

## HOW TO INSURE A BIG WHEAT CROP

By the Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association.

Plow the ground early. Cultivate the plowed ground as often as necessary to prevent weed growth.

It is agreed by all good wheat farmers and by the Experiment Stations of the southwest that it does not pay to plow too shallow nor too deep for wheat— from 6 to 7 inches deep gives best results.

If plowing cannot be done right away after harvest, the land should be double disked—to do this immediately and plow later gives almost as good results as to do all the plowing early.

Listing is more rapid than plowing. Where listing is practiced, list early; work the ridges down several weeks before seeding; cultivate as often as necessary to prevent weed growth. Double listing or splitting the ridges has been less profitable than single listing.

To prevent blowing in the western parts of Kansas and Nebraska, the Panhandle of Texas, and eastern Colorado, the ground should be disked rather than plowed when it is loose. After plowing it should be cultivated with implements that leave the fields furrowed and the surface rough. In this western district it does not pay to plow for wheat at all unless it can be done early, and if it is absolutely necessary to prepare land late, double disking will prove about as good a method as any.

Grow wheat in rotation with other crops: it increases the yield and lessens the expense of preparation.

### For City Water Works

As an initial move toward securing a water works system and light plant for Spearman, the City Council recently entered into a contract with the Gantt-Baker Engineering Co., of Amarillo and Oklahoma City, under which this firm will make a preliminary survey and estimate of the cost of construction of a plant adequate to the needs of the city. A competent man will soon be on the ground to make such surveys as are necessary, and when the estimates are received by the council, they will then consider the advisability of calling an election to vote bonds to construct the plant. It is to be hoped that the council will have the support and co-operation of the citizens of the city in this undertaking and that the matter can be worked out to a satisfactory conclusion. We have outgrown the present system and the public watering places about town are a great nuisance. The entire water supply system should be placed on a more business-like basis, and each user of water should pay the rentals charged. Herds of stock are driven into town for water, bringing flies and causing filthy conditions to exist and reducing our water supply to such an extent that it is almost impossible, at times, to keep a head of water to meet the needs of the residents of the town.

The council passed a hog ordinance at their meeting Monday night, which will be found in another part of this issue. If you have a hog it might be well for you to read this ordinance very carefully.

### Be Careful With Fire

Year after year, along in the fall we are told to be careful with fire. Cigarette smokers are warned to be careful, likewise pipe smokers and campers. But owing to the continued dry, hot weather, it is particularly important that everyone use extreme precaution this year. ### The Value of Education

Education means money. In the United States as a whole the average college graduate earns \$2,000 a year, the average high school graduate \$1,000, the average elementary school graduate \$500. Each day spent in high school is worth \$25 to each pupil, each day spent in college \$55.55. This is more than the average boy or girl can make by staying out of school and working.

Only one in a hundred of our people is a college graduate, yet 36 per cent of every one hundred congressmen have been college graduates, while 50 per cent of our Presidents, 54 per cent of our Vice Presidents, 69 per cent of our Supreme Court Judges

and 87 per cent of our attorney-generals have had college degrees.

There is a book called "Who's Who in America." This book contains the names of those persons who are well known because of their good works. The person who can not read and write has one chance in 150,000 to get his name into this book; the grammar school graduate one in 4,250; the high school graduate one in 1,600; the college graduate one in 180; the honor student in college one in three. It pays to graduate.

### From City Health Officer

Having been appointed City Health Officer of the City of Spearman, Handford county, Texas, by the City Council, on this the 8th day of August, 1922, I am going to ask the citizens of Spearman to cooperate with me in making this a safe place in which to live; free from all of the filthy conditions that have existed in the past. The first thing is to clean up the city, and it is up to every citizen to help I will, at different times, inspect the alleys and public places and give you any information that I can to help you comply with the state laws.

All citizens, especially physicians, midwives and nurses, are requested to report to me all contagious diseases which may exist within the city limits, of which they have any knowledge, as my reports must be mailed to the state health officer every week end.

Now, let everyone remove the manure piles from their back yards and clean out the barns and pens. See that the water barrels are clean and keep them covered at all times. Do not have the outhouses exposed and the depth of the pit should be eight feet. A handful of lime should be thrown in the pit every morning. Remember one fly can carry enough germs to spread a contagious disease that will affect every person in Spearman.

Page 187, Title 12, Chapter 1, Article 694 (423) Revised Criminal Statutes, 1911.

