Mrs. W. F. Forester Dies In An Amarillo Hospital

Mrs. Rosa Lee Forester, 78 years old, wife of W. F. Forester of Texhoma, died at 3:30 Sunday afternoon in an Amarillo hospital following an injury several days ago.

Mrs. Forester, who came to the Panhandle in 1904, fractured her hip when she slipped and fell at her home at Texhoma.

The deceased was one of the Panhandle's earliest settlers, having lived in Hutchinson County before moving to Texhoma 14 years ago. She was widely known throughout this section. Besides her husband she is survived by four sons and six daughters—H. W. Forester, Morse; Harry, Elkhart, Kansas; C. E., Santa Ana, Calif.; A. C. Clyde, Texas; and Mrs. A. G. Thornton, Wortham, Texas; Mrs. W. L. Waters, Amarillo; Mrs. C. E. Lieb and Mrs. H. B. Parks, Pringle; and Misses Clara and Bertha Forester, Texhoma.

Funeral services were held at Pringle at 2 p. m. Tuesday, followed by interment in Lieb cemetery.

TURKEY SHOOT HELD SUNDAY—SUCCESSFUL

Even turkeys were awarded to participants in what has been termed the most interesting turkey shoot ever held at Spearman. The contest was held last Sunday afternoon at the gun club grounds North of the tracks.

Awards were made as follows: Edgar Dillow, one turk, making a score of 7 hits out of 10 birds.

Jake Vernon, two turkeys making a score of 7 hits out of ten birds and 3 hits out of five birds. L. D. McDonald of Amarillo, two turkeys, the first won by a score of 9 hits out of 10 birds. The second won with 14 hits out of fifteen birds. Mr. McDonald had tied D. M. Jones, and made three trials before he won the last turkey.

F. W. Brandt, two turkeys. The first won with nine out of ten, and the second won by flipping a coin since Mr. Brandt and Mr. McDonald were tied and it looked as though they would have to call time out on account of darkness, as neither could miss a bird.

John Bishop with a nine out of ten score won the last turkey to be awarded.

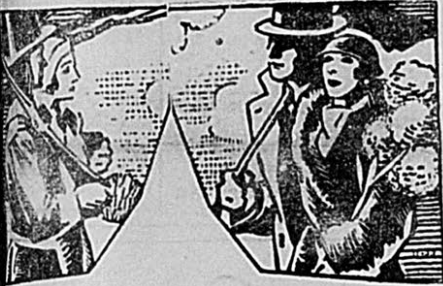
GRUVER P. T. A. PLAY IN REHEARSAL

We as a people have countless advantages and blessings that are not current at the time of our pioneer ancestors. We should be thankful for many things to be thankful for.

FIRST THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

New Americans know that the original Presidential Thanksgiving Proclamation was lost for over a hundred years; that it was found in an auction sale in 1921. That it was bought by the Library of Congress for \$300; and that it now reposes in the archives of the Library—one of the most valuable documents in the world.

On September 25, 1789, Elias Boudinot introduced the following resolution in the House of Representatives:

Resolved, that a joint committee of both Houses be directed to recommend to the President of the United States, to request that the President of the United States a day of Thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging the mercies of the Father of Mercies, the many signal favors of Almighty God, by affording them an opportunity to establish a Constitution of government for their safety and happiness."

As harmless as the resolution seems, there were objections to the Annals of Congress of that period, we find that the Aedanus Burke of South Carolina thought we should mimic Europe, "where they made a mere mockery of Thanksgiving."

