### NEW LION PRESIDENT GIVES INAUGURAL TALK AT MEETING

#### MEMBERS URGED TO COOPERATE IN PROGRAM OF PROGRESS.

Todd, who served as President of the Lion club of Spearman for the first time at the Tuesday noon meeting, set an excellent example to the membership by providing the program with an inaugural address. Mayfield were introduced at the meeting, making short talks. deCordova, a guest of Bruce Sheets, complimented Spearman and Hansford county on the progress that was being made in the face of the many obstacles that faced the people. He stated he had been showing a picture of the very bad dust storm of this year to people of the East, not in a spirit of giving this section adverse publicity, but to impress them with the fact that the people of this county were able to overcome adverse conditions. He mentioned that one local store showed a forty per cent increase in business this year over 1934, when the county had a short wheat crop.

### HANSFORD COUNTY BENEFITED BY AAA INCREASE ON WHEAT

#### NEARLY \$50,000.00 IS ADDED TO 1935 WHEAT ALLOTMENT PAYMENTS.

Contract wheat producers of Hansford County will be benefited to the extent of \$46,932.48 as result of the increase in 1935 basis for pay on wheat, as announced by government officials in Tuesday daily papers.

These figures presented this publication by County Agent Lester Boykin represent the amount of additional money that will be paid to contract wheat producers. The announcement of the government officials as carried in Tuesday Amarillo News follows: Washington, July 8—A proclamation by Secretary Wallace today established the minimum 1935 wheat adjustment payment at 33 cents a bushel compared to the 1934 minimum of 29 cents.

Payment for both years, the AAA said, are subject to slight deductions for county administration costs.

Chester C. Davis, AAA administrator, said the increase of 4 cents a bushel for the 1935 allotments represents additional income to co-operating wheat producers of approximately fourteen million dollars.

Under the new schedules, Davis asserted, producers will receive adjustment payments of at least \$150,000.00 on 1935 crop in lieu of \$100,000,000 on the 29c basis.

No change was made in the processing tax rate of 30 cents a bushel. The AAA said the adjustment payments were made possible by reserve accumulated from the tax on wheat produced by farmers not under allotment contracts. The increased payment, it was said, will not result in any deficit in the wheat budget since available funds are sufficient to cover the increase.

### ONLY FEW FARMS HAVE PRODUCTION TO BE HARVESTED

OSLO, HITCHLAND, AND A SMALL AREA SOUTH EAST SPEARMAN ARE CUTTING

Only a limited number of producers of Hansford county are in a position to harvest a 1935 wheat crop this year, on account of the drought in the fall and early spring. However, farmers in the Hitchland and Oslo communities are combining this week and reports coming to Spearman indicate a fair yield in some instances. J. Jones of the Oslo community reported a yield of 10 to 12 bushels when he started his combine Wednesday of this week. Reports indicate that several fields in both the Oslo and the Hitchland communities will make a yield above 15 bushels per acre.

Everett Green's, Mr. Thorson, and the Otto Reimer farms are being harvested this week with an average production of 6 to 7 bushels.

The writer visited the Rex Sanders section 10 miles Southeast of Spearman where some 400 acres of wheat look like a production of 10 to 12 bushels per acre. This wheat looks as good as can be, and is quite a phenomina. Rex evidently got a couple of good showers on his field that none of his neighbors enjoyed, as his is the only wheat that will be harvested Southeast of Spearman.

Local elevator men stated they had not been able to purchase any Hansford county wheat. Most of the wheat is being stored for seed or to sell for seed.

### TWO MEMBERS OF SCHOOL FACULTY HAVE RESIGNED

Members of the Spearman Independent school board accepted resignations of Miss Erma Crittenden and Miss Lucile Maize, at a meeting of the school board held at the school house Tuesday evening of this week.

Miss Crittenden will head the home ec. department in the Clarksville school, while Miss Maize will head the English department of the Brownwood school system.

**ORDINANCE NO. 50**

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF HANSFORD  
CITY OF SPEARMAN

Be it resolved, by the City Commission of the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, that on and after the passage of this Ordinance that from every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of selling cannon-crackers, or toy pistols used for shooting or exploding cartridges, within this city, an annual tax of the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars, and such persons, firm or corporation shall be required to pay an additional tax in the above amount and take out an additional license for each establishment or place where such cannon-crackers or said toy pistols are sold. By the term 'cannon-cracker' is meant any fire cracker or other combustible package more than two inches in length and more than one inch in circumference commonly sold for purposes of amusement. Nothing herein shall be so construed as to prohibit the sale of, or to place a tax on the sale of cartridges, combustible packages commonly used for firearms or artillery, mining, excavating earth or stone, scientific purposes or for public or private works.

where else that I know of, is there another such story of love told as the love of Ruth for Naomi, the love of this Moabite daughter-in-law for her Hebrew mother-in-law. Ruth's love for her dead husband's mother is as pure as gold and as strong as death.