Offensive Trades and Nuisances—If any person shall carry on trade, business or occupation injurious to the health of those who reside in the vicinity, or shall suffer any substance which has that effect to remain on premises in his possession, he or she shall be punished by fine not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars; and each separate day of carrying on such business, trade or occupation, or of permitting such substance or animal to remain on premises, shall be considered a separate offense.

### IF YOU HAVE HONEY

Honey eaten in its natural state is so healthful that any, who can, should keep a hive of bees to provide this delectable sweet. Cakes, cookies and other such foods retain their freshness much longer when honey is used for the sweetening.



### Honey Tea-Cake.

—Take one cupful of honey, one-half cupful of sour cream, two eggs, one-half cupful of butter, two cupfuls of flour, scant one-half teaspoonful of soda, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven.

Soft Honey-Cake.—Put a teaspoonful of soda in a measuring cup, add five tablespoonfuls of hot water to the soda, then fill the cup with extracted honey. Take one-half cupful of softened butter and one egg; eat well, add two cupfuls of flour and a teaspoonful of ginger, stir all together and bake in a slow oven.

Crackerjack.—Take one cupful each of brown sugar and extracted honey, boil until it hardens in cold water. Remove from the stove and stir in one-half teaspoonful of soda; add all the popcorn it will take, with a handful of shelled peanuts. Press into a greased dripping pan and mark in squares.

Potato Cake.—Take two cupfuls of mashed potato, one cupful of sugar, one cupful of honey, one cupful of butter, one cupful of sour milk, four eggs, two teaspoonfuls of soda, one-quarter of a cupful of grated chocolate, one teaspoonful each of nutmeg and cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of cloves, two cupfuls of flour, one cup-

ful of chopped nutmeats and two cupfuls of raisins. Beat the butter, sugar and honey to a cream, add the beaten eggs, then the chocolate, milk, soda, flour, mashed potato, spices, nutmeats and raisins. Turn into a well-greased and floured tin and bake in a moderate oven.

Honey Ginger Snaps.—Take one pint of honey, three-fourths of a pound of butter, two teaspoonfuls of ginger; boil together for five minutes, then cool; when nearly cold add flour to make a stiff mixture, roll very thin and bake quickly.

## VARIOMETER SET ON A VERTICAL PANEL

### Method of Building This Receiver and Setting It Up Explained in Detail.

The radio receiver described here is one using a variometer for the tuning circuit and mounted on a vertical panel, 6 inches by 8 inches, instead of a horizontal base board.

To support the panel in a vertical position a small base board four inches wide by six inches long and 1/2 to 5/8 of an inch thick is screwed to the panel.

The material required for the variometer follows:

One piece of bakelite or stiff cardboard tubing, three inches long and 3 1/4 inches outside diameter. Cost about five cents.

One piece of bakelite or stiff cardboard tubing 1 1/4 inches long and 2 5/4 inches outside diameter. Cost about five cents.

100 feet of No. 26 DCC wire. Cost about 25 cents.

Six inches of 1/4 inch outside diameter brass tubing costing about 25 cents.

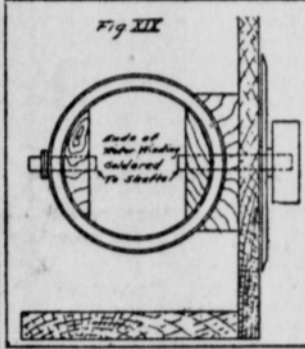
Fig. 18 shows how the details of the variometer are assembled.

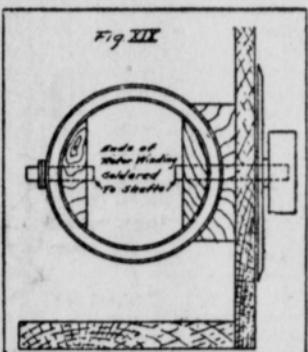
Fig. 18 shows how the details of the variometer are assembled.

Four small blocks of wood as shown in Fig. 18.

One panel 6 by 8 by 3/8 inch.

Eight small round-head 1/4 inch long brass wood screws.

One base board 4 by 7 by 1/2 inch. One standard four-inch diameter dial and knob to take 1/4 inch shaft, costing about \$1.50.

Seven binding posts.

