## Automobile dealership sale announced



Jimmy Shieldknight announced this week that he has sold his Excel Chevrolet Oldsmobile business, to Gerald Heinrich. Gerald and his family will be moving to Spearman in the near future. Mr. Shieldknight is standing, and Mr. Heinrich is seated in the picture.

The sale of Excel Chevrolet-Olds Co. in Spearman to Gerald Heinrich, 35, of Lubbock was officially announced Tuesday, January 25, by Jimmy Shieldknight and Eris Pittman, co-owners of the firm for the past 20 years. No other changes are planned. Heinrich, a native of Slaton, Texas, is a 1964 grad-

uate of Texas Tech University and has been in the automobile business for 16 years. In making the announcement, it was stressed that the name of the firm will remain the same and present employees will be retained. It also was announced the firm will close for inventory at the close of business

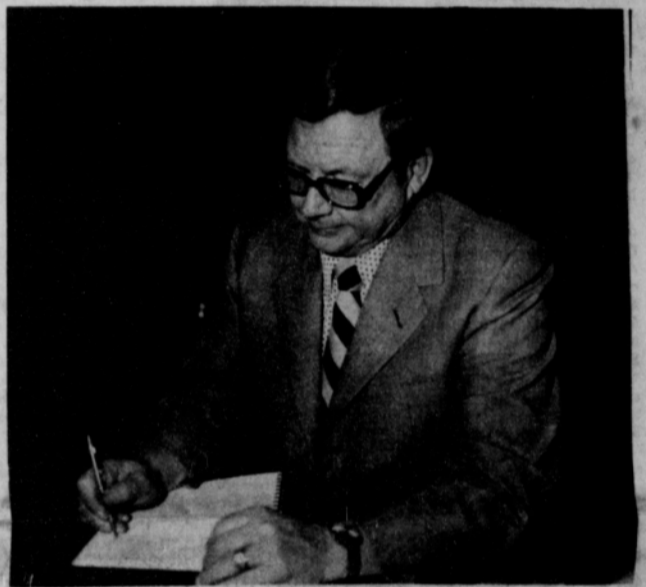
today, January 27, and for closing the sale of the firm. The firm will be open February 1 under the new management. Heinrich and his family will move to Spearman. His family includes his wife, Sandra, a daughter, Robbie, 11, and a son, Jamie, 8. They are members of the Catholic Church.

While not going into great detail, Shieldknight stated he will continue working with AGCO of Spearman, and other business interests. Pittman reported he will continue looking after his interest as a farmer and stockman.

## Banks In Good Shape Mayor signs contracts

In response to a bank call for a report of the condition of each bank at the close of business on December 31, 1976, the two Hansford County banks, Gruver State Bank and the First State Bank in Spearman, reported more assets than liabilities. The First State Bank showed in its statement \$23,881,000 in assets. The Gruver State Bank statement showed \$14,630,000 in assets. The statements also showed the Gruver State Bank with total deposits of \$13,355,000 and equity capital of \$1,101,000. Liabilities were listed at \$13,529,000. Net loans amounted to \$8,743,000.

For the First State Bank, total deposits were \$21,235,000 and equity capital \$1,795,000. Total liabilities were \$22,086,000 and net loans were \$12,226,000. Neither bank reported subordinated notes and debentures. Gruver State Bank surplus was reported at \$300,000 with \$492,000 undivided profits. First State Bank surplus was \$500,000 with \$445,000 undivided profits.

Contracts totaling \$433,163.10 for the Economic Development Administration water and gas systems improvement projects in Spearman have been signed and works is expected to begin for gas system reconstruction and improvements to the system the first of February, it has been announced by Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett.

Contracts were signed last week by the Mayor as required in order to kick off the work to be done under each of the three contracts.

T.O.K. Company of Amarillo, the low bidder at \$282,079.50 for gas system construction and improvements to the system, is expected to begin work in Spearman about the first of next month replacing existing lines and installing some new lines. All the work will be on City Property, City Manager Mark Neff reported.

Part of the work will consist of installing 17,530 feet of 4-inch line, 4,470 feet of 3-inch line and 45,361 feet of 2-inch line.

All the work will be in residential and commercial areas of the City. Other work will consist of rebuilding seven regulator stations at various locations throughout the City as well as conversion of an ounce pressure system to a pound pressure system within the City.

The City Manager also said that work under this contract will include installation of cathodic protection on all metal installations left within the system.

The Amarillo firm will be utilizing its own personnel as well as hiring some local workers in completing the project which is to be done within 365 days.

