### Government Will Buy Hansford County Cattle This Week

Hansford county cattle two years old and older will bring \$12 to \$20 each on a market created by the government in the program of cattle reduction. The market will be open for the general public Wednesday morning July 25th. Sale of cattle to the government under the terms of the present cattle reduction program required the signing of a contract with the government. These contracts are in the office of the county agent, Frank Wendt, in Spearman, and Mrs. J. N. Jackson will have charge of filling out the contracts. All cattle owners who anticipate selling any cattle to the government must attend to filling out these contracts before sale can be effected. Mrs. Jackson is at the county agents office now and can arrange the contracts at any time.

Cattle purchased by the government will be either killed or processed. Dr. Wilson, veterinarian, working with the government will have charge of inspection of cattle to determine the classification and the cattle that is designated for killing will be killed on the owners premises. The government will not resume any responsibility for the disposal of the carcass of cattle killed. The owner can skin the cattle and dispose of the carcass as he sees fit.

### Drouth Relief Loans To Be Made Through Local Hansford Relief Office

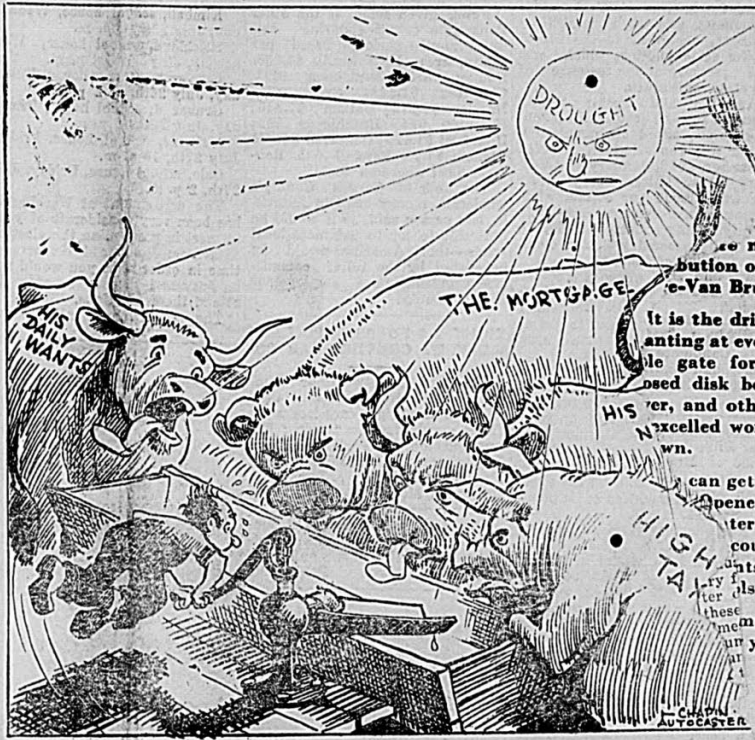
The Spearman Reporter has on hand a copy of the regulations governing loans in Drouth stricken area from the emergency crop loan section of the Farm Credit Administration. These regulations are entirely too bulky and technical to be classified as interesting reading matter, and in the opinion of the editor of this publication will be explained in less cumbersome form to those desiring to take advantage of loans under the above classification. Loan can be made on farm livestock (cattle, horses, mules, sheep, goats, hogs) and range livestock (cattle, sheep, goat and horses). The rate of interest is 5 and a half per cent.

Applications for such loans will be made at the Hansford County Relief office. Approval of loans will be made by a local committee, the personnel of which is not to be made public. Any person who would like to look over these regulations can secure a copy at the Reporter office, or better apply at the Relief office.

## Texas Voters Rallying to Support of Senator Small

In an article featured by one of Texas most talented editorial writers, Peter Molyneux, Editor and publisher of the TEXAS WEEKLY, a non-partisan publication, the writer discusses "Who'll Win the Governor's Race?"

The thinker who really wants to learn the trend of the present political race will do well to secure a copy of the TEXAS WEEKLY and read this two page article, which is a summary of opinions gathered from every section of the state of Texas. The article favors no one individual, further than reproducing facts as gathered by the very capable staff of editorial writers. Perhaps the individual reader of the article can find encouragement for himself since nearly every candidate receives support of individual papers throughout the state. However the encouragement West Texas' get out of the article is embodied in the fact that there is a general acknowledgement in the majority of the articles that Senator Clint Small is gaining ground each day as the primary election

time draws near. Broadly speaking Attorney General Allred seems to be assured of a place in the run-off, with the opinions divided between Small, Hunter and McDonald for running mate in the August election. Few papers deny Allred the prospects of leading the race, but practically every article summary indicates that the favorite is losing ground rapidly, and many of the opinions state that either Hunter, Small or McDonald will defeat Allred in the August derby, with the aid of the vote of defeated candidates.

