FARMERS--NOTICE--Hansford County Is Invited To Fair

Several wild plants of the morning glory family are troublesome weeds, but by far the most difficult to control is the small-leaved field bindweed, known also as wild morning glory, and in Nebraska as creeping Jenney. Field bindweed occurs in favored places almost throughout the U.S. but especially abundant in the N. Central states and northern Rocky Mountain States and California.

No easy method of eradicating bindweed is known. The plant is perennial, growing from long, fibrous roots which may send up leafy shoots from any part of their length. Seeds are produced abundantly and germinate readily but can live in the soil for twenty years or more if necessary. Once established, bindweed can be exterminated only by the most rigorous measures, for ordinary good farming will not be sufficient.

Many methods of eradicating bindweed have been tested but the following are regarded as the most useful.

1. CLEAN CULTIVATION.—In areas of more than one acre the most practical measure is persistent clean cultivation. At least 15 months must be devoted to the task, during which period the bindweed must not be allowed to produce any top growth longer than 2 inches. At first it is necessary to cultivate every 4 or 5 days, because leafy shoots can be bent up from the roots in as little as 48 hours. As the plants weaken the interval between cultivations can be lengthened. Nevertheless, at least 15 cultivations are usually necessary the first season. In the second year, cultivation should begin with the first growth in the spring and be continued until the plants are definitely dead.

The best tool for maintaining clean culture or fallow is a common corn or sugar beet cultivator equipped with knife like edges. Most manufacturers of cultivating machinery can supply these. They must be of good steel, capable of keeping a sharp edge which, in sandy or stony ground requires careful attention. The object is to cut through and not pile around the bindweed stems. Pick-foot cultivators leave the soil in a condition which does not grow readily but one should be careful and plant some winter crop on the land.

2. CHEMICAL CONTROL.—Bindweed can be killed with chemicals, but the process is expensive, roughly about 40 or 50 dollars per acre.

The chemicals most commonly used are sodium arsenite and sodium chlorate, either alone or in combination with other substances will kill the weed.

Sodium arsenite is used in solution as a spray driven against foliage. Like all arsenicals, IT IS A DEADLY POISON AND MUST BE USED WITH GREAT CARE TO AVOID INJURY TO LIVESTOCK AND HUMAN BEINGS. It can be purchased in either dry or liquid forms, or it may be prepared at home, write to the Division of Forage crops and Cereals, Bureau of Plant Industry, Dept. of Agriculture, Washington D. C.

Sodium chlorate is a powerful weed killing. It is applied as a spray to the foliage or in dry condition to the surface of the soil. In spraying 1 1/2 pounds of chemical or its compounds are dissolved in each gallon of water and sufficient spray applied to wet foliage thoroughly. One hundred to two hundred gallons or necessary to fix an acre. In dry weather the chlorate is scattered on the surface of the ground late in autumn and allowed to dissolve in the soil during the winter. 4 1/2 hundred pounds per acre the