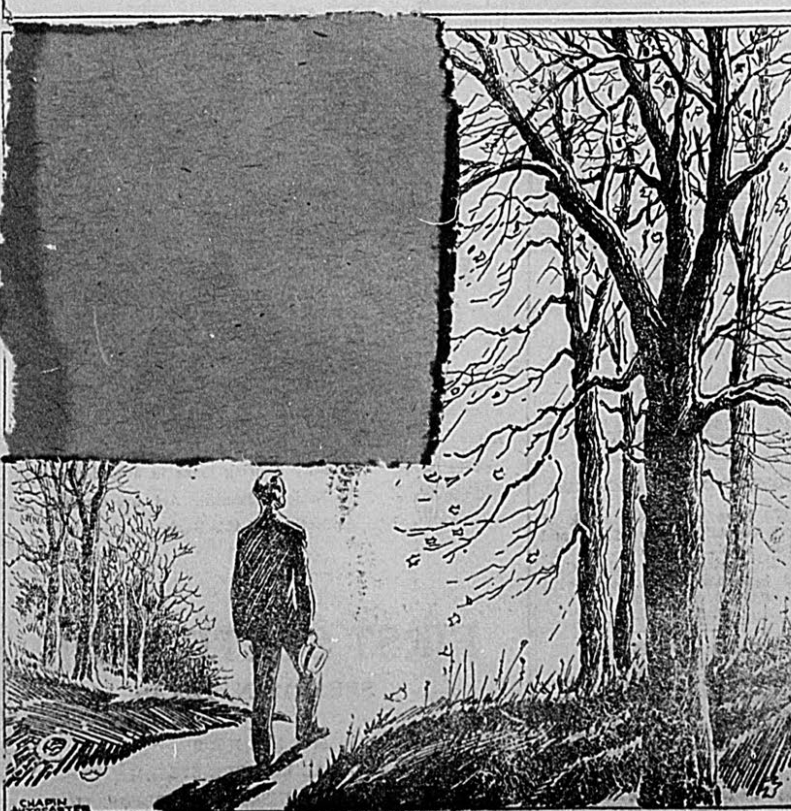
Representative Thomas Tudor Tucker, also of South Carolina, thought that it was not the business of Congress to ask a nation to observe a day of Thanksgiving.

They (the people) may not be inclined to return thanks to the Father of Mercies until they have experienced that it promotes their safety and happiness."

These objections, however, were overruled; the resolution was passed and sent to the Senate for concurrence. The Senate appointed its committee to wait on the President. The committee was made up of Ralph Izard of South Carolina, William S. Johnson of Connecticut, from the Senate, Elias Boudinot of New Jersey, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, and George Washington of New York, from the House.

Washington complied with the request and on October 3, 1789, issued his proclamation, calling for a National day of Thanksgiving on Thursday, November 26.

International Sunday School Lesson

FOR DECEMBER 2

General Topic:—The Christian as Witness. Scripture Lesson—1 Thessalonians 1:1-10.

1. Paul, and Silvanus, and Timothy, unto the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace.

2. We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers.

3. Remembering without ceasing your work of faith and labor of love and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, before our God and Father.

4. Knowing, brethren beloved of God, your election,

How that our gospel came not unto you in word only, but also in power, and in the Holy Spirit, and in much assurance; even as ye know what manner of men we showed ourselves toward you for your sake.

6. And ye became imitators of us, and of the Lord, having received the Lord in much affliction with joy of the Holy Spirit.

7. So that ye became an example to all that believed in Macedonia and in Achaia.

8. For from you hath sounded forth the word of the Lord, not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but in every place your faith to God-ward is gone forth; so that we need not speak anything.

9. For they themselves report concerning us what manner of entering in we had unto you; and how ye turned unto God from idols, to serve a living and true God.

10. And to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead, even Jesus who delivereth us from the wrath to come.

Golden Text:—But ye shall receive power, when the Holy Spirit is come unto you; and ye shall be my witness both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea and Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.—Acts 1:8.

Introduction

In the course of Paul's second missionary journey, accompanied by Silas and Timothy, he was led by the Holy Spirit to take the momentous step of crossing from Asia into Europe. There he first founded the church in Philippi, a leading city of Macedonia. Driven thence by persecution, arising from the miraculous healing of a demoniac slave girl, Paul went southward to the important city of Thessalonica, where he established a strong church. Driven thence by persecution, he went on to Berea, where he built up a church notable for its study of the Bible. Again, however, persecution drove him away and he went south to Athens, where he preached the marvellous sermon on Mars' Hill, but won few converts. Proceeding to the near-by commercial city of Corinth, he labored there successfully for many months, sending back from there this first letter to the church in Thessalonica. It is the earliest of his Epistles that we possess, and with the possible exception of Mark's Gospel, is the earliest of the New Testament writings.

First Thessalonians

"Of all Paul's letters this is the faintest. There is not a word of controversy in it. Its style is unusually simple. A loving fatherly spirit breathes in every line. It is in all respects a letter of

consolation. Two words strike the key-notes of its two most important sections—'affliction,' 'advent.' He has preached to them in affliction; he has warned them that they would suffer affliction; and that warning has been fulfilled. But he has also preached to them of the coming of Christ, and in that hope all sorrow vanished; so that they had received the word in tribulation, yet with joy—in much tribulation, yet with joy of the Holy Ghost. That joy was like a green isle of peace in the world's troubled and storm-swept sea, on which the waves might beat, but on which they might forever beat in vain.—F. W. Farrar.

