## POWERS KILLED BY DEATH JUNE 28, 1935

Handford County judges and commissioners from more than 20 North Plains counties conferred with highway officials here Friday in an effort to map out a workable lateral road program.

Some \$22,000,000 of special federal funds under WPA regulations are to be given Texas for road building, information being that 25 per cent will be for lateral roads. In addition the state will have \$6,000,000 of its own money and \$7,500,000 regular federal aid for roads.

Judges and commissioners pointed out that if the government will furnish only man power for lateral roads that most counties cannot start to work because they cannot furnish both equipment and materials. They probably can furnish either one, it was said.

This is strong indication of the interest and cooperation shown by Pampanos.

Other towns in the Panhandle will send delegates.

Some of the best speakers in the territory are on the program. The first hour of the 24-hour program will begin at 4 a. m.

The program extends until 4 o'clock the morning of the fifth. Rodeos, dances, county fairs, games, water carnival, cowboy parades, fireworks, and a ball game will fill up the hours of the celebration.

In extending an invitation to Panhandle people, Mayor John R. Miller of Borger offered the services of the city in entertaining and assured the local chamber that he would do all in his power to make the celebration a success.

Many contestants for the rodeo have entered at this early date. The \$750 purse holds a charm to the bronc busters and the bulldozers, many special prizes add to the attraction. When the couples entered in the nanny-goat milking contest perform, crowds will go wild.

Good music will be featured at all dances. There will be several. Halls are large, giving ample room, for as many as wish to attend.

## ARE WE MEN OR MICE?

This paper being issue on the holiday celebrating our national independence, it seems nothing but right that this editorial writer might suggest a degree of independence for the citizens of the 18th Senatorial district comprising 28 counties of the great Panhandle of Texas.

We are suggesting the idea of Independence of thought and planning, getting away from that terrible habit of letting Amarillo and Amarillo influence do the thinking for the entire Panhandle country.

The cause of this very (absurd?) idea is a study of the plans, apparently formulated at Amarillo for the distribution of funds to build highways in the Panhandle.

A news article carried in the Amarillo News under date of June 29th, informs the people that plans are made to spend something like two million one hundred and forty eight thousand dollars on improving the highways of the great Panhandle of Texas. The projects have been worked out with estimates covering projects one to thirteen.

These road improvements bring to mind again the fact that just so long as we fall under the leadership of Amarillo and Amarillo influence, we citizens of the vast Plains of Texas will play second fiddle and will secure whatever patronage or benefits that are to be distributed, as are left when Amarillo gets the lion share.

Just review the outlined program for the 28 counties of the Panhandle. Projects 2 to 8 inclusive, calling for an expenditure of more than one million dollars, paves highway No. 5 from Clarendon to Amarillo. Projects 1, 9, 11, and 13 fill in the gaps on highway 66, making another splendid outlet for Amarillo and Amarillo products.

In fact out of the entire probable appropriation, as well as this writer can check up, we find every improvement suggested finally leads into Amarillo. Another startling bit of information that one finds when studying the plans is the fact that out of the 28 counties in the district only six counties will be benefited by the program as outlined by the news story appearing in the Amarillo News-Globe.

If you will think back a bit, and remember the reprint of a story written by David M. Warren of the Panhandle Herald, you will remember that when the relief work was started in the Panhandle of Texas, a check-up showed Potter county and Ama-

rillo received two times as much per capita appropriation for relief than was received by Hansford county.

Check up on state appropriations for schools, for any sort of patronage funds that are issued to this section of the state and see where Potter county and Amarillo stand.

Right now we can call to mind that the division highway department is located at Amarillo. The Panhandle relief official personnel for checking up records of the entire Panhandle is located at Amarillo.

During the last two years the writer remembers attending many political gatherings at Amarillo, and under the dominance of the Amarillo influence. One can hardly pick up a paper without seeing a news release of a meeting of Panhandle commissioners or judges or other official bodies held at Amarillo, to plan the future of the great Panhandle of Texas.

Will we continue to let Amarillo and Amarillo influence do our thinking, or do we plan to get out in the front line trenches and fight for the entire Panhandle first, and let Amarillo grow as a natural result of the growth of the Panhandle country.

