Important Notice

The U. S. Treasury Department has announced an issue of 4 3/4 per cent Treasury Bonds of 1947-52.

A GREAT SHOW AT AMARILLO

The Jobbers & Manufacturers' Association of Amarillo will on November 23, 24 and 25, stage in Amarillo, what is conceded to be the greatest industrial exposition ever attempted in the Southwest. Amarillo made articles, together with commodities handled by jobbers who have distributed and thousands of visitors representing all sections of the Panhandle, Oklahoma and New Mexico will be there to see the display, it has been announced by officials of the organization.

The exposition will be held in the J. I. Case Threshing Machine Company's building, and display booths are being arranged to accommodate the showings.

Amarillo is conceded to be one of the fastest growing manufacturing and jobbing centers in the Southwest, and being in the heart of the world's greatest gas field, a tremendous growth of the manufacturing and industrial enterprise is believed inevitable.

Texas-made products are rapidly becoming very popular, and the demand is growing greater every day, according to the local wholesale exporters, and for that reason, the exposition at Amarillo is attracting wide attention.

Amarillo jobbers and manufacturers are urging the retail merchants of the entire Panhandle to lend their cooperation in making the exposition truly representative of the industrial activities there and many of the merchants and business men are responding and will urge their customers to attend the display.

The financial budget for the enterprise has been assured and committees from the association are at work arranging the details. In connection with the showing of manufactured products and merchandise jobbed through this point, a program of music and entertainment of exceptional merit is being arranged, including band music, orchestra music, vaudeville performances, dancing and other forms of entertainment.

F. L. CADOU INVENTS NEW RADIO STAND

Manager of Liberal Light, Ice & Power Co. Uses Much Ingenuity in Perfecting Device Which is Great Convenience

Manager F. L. Cadou of the Liberal Light, Ice & Power Company is patenting a device to be known as the Cadou Headphone Stand, which promises to be very popular with radio owners for its simplicity of arrangement and convenience both to the listeners and the owner of the set.

The new stand consists of a slender pedestal with an inverted bowl near the top. A wire extends from the radio set to the base of the stand and up through the pedestal to the bowl, where the connections are made with the headphones. Above the bowl are small brass hooks where the headphones may be hung when not in use and the entire stand, which is light in weight, set in the corner of the room out of the way as one would a floor lamp.

The great convenience of the set is in enabling the listeners to sit comfortably around the room in place of crowding around the set, or the stand may be placed in the center of the room and the listeners group comfortably about it. It also does away with the inconvenience of having the headphones laying loosely about on the table, which is unsatisfactory at best and where they are in danger of their being accidentally dropped to the floor.

While new inventions and improvements are constantly being made on the radio sets it remained for a Liberal man to study out the arrangement of this device which will without doubt be a great boon to radio owners and be in great demand.

THE SPEARMAN FAIR

I attended the two day fair at our sister town of Spearman last week and found it to be a real incubator for hatching thoughts.

I found the business men of Spearman to be a real live and progressive bunch, which it came to the interest, welfare and entertainment of their visitors they were always on the job, meeting all comers with a glad hand.

They worked like Chinamen when it came to feeding the multitude, having slaughtered and barbecued 70 heaves the last day. I don't know how many they killed on Tuesday.

To barbecue 7 fat kine with all the accessories including hogheads of coffee is no small undertaking and the beauty of it was everything was free.

It shows that the business men of Spearman realize the source from which their blessings flow, they know that to help and encourage the farmer and stockmen just adds to their own larder.

For the first one, it was a most splendid little fair. There were between 60 and 70 head of pure-bred hogs about equally divided between Durocs and Poland Chinas, and I feel safe in the prediction that there will be double the number next year.

There were Hereford cattle shown that were good enough to enter a State Fair, there were a lot of splendid horses, and mules so big and fine that I thought that I must surely be in Missouri.

The agricultural display was splendid, a whole building filled with every conceivable kind of grain, fruit and vegetables.

And the ladies' display of fine art work including many fine quilts was as nice as any thing that I have seen in a long time, it shows that the Panhandle women have an artistic taste and an eye for the beautiful.

I just thought while meandering up the street how nice it was that Spearman had given something in which the Farmers could join with great benefit to themselves as well as the town.

I am sure they are much prouder of it than they would have been of a little old annual house-moving celebration, then you know they would have to keep that up eternally.

I was talking with County Judge Storrs, he says they are going to have a county agent next year.

That is what Ochiltree county needs, the county would only be out 40 per cent of his salary, the balance being paid by the State and government. I don't believe that there is any possible way that the same amount of money could be expended that would do the county as much good.

I feel that the Commercial Club of Perrytown would be doing a great work if they could lead our Board of Commissioners in from outer darkness.

We will never have any analysis of the soil, calf club, pig clubs or any other progressive movement until we have one.

It seems to me, and I believe that the bankers will bear me out in the statement, that the average farmer needs some one to direct him, get him out of the rut in which he has trailed so long, for instance, to go in for straight wheat farming in this country as so many of them do, is like going into a poker game with the cards stacked against you. If the farmer would give one-half the attention to the prep-

tion of his maize ground that he does to his wheat land he would raise a maize crop every year.

Every one I talked to from Hansford county and around Guymon, Oklahoma, is very enthusiastic about hogs, taking one year with another's old sow and her product that furnish the table and pay the taxes.

