Mrs. D. W. Hazelwood's Mother Fatally Burned

Saturday afternoon Mrs. D. W. Hazelwood received a telegram that her mother had been seriously burned. She left immediately for Texhoma for her mother's bedside, and on arriving found that her mother's sufferings were so great that she had already departed this life. Funeral services were held Monday.

Mrs. Crismon was well known in Spearman, having visited here many times. The many friends of the family extend their sympathy to the bereaved.

The following obituary was written by Rev. R. L. Wells, a life long friend and neighbor of the family.

Lula Jane Hill was born at Chattanooga, Tenn., on July 13, 1865. With her parents, she went to live in Arkansas in 1876, where she grew to womanhood. On December 14, 1884 at Bentonville, Ark., she became the bride of William A. Crismon. The family lived in the vicinity of Rodgers and Mont Ne till 1906, when they came with a colony to settle on government land west of Eva, Oklahoma. Mr. and Mrs. Crismon welcomed ten children into their home and hearts, two of whom died in infancy and one, Mrs. Anna Hollis, was taken by death in a beautiful young womanhood.

"Mother" Crismon, as she was known to a large circle of friends, embraced the Christian faith when a girl of twelve years, uniting with the Presbyterian church. When the United Brethren church was organized at White Hall, near Eva, she transferred her membership and continued in that faith to the journey's end. She was also a member of the Rebekah lodge for many years.

Some years ago the family moved to Texhoma, where failing health confined her to her home but her ministry to others never ceased.

On Nov. 30, a terrible tragedy occurred when her clothes caught fire and she was burned till death ensued in a few hours. In her passing, Texas County loses another of the fast thinking group of pioneers who helped establish the schools and churches in the days of early settlements on the flats.

Those who will cherish her memory include the aged husbands; four daughters, Mrs. Dana Hazelwood and family of Spearman, Texas; Mrs. Ora Hoskins and family of near Texhoma; Mrs. Velma Metz and family and Mrs. Zula Long and family of Eva; three sons, W. O. Crismon and wife of Hillsboro, Kansas; J. F. Crismon and family of Garfield, Kansas and B. E. Crismon and family of Vineta, Okla.; a sister in Milford Texas; a brother in Waxahachie, Texas; 21 grandchildren and two great grand children, along with many other relatives and friends.

A funeral of beautiful songs and loving tribute was held at the Texhoma Methodist Church, with Rev. R. L. Wells, a friend of many years in charge, assisted by Rev. Norwood, Rev. DeVillars and Rev. Dodd. Six grand-children, Helen Metz, Alice and Hugh Hazelwood, Ermin and Bill Hollis and Earl Hoskins, bore the body to its final resting place in a cemetery near the old mortuary in west Texas County.

Neighbor Beloved

She came to our home and sat by our side. When sickness and worry tried body and soul, she spoke, O so softly, and knew what to say. When all that we tried, fell short of the goal, her home was so humble but she was a queen. With power to change and transform the commonest things into beauty and grace. At her touch, the barest 'came cheerful and warm. Never too busy to lend a deft hand. To neighbor or stranger in need. Believing for better, ignoring a thrust. Repaying a hurt with a dear kindly deed. Sharing with others from her own scanty store. Generous of heart and of hand. Welcomed her babes and knew each one. As a gift from her dear Father's hand. Trusted her Lord, lived close to her Christ. When others walked in the broad way. Living in faith and waiting in hope. The coming of God's happy day.

HANSFORD GAINS NEAR FIFTEEN THOUSAND IN NEW WPA WAGE SCALE

According to a rough estimate made, taking into consideration the number of men and women now employed on WPA projects and the number who will enter the program in the near future, it is estimated that Hansford county gained nearly \$15,000.00 annually when the scale for labor was raised from \$21. per month to \$29.00 per month.

The wage scale has been: Unskilled labor, \$21. intermediate labor, \$30, skilled labor, \$38, professional labor, \$42, on a monthly basis. The new scale is: Unskilled labor, \$29. inter. \$35, skilled, \$40, prof. \$44. It is estimated the common laborer increase per month will be \$1200 an dthetotal annual increase \$15,000.

Exemption Certificates Ready For Young Voters

Announcement from Sheriff H. L. Wilbanks is to the effect that the information regarding securing exemption certificates as published recently by this paper was in error. The requirements are that any person who becomes 21 years of age after January 1, 1935, or becomes 21 years of age on or before election time in the year 1936, must secure the exemption certificates in order to cast a ballot in any of the elections of the coming year.

Latest instructions state that individuals past the age required to pay poll tax, do not have to secure these exemption certificates in order to vote. Individuals moving into this county from another county or state will have to secure the exemption certificates in order to cast a vote.