The rotor is wound with 40 turns of the No. 26 DCC wire, divided into two groups of 20 turns, each symmetrical with respect to the center

hole should be such that it be a forced fit for the 1/4 inch diameter shaft.

The winding on the stator is similar to that on the rotor. There are 40 total turns divided into the sections of 20 turns each. The beginning and the ending of the stator windings are 15-16 of an inch from the ends of the tube. When the rotor is assembled inside the stator, the winding on the stator should fall just above that on the rotor.

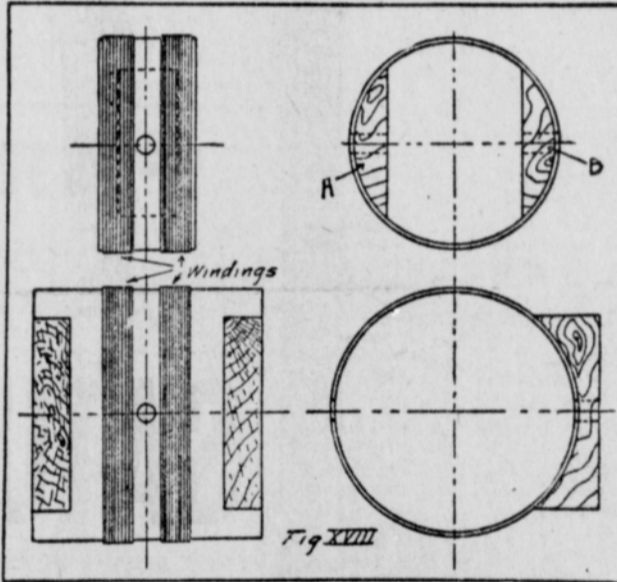
After the rotor and stator are wound, give them a thin coat of shellac and allow it to dry thoroughly before attaching the wooden blocks. Assemble the blocks on the rotor and stator and then give the assembled part a second thin coat of shellac. Put the variometer parts in a hot dry place and allow them to dry until all the volatile matter has been driven



off. This will give the windings a hard finish that will not absorb moisture, yet protect them from mechanical injury and hold them in place.

The vertical panel upon which the set is mounted is six inches high and eight inches long by three-eighths of an inch thick. It should be of a clear, close-grained wood that has been well dried to prevent warping. The panel is fastened to the base board, which is four inches by seven inches, by one half inch thick, by means of the screws.

Before mounting any of the parts, the panel base board should be finished. Staining the panel dull



line of the rotor. Start 1-16 of an inch in from the edge of the rotor and wind on 20 turns, then, crossing over on the other side of the center line, wind on 20 more turns, so that the end of the second group of 20 turns will terminate 1-16 of an inch in from the end of the tube. Bring out the end of the rotor winding on the inside of the tube.

Cut two blocks of wood, A and B in Fig. 18, from pieces of 3-inch soft wood and fasten them as shown diametrically opposite each other on the inside of the rotor tube with some small wood screws. Drill two shaft holes, one through each side of the tube over the thick portion of the wooden block. The diameter of this

block and shellacking the base board will make a pleasing combination.

Fig. 19 shows how the variometer is assembled on the panel. The center of the variometer is three and one-quarter inches up from the bottom of the panel and two and three-quarter inches from end. The assembling drawings are all to scale and by referring to them, all the details will be made clear.

Fig. 20 is a plan view of the set showing the location of the tube socket, grid condenser with grid leak and phone condenser.

A receiver of this type is very simple in operation, since the wave length is entirely controlled by one knob and the detector by the other knob.

## CRYSTAL SET IS ALL RIGHT

In its Own Way It is Quite as Efficient as the Vacuum Tube Outfit.

The small crystal receiving set, which may be likened to "the poor man's set," contrary to reports heard in some quarters, is quite as efficient in its way as the much higher-priced and elaborate vacuum tube outfit. While these sets are usually not guaranteed to receive more than fifteen or twenty-five miles, some amateurs have succeeded in hearing music over a fifty-mile range.

But the most amazing of all is the report which comes from a retailer in New York, who says that he has succeeded in connecting up an amplifier with his set. Despite the handicap of being entirely surrounded by steel skyscrapers, this set is in daily operation.

**Radio Warns of Thunderstorms.**  
Detection of approaching thunderstorms in time to make necessary adjustments in operation of electric service is a valuable practical use of the radio, according to the report of the electrical apparatus committee of the National Electric Light association presented at the convention in Atlantic City. The radio also serves to detect defects in electrical apparatus and equipment more efficiently than any other agency, the report says.