I saw my friend Cooper who moved from Ochiltree to Spearman county a few years since, he raised 500 head of hogs this year, and his neighbors told me that he was the only man in that country that had made any money.

The farmers west of us and especially in Hansford county and around Guymon are much more enthusiastic about pure-bred stock than they are in Ochiltree county. They know the government and State Agricultural Colleges are correct when they make the statement that the pure-bred is just 24 per cent better for the farmer than the grade or scrub.

So my parting injunction is, buy a few pure bred Durocs and join the procession which leads ever upward and onward.—J. P. Cartwright in the Ochiltree County Herald.

McLEAN BONDS BRING ABOVE PAR WEDNESDAY

McLean Municipal Improvement Bonds were sold Wednesday for 101. This is a very good price, considering the present state of the bond market. One company offered 102 by wire, but refused to put up a \$2,000 check as forfeit that was required from every bidder; so this offer could not be considered.

The buyers will have twenty days to examine and approve the bonds before making payment. The bonds were sold to a reputable house, and there is no reason why the city will not have the money within the twenty days.

The engineers are anxious to begin work, and just as soon as possible, the actual work of construction will be started.—McLean News.

Should the propositions offered the property owners of Spearman by the city council be accepted on November 21, the bonds will likely sell at par or a little above. Men who are well posted in financial affairs say that the bond market is good; that now is a good time to sell bonds.

Gooseboneology
 The goosebone that was sent us by Doc Anshutz, who lives on the banks of the sandy Cimarron in the south part of Meade county, has been carefully studied and read and we are pleased to give the readers of the Globe-News and the people of Kansas a forecast of the weather as we find indicated by the marking on the breast of this well known water fowl.

We find unmistakable evidence of a severe winter, not particularly in Kansas, but in the Mississippi states and in the eastern section of the United States, but there will be winter enough in Kansas to forebodingly remind one that it is here and will stay with us for two months at least. There will be much snow in the east from Missouri to Massachusetts and Kansas will get her share, either in the shape of snow or rain. The goosebone indicates an early winter with snow in the two closing months of the year 1922, and in January and February 1923. Thanksgiving day will no doubt be snowy and there will be a white Christmas. An early spring may be expected and the idea of March will see farm work well under way and there will be no lack of moisture.—Frank Fuhr in Meade Globe.

Both Drivers Right but Come to Grief
 A tourist westward-bound late last Thursday afternoon turned to the left near the John Berghaus place to pass some westbound wagons hauling sand. The tourist was in a secondhand Chevrolet which he had bought the day before and

was driving probably five or six miles an hour as he passed the sand-wagons. About the same time an eastbound tourist in a Hudson and driving maybe twenty-five miles an hour met the wagons and turned to the right. No one was hurt but the front wheels and axle of the Chevrolet were badly broken and bent. The Hudson suffered practically no damage and proceeded on its way. The occupant of the Chevrolet was picked up a little later by his son who was following in another car. The damaged machine was bought by Scott R. Pierson.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas, that an election be held on the 21st day of November, 1922, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the said City of Spearman in the sum of FORTY-THREE THOUSAND (\$43,000.00) DOLLARS, payable serially or otherwise, not exceeding forty years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of the construction of water works in the City of Spearman as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, General Laws of the State of Texas passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislature at the regular session 1921 and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the office of McLain & McLain in the City of Spearman and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit: C. W. King, Presiding Officer; P. A. Lyon, Judge; F. C. Sumrall, Clerk and M. L. McLain, Clerk.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, General Laws of the State of Texas passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislature at the regular session 1921 and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of the said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS." And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the state regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Spearman, attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall and at one public place at each of the voting places of the city of

Spearman for at least thirty (30) full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city and which notice shall be published once each week for four weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty (30) full days prior to the date of the election.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas, that an election be held on the 21st day of November, 1922, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the said City of Spearman in the sum of TWELVE THOUSAND (\$12,000.00) DOLLARS, payable serially or otherwise, not exceeding forty years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of the construction of an Electric Light Plant in the City of Spearman as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, General Laws of the State of Texas passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislature at the regular session 1921 and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the office of McLain & McLain in the City of Spearman and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit: C. W. King, Presiding Officer; P. A. Lyon, Judge; F. C. Sumrall, Clerk and M. L. McLain, Clerk.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, General Laws of the State of Texas passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislature at the regular session 1921 and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said City, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS." And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the state regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Spearman, attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and di-

rected to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall and at one public place at each of the voting places of the city of Spearman for at least thirty (30) full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City, and which notice shall be published once each week for four weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty (30) full days prior to the date of the election.

You are hereby commanded to summon O. M. You are further commanded to so summon defendant by making publication of this citation once in each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county; but if there be no newspaper published therein, then in the nearest county where a newspaper is published.

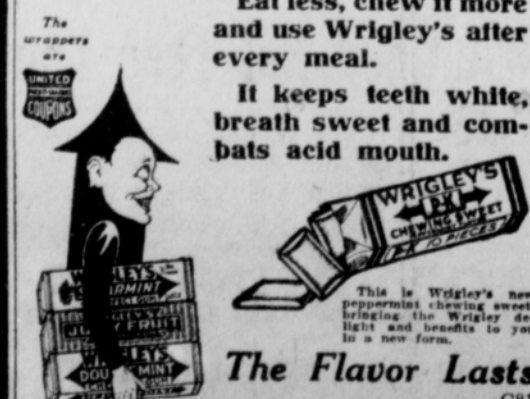
