Contracts totaling \$433,163.10 for the Economic Development Administration water and gas systems improvement projects in Spearman have been signed and works is expected to begin for gas system reconstruction and improvements to the system the first of February, it has been announced by Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett.

Contracts were signed last week by the Mayor as required in order to kick off the work to be done under each of the three contracts.

T.O.K. Company of Amarillo, the low bidder at \$282,079.50 for gas system construction and improvements to the system, is expected to begin work in Spearman about the first of next month replacing existing lines and installing some new lines. All the work will be on City Property, City Manager Mark Neff reported.

Part of the work will the airport is to be drilled to approximately 480 feet and the one across from the high school is to go to a depth of approximately 510 feet under terms of the contract.

This will take about 60 days for completion and it was pointed out that drilling will take place during daylight hours to reduce any possible disturbances which might be created at other hours during such operations.

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

As they do every two years, on the second Tuesday in January, Texas Legislators have converged upon the State Capitol Building, in Austin, to begin the 140-day session of the 65th Texas Legislature Legislature. Committee Legislature. Committee hearings, staff meetings, regular floor sessions, meetings with constituents, and volumes of reserarch material will all help shape the bills that will wind their way through subcomittees and bills that will wind their way through subcomittees and committees, and finally floor debate, before becoming law. Speaker of the House, Bill Clayton, of Lamb County, expects more than 4,000 measures to be introduced. Of course, the vast majority of these will die in the legislative process, before reaching the House floor.

After the pomp and cere-mony of the opening day festivities, the Legislators settled down to work. Folcommittee assignments were announced by Speaker Clay-ton. It's make-up of these committees that will largely determine the priorities of the Legislature in the months to come

If the rest of the House members are as concerned with spending legislation, and wise use of funds, as the Panhandle Delegation, these issues will receive much attention from the

attention from the lawmakers.





Peggy's **Pointers**

Stretch your dollar power by making sales work for you, says Peggy Marrs, County Extension Agent. Authorities estimate that families can save between 15 and 25 percent on purchases during the year by taking advantage of special prices.

Effective sales shopping begins with a purpose and plan in mind. Stock up on as many items as you use regularly that you have room to store. Identify future needs and be on the lookout for them. However, resist the temptation to buy just because the item is on sale. Nothing is a bargain unless you need it. Know the regular selling

price so you can recognize a reduced price. Keep in mind that prices vary from store to store. A sale price at one store may be the regular

price at another.

Be an informed sales shopper by knowing your legal rights. Texas laws make it illegal for a store to advertise false or misleading statements about arise reducments about price reduc-tions. The law state that stores which advertise an item on sale must have a supply large enough to meet reasonable public demand, unless the ad specifies a

limited quantity.

Preventing medicine from deteriorating too rapidly is a key consideration in home

medicine storage.

Over-the-counter medicines (OTC) usually are safe and effective for approx-imately two years -- if stor-age conditions are favorable. But if they aren't, the medi-

cine may lose quality faster. Few OTC drugs have expiration dates printed for the consumers' information; so it is wise to print clearly the purchase date on medicines to keep track of their age.

Humidity and moisture speed deterioration of many drugs, especially tablets and powders. Vitamins often are sold in dark plastic contain-ers to protect them from light. In general, drugs need to be protected from intense light, heat and moisture. Some may need to be refrig-

The bathroom is a popular place to store medicines, but it is often steamy and warm.

The kitchen presents a better atmosphere, if the drugs can be stored away from the stove -- and not

from the stove -- and not above the regrigerator -- and the kitchen is well ventilated. Cabinets with a special section used only for drugs should be clearly marked and set apart from regular food storage areas.

It is advisable to discard a drug with any sign of deterioration, rather than take a chance using it. The user does not know the effect that may result from chemical changes which have taken place. 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

Even this approach can hurt the body if a person doesn't select from the four broad categories of the milk group, vegetable and fruit group, meat group and bread and cereal group. Eating sensibly from all these groups adds variety and makes it easier to lose weight and form sensible eating patterns.

Bob Close Report

64th District Representative Bob Close, of Perryton, has introduced a bill in the House of Repre-sentatives that would expand sentatives that would expand the permissive use of oral confessions, in criminal trials in Texas courts. His propo-sal would amend the article of the Code of Criminal Procedure dealing with con-

fessions, and bring Texas in line with the other 49 states and federal law.

The proposed amendment provides that an oral statement can be used against the accused at his trial under certain circumstances.

"Under existing law, some oral confessions made before a room full of people, are not

admissable evidence," said Close. Under the new proposed

legislation, oral statements made while being interrogated by law enforcement officials will be admissable if heard by two or more persons. The witness-es must write a memoran-dum of the statement they heard, telling the date, time and place it was made. This must be done within 48 hours

after the statement was made, and be sworn to before a magistrate.

Rep. Close added that, "this proposal will not change any of the safeguards now required by State or Federal constitutional or statutory law, and will add an additional weapon to combat crime."

This piece of legislation is a companion bill to Senate Bill 157, that was introduced



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
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