## Terraces Save Enough Water To Insure Cover

Though the Dalhart area has had only about 50 per cent normal rainfall this year. The farmers who had their land terraced have sufficient moisture to assure a vegetative cover regardless of whether any more rain falls or not. Many of them have sufficient moisture to insure feed.

Exhaustive experiments have shown, says H. Fennell regional director of the Soil Conservation Service, that the average Panhandle crop is grown and matured on about 3.5 inches of moisture. That is the amount actually used by the roots. The rest of the 18 inches of average annual moisture has been lost mostly through run-off and evaporation.

Terracing and contour listing not only keep all the moisture on the land, but hold it where it falls, insuring equitable distribution. Run-off is prevented and the only loss sustained is evaporation. The rest of the water goes into the soil storage.

Showing how effectively terracing and contouring contributes to soil storage is the fact that two weeks ago soil moisture on terraced and contoured land was forty inches deep while on adjacent land neither terraced nor contoured, soil moisture was only seventeen inches deep.

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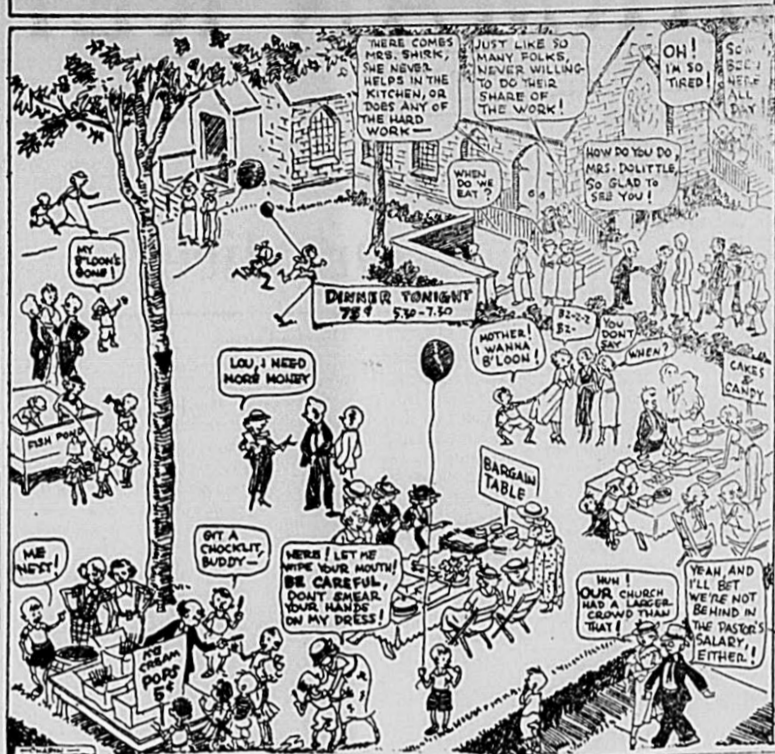

ORDINANCE NO. 50 THE PANHANDLE PRESS A COMPLETE STORE

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF HANSFORD CITY OF SPEARMAN

Be it resolved, by the City Commission of the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, that on and after the passage of this Ordinance that from every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of selling cannon-crackers, or toy pistols used for shooting or exploding cartridges, within this city, an annual tax of the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars, and such persons, firm or corporation shall be required to pay an additional tax in the above amount and take out an additional license for each establishment or place where such cannon-crackers or said toy pistols are sold.

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## Gold and Silver

As so much treasure assembled under the Treasury and the Federal Reserve in the world at any time in history, the monetary gold in this country last year reached the total of \$9,013,782,000.

The monetary stock of silver held by the banks reached the total of \$815,000,000 at the present price of silver at the long-established legal value of 62 1/2 cents an ounce.

It was reported a few days ago that the Silver Purchase Act of 1934 has bought 431,497,000 ounces of silver at the monetary price of \$1.29 an ounce. The Government must continue to purchase its stock of silver bullion amounts to as much as its gold.

Our country has ever had as much gold in its bank vaults as we now have; probably has ever had as much silver, although the Government in India is supposed to have something like 500,000,000 ounces of silver. The enormous hoards of gold in the treasuries of the semi-independent states of India, stores which have been accumulating for a thousand years or more of the native Indian Princes. The richest men in the world are said to be the native rulers. But their gold and silver do not go into general circulation nor form the backbone of their money. So far as the tools of trade and the means of exchange are concerned America is by far the wealthiest nation in the world.