Neff announced that persons interested in working on this project should apply at City Hall during normal business hours.

W. D. Jones Drilling Co. of Dumas, with a low bid of \$79,500, will drill two water wells, Nos. 9 and 10, on City property. One will be in the airport district north of town and the other in the City of Spearman Park across from the high school. The well at

the airport is to be drilled to approximately 480 feet and the one across from the high school is to go to a depth of approximately 510 feet under terms of the contract.

This will take about 60 days for completion and it was pointed out that drilling will take place during daylight hours to reduce any possible disturbances which might be created at other hours during such operations.

Work is to start sometime after Feb. 1.

Upon completion of the two wells, Taylor Construction of Canyon, the low bidder at \$71,583.60 for the project, will begin installation of the water supply line and installation of miscellaneous equipment required to tie the new wells into the existing system.

# Cunningham Nominated USAF By Hightower

Congressman Jack Hightower officially announced today his principal nominations to the United States Service Academies. Mark Cunningham of Spearman, Deway Ford of Clarendon and Donald Blaylock of Amarillo were selected for the U.S. Air Force Academy.

Bill McElduff of Amarillo is the nominee to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., and James Daniel of Amarillo is his candidate for the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland.

Cunningham is a member of the National Honor Society the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, the Student Council, the High School Band and varsity letterman in football, basketball and tennis at Spearman High School.

Ford, who is active in sports at Clarendon High School, is also an Eagle Scout, and officer of the Key Club, the Student Council, and listed in Who's Who

among American High School Students.

By law, a maximum of five residents of each Congressional District are allowed to attend each academy during any single academic year. The number of openings available each year is determined by the number of students from the Congressional District who have graduated or left the academies for other reasons.

Hightower's selections are based upon the recommendations of his Academy Selection Committee. The Committee consists of thirteen interested and knowledgeable individuals who reside throughout the District. They carefully reviewed the qualifications of all students who had completed the preliminary application and made their selections.

"I could not be more pleased with the quality of the applicants we considered," Hightower said. "The competition for my limited vacancies was keen, and I am delighted to be able

to present such high calibre nominees to the academies."

Each of the academies reviews the various qualifications of the nominees and will notify them of their acceptability during the Spring. Those selected will begin classes in July.

## Kindergarten Day At Waka

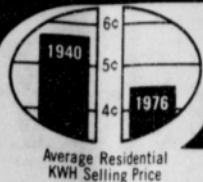

**Bob Close Named To Committees**

As they do every two years, on the second Tuesday in January, Texas Legislators have converged upon the State Capitol Building, in Austin, to begin the 140-day session of the 65th Texas Legislature. Committee hearings, staff meetings, regular floor sessions, meetings with constituents, and volumes of research material will all help shape the bills that will wind their way through subcommittees and committees, and finally floor debate, before becoming law. Speaker of the House, Bill Clayton, of Lamb County, expects more than 4,000 measures to be introduced. Of course, the vast majority of these will die in the legislative process, before reaching the House floor.

After the pomp and ceremony of the opening day festivities, the Legislators settled down to work. Following a number of rule changes in the House procedures, the all important committee assignments were announced by Speaker Clayton. It's make-up of these committees that will largely determine the priorities of the Legislature in the months to come.

If the rest of the House members are as concerned with spending legislation, and wise use of funds, as the Panhandle Delegation, these issues will receive much attention from the lawmakers.

There will be 38 new members in the House this session, and one of these is Democratic Representative Danny Hill of Amarillo. Hill views his election to the office as a mandate of restraint in spending. He followed this mandate on his first vote in the House, by voting against a proposed measure that would have increased staff spending by members of the House.

During his campaign for the House, crime was a major theme of his. Following his first week on the House floor, he still sees this issue as crucial to all Texans, and said, "The people recognize, and I believe, the Legislature recognizes that it's time to protect the victims and not the criminal. Our rehabilitation programs have failed, our punishments are ineffective, and it's time that harsher penalties, and tougher criminal laws be a major priority of this session".

Spending legislation also ranks high in the thinking of Representative Bob Close of

Perryton. "Many demands will be made for the surplus funds which appear to be available, and restraints must be exercised to avoid large tax increases and tax burdens in the future", cautions Close.

The second-term representative from the 64th District also views public school finance and the highway funding crisis looming as matters that must be faced. Commenting on the lack of funds in the Highway Department, Close remarked that, "Transportation is important to the Texas Panhandle, and many highway projects, repairs, and improvements are being delayed because of the lack of funds".

