adbere to the panel, which will not have here to the panel, which will not have to be dismantied to be lined, as the foll can be placed on in small strips. Another method of remedying the effects of body capacity is by using method due on the exploration and metal dials on the variocoupler and variometers; and in sets where the variometers are very close to one another, moving them away will help. Or in case it is not desired to change the set, placing a nonmagnetic mathe set, parties a nonnegative matterial between the variometers which are close to each other and grounding it will remedy the ill effects. For this case, a piece of glass such as photog-raphers use, covered with throit on one side, is effective.

Fading signals have long been en-countered by amateurs when receiving ong-distance stations. In this case, the signals from a goodly distance away may be coming in loud and clear and then without warning fade away. In a few seconds they may return with all their force, and then when the amateur is congratulating when the anniteur is congratulating hinself, again the volces or music die out. Or fading may take the form of varying intensity of signals, one anhante the operator being forced to strain his ears to catch the sound while the next voices may be loud

There have been many theories advanced for this phenomenon, and we are giving today two of the latest. The radio division of the Department The radio division of the Department of Commerce is reported to be under the impression that fading occurs when a cloud passes between the transmitting station and the receiving set. This theory has been one of the most popular among the experts, and recent tests have been made to obtain more complete data. If the passing cloud theory is a good explanation more complete data. If the passiu-cloud theory is a good explanation of finding there will be some *toxi*, radio development very shortly. The effects of various types of clouds upon the signals is being studied, and the results of this study will be of inter-est to everyone interested in radio. Government officials are interested in eliminating, fading, or overcoming it as much as possible, largely from the standpoint of the amateur, as the com-mercial stations, having much greater power than amateur zets, are able to power than amateur sets, are able to overcome the atmospheric effects to a

the relation between wave-length antenna resistance be smooth. I Don' allow bumps in the curve to lead one astray. The absorption of energy by some nearby object will cause the antenna resistance at certain wave lengths to show fictificually high wave antenna resistance tengths.