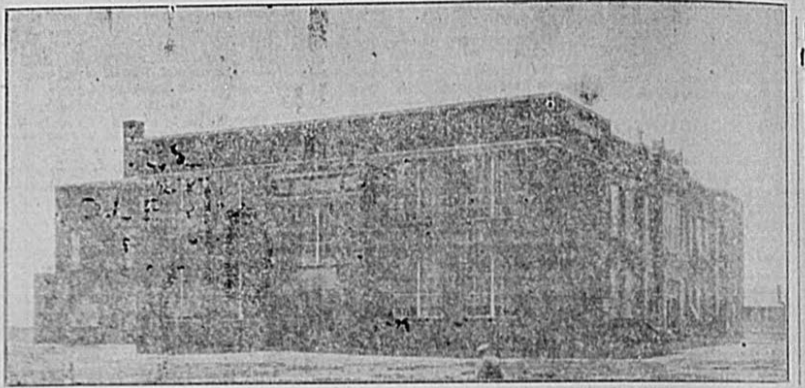

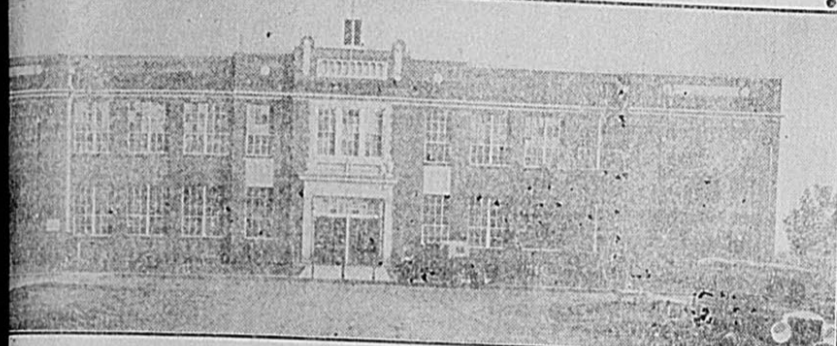

EDITORIAL

Perhaps the reading public are becoming a bit tired of the continued editorials in this publication about Work Progress Projects, and Hansford County gaining their share of the Federal billions that are to be spent the near future. In explanation the writer would state that he does not, and is not attempting to criticize the Planning Board of the county, or any officials that may be responsible for submitting WPA Projects. It is more a matter of bringing to the public such facts as might be overlooked.

The alarming situation as viewed by this writer is the fact that the official records of employable men in the county had been reduced to 57 men on July 25. This, according to records of Relief Director Haile was scaled down as follows: April, 231 men, (or relief clients), May 152, June 64, July 57. These men were taken off the government pay roll and found employment elsewhere, either in the county or were forced to move to more thriving locations. At the present date the number has increased to 82 men.

According to information from Director Merideth, who visited Spearman Wednesday of this week, applications will be made for funds covering \$600.00 per qualified worker, representing the number of unemployed needy of this county. Judge J. H. Broadhurst estimates that this number will be between 250 and 300 unemployed, bringing a sum of money to the county of approximately \$200,000. This is only a means of placing on record our needs. Before the project will be approved and the money spent in Hansford county, a certified list of needy people will have to be established. It therefore behooves everyone interested in seeing justice done in Hansford county, to recommend every needy individual who can qualify, to register at the relief office and get names properly certified so that they may work on Hansford county projects, when and if sufficient number are approved.

This writer would even recommend a bond issue or other means to raise funds to match funds of the Federal government, if such became necessary, in order that we might derive an income during the coming months.

I have heard of some citizens who are unfavorable to a bond issue, and I wonder at their logic. Evidently they forget we do not have a crop this year following five former years of failure, and one before that gave abnormally low price for grains there will be scarcely any of the fall row crops developed sufficiently for feed. The feed crops that was knee high schrieved under the blistering sun the past few weeks. The rains that have fallen, mere showers, and scarcely any of them have been followed by blistering winds, and there is no moisture from the subsoil to maintain it. Under this condition, our soils, the richest to be found in the nation, are covered with the dry silt that was spread by the storms of the past few years, and the richness adds to its burning power. Without crops for feed for another winter season, even those thrifty farmers who have kept the relief messengers from their doors for 4 long years have exhausted their resources. Our grocerymen will tell of heartrending conversations they have had recently with old farmer customers whom they have served for years on a seasonal crop basis, who bring them such message.

Measured as individual economists, Bill and Jim and this column would not take any prizes. The record is there on what we have done with the given number of dollars and cents. But when it comes to millions you can't prove that Bill and Jim and us don't know what ought to be done. We have never had a million dollars. The way we are going now we never will have. But our guess on what we would do with it is just as the next fellows. Incidentally, a million is becoming small conversational change. We will go on working before we will go on piddling with chicken feed. But we can tell you how to handle a billion. Come around.