District representative Bob Simpson sees the wise use of the projected \$2.9 billion dollar state surplus as the top priority. On this subject, Simpson says, "I have previously stated that the creation of a reserve fund, to save for the time when state revenues from oil and gas runs out, is certainly needed. I was sorry to note that Governor Briscoe, who has supported this concept in the past, failed to incorporate this in his proposals in his State of State message".

The ranking member of the Panhandle Delegation, in seniority, in the House of Representatives, is Phil Cates of Shamrock. In beginning his third term from the 66th District, he voices concern with spending, public education financing, and the money problems of the Highway Department.

With smaller cities in mind, Cates believes there is a real need for annex legislation, and in this area Cates adds, "Legislation that includes strong safeguards for residents and property owners".

The Panhandle will have a voice this session on one of the most powerful committees in the Legislature, the Appropriations Committee. That voice will belong to Representative Cates. This body works on the bill that is actually the budget for the State. As a result, this committee's actions directly

Commerce, trade, and manufacturing come under the jurisdiction of the Business and Industry committee, with civil and administrative law, and concern for courts and court procedures coming under the eye of the Judiciary.

Any proposal to amend the State or U.S. Constitutions in Texas, must first be studied by the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

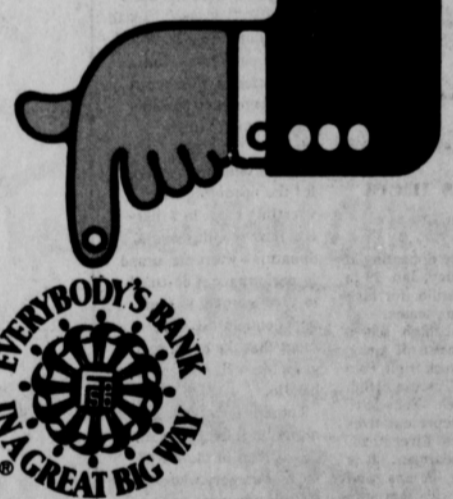

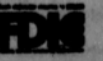

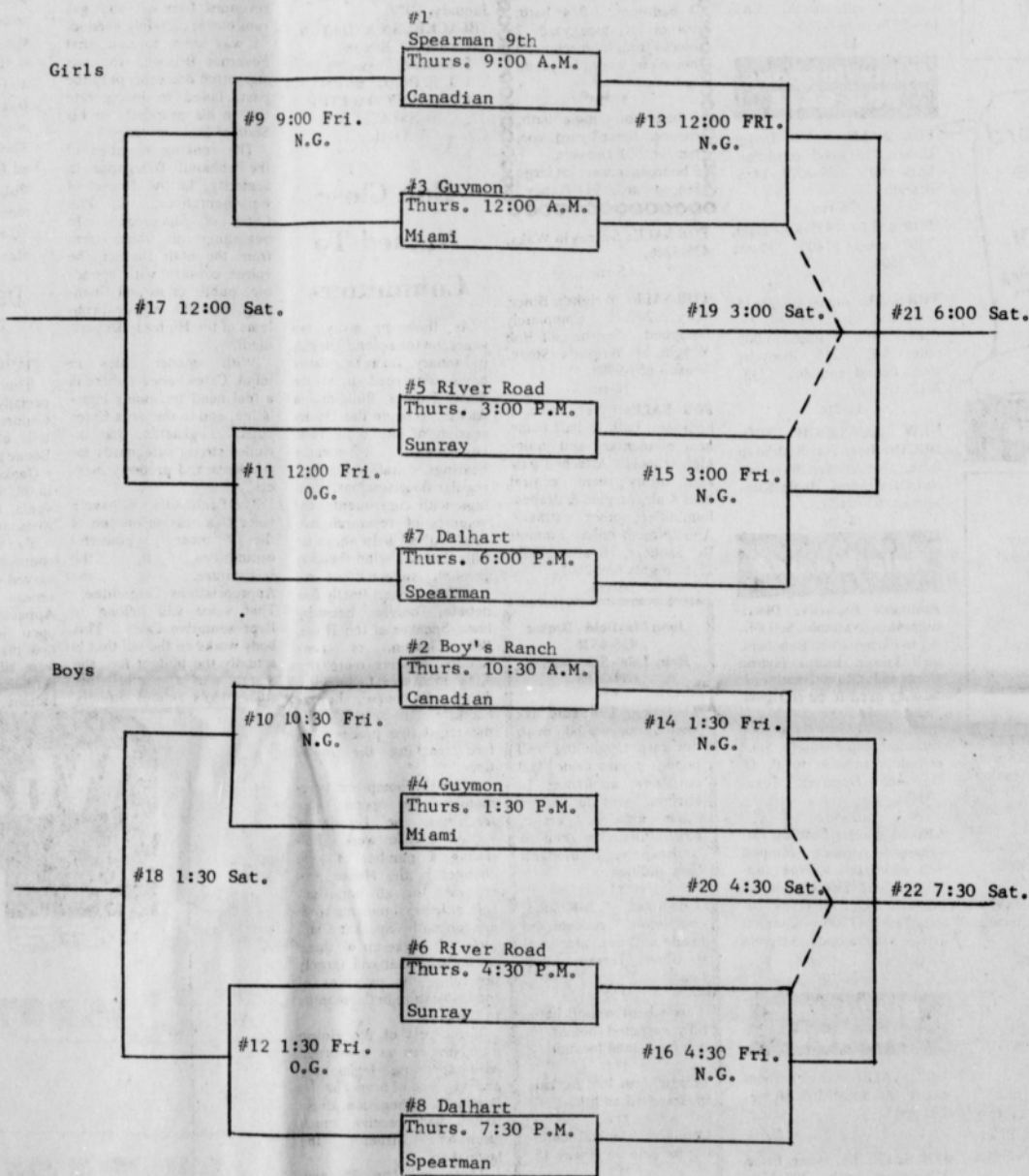

### Peggy's Pointers

Stretch your dollar power by making sales work for you, says Peggy Marrs, County Extension Agent. Authorities estimate that families can save between 15 and 25 percent on purchases during the year by taking advantage of special prices. Effective sales shopping begins with a purpose and plan in mind. Stock up on as many items as you use regularly that you have room to store. Identify future needs and be on the lookout for them. However, resist the temptation to buy just because the item is on sale. Nothing is a bargain unless you need it.