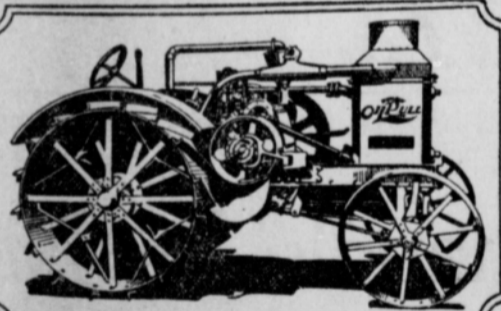

### IF YOU HAVE HONEY

Honey eaten in its natural state is so healthful that any, who can, should keep a hive of bees to provide this delectable sweet. Cakes, cookies and other such foods retain their freshness much longer when honey is used for the sweetening.

**Honey Tea-Cake.**—Take one cupful of honey, one-half cupful of sour cream, two eggs, one-half cupful of butter,

two cupfuls of flour, scant one-half teaspoonful of soda, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven.

**Soft Honey-Cake.**—Put a teaspoonful of soda in a measuring cup, add five tablespoonfuls of hot water to the soda, then fill the cup with extracted honey. Take one-half cupful of softened butter and one egg; eat well, add two cupfuls of flour and a teaspoonful of ginger, stir all together and bake in a slow oven.

**Crackerjack.**—Take one cupful each of brown sugar and extracted honey, boil until it hardens in cold water. Remove from the stove and stir in one-half teaspoonful of soda; add all the popcorn it will take, with a handful of shelled peanuts. Press into a greased dripping pan and mark in squares.

**Potato Cakes.**—Take two cupfuls of mashed potato, one cupful of sugar, one cupful of honey, one cupful of butter, one cupful of sour milk, four eggs, two teaspoonfuls of soda, one-quarter of a cupful of grated chocolate, one teaspoonful each of nutmeg and cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of cloves, two cupfuls of flour, one cup-

ful of chopped nutmeats and two cupfuls of raisins. Beat the butter, sugar and honey to a cream, add the beaten eggs, then the chocolate, milk, soda, flour, mashed potato, spices, nutmeats and raisins. Turn into a well-greased and floured tin and bake in a moderate oven.

**Honey Ginger Snaps.**—Take one pint of honey, three-fourths of a pound of butter, two teaspoonfuls of ginger; boil together for five minutes, then cool; when nearly cold add flour to make a stiff mixture, roll very thin and bake quickly.

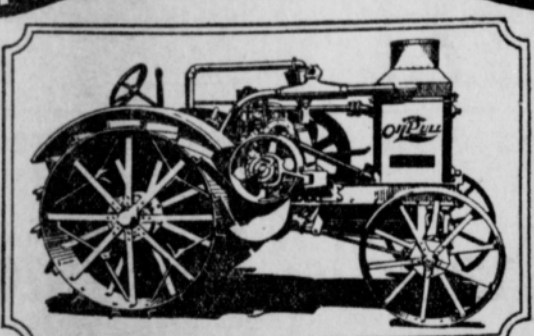

## VARIOMETER SET ON A VERTICAL PANEL

Method of Building This Receiver and Setting It Up Explained in Detail.

The radio receiver described here is one using a variometer for the tuning circuit and mounted on a vertical panel, 6 inches by 8 inches, instead of a horizontal base board.

To support the panel in a vertical position a small base board four inches wide by six inches long and 1/2 to 5/8 of an inch thick is screwed to the panel.

The material required for the variometer follows:

One piece of bakelite or stiff cardboard tubing, three inches long and 3 1/4 inches outside diameter. Cost about five cents.

One piece of bakelite or stiff cardboard tubing 1 1/4 inches long and 2 3/4 inches outside diameter. Cost about five cents.

100 feet of No. 28 DCC wire. Cost about 25 cents.

Six inches of 1/4 inch outside diameter brass tubing costing about 25 cents.

Four small blocks of wood as shown in Fig. 18.

One panel 6 by 8 by 3/8 inch. Eight small round-head 1/4 inch long brass wood screws.

One base board 4 by 7 by 1/2 inch. One standard four-inch diameter dial and knob to take 1/4 inch shaft, costing about \$1.50.

Seven binding posts.

