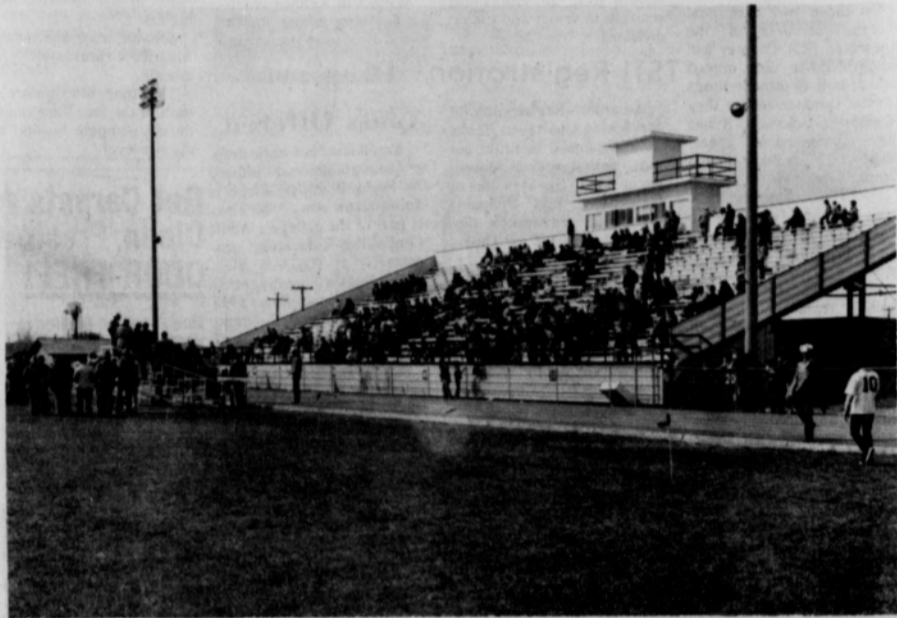

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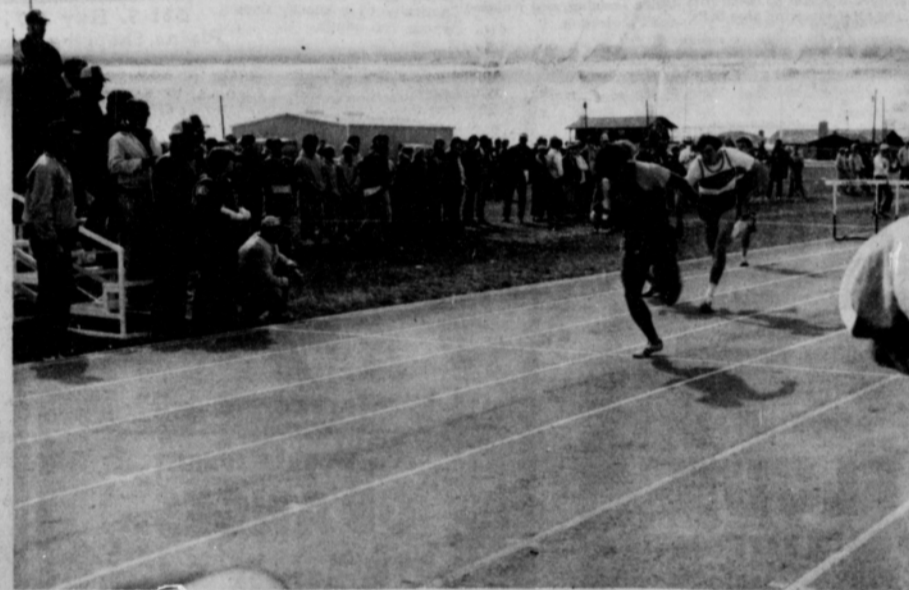

Lynx Edge Sunray To Win Lynx Relays



In spite of the chilly weather, many were the spectators who turned out for the Lynx Relays in Spearman last Saturday as is evidenced by the crowd in the grandstand and elsewhere during the afternoon's activities. Spearman won the Lynx Relays with track and field teams from Sunray, Gruver, Booker, Canadian and Phillips in addition to the Spearman Junior Varsity competing.