The Church—"EKKLESIA" v. 1

"Unto the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." "Church" is "ekklesia" in Greek, whence our "ecclesiastic." It means called out, "separated," a congregation bound together by one purpose. But this might be a secular assembly, so that Paul further defines it as "in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ," thus defining the Thessalonian church as a body of believers in God, so not a pagan organization, and in the Son of God, so not a Jewish but a Christian assembly.

The Work of Faith. v. 3

"Remembering without ceasing your work of faith." It is often said that James in emphasizing works and Paul in emphasizing faith are at variance, but this phrase, if we had nothing else (and we have much else) would be enough to prove that Paul agreed heartily with James. "In fact, all James's contention is in this phrase, 'the work of faith.' This was the only faith that was genuine; that was the only faith Paul believed in—the faith that worked. And that was the secret of his rejoicing over these Thessalonians—the reality of their faith was proved by its results, their faith was made perfect by works."—Rev. J. D. Jones. "And labor of love." Paul unites these three, faith, hope and love, as the chief Christian graces, in his incomparable hymn of love, the thirteenth chapter of First Corinthians, ending with the famous estimate, "the greatest of these is love." "The work of faith will never be done unless it is the toil of love. Love delights to have a hard task set it by the beloved, and the harder the task the more poignant the satisfaction."—Rev. Alexander Maclaren, D. D.

Paul's Life an example. v. 6.

"And ye became imitators of us." "Paul challenged his friends in Thessalonica, in Corinth and elsewhere, to take his life as a pattern. He was an example to them as they were to be an example to others and as the Lord Jesus Christ was to be an example to him and the standard for him."—Rev. J. G. Masee, D. D. Has any Christian a right to live a life to which he cannot safely and confidently point as an example for others? If he is not living such a life, he is in deadly danger. "And of the Lord." Paul was humbly certain that all his good deeds were not his own, but those of Jesus Christ; and so when he pointed to himself as an example, he was in reality pointing to his Saviour.

"Affliction, With Joy." v. 6 "Having received the word in

National Cheese Week—celebrated throughout the nation November 11 to 17—has a double significance for Victoria, Texas, and the entire Southwest.

With Governor Miriam Ferguson proclaiming Cheese Week for the state, the Week will get under way at Victoria, November 9, 10, and 11, in a formal opening of the new cheesemaking plant at which J. L. Kraft, and other dairy leaders from both the North and South will be present.

The Victoria plant, regarded as a model for American cheese production, will provide a year-round cash market for several thousand dairy farmers in the immediate vicinity. Another model plant at Bonham, Texas, is being erected, making a triumvirate of important cheese-producing centers for the state of Texas. The first important cheese-production center, and present headquarters in the Southwest, of the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation is the plant at Denison.

much affliction, with joy of the Holy Spirit." "Affliction with joy!" It represents a new possibility introduced into the world by the Christian faith. The phrase describes the life experience of the apostle Paul. At the time of his conversion he was told, "I will show thee how many things thou must suffer for my name's sake" (Acts 9:16). His Christian calling meant affliction for him wherever he went, but he had the Spirit's presence, and that meant love and joy and peace. Affliction with joy! Tribulation, consolation, coronation!"—Prof. D. A. Hayes.

"To Wait For His Son From Heaven." v. 10

"And to wait for his Son from heaven." To await in eager expectation the return of his Son from heaven. "This marked them out from Jewish proselytes, who might also be said to have turned from idols to serve the living God."—Prof. James Moffatt.

"Whom he raised from the dead." Paul could never be long without wondering mention of Christ's resurrection, the great truth which meant so much to him, which he had verified so carefully, and which he correctly saw to be the foundation of historical Christianity and of Christian evidences. "Even Jesus, who delivereth us from the wrath to come." "Our Lord is very emphatically spoken of as 'the Deliverer.' This ever present deliverance implies a past. He redeemed us once for all; he is ever delivering us."—Bishop of Derry.

"All the conversions that are made are made not so much by what we say as by what we do. We are told that we should be living epistles, known and read by all men."—Hon. William Jennings Bryan.

"The fact of our being saved, almost always, through some human instrumentality, makes it incumbent upon us to help save someone else. It is a debt which we owe to humanity."—S. M. Sayford.

"The president of one of our largest theological seminaries was led to Christ in this way. During his college course, as he came out of recitation one day, one classmate gave him a slap on the back, and said, 'Say, Gus, I wish you were a Christian.' Gus made no reply, and the matter was dropped; but years afterward he told his friend that it was that remark which led him to accept Christ as his Saviour."—Rev. H. W. Pope.