These enormous stocks of bullion back of our government debt, it seems to us a cause for worry about the credit of the United States.

## Old Time Splendor Seen in Japan's Aged Temples

It seems that every important city of Japan has been the capital and seat of government of the nation at some time in the 2,500 years reign of the present imperial house, notes a writer in the Chicago Tribune.

Jimmu Tenno, founder of this oldest existing dynasty, who took over the rule of the country in 660 B. C., is buried in Nara province. Nara was the first permanent capital of Japan, but succeeding emperors have changed the seat of government many times to various cities. Moving the capital did not cost the people so much in this land of typhoons, earthquakes, and fires as it would in countries where government buildings are constructed on a more costly scale with a view to permanent occupancy.

At the height of its glory Nara was rich in palaces, temples, public buildings and residences of noble and wealthy families. It established arts and crafts and encouraged literature and religion. Many tokens of Nara's former splendor still survive in the magnificent temples and shrines erected in bygone centuries, carefully preserved and loyally cherished.

## British Isles Possess Most Temperate Climate

The Bahama Islands, lying a few hundred miles southeast of the coast of Florida, were settled by Loyalists from the United States after the American Revolution, notes a writer in the Montreal Herald. The islands have the most temperate climate in the world and the crop season extends throughout the whole year.

The land was at first divided into large plantations using slave labor, after the fashion of the southern states. Cotton and tropical fruits were the great export crops while corn and live stock were produced for local needs. Cotton was abandoned after a few years since it rapidly exhausted the thin soil and with the abolition of slavery the land was gradually broken up into small holdings, cultivated by both white and colored farmers.

The big limiting factor in the agriculture of these islands is the peculiar nature of the soil. Generally speaking it is not more than a few inches deep, with coral and other rock outcroppings frequent.

## First Tile From Scotland

The first tile laid in this country was imported from Scotland in 1835 by John Johnston and laid in clay soil on his farm near Geneva, N. Y. The success of this venture prompted him to import patterns and have tile made by hand. In 1848, a neighbor, John Delafield, imported a tile machine from England. The success which these men had with a horsehoe-shaped tile soon encouraged the rapid spread of tile drainage in this country. The first drain tile ever used were probably used in northern France about 1620. Not until England took up the practice, however, were tile used extensively.

## The Song "Sweet Adeline"

"Sweet Adeline" was written by Harry Armstrong and Dick Gerrard. It was published in 1903 after an ignominious career as "Sweet Rosalie." While the composers were trying to sell the song Adeline Patti began her farewell tour. A publisher suggested the change in title. The song was sold, but as "Sweet Adeline" failed to become a hit. About that time the Quaker City Four, a vaudeville quartette, tried out the ballad on a Broadway audience and stopped the show. In a few weeks it was a national rage and since then over 2,000,000 copies have been sold.

## Ikon Painting Russian Art

Ikon painting is one of the few original Russian arts. Before the revolution every household, no matter how poor, had at least one religious picture before which an oil lamp constantly burned. The most famous center of ikon painting was Palekh. A remote little colony, 50 kilometers from the nearest railroad line, produced works of rare art. These paintings found their way all over Russia, into the palaces of czars and princes, as well as the homes of common people.

