THERE is no better way to waste your time than to work in an office where there is friction between the employees.

The root of the evil is generally poor organization. If you are given orders by someone whom you do not recognize as your superior, you are likely to get huffy. You don't carry out the orders as you should. The work of the office suffers.

Every office should have an understanding as to the rating of each employee. If you give orders there must be no mistake in your right. If you take orders you should understand that the person giving them has the authority.

If the office is small it is easy for the head to give instructions on this point. If it is large it is better to have a chart showing the exact position of each member of the force.

But there are other sources of friction. A habit of fault finding and criticism is an excellent medium for friction. Don't fall into the habit of criticizing your superiors. It is a schoolgirl trick. The entire atmosphere of an office can be poisoned by it.

If you are working in an office that is a hotbed of this sort of thing, get out of it. You will do better to take a chance, even to accept a lower salary, where the spirit of the employees is friendly, and the whole office force works together. You will do better work, stand more chance of promotion, and your character will not suffer.

### HARVESTING THE BIG WHEAT CROP

The whole life of the Spearman country is centered this week on the harvesting of the immense wheat crop. Hundreds of harvest hands have been brought in from Amarillo and elsewhere, but more are needed and farmers are calling for help from all parts of the country. S. B. Hale spent two days in Shattuck this week and succeeded in rounding up quite a bunch of workers. C. W. Carson, H. E. James and Louie Coats each made a trip down there for the same purpose. John L. Hays went to Texola and brought back a good bunch. The safest proposition still seems to be to go to Amarillo prepared to haul out the number of men you want, and stay there until they are found. The weather so far this week has been fine, with the exception of light showers of rain Thursday night. The harvest on the lower plains is finished and it is thought the labor proposition will be greatly improved by Monday. The wheat yield per acre is much greater than farmers expected and will make up in a large measure for the recent drop in price. Some fields are producing as high as 30 bushels per acre but the general average is 18 to 22 bushels per acre.

M. B. Wright was taken to the sanitarium at Amarillo the first of the week for medical treatment and on Thursday members of the family here received information that his condition was not improved and to come at once. Mr. Wright's health has been failing for the past several months and relatives and his hundreds of friends throughout this section are watching the result of the treatment at Amarillo with much interest.

### Orangeade.

Take two cupfuls of orange juice, add one and one-half cupfuls of sugar, one cupful of strained cranberry juice and two quarts of water. Boil the sugar and water together five minutes, then cool and add the strained juices. Garnish each glass with a slice of orange hung on the edge of the glass.

### Simple Dessert.

Break crustless bread into a bowl and pour over it enough canned fruit juice to thoroughly soak the bread. Set away to chill and serve with cream and sugar. Such a dessert is especially good for the little folks.

### String Beans and Tomatoes.

Take freshly cooked string beans and put into a baking dish with some olive oil, chopped onion, parsley, salt and pepper. Cook slowly. As the beans dry out add the strained juice of tomatoes.

### Cheese With Tomatoes.

Take one cupful of stewed tomatoes, one-half slice of onion chopped, and one cupful of cheese cut in bits; cook until soft and then add a teaspoonful of salt and the same amount of paprika. Serve on toast or hot crackers.

### Orange Sherbet.

Use a pint of orange juice, a quarter of a cup of lemon juice, sugar to sweeten and add one pint of cream. Freeze and serve with a garnish of candied peel or orange marmalade.

### Lemon Raisin Pie.

Take a cupful of large raisins, add a cupful of sugar, one large lemon, part of the grated rind, a tablespoonful of flour and a cupful of water. Bake with two crusts.

For a Friday meal serve boiled fish, lemon sauce, baked potatoes and a steamed pudding with an egg sauce.

### AMARILLO WANTS NORTH PLAINS TRADE

"Is Amarillo keenly alive, and is she thinking in terms of her future?"

This question is being hurled with telling force by W. E. Harding, head of the Amarillo Hardware Company, into the consciousness of manufacturers, jobbers and wholesalers of this city.

In dealing with pertinent questions, Mr. Harding calls attention to all who are interested in Amarillo—as a wholesale and jobbing center, to the fact that a representative of a large concern is here, making a survey of facts and conditions, for the purpose of determining whether the wares of this concern shall be handled through an agency here, or one in Kansas City or Wichita, for the North Panhandle territory.

The presence of this representative has sharpened Mr. Harding's attitude toward the prevailing conditions. He is concentrated on the idea of getting a concerted action among Amarillo wholesalers and jobbers, with reference to the North Plains trade.

Prior to the construction of the Santa Fe line out of Shamrock into and through the towns of Pollett, Darrrouzett, Booker and Perryton and on to Spearman, Amarillo served all of that portion of the Texas Panhandle, almost exclusively. But with the building of the road, the territory was entered by concerns from Woodward, Wichita and Kansas City, much to the detriment of various wholesale jobbing enterprises of this city.

It is the assumption voiced by Mr. Harding that even Spearman, being a little more than a hundred miles out of Amarillo, on a straight line, is in the legitimate trade territory of this city. He points to the great development of that section of plains and the incident increased demands for the goods and wares dispensed from this city. Asked to suggest a remedy, Mr. Harding stated that truck lines should be operated from Amarillo, with vehicles out and in each day. The number of such trucks should be sufficient and the patronage of such volume as would warrant a real service operated on schedule that would make patronage profitable alike to those engaged in merchandising and those doing transporting of the goods.