Know the regular selling price so you can recognize a reduced price. Keep in mind that prices vary from store to store. A sale price at one store may be the regular price at another.

Be an informed sales shopper by knowing your legal rights. Texas laws make it illegal for a store to advertise false or misleading statements about price reductions. The law state that stores which advertise an item on sale must have a supply large enough to meet reasonable public demand, unless the ad specifies a limited quantity.

Preventing medicine from deteriorating too rapidly is a key consideration in home medicine storage.

Over-the-counter medicines (OTC) usually are safe and effective for approximately two years -- if storage conditions are favorable. But if they aren't, the medicine may lose quality faster. Few OTC drugs have expiration dates printed for the consumers' information; so it is wise to print clearly the purchase date on medicines to keep track of their age.

Humidity and moisture speed deterioration of many drugs, especially tablets and powders. Vitamins often are sold in dark plastic containers to protect them from light. In general, drugs need to be protected from intense light, heat and moisture. Some may need to be refrigerated.

The bathroom is a popular place to store medicines, but it is often steamy and warm.

The kitchen presents a better atmosphere, if the drugs can be stored away from the stove -- and not above the refrigerator -- and the kitchen is well ventilated. Cabinets with a special section used only for drugs should be clearly marked and set apart from regular food storage areas.

Wherever drugs may be kept, a prime consideration

is that they are out of the reach of young children.

Some specific signs of deterioration may help consumers know when medicines shouldn't be used anymore.

--Aspirin: a vinegar-like odor or the tablet may be puffy or have a change in color.

--Liquid or syrup medicine: cloudy, residue collected on the bottom and after shaking the liquid immediately separates again.

--Creams or ointments: dry and caked means they are no longer effective.

It is advisable to discard a drug with any sign of deterioration, rather than take a chance using it. The user does not know the effect that may result from chemical changes which have taken place. The medicine may be flushed down the toilet or dissolved in water and washed down the sink. Also, rinse the container before throwing away.