Sunray's Ricky Vasquez appears to be almost stumbling but he really is intent on breaking the tape to come in ahead of his two Canadian pursuers and win the 120-yard high hurdles in last Saturday's Lynx Relays in Spearman.

The Spearman Lynx racking up a total of 143 points on the basis of 9 first, 14 second and 7 third places literally ran and jumped their way to win the Lynx Relays held in Spearman, Saturday, March 5.

Seven teams, including the Spearman Junior Varsity which collected 8 points, entered the day's events.

Sunray took second with 139 points. Gruver was third with 111. Canadian finished in fourth place with 44 points while Phillips came in fifth on the basis of 28 points and Booker, with 25 points, wound up in sixth place.

In the high school events, Spearman's John Holman with a jump of 13 feet, 6 inches, took first in the pole vault and John Reneau, in 23.8 seconds, won the 220-yard dash.

Spearman's Tylon Pierce, leaping 5-feet, 3-inches, took first in the high jump in the eighth grade competition.

The Lynx foursome of Sellers, Reneau, Morris and Sherwood beat the clock and a swift-running Sunray squad to take the 440-yard relay in 45.3 seconds, just a few whiskers faster than the second-place time of :46.1.

In seventh grade competition, Spearman won five first places; the long jump with Stan Sherwood managing 15-feet, 1 1/2 inches; high jump with Sherwood making it over the bar at 5-feet, 2-inches; the 60-yard intermediate hurdles with Sherwood making the run in 9 seconds; the 100-yard Dash with Chuck Rigdon doing the yardage in 11.7 seconds and the 100-yard low hurdles with Sherwood doing the stretch in 13.2 seconds.

Spearman took six second places in the high school competition, four in the eighth grade competition and 14 in the seventh grade competition.

Spearman Wrestler Is State Champion

A Spearman Junior High School student, Johnny Lira, is the state champion in the 106-pound weight class after competition March 5 in Amarillo during the State Wrestling Tournament for Elementary and Junior High School Boys in which other Spearman representatives took a third and two fourth places.

Coach Jim Ivey said that Lira's win qualifies him to go to the national wrestling finals in Iowa later this year.

Carl Urban in the 44-pound weight class took a third place.

Raymond Mosley took a fourth place in the 77-pound class and Greg Meek took a fourth place in the 80-pound class.

In winning his championship status, Lira took three opponents to the mat in jig time, pinning the first one in 36 seconds of the first period, the second in 33 seconds of the first period and the other in 22 seconds of the first period. His opponents were from Plano, Amarillo Maverick, Amarillo YMCA and Fort Worth.

Urban scored against opponents from Irving, Fort Hood and Fort Worth.

Meek decided wrestlers from Houston, Temple and Longview.

Mosley took advantage of opponents from Fort Hood, Fort Worth, Amarillo maverick Club, Pampa and the Amarillo YMCA.

In addition to his three quick pins, Lira also decided a fourth opponent.

Lira is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Lira. Urban is the son of Mrs. Winnie Urban. Meek is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Meek. Mosley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Barber of Gruver.

County Junior Livestock Show March 18-19

The 1977 Hansford County Junior Livestock Show and Sale will be March 18 and 19 at the County Barn in Spearman with the Gruver Future Farmers of America, Gruver 4-H, Morse 4-H, Spearman FFA and Spearman 4-H clubs and chapters participating.

Advance entries must be in by March 11 to their respective advisors, accompanied by an entry fee of \$3 per steer, \$1.50 per lamb and \$3 per barrow.

Livestock will arrive March 18 with swine and sheep to arrive between 8 and 10 a.m. and cattle between 10 and noon and be weighed.

Each exhibitor is to submit a completed record book on their project animals to their adult advisor as soon as possible after the show is completed. Record books will be judged according to accuracy, completeness and neatness. Cash prizes will be \$7.50, \$5 and \$2.50 for first, second and third places in both FFA and 4-H records.

First, second and third place

ribbons will also be given as premiums in each organization.