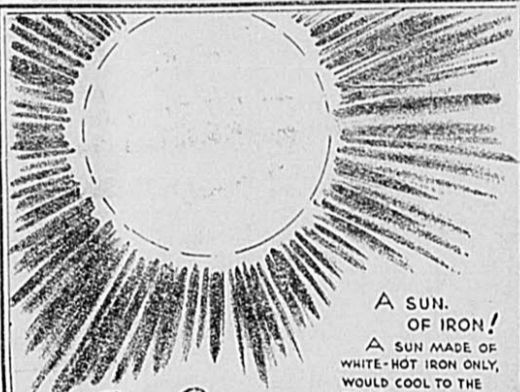

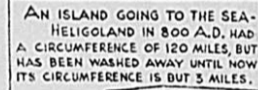

Austin, Nov. 26.—Counties participating in the rural rehabilitation program received Novem-

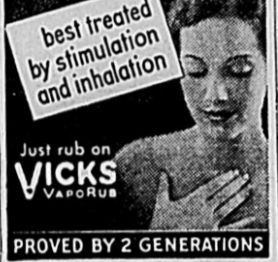
ber allotment checks totaling \$326,100 last week, it was announced by J. E. Stanford, head of the rural rehabilitation department of the Texas Relief Commission.

Now that the election is over and the officials named the ensuing term it might not be amiss to direct attention to the cost of our system of government.

According to recent census figures the tax payers of the United States support 3,062 county governments, 16,769 city governments, 128,548 school districts and 19,769 township organizations. The question before the citizens of this country is whether there are too many organizations for modern needs.

We have no objection to any of these arms of government if the taxpayers are willing to pay for them. However, the average citizen of this republic pays \$71.09 each year to support them, when many of them could be eliminated without crippling government in the least.

We haven't heard very much about the campaign against indecency in the movies lately but we call to your attention the evident fact that there is no system in the universe which compels a man or a woman in Hansford County to pay money to see a picture that they prefer not to see.

There is much to be said in defense of the operators of the moving picture theatres in this county, as well as elsewhere. They are not to be blamed, as a class, for the type of films put out by the producers nor are they responsible for showing objectional pictures which producers compel them to buy.

We have witnessed a great number of moving pictures in our day. Some we did not like; others we enjoyed. However, it has been our practice to watch the advertising matter and the write-ups of the screen's offerings. When we know that the theatre is showing a type of picture that we do not care to see, we stay home. It is a good rule for everybody and, in time, the most effective form of censorship that the world provides.

It's about time for merchants and business men of Spearman to look ahead and resume plans for business as usual.

While there has been an excusable let-down in the past few years the tide is beginning to turn, the buying power of people is improving and trade will naturally come to the merchants who go after it.

In this connection we point out that one of the greatest factors in advancing the commercial and business interest of any city is a first-class newspaper. Somehow, people in a given territory trade in the town whose newspaper they read. The Spearman Reporter, with its thorough coverage of the trading area of Spearman is indispensable in any concerted trade promotion.

We do not mean and would not advise that merchants in any city should support a newspaper solely because it is published where they have their places of business. But we do say that where a newspaper is published in a given city, with adequate coverage of the trading area and comprehensive service to the people of that section, merchants and business men would do well to advertise in the publication.

Spearman's business will grow almost identically with the success of its journalistic enterprises. The support from advertiser, which insures newspaper success, widens the field of influence for a publication and brings back dividends to the business men involved. There is no question about the truth of this conclusion. It would, perhaps, be unbecoming for us to say that the Reporter is such a worthy representative of the publishing world and the question is left for answer from our business interests. If they conclude that this newspaper is a good salesman for this section and will give us the support that such a representative deserves there will be a decided improvement, and, among the first to feel it will be the advertising business men of Spearman.

The most important of all: The human body, gets less attention from the governing powers of Texas than any other state in the union. Health Department records at Austin show Texas, with less than 5 per cent of the total population of the United States, has more than 18 per cent of all the deaths caused by typhoid fever.

During the time that four children die in the remaining United States from diptheria ten children

5 per cent of the children in the United States lives in Texas, yet 20 per cent of the death from malaria last year occurred among Texas children.

Hansford County has as good doctors as can be found, and also a good registered nurse, and we believe it would be one of the best moves the Commissioners' Court of Hansford County could make to employ a full time Health Officer and a Registered Nurse to be on the job at all times, caring for the sick and especially looking after the health of the children.