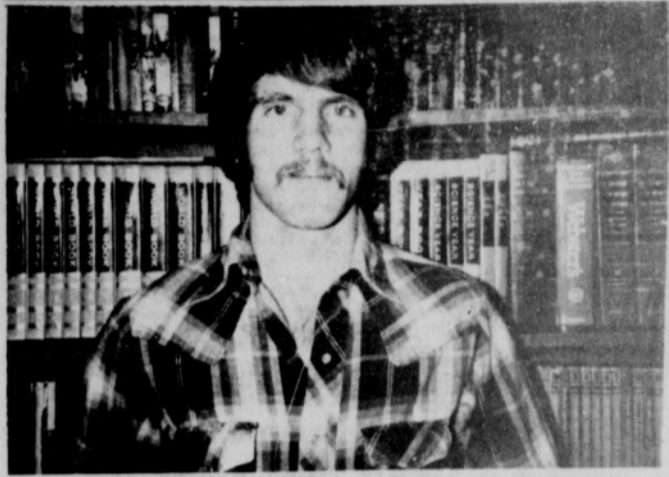

## Judicial District Probation Department Year End Report

The 84th Judicial District Probation Department returned \$98,718.47 to Hansford, Hutchinson and Ochiltree Counties during 1976, according to the year-end report prepared by the Department. The Probation Department is appointed by District Judge Richard N. Countiss of Spearman and is responsible for the supervision of all probationers in the three counties of the District. H.O. Wilbanks of Stinnett is the Chief Probation Officer.

During 1976, the Department supervised 714 persons, including 361 felony probationers, 232 misdemeanor probationers and 121 juvenile probationers. Funds collected from the probationers and disbursed totaled \$103,530.69. Of that amount, \$4,812.22 was paid to counties outside the 84th Judicial District and the balance was disbursed in the District. The money was collected from probationers for fines, court costs, fees,

restitution to injured persons and other expenses incident to the handling of the probationers. The Texas Code of

Criminal Procedure requires the District Court to establish and supervise a probation department and apporions

its expenses to the counties of the District, prorated on the basis of population of each county.

WE HAVE HEARD THROUGH THE grapevine that some minor shifts in the numbers used to determine classifications of schools in the UIL may take place next fall.

While these changes are minor to most schools, they could be major to Perryton.

Currently, Perryton is one of the smaller AAA schools in the state, with an enrollment in high school around 575. The cut off line between AAA and AA is 550, so currently we are about 25 over the limit.

But, I overheard a sports show on the radio in Dallas which said the most highly-favored plan for the next realignment would put the breaking point at 599.

This would drop Perryton back in classification from AAA to AA, and could possibly create one of the most interesting and competitive football districts in the state.

Just imagine Dalhart, which will probably be saved from going AAA by this ruling, Spearman, Perryton, Canadian and Panhandle all in the same conference.

In addition to the competitiveness, it would cut down considerably on the travel involved by the Rangers.

## Health Tips

Texas Medical Association

Plodding away from the holidays, many people notice they've picked up a few pounds. The next step often is a crash diet that could be more harmful than a little fat, the Texas Medical Association says.

Fasting has gotten a lot of attention with its promises of dramatic weight losses. However, several medical authorities stress that the technique can be dangerous unless supervised by a doctor. This extreme form of dieting most often is recommended only for extremely overweight people, say three physicians writing in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*. Another doctor writing in the *American Journal of Medicine* says fasting causes large losses of potassium and sodium. Loss of body chemicals and lack of food can make a person weak and irritable. Short-term fasting can even cause death if it

aggravates an existing medical problem, another doctor writes in *Practitioner* magazine.

Overweight people often turn to fasting only after other diets fail. People waste more than \$100 million annually on useless reducing products. Taking drugs for dieting can be useless and dangerous unless very closely monitored by a physician even after the drugs are prescribed.

A combination of exercise and eating less is still one of the best ways to lose weight. Even this approach can hurt the body if a person doesn't select from the four broad categories of the milk group, vegetable and fruit group, meat group and bread and cereal group. Eating sensibly from all these groups adds variety and makes it easier to lose weight and form sensible eating patterns.

## Bob Close Report

64th District Representative Bob Close, of Perryton, has introduced a bill in the House of Representatives that would expand the permissive use of oral confessions, in criminal trials in Texas courts. His proposal would amend the article of the Code of Criminal Procedure dealing with con-

fessions, and bring Texas in line with the other 49 states and federal law.

The proposed amendment provides that an oral statement can be used against the accused at his trial under certain circumstances.

"Under existing law, some oral confessions made before a room full of people, are not

admissible evidence," said Close.

Under the new proposed legislation, oral statements made while being interrogated by law enforcement officials will be admissible if heard by two or more persons. The witnesses must write a memorandum of the statement they heard, telling the date, time and place it was made. This must be done within 48 hours

after the statement was made, and be sworn to before a magistrate.

Rep. Close added that, "this proposal will not change any of the safeguards now required by State or Federal constitutional or statutory law, and will add an additional weapon to combat crime."

This piece of legislation is a companion bill to Senate Bill 157, that was introduced

by Senator Meier of Fort Worth.