The rotor is wound with 40 turns of the No. 28 DCC wire, divided into two groups of 20 turns, each symmetrical with respect to the center

hole should be such that it be a forced fit for the 1/4 inch diameter shaft.

The winding on the stator is similar to that on the rotor. There are 40 total turns divided into the sections of 20 turns each. The beginning and the ending of the stator windings are 15-16 of an inch from the ends of the tube. When the rotor is assembled inside the stator, the winding on the stator should fall just above that on the rotor.

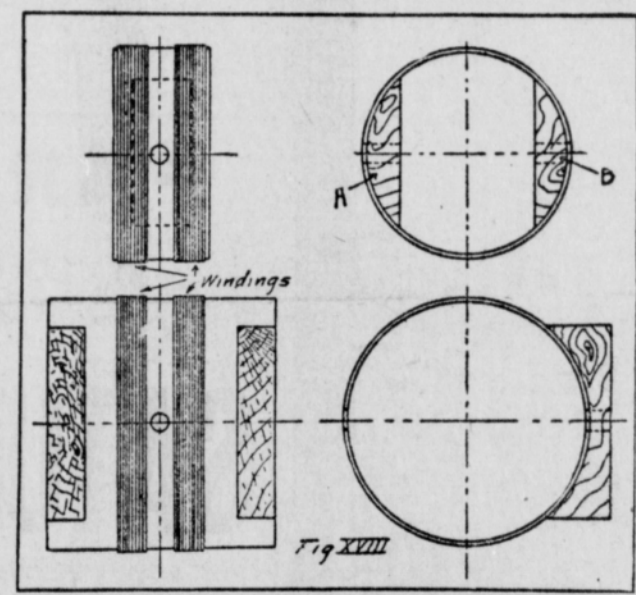
After the rotor and stator are wound, give them a thin coat of shellac and allow it to dry thoroughly before attaching the wooden blocks. Assemble the blocks on the rotor and stator and then give the assembled part a second thin coat of shellac. Put the variometer parts in a hot dry place and allow them to dry until all the volatile matter has been driven



off. This will give the windings a hard finish that will not absorb moisture, yet protect them from mechanical injury and hold them in place.

The vertical panel upon which the set is mounted is six inches high and eight inches long by three-eighths of an inch thick. It should be of a clear, close-grained wood that has been well dried to prevent warping. The panel is fastened to the base board, which is four inches by seven inches, by one-half inch thick, by means of the screws.

Before mounting any of the parts, the panel base board should be finished. Staining the panel dull



line of the rotor. Start 1-16 of an inch in from the edge of the rotor and wind on 20 turns, then, crossing over on the other side of the center line, wind on 20 more turns, so that the end of the second group of 20 turns will terminate 1-16 of an inch in from the end of the tube. Bring out the end of the rotor winding on the inside of the tube.

Cut two blocks of wood, A and B in Fig. 18, from pieces of 3-inch soft wood and fasten them as shown diametrically opposite each other on the inside of the rotor tube with some small wood screws. Drill two shaft holes, one through each side of the tube over the thick portion of the wooden block. The diameter of this

black and shellacking the base board will make a pleasing combination.

Fig. 19 shows how the variometer is assembled on the panel. The center of the variometer is three and one-quarter inches from the bottom of the panel and two and three-quarter inches from end. The assembling drawings are all to scale and by referring to them, all the details will be made clear.

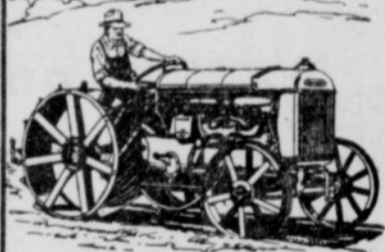

### Tax Rate Fixed At 75 Cents

County Tax Assessor Henry Waldrop on Wednesday received the information from Lon A. Smith, Comptroller of Public Accounts, that the board to calculate the ad valorem tax to be levied for the year 1922 for the state revenue and public free school purposes, had fixed the rate as follows:

State revenue . . . . . 35 cents  
State school . . . . . 35 cents  
Confederate pension . . . . . 05 cents  
Total state rate 75 cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property assessed. This is an increase of 13 per cent. over the rate of last year.

This tax fixing board is composed of the governor, comptroller of public accounts and state treasurer.

The county tax is 65 cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, and the district school tax varies considerably in the several districts, ranging from 20 cents to \$1.00 on the one hundred dollar valuation.
