The Spearman Country Produced One Million Bushels of Wheat in 1921—480 Cars Shipped From Here

From data secured from the different elevators and the depot at Spearman, it is found that Spearman country produced over one million bushels of wheat in 1921. How does that sound for a country that is just beginning to raise wheat, and a county that was given a population of 1300 by the federal census of 1920. Up to Wednesday night 480 cars had been shipped from Spearman, by the following shippers: Spearman Equity Exchange, 129 cars; Cozart Grain Company, 102 cars; Bolin-Hall Grain Company, 76 cars; Horne Grain Company, 25 cars; Mosher Grain Company, 2 cars; Liske Grain Company, 44 cars; Probst Grain Company, 4 cars. The other 88 cars were shipped by track buyers and individuals who ordered cars and shipped on their individual ac-

count. The Equity Exchange has also shipped 35 cars from their elevator at Waka, 10 miles east of Spearman. It is thought that at least 200 cars of wheat which should rightfully have been shipped from Spearman went to other roads on account of inability to get cars here at the proper time, but since the Santa Fe has been furnishing cars, the golden has been pouring into this market at an alarming rate. The Cozart Grain Company has shipped 37 cars since September 1. Spearman buyers pay all the market will allow for wheat and sometimes a little more than is really safe; they are accommodating business men and are rapidly putting Spearman on the map as a grain market. No farmer can do better than bring his wheat to Spearman.

BIG COLD STORAGE PLANT AT AMARILLO

Geo. C. Ellis and A. A. Ellis, spent several days in the Spearman country the past week, talking up interest in a mammoth cold storage and ice plant for Amarillo. These men produce substantial argument that such an enterprise will be a money maker from the start and a great thing for the Amarillo country, of which the Spearman country is a part. Just as an example they point to the fact that 285,000 cases of eggs were shipped out of the Panhandle last year. These eggs were sent to cold storage houses in Denver, Oklahoma City, Omaha and elsewhere, at a cost of approximately 65 cents per case. Many of them were shipped back during the winter at a cost of another 65 cents per case. Eggs which sold in the Panhandle at three dozen for 25 cents were sold to consumers during the winter at 60 to 70 cents per dozen. Think, then, of the possibilities of an immense cold storage concern, right here at home, which can handle all perishable products. Then, the 60 ton ice plant, with the truck for making daily trips, will be a great thing for Spearman. The Reporter believes this enterprise should be encouraged in a substantial way by citizens of Spearman country. After it is well established it is the intention of the

UNIVERSAL JOINT IS VITAL PART OF AUTO

No Portion of Car Works So Hard and Efficiently.

Takes Power of Engine and Transmits it to Propeller Shaft Which Moves According to Movement of Rear Axle.

There are hundreds of moving parts on an automobile or motortruck, but none works so hard and so efficiently as a universal joint. Such a joint is necessary on the propeller shaft extending from the clutch to transmission and from the transmission to the rear axle, as the case may be.

Universal joints are known to operate at more than 98 per cent efficiency, which cannot be said of any other part of an automobile doing such strenuous work.

The universal joint, as its name indicates, allows for free or universal movement of the propeller shaft. It is like your thumb, which you can wiggle in all directions.

A universal joint takes the power of the engine and transmits it to the propeller shaft. At the same time this joint may be constantly moving first in one direction, then another, but usually it moves up and down because the rear axle keeps moving up and down over the road.

The propeller shaft angularity varies according to the relative movement of the rear axle, and were it not for the use of universal joints the shaft would bend or break, and hence could not transmit power.

Every automobile uses universal joints on the propeller shaft. This is an all-metal joint, and the only care which this hard-working part receives is a little grease twice each year. It is remarkable how this part stands up even when owners forget it.

Most owners do not know what a universal joint looks like because it never gives any trouble, but the wise owner will not allow joints to go without grease.

Grease is easily injected through the filler opening by means of a suitable grease gun. The joint should not be filled completely—one-third full is sufficient.

INJURIOUS TO CAR SURFACE

Common Practice of Using Ammonia to Brighten Surface of Hood Will Ruin Finish.

There used to be a common practice of trying to brighten up the finish of the hood by the use of a solution of ammonia. This is about the worst thing that could be done, as ammonia eventually destroys the finish. Unfortunately the ammonia gives a little temporary brilliance to the finish, but in the long run it ruins it. In fact, car manufacturers recommend that no car be kept in a stable or barn, as the ammonia from manure gradually destroys the enameled surface.

SUMMERY FOODS.

DISHES easy of digestion and those refreshing as well as easy to prepare are those that interest us during the warm days.

Creamed Chicken in Crown of Rice.