The writer remembers well the first time he ever made state press in the Dallas News. Joe Taylor, a handsome, educated, versatile, brilliant writer, jovial, personality, and practically perfect in most respects, like many other humans, is cursed with one outstanding weakness. Joe has no love or respect for a dog. He took exception to some comments made by the writer praising that great friend of mankind . . . the lowly cur. . . and said so in his column. . . that was some 14 years ago.

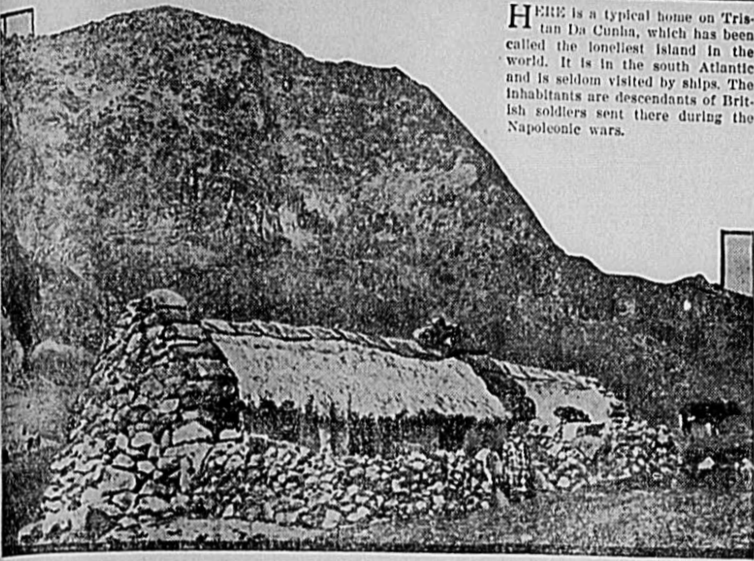

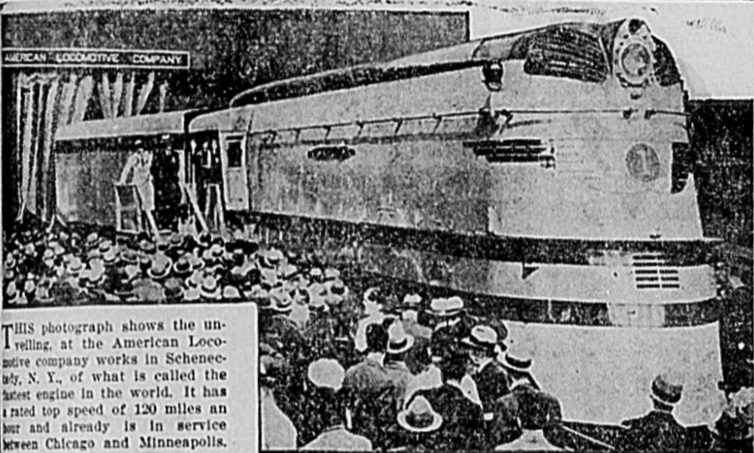


Home, Sweet Home on the "Loneliest Island"

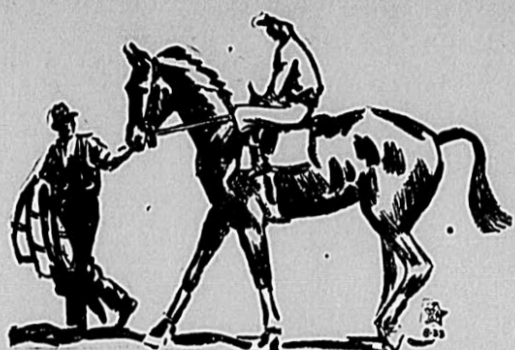

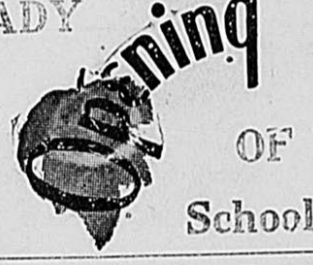