The show schedule begins Friday afternoon 1:45 p.m. with the Grand Opening in which all directors, agriculture teachers, the county agent, FFA Chapter Presidents, 4-H Club Chairman, FFA Sweetheart and Plowgirl will report to the arena and participate in the ceremonies.

Lamb show starts at 2 p.m. with the swine show to follow completion of lamb show.

Steer judging will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday and the livestock judging contest will be conducted by agriculture department personnel from Frank Phillips College in Borger during activities starting at 2 p.m. with trophies and awards for the winners to be provided by the Spearman Chamber of Commerce.

Judges this year will be Randy Upshaw of Tulia as sheep judge, Bobby Lee of Wilson as swine judge and Don Reeves of Wellington as

steers judge.

The big night Saturday begins at 6 p.m. with such activities as presentation of livestock judging awards, showmanship trophies and top gaining award to be handed out to the successful exhibitor.

Immediately following the presentation of awards the auctioneer will begin activities in the sale of lambs, swine and steers.

The 1976 Grand Champion Steer was shown by Sam Boone of Spearman FFA. Grand Champion Barrow was shown by Lonnie Clemmons of Spearman FFA and Grand Champion Lamb was shown

by Eric Brown also of the Spearman FFA.

Will the Spearman FFA again dominate the show? Admission is free and spectators can come out and join exhibitors and others in finding out the results.

12 Complete Defensive Driving Course

Residents from Gruver, Sunray and Spearman took the one-day defensive driving course taught in Spearman March 5, it has been announced by John R. Collard, Jr., instructor and one of the sponsors.

The 12 who completed the course will have two distinct advantages: for the \$10 cost, they will be eligible for a 10% reduction in the cost of insurance for a private pas-

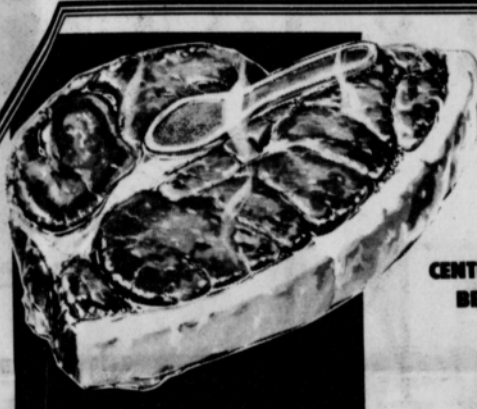



Fertilizers Help Keep Price Of Food Down

Next time you're shopping for food, think about how much more groceries would cost if 40 percent of the world's food supply didn't exist. That much food is directly dependent upon commercial fertilizers for its production.

Even though commercial fertilizers play such a major role in world food production, they account for only three to four cents of every U.S. retail food dollar. These fertilizers, really nothing more than food for plants—nitrogen from the air, phosphate from the ground and potassium from potash mines—provide the essential nutrients necessary for plant growth.

Until the 1880's when commercial fertilizers were first developed, farmers had to depend on "natural" fertilizers—plant and animal waste—to replace nutrients depleted by over-use of the soil. Today, of course, there is simply not enough animal and plant waste to meet the enormous needs of world-wide farming. And even if there was, the problems of storing and transporting it would be insurmountable. Last year, for example, farmers used 91 million tons of fertilizers. Using "natural" fertilizers, 1.8 billion tons would have been needed to obtain the same harvest.

Obviously, the development of modern fertilizers and other advances in farm technology have revolutionized the agricultural industry. They not only increase the harvest of the farm but also do more of the farmer's work. In the 1880's one farmer could produce enough food for five people. Today the average farmer can produce ten times that amount with the help of fertilizers and modern machinery.



Commercial fertilizers have also helped farmers produce more food than before by increasing the yield of each acre farmed. Scientists at W. R. Grace & Co., one of the two largest producers and distributors of commercial fertilizers, cite, for example, that on the average, one ton of a standard mixed commercial fertilizer can produce about 15 tons of harvested corn crop. To insure this agricultural output, the company is in the midst of nearly doubling fertilizer production capacity to seven million tons annually. This is in response to Grace economists' prediction that fertilizer needs will increase on an average of about six percent annually through the next 10 years.