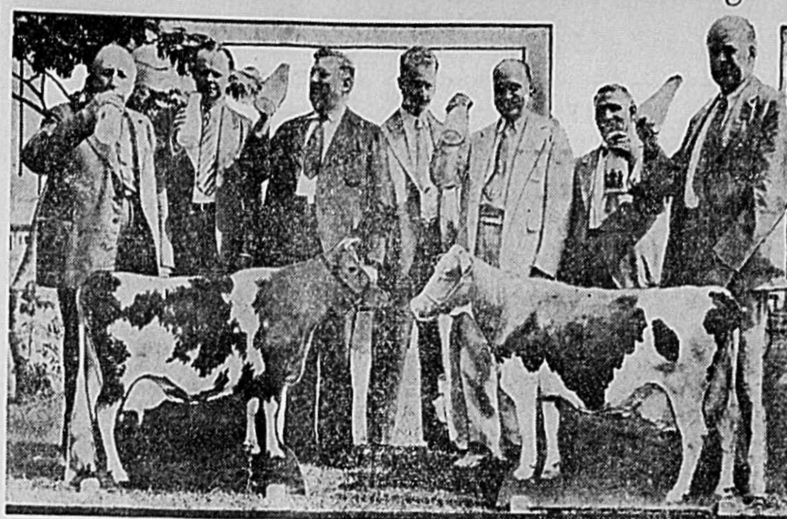
## Thermite Process of Welding

Thermite (also thermit) is a mixture of aluminum in fine grains or filings with some metallic oxide, usually of iron or chromium. On being heated by priming with magnesium powder and barium oxide the aluminum combines violently with the oxygen of the oxide, setting free the iron, producing a fluid slag and generating sufficient heat either to melt or bring adjacent parts to the welding temperature. It is used in welding steel rails and for other purposes.

#### Earth Is Not Finished

##### Like Sculptors Model

The earth is not "finished," in the sense that a sculptor would apply the word to a statue of his, asserts a writer in the New York Times. The forces that began to shape the earth when it was but a liquid ball are still at work, although they are not as violent now as they were then. It is as normal for the earth to shake as it is for clouds to sweep across the sky.

The process of faulting, which means the redistribution of the earth's materials in an effort to establish equilibrium, is not likely to end for many million years. And when it does the earth will be "finished" in the slang sense of the term. It will be a mere cinder drifting in space around the sun, with no life. When stability comes man will be extinct.

To a seismologist earthquakes reveal the internal structure of the earth. They are somewhat like X-rays that make the bones stand out on a photograph of the chest. The records reveal the character of the waves that course through the trembling earth plainly enough. They are highly complex—these earthquake waves. They move up and down like waves in the ocean, crosswise like those of a fluttering flag, back and forth like sound waves.

#### Three Old Cities Recall Crimea's Ancient History

Three ancient cities lie near the Crimean shore of the Black sea. Until recently they were seldom visited by travelers abroad, observes a writer in the Philadelphia Inquirer. The three cities represent distinct eras in the life of the little-known peninsula of Crimea. One remembers it largely for Tennyson's "Charge of the Light Brigade" at the battle of Balaklava, commemorated by the extensive cemeteries in the vicinity of that coastal town. Khersones, founded by the Greeks, Chufut-Kaleh, the "Dead City," and the once palatial capital of the Tartar Khanate, Bakhchissaral, are ruins of absorbing interest. Khersones is only several miles from Sebastopol, a land-locked harbor reminiscent of some Mediterranean shore city, red tiled and white-walled dwellings rising on terraces from the sea. A large part of the city has sunk into the sea.

Over the mountains towards the southern shore lies Bakhchissaral. It is a tartar word signifying "Palace of the gardens." It is situated in a deep valley. Here the Crimean Tartars obeyed the law of their Khans and worshiped in numerous mosques.

#### Bullet-Proof Glass

Bullet-proof or shatter-proof glass is made from two sheets of plate glass with a transparent plastic material such as pyralin or cellulose between. The layers are cemented together and heat and pressure are applied to every part. The Britannica cyclopedia gives a description of this laminated glass and mentions that it is retardant but not proof against rifle and revolver shots. An article on glass in "Chemistry in Industry" mentions re-enforced glass, made by working wire screening between two layers of molten glass, or by fastening several layers of plate glass together with some plastic or gummy cement under pressure. This authority states that one can stand in perfect safety behind a plate an inch thick and let some one fire a .45 caliber steel-nosed bullet at the plate, while a 2-inch plate withstands a 30-30 machine-gun bullet.

#### Fuel Waste Cited

For years owners of industrial plants have known that an uncovered steam pipe or boiler means dollars wasted in fuel bills. The same method of insulation used in such large plants is needed in the home, for an uncovered furnace in the cellar with unprotected pipes leading from it will mean just the same percentage of waste as would occur in a giant foundry or coke furnace. Insulation used for such purposes is easy and economical to apply and is just as important in having an effective heating system.