LOVABLE TRAITS IN BOTH

The one had become acquainted with the fine traits of character in the other to have also, a charity, begotten of understanding, for the faults of the other. Doubtless in the early years of the Elimelech family's sojourn in Moab there was not a little rubbing in the wrong direction, on the part of both the Moabites and the Hebrew immigrants. Naomi was to them that foreigner, and they were to her such queer people. Presumably, also, there had been something of the proverbial mother-in-law daughter-in-law friction. But as the two women journeyed Judeward they were truly mother and daughter; sisters in the finest sense of sisterhood; and the elders called forth from the younger words of devotion that have become devotion's classic formula.

What we are told of Naomi here makes evident enough that she was religious and in an attractively appealing way that Ruth was so ready to make Naomi's faith her own showing that she had gotten a good impression of it. And Naomi must have been a lovable woman. Daughter-in-law don't usually love their mother in laws unless they are lovable. And nothing so adorns a woman as genuine religion.

Naomi was unselfish, and unselfishly generous. Regardless of her loneliness she urges Ruth and Orpah to remain in their homeland where things will go better with them than in a new, strange country. She pleaded with them not to spoil their lives by remaining with her, a poor old widow. Arrived in Judeah, she thinks solely of Ruth's welfare and happiness.

The theme of the Book of Ruth is the heroism of the loyalty of women. It is one of the most marked and beautiful of female traits. Both Ruth and Naomi splendidly exemplify this. Rarely do you find heroic loyalty apart from loyalty to God. Charms are deceptive and beauty is a breath but a woman who reverts the Lord she will be praised.

**THE INFLUENCE OF EXAMPLE**  
Thy people shall be my people. Is our example such that some of those around us would be willing to say "Thy people shall be my people. Let us bear in mind that, if we are not living unto Christ, if we are not showing forth in our lives the praises of

him who hath called us out of darkness unto his marvellous light, then we are both bringing dishonor upon that worthy Name and are also being a stumbling block in the way of some who might be seeking and finding peace in Christ. Certainly a radical change had come into the life of this Moabitish woman. Nothing is deeper in one's soul than religion and nothing but the most powerful force can change the heart of a strong character in the matter of religion faith. That which had made Ruth to know that the God of the Hebrews was infinitely superior to the false God whom she worshipped was the superior life which she had discovered in her mother in law, Naomi. Thus do we all become living epistles through whom Christ speaks.

INTRODUCTION

"The Book of Judges, full of war and tumult, and the Book of Samuel, full of more war and tumult. Men hate and steal and lie and kill, until the heart is sick of the havoc which sin was wrought among men. But between these two books as a beautiful valley full of flowers and fertile fields, and with a gentle brook, singing down through the meadows, as often found between two mountains ranges, is the book of Ruth, a wonderful story of love and holy character, filling all that part of the Old Testament with its fragrance.

THE MESSAGE OF THE BOOK OF RUTH

Moab occupied a part of the table-land east of the Jordan Valley. It lies at an elevation of more than four thousand feet above the Dead Sea.

The Jews traditionally had only hatred and contempt for the Moabites. Bitter enmity existed between the two peoples. As worshippers of Chemosh the Moabites were rank infidels to the Israelites. It follows that this history of Naomi Ruth and Boaz is a fine lesson in the breaking down of three of the sharpest dividing walls between man and men: race, nationality, and religion.

It is significant that for thirty centuries exclusive Judaism has regarded Ruth the Moabitess as one of their fondest heroines. Her splendid devotion to her lonely, widowed mother-in-law has offset her alien blood.

A LOVE STORY

The Book of Ruth is sometimes called a love story. In a double sense it is. Leaving Boaz out of the picture, the love that we are here concerned with is the love that these two women had for each other; or the love that moved the people of Bethlehem to let Ruth be one of them. It is the same love that Jesus commanded us to have for our neighbors who is everybody. This love it is that is the supreme force to break down the barrier of race and religion. Neither in the Bible nor any-
