SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees, (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this state by the sum of twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided, however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State government of funds derived from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this state by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars, provided, however, that the population of the State (in determining the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, licenses, permits and fee or expended from the revenue thus obtained) shall be determined by the then last preceding Federal census, to which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has lapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by Federal census when compared with the Federal census which immediately preceded said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots, or insurrection, or a state-wide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or an epidemic which seriously threatens the health of the citizens of this state, the Legislature shall have authority, by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period this constitutional limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected and expended during the biennium."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature shall have the power to create counties for the convenience of the people subject to the following provisions:

First. In the territory of the State exterior to all counties now existing, no new counties shall be created with a less area than nine hundred square miles, in a square form, unless prevented by the preexisting boundary lines. Should the state lines render this impracticable in border counties, the area may be less. The territory referred to may, at any time, in whole or in part, be divided into counties in advance of population and attached for judicial and land surveying purposes, to the most convenient organized county or counties.

Second. Within the territory of any county or counties now existing, the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, create new counties, combine existing counties and parts of counties and abolish existing counties and change county boundaries at will, provided that no new county shall be created with an area less than nine hundred square miles nor shall any existing county be reduced in area so as to contain less than nine hundred square miles, unless such county, and both shall have a population of not less than fifty thousand according to the last United States census prior to the date of the creation or change of such county. When any part of a county is stricken off and attached to, or created into another county, the part stricken off shall be held for and obliged to pay its proportion of all liabilities then existing, of the county from which it was taken, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Third. No part of any existing county shall be detached from it and attached to another existing county until the proposition for such change shall have been submitted in such a manner as may be provided by law, to a vote of the electors of both counties and shall have received a majority of those voting on the question in each."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday in November, 1934. At this election all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the amendment to Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties."

Those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballot the words:

"Against the amendment to Section 1, of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change boundaries of existing counties."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned, provided they shall be rendered for taxation on the values fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the Uniland; and provided that the University of Texas shall remit annually to each of the counties and school districts in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county and school district purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas...

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 1. TAXATION TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO REAL ESTATE AND TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO ALL REASONABLE CLASSIFICATIONS OF PROPERTY; AND OCCUPATION AND INCOME TAXES; EXEMPTIONS; LIMITATIONS UPON COUNTIES, CITIES, ETC.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this state, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The Legislature may impose a poll tax. It may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except that persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax; provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the state, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town for any year on persons or corporations pursuing any profession or business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the state for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election, all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this state, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose a poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this state, other than that owned by municipal corporations shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose a poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and authorizing the Commissioner's Court in all counties to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

Cities having more than five thousand (5,000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subjects to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no Legislative or other ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State, said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (2 1/2 per cent) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city unless at the same time provisions be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two per cent (2 per cent) thereon; provided further, that no city charter shall be amended or repealed or its charter altered every twelve (12) months."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934; at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;"

And those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."

Each voter shall scratch out with a pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 42.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 30, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its charter as provided in Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law, it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers, and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, that Railroad Commissioners first elected after this amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one shall serve four (4) years and one six (6) years; their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of a vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next general election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next General election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to amend their charters, that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."

And those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."

Each voter shall scratch out with a pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment.