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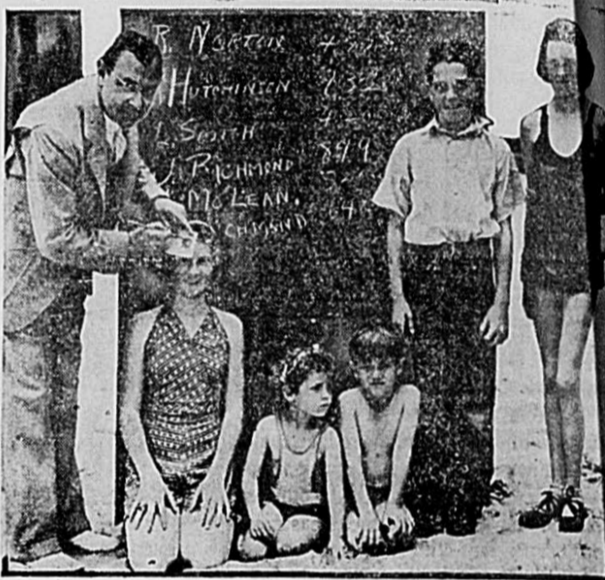

**A FEW DESSERTS**

Nothing that goes to the oven with the ordinary individual is so fresh, hot, ginger bread, served with cream, apple sauce, or topped with whipped cream, and it is always a good dessert. The following is an old recipe which is good:

**Hot Water Ginger Bread.**  
 One egg, add one cupful of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one cupful of sweet molasses and one cupful of flour with a table-spoonful of ginger. Mix and stir. Add a cupful of boiling water to which a teaspoonful of soda has been added, stir until smooth. Then pour into a good-sized greased pan and bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven. Cut while hot in four or two, so that it will be good.

**Frozen Boston Pudding.**  
 One cup of brown bread a day old, pour over a pint of boiling hot cream and stand until cool. Prepare a custard, using a pint of milk, three eggs, two table-spoonfuls of sugar, a few grains of salt, and the custard coats the bread. Cool and freeze, serve unadorned on a platter covered with crushed crumbs.

**Frangipani Pie.**  
 Roll out three circles of nice dough and cut with a plate for the top. Bake on baking sheet and fill with crushed strawberries, sugar and whipped cream. Top with the cream and berries.

**Coffee Junket.**  
 One junket tablet and dissolve in a table-spoonful of coffee. Reserve half a cupful of coffee from a quart of lukewarm milk. Add to the dissolved junket. Pour this milk over two cupfuls of coffee, having the coffee boiling hot. Let stand until cooled, strain and cool before adding to the milk. Let stand in a place to thicken and serve with whipped cream for topping.

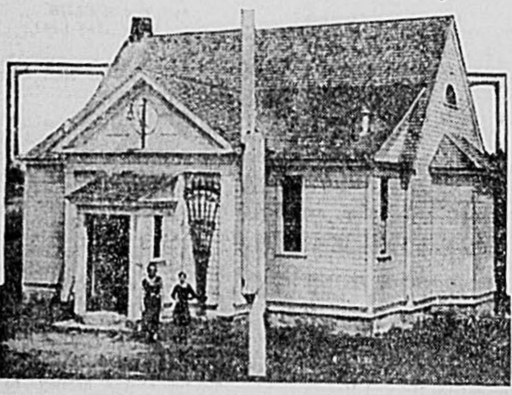

Both acts were most distasteful to the colonist.

**CATTLE RANCH ROUTINE**  
 The great events of the ranchman's year are the round-up when stock is taken the cattle are branded, and such full-grown cattle gathered into a herd as are suitable for market, and the departure of the herds for market or port. In the South there is but one annual round-up, on the ranges of Wyoming, the Dakotas, Colorado, and Montana there are two round-ups, in the year, one early in the spring, to brand the calves and ascertain the losses during the winter, the other in autumn, when the steers over three years old are separated from the main herd and sent for sale.

**SATURDAY EVENING POST**  
 As founded by Franklin, the periodical now known as the Saturday Evening Post, was entitled The Pen. Gazette. The name was changed in 1821 to avoid confusion because at that time six other papers in Penn. were called the Gazette.

**MEATS FOR CANNING**