For a crown mold holding one pint of material, wash a scant cupful of rice and cook in one quart of chicken broth, in whole or part. Salt, using one-half teaspoonful. When done butter the mold and pack in the rice. Set the mold on several folds of paper in a dish of boiling water and let cool until the filling is ready. Melt one fourth cupful of butter. In it cook one-fourth of a cupful of flour, one-half teaspoonful each of salt and pepper, a scant pint of liquid, broth or milk, one or both. Fill the center with the creamed chicken and serve at once.

Sardine Hors d'Oeuvre.

Cut Boston brown bread into rounds. Cut out a thin round one-eighth of an inch from the edge of this open space between edge. Fill sardines sliced and the two with good and boned, seasoned with lemon juice, salt and paprika and Worcestershire sauce mixed together. Salt a slice of hard-cooked egg at the center and a row of capers around the edge.

Coffee and Tapioca Trifle.

Have ready two cupfuls of clear strained coffee and one-half cupful of pearl tapioca. Cook the tapioca with the coffee until well done. When done add one-half cupful of sugar, a pinch of salt, turn into glass cups and finish when cold with whipped sweetened cream.

Green Peppers Stuffed With Mutton.

Cold mutton chopped, some of the gravy or sauce with which it was served may be mixed with it, seasoning well and use as a stuffing for green peppers. Cut the peppers in halves or remove the tops; parboil for five minutes; drain and chill, then fill. Bake in a moderate oven basting with broth occasionally.

ALARM WARNS OF DEFECTIVE TIRE

Electric Device Invented by Indianapolis Man Can Be Attached to Any Wheel.

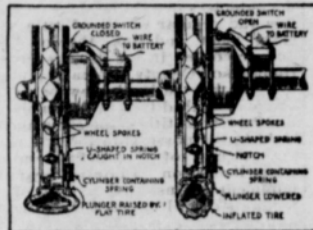
ELECTRIC SWITCH DOES WORK

Placed in Position So That They Will Be Thrown to One or Other of Closed Positions When Tire Is Punctured.

It frequently happens that air leaks slowly from a tire without the driver's knowing it. The tire becomes flat and the rims of the wheel cut into it. To warn drivers in time, George F. Young of Indianapolis has recently invented an electric alarm which can be attached to any wheel. It consists of an electric switch which is mounted on the axle of a wheel. The blade of this switch projects toward the spokes of the wheel. The end of the blade stops very close to the spokes, though enough space is left to enable the blade to barely clear them.

Working of Switch.

Working in conjunction with the blade of the switch is a metal finger mounted on one of the spokes of the wheel. This finger can slide radially to the wheel, but a spring normally holds it away from the axle, with one

end up against the underside of the inflated tire. The other end of the finger will clear the projecting blade when the tire is properly inflated. Just as soon as the tire begins to flatten, the finger is pressed radially inward and it strikes against the projecting blade. The switch is thereby closed and an alarm, such as a well located light or buzzer which is very easily heard, is operated.

Rotate With Wheels.

The various switches are mounted so that they do not rotate with the wheels with which they are associated; but they are placed in a position so that they will be thrown to one or the other of their closed positions when the tire is punctured or if the air suddenly leaves it. This method of mounting may be carried out in several different forms. The one most convenient is shown in the accompanying illustration.—Popular Science Monthly.

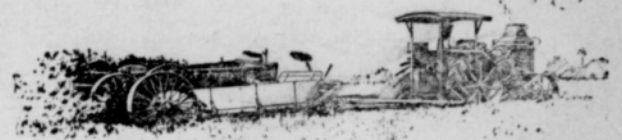

THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

"BLACKGUARD."

IN OLDEN days the palaces of kings and the palaces of nobles were by no means as well furnished and as clean as they are at the present day, and it was customary when members of royalty or the nobility visited each other that the guest should bring with him all his kitchen utensils, pots, pans and even a certain amount of coal. The scullions and lesser retainers had charge of these goods, rode among them, were smutted by them and received the contemptuous appellation of the "black guard." In time the word came to be understood as meaning any troop or company of ragamuffins, and finally, when its original application had been buried in the lore of centuries, it was applied to a single person as an epithet of opprobrium—as being synonymous with a rogue or rascal who would stop at nothing in order to gain his ends.

It was in the earlier sense, however, that Dryden used the term a stage-direction in his play "The Conquest." "Enter the captain of the French with his black guard at his heels, and Fuller likewise spoke of the "devil's black guard" in the Crusades as meaning "the number of thieves, debtors and runaway slaves who joined in the Holy war."