It was the expressed opinion of Mr. Harding that this would be done during the pendency of schemes for the construction of a line of railroad out of Amarillo north. Mr. Harding expressed the belief that if Amarillo had seen fit at the proper time, to get adequately behind such a line, that it would have been built a number of years ago. While the time just now is inopportune to suggest extension of railroads, Mr. Harding believes that the scheme is by no means lacking in the elements of feasibility and desirability. He thinks when finances may be secured easily and in sufficient sums, when business becomes normal, extension to any legitimate and warranted extent may be expected.

While this is true, it is the contention of Mr. Harding that if the people of Amarillo sit idly by and witness the establishment of agencies, the concentration of supplies, the stabilizing of affiliations with other trade centers, that this city will have lost much of the patronage to which it is rightly entitled, and which will be regained with a maximum measure of difficulty. As a remedy against this state of affairs the truck transportation is suggested. It is admitted that the trucks may not be the swiftest or the most satisfactory mode of shipping, but it is declared that it far in advance of no transportation at all, and when viewed in comparison with the railroad, has in some ways its advantages.

The matter will doubtless be brought by Mr. Harding to the attention of all wholesalers and jobbers in Amarillo, at a meeting now being considered, and which will doubtless be held at an early date—Amarillo Daily News.

## GOOD ROADS

### FEDERAL AID FOR HIGHWAYS

President Harding Insists That States and Communities Keep Roads in Repair.

President Harding has touched upon a subject which it is to be hoped he will develop in his communications to congress, and that is the subject of federal participation in the building of good roads. The government is committed to the policy of co-operating with the states in road construction, and there is no disposition to depart from it, but the President is emphatic in his insistence that the states and communities shall assume the responsibility of keeping their roads in repair, which is only a just and fair proposition, says Washington Post. If the government is to pay out millions of the taxpayers' money to help pay for the construction of roads, only to see within a few years these highways deteriorate into disuse and decay, that money is wasted.

The value of good roads is now generally recognized and the larger and more progressive states have proved that they are good investments. Improved highways mean not only good automobile roads, they mean cheaper and better food, greater values in the land, better opportunities for the rural population. And they also pay good dividends in the huge sums collected in license fees for motor vehicles, enough in most instances to pay the cost of repairs and improvements.

The policy of the government co-operating with the states in the cost of road building has been a great incentive in the construction of better highways and there is no doubt that

many thousands of miles of roads have been built under this plan, which otherwise would not have been undertaken. It should and doubtless will be continued, but there should be an expressed guarantee that roads built under this co-operative plan are to be maintained and kept in good repair. This preeminently is the duty of the

state and not of the general government, and it should be understood that no state will receive an appropriation from the federal government for road building except under the stipulation that it will make provision for upkeep.

This is good policy and good business and President Harding is conserving the public interest in bringing it to the attention of the country. States like Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio and Maryland, which have expended millions of their own money on a system of improved highways, willingly would give guarantees along this line, and if any state is not ready to make such an agreement it should not participate in the federal appropriation.

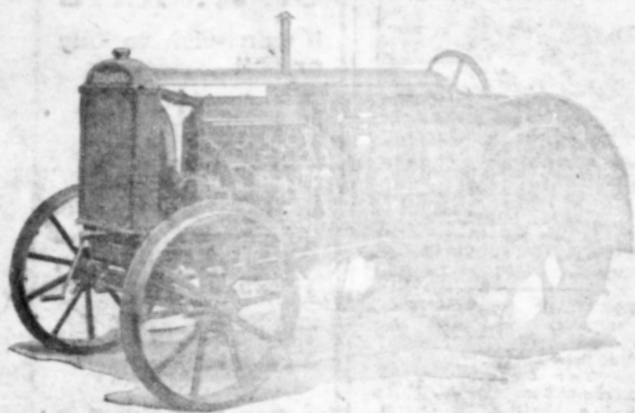

#### FACTORS IN PLANNING ROAD

Location, Construction and Maintenance Must Be Taken into Serious Consideration.

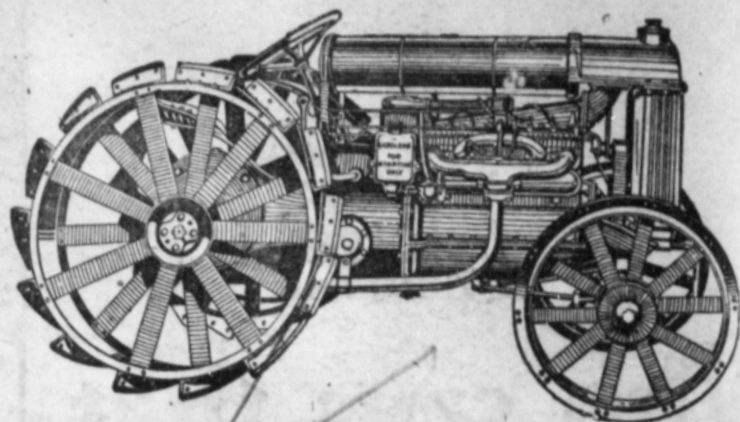
