SLOW RAIN TOTALS MORE THAN ONE AND HALF INCH IN COUNTY

Blanket of Cheer is Spread Over Entire North Plains Section of the Panhandle.

Practically two days of slow falling moisture measuring from 1.15 inches to one and a half inches over the entire county, has brought renewed hopes to wheat producers and cattlemen of Hansford county.

Starting with fog and mist Sunday night, continuing through Monday with mist, fog and slow falling showers all day, with heavy showers Monday night and continued damp foggy weather Tuesday.

Rainfall has been general over the entire Plains country according to reports from the daily papers, and in Hansford county the rainfall was general all over the county with possible heaviest precipitation at Gruver and north of Gruver.

This moisture at the time is proving a great blessing to this section of the country. Wheat all over the county was badly in need of rain, and especially was this true of the north section of the county where the rainfall was the heaviest.

According to farmers in this county, the fall could not have been regulated better. The slow pattering of rain soaked in the earth as it fell, and scarcely any of the moisture is lost.

Cattlemen who have faced the possibility of taking their cattle from the wheat fields and begin feeding them are jubilant as result of the rain. Present conditions assure pasturage for cattle on the wheat fields in Hansford county.

AAA PROGRAM IS FEATURED AT LION CLUB MEETING TUESDAY

County Agent Boykin Impressed Lions With Importance of Processing Taxes

Through a series of questions and answers, Lion Lester Boykin impressed members of the club with the importance of the AAA program as it exists in this nation, at the regular meeting of the club held Tuesday noon.

Prior to opening of the program Lion Boykin passed pamphlets to members in which they might study the subject under discussion.

Very impressive was the fact that the processing tax was instituted by the government in order to establish an equalizing between the farmers' ability to purchase tariff protected manufactured products as compared with his unprotected sale of the products he sold on the market.

It was established that it took approximately 100 bushels of wheat to purchase a grain drill in 1912, and nearly 900 bushels to come into possession of a grain drill in 1935. It was to correct this situation that the processing tax was levied.

Round table discussion of the tariff and processing tax gave the members a better insight into the extensive program of the Agricultural program.

ORVILLE C. CARPENTER HEADS PENSION

AUSTIN—We are going to be fair to the old people of Texas," said the new chief of this week.

Orville C. Carpenter, 38, old State Auditor, was named executive director of the old-age pension board, November 14.

He will resign as executive director of the old-age pension board, November 14, when the pension law becomes effective February 14.

"We are going into the matter carefully. I am studying the pension system of other states that have pension laws," he said. Mr. Carpenter probably knows more about pensions than any other man in the State. At request of Governor Alfred, Mr. Carpenter made a survey in September on the "Cost and General Plan for Old-Age Pensions." This was prepared for the Legislature, and the new law reflects his survey in many ways.

The Dallas businessman was appointed last August by the Governor to recognize the Office of the State Auditor. To the Legislature, he made reports on pensions, liquor, and fees. Other surveys were on taxation, bank deposit insurance, and a number of lesser subjects. He is now conducting audits of the Treasury and Banking Departments.

He estimated that there were 283,934 people in this state 65 years of age or older. Considering the experience of other states he calculated that there would probably qualify for old-age assistance in Texas 62,398 people.

"As there are 41,787 persons 65 years of age and over on the Texas relief rolls, this apparently is the minimum number to qualify for old-age pensions. Mr. Carpenter stated.

"I am not sure about the reducing effect of the regulations passed by the 44th Legislature. My calculations were made in September.

Here are the provisions as to Old Age Pension. The petitioner must meet the following requirements.

1. Must have attained the age of 65.
2. Must be a citizen of the U. S.
3. Must reside in Texas five years during the last nine.
4. Must not be an inmate of, or receive aid from any home or other institution except for medical care.
5. Must not have transferred property to others in order to secure the pension.
6. Must not have an income of \$360. or if married, not over \$720 per year.
7. Must not own property with a taxable value over \$5,000. or if married, over \$7,500.
8. Does not own marketable securities of more than \$500. or if married, \$1,000.
9. Is not an habitual criminal or drunkard.
10. Has neither husband nor wife able to furnish adequate support.

TOWNSEND CLUB ENJOYING RAPID GROWTH IN CITY

More Than One Hundred Thirty Paid Up Members in Hansford County Chapter.

The Townsend Club which was organized some weeks ago is growing in a most substantial way. The Club now has about 130 paid up members. Some of the very best citizens of Spearman and of this county are members of this club.

The Townsend Club proposes: That every man and woman who has reached the age of 60 or above, shall be paid a salary of \$200. per month, with safe guards about it that this money shall be spent every month; that it may be spent for the NECESSITIES OF LIFE.

Is the Townsend plan a pension? YES, it is a pension. But what is a pension. A pension is a sum of money paid to a person in return for past services. A sum of money paid for past services. Not a DOLE not a GIFT. A pension is NOT charity. It is wages for past service.

WE need the Old age pension because first: This nation of ours needs complete and permanent recovery. To have this there must be a constant and sufficient supply of purchasing power. And this purchasing power MUST be evenly distributed according to the population throughout the nation.

There must be assurance of continuous employment. This is one of the most serious questions before our Nation today. No longer than yesterday the announcement came over the radio that there are a little over ten million out of employment today. Something MUST be done for these ten millions of people in a sane sensible way.

There are now 4 million men and women who are 60 and above who could be retired on a salary of \$200 per month and their jobs given to 4 million who are now unemployed. If this is true then, if the Townsend Plan should go into operation tomorrow no less than 7 million persons would be put to work.

MANY NEW WPA PROJECTS OPEN IN DIST. 16

There were fourteen additional WPA projects opened in District No. 16, during the week ending November 16th, announced A. A. Meredith, District Director, creating work for 505 people. This brings the total of WPA projects now operating in District 16, or the twenty northern counties of the Panhandle of Texas, to 36, employing 1269 people.
The Federal Government's contribution to the projects now operating amounts to a total of \$371,467, and the total amount of the Sponsors' contributions to the projects is \$133,668.

The first WPA project to be completed in District 16 is the Antelope Creek Bridge on the Borger Sanford Road. Construction of this bridge started on October 17th, and was completed November 15th, and is now open to traffic. This is an all-steel bridge, with the exception of the flooring, built of pipe which was cut and fabricated on the job. Completion of this bridge closes one of the four projects sponsored by Hutchinson County in their farm-to-market road program.

The 36 projects operating involve road construction, improvement of school buildings and grounds, parks, street improvements, water main extensions, sewing rooms, libraries and sanitation work. All of these projects are reported to be progressing satisfactorily.

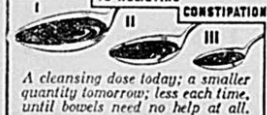