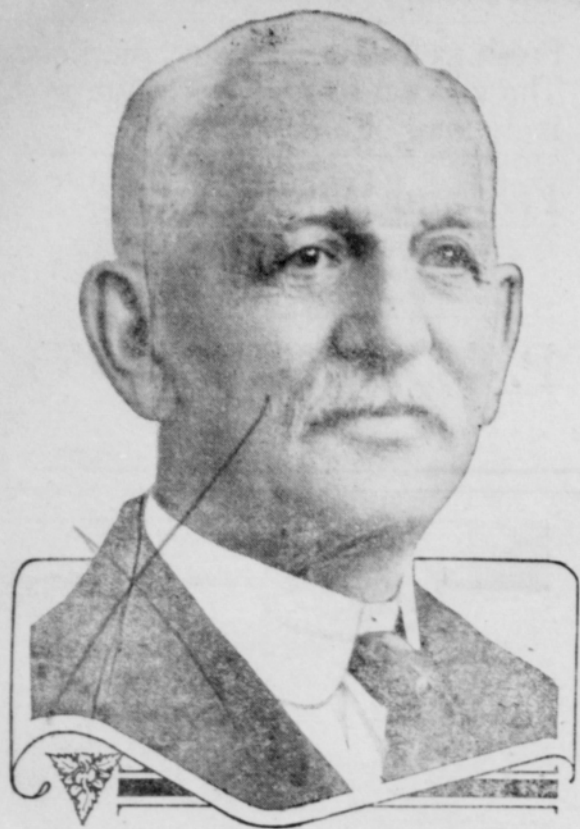

SUMMERY DISHES.

Junket is so easy to prepare and so easily digested that it makes an ideal summer food.



Coffee Junket.

To a pint and a half of milk warmed to new milk temperature add a junket tablet dissolved in a tablespoonful of coffee infusion, add a cupful of coffee and pour into sherbet cups stirring well to mix with the junket, sweeten to taste and let stand in a warm room to become firm, then chill.

On a hot day there is nothing more restful than a meal out of doors. If it cannot be taken in the woods or by a stream, the grounds at home or even the porch will be a good substitute. A screened in porch, if near the kitchen, makes an ideal dining room for summer weather.

Salmon Salad.—To a can of salmon add one cupful of cucumber pickles finely chopped, one and one-half cupfuls of oyster crackers, crushed fine, mix with salad dressing and serve on lettuce.

Custards of various kinds and flavors make most wholesome desserts. A cup custard is easy to prepare and when chilled is especially dainty. Slightly beat two eggs to a pint of milk, add sugar and flavoring and pour into the custard cups. Set the cups in a pan of hot water and steam until the custards set firm to the center. Remove and set on ice when cool to chill.

Jellies and gelatines are delicious combinations with fruit and nuts served with whipped cream. Lemon jelly served with a chocolate blanc mange is a combination not very common, but very good.

Such desserts may be prepared the evening before while dinner is in preparation or early in the morning. A light dessert should follow a heavy dinner, especially during the hot weather.

Dates and Orange Salad.—Peel and carefully remove oranges into sections, mix with quartered well washed dates, adding a little diced pineapple. Serve on lettuce with any good dressing mixed with whipped cream.

HELPFUL HINTS—TASTY PLANS

Bits of butter left on the bread and butter plates should be saved for seasoning. A tablespoonful or two of butter from each meal will season a dish of vegetables. Other fats may be a wholesome and cheaper, but but ter has a flavor all its own.

Pits of left over pastry may be rolled out for tarts or sprinkled with sugar and cinnamon and baked; they make nice little cakes to serve with tea.

Nut Cutlets.—Have ready half a cupful of chopped nuts, using Brazil nuts, walnuts and almonds; add to them a cupful of breadcrumbs and a cupful of mashed potatoes, with a little chopped onion and parsley; beat two eggs, mix with the other ingredients, add salt and pepper and form into balls or cakes; dip in beaten egg and crumbs and fry a golden brown.

Fruit Juice Pie.—Take two and one-half tablespoonfuls of cornstarch, add one-fourth cupful of sugar, one cupful of any strained juice, a teaspoonful of butter, a pinch of salt and the yolks of two eggs. Cook all together, adding the egg yolk at the last. Cover with a meringue, using the whites of the eggs, and pour into a baked crust.

Chicken Custard.—A good dish for an invalid and one that is dainty too! Take one and one-half cupfuls of bread crumbs from the center of the loaf, add to them two tablespoonfuls of finely chopped chicken breast. Beat the yolks of two eggs until well mixed, add to them a dash of celery salt, a pinch of salt, and a cupful of milk. Pour into a custard cup, set cup in hot water and bake until the custard is set. Serve hot.

Filled Sponge Cake.—Scoop the center from a deep sponge cake and fill with mashed sweetened berries and cover with sweetened whipped cream. Serve at once. The top may be put back, covering the berries, if desired. Brooms should be dipped in hot suds once a week, rinsed and dried, then hung, as standing on the straw spoils the broom.