Use of fertilizer by itself, of course, is not enough to solve the world's food shortage. Many factors—weather, storage, technology, economics—affect the use of fertilizers and their effect on agricultural output. Fertilizers do, however, contribute to keeping prices low and output high.

International Paper Company owns 8.5 million acres of timberland and has harvest rights on another 15.6 million acres. For each tree harvested the company plants five new seedlings. Trees are our most renewable resource.

To protect the environment, more than \$275 million has been spent or appropriated by International Paper in recent years. It appears that environmental control equipment will account for almost 30 percent of the future capital expenditures in the pulp and paper industry.

How can I apply these recommendations to my daily diet? Eat sensibly! A balanced diet is the key to good eating habits. To lower saturated fat and cholesterol levels in your diet, make intelligent choices. Choose skim milk rather than whole milk and use only skim milk cheeses. Substitute fish and chicken for red meat in most meals. Lean meats can be used if all fat is removed. Use shellfish in moderation.

GED Tests At FPC

General Education Development (GED) tests will be given at Frank Phillips College on Friday and Saturday, to all persons who wish to take them and who meet the listed requirements. Persons taking the tests

must be residents of Texas. Seventeen year-olds may take the tests if they are entering the armed forces, and must bring with them a letter from the parents and from the recruiting officer. Persons 18 years old may take the tests if they have been out of school for one calendar year and present a letter of proof from the principal of the school at-

tended. All persons 19 years of age or older are eligible. Satisfactory completion of the tests will obtain for those taking them a certificate which is the equivalent of a high school diploma and is accepted in most states as such. A series of five tests will be given, on Friday from 6-10 p.m., and on Saturday from 8

a.m. until 1 p.m. The tests will be given in the reading room of the Library building. Cost of the tests is \$5 for the complete series, or \$2 per individual test.

Yield Contest Winner Announced

The National Corn Growers Association has announced the winner of its 1976 Nationwide Yield Contest, a hybrid handled in Spearman by AGCO of Spearman. Dennis Kindsvater of Dodge City, Kansas, using a mid to full season hybrid NC159, produced the top irrigated and highest overall yield of 262.55 bushels per acre. Second and third place entrants were from Texas and California who produced yields of 253.22 and 247.51 bushels per acre. The National Corn Growers Association competition has been conducted for 12 years and it is the only non-commercial Nationwide yield contest. At 25 acres it requires the largest field size

of any contest. In the 1976 competition over 1,000 corn producers from 46 states entered hybrids from 30 commercial seed companies. Kindsvater's field entry was planted May 15 at a rate of 32,000 kernels per acre. There were approximately 26,000 plants per acre at harvest. Because of high April rainfall, no pre-irrigation was required. About 16 inches of water was applied throughout the growing season. According to Kindsvater no herbicides were used. His fertilizer program included 40 tons of manure and 70 pounds of nitrogen applied during the winter. Another 40-45 pounds of nitrogen was applied through the sprinkler at tasseling time.

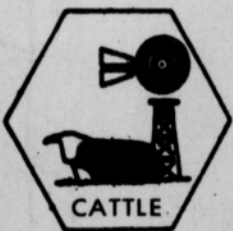

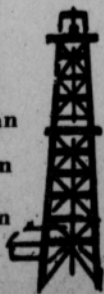

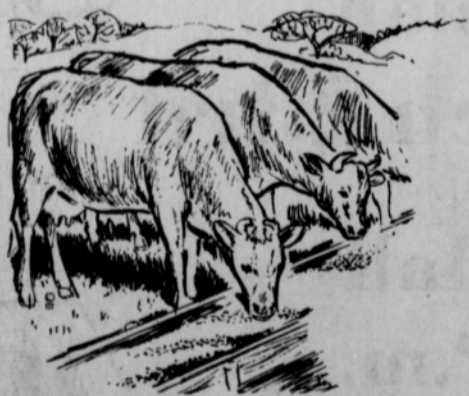