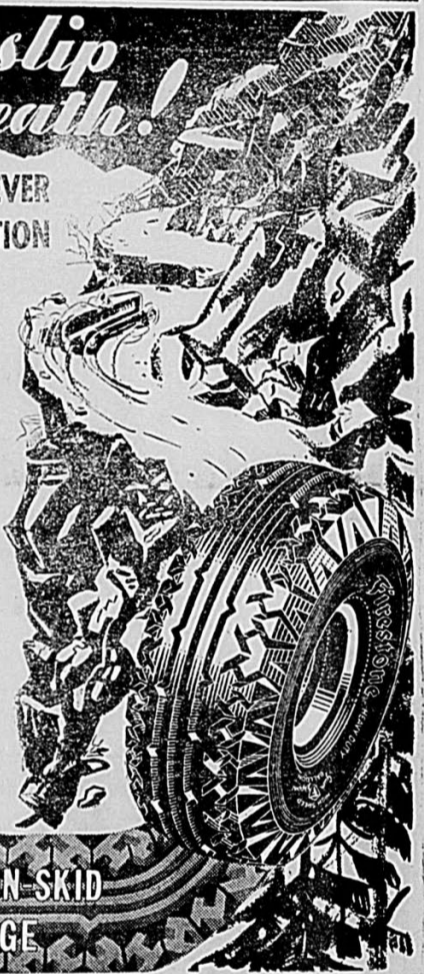

INTRODUCTION We have already seen in lesson IV, 1 Kings 19:19-21, how Elisha the farmer lad, was made a prophet by Elijah, who threw his mantle over the lad's shoulder, and thenceforth Elisha became his follower and servant. When the great prophet was carried to heaven in a whirlwind of fire, Elisha took up his mantle, and from that hour was heir to his power and his influence. But "Elijah's" disciple and successor was a very different type of man. He was neither so fierce nor so impulsive. He seems gentler and kinder. He impresses us as far more tolerant of human shortcomings, always eager to help and reluctant to denounce people. Instead of dwelling solitary, apart from human kind, he was companionable and loved to be where his fellowmen lived and toiled. Thus the two great prophets complemented one another in marvellous fashion.—Prof. Geo. Dahl, Ph. D. Elisha A Man of the City "Elijah had been a man of the wilderness, dwelling far from the shades of men. The free air of the desert had been his vital element; the wild broom of the wadis his shade; the awful wilderness of Sinia his chosen retreat in the supreme hour of despondency. Elisha was a man of the city, fond of its streets and crowds. Samaria became his residence for many years. From this center a wide apostolate was carried on, for well nigh fifty years, in every direction. Like Samuel, he seems to have made circuits over the whole country, rousing and instructing the people at large. A citizen among citizens, he moved about amidst the people leaning on the staff; his dress was that of ordinary life, nor do we hear of him wearing even the sheepskin mantle of Elijah, which he had inherited. Elisha is noted for the number of his miracles. The wonders recorded of him are a testimony to his gentle and loving nature. He heals the waters of Jericho by casting salt into them from a new cruse, doubtless with invocation of God. He replaces even so slight a loss as that of an axe-head which had fallen through the thickets of the Jordan into the river. While Elijah predicted famine, he foretells plenty."—Cunningham Geikie. Sons of the Prophets. v. 1. "Now there cried a certain woman of the wives of the sons of the prophets." "Sons of the prophets" is a term that does not mean children of the prophets, but members of the prophetic order. The so-called "schools of the prophets" were not theological seminaries, but were associations of those who already possessed prophetic powers and exercised prophetic functions. Samuel was the great master of "sons of the prophets." Elijah was another, followed by Elisha. This poor woman went naturally to Elisha for help, as he was the chief of the prophets. 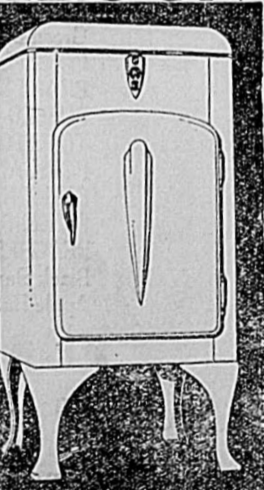

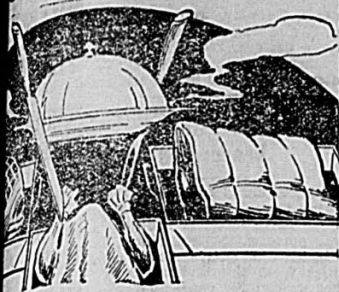

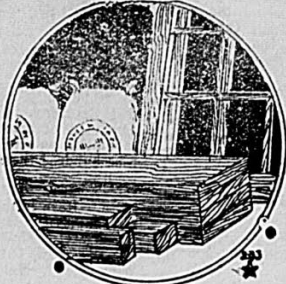