Quoting from some of the widely separated newspaper opinions (separated by distance as well as opinions):

Corpus Christi Caller. . . Small bids fair to carry Corpus Christi and some of the larger towns. Allred seems to have lost some of the speed he showed as the starters were given the flag, and McDonald and Hughes are apparently managing to keep each other from gaining any ground."

And now for a swing around the State. Most largely favored by the press is Clint Small, particularly in West Texas where the local papers are more active in the Governor's race than those in other sections of the state. The Fort Worth Star-Telegram announced of four early for its candidate of the year ago: "Reports from over the state showing a solid and increasing interest in the candidacy of Clint Small for Governor indicate no other than logical development of his campaign four years ago when his sagacity and practical-mindedness drew him to a gratifying large support."

The Wellington Leader and Abilene Morning News applaud the entrance of Senator Clint Small in the race, as would be expected, and both papers refer to the growing interest in the campaign for Small that has developed all over the state. Most all West Texas papers refer to the fact that favorable comments for Small are reflected in newspaper articles from large daily papers at San Antonio, Houston, Dallas, Ft. Worth, Amarillo and Austin.

In East Texas the dignified campaign conducted by Clint Small meets with the approval of a half hundred weekly papers as well as many small dailies, who have expressed themselves either converted to the Small campaign, or favorably impressed.

In South Texas the West Texan is favored with the support of many influential weekly papers. Several comments from South Texas weekly papers indicate Small for a favorite in the run-off campaign, although the publications are supporting one of the lesser favorites in the primary election.

Comments from a large number of papers indicate the editorial staffs of the respective papers are not well enough informed to present a guess on the outcome of the coming election. The Goose Creek Daily Sun agrees with the Corpus Christi Caller. "Allred seems to have lost some of the speed," but most newspapers still feel he will be in the race. In West Texas the Lynn

County News offers its opinions: "Now, we are not going to say positively who the next Governor of Texas will be, but we are sizing up the situation as it appears to us today. Here it is. Jimmie Allred is the leader of the field. He is sure of a place in the run-off. He is running strong in every section of the state. . . At the outset we believed that C. C. McDonald of Wichita Falls, who is the candidate of the Fergusons would be the second highest man. But now we doubt it. He will undoubtedly get the Ferguson vest pocket vote. But he does not seem to be arousing much enthusiasm. He is not gathering any strength. . . For a few weeks Tom Hunter seemed to be gathering great strength. The prospects are yet that he will get a good vote in all parts of Texas. He seems to have a good chance to get in the run-off, but possibly not so good as he had two or three weeks ago. . . Clint Small is obviously gaining strength. He has the support of more of the daily papers than any other candidate. . . According to all of the political writers, he is steadily gaining strength throughout the state generally."

In the Panhandle the Pampa Daily News reasons this way: "There may not be a very big margin of votes between Allred, Small, McDonald and Hunter. Allred's strength, generally based on the point of view that Hunter is the more radical of the two

mer anti-chain store group. McDonald is a contender almost solely because he has Ferguson support. . . This leaves Senator Small in the unique position of having State-wide support, though scattered, plus what should be a powerful West Texas following."

The Moran News agrees that Allred, McDonald, Small and Hunter "will be uncomfortably close together when the votes are counted," but it adds Maury Hughes' name to the select group. The Hamlin Herald reproduces these forecasts from the columns of the News: "It is interesting to hazard guesses on the race, and is also very probable that any guess at this time will be premature. However, we will indulge in one or two: If Hughes and McDonald are in the run-off, Hughes will be the next Governor. If Allred and Small go into the second primary (which we figure improbable) Mr. Allred will be our Governor. But we shall see what we shall see."

And in East Texas the Huntsville Item continues to feel that Allred still is clinging to the inside track: "The candidate who can defeat Attorney General Allred in the August primary will be the next Governor of Texas. The two men who have his time the best chance of doing this are the primary contestants Allred and McDonald. Hunter. It is surprising how Tom Hunter is showing strength in all sections of Texas, and he may be the one to run it off with Allred."

generally conceded that Attorney General James V. Allred will be one of the contenders in the second primary, but pauses to consider seriously who has the best chance of being his opponent: "Reports from all sections of the state indicate that the strongest contenders for a place with Allred in the second primary is Maury Hughes and Senator Small. Hughes' strength lies in the heavy voting counties around Dallas and in North Texas. . . Senator Small according to authentic reports, will likely carry the Panhandle counties and much of West Texas. . . He will likely be among the high men in the Governor's race. "Edward K. Russell, the bone-dry prohibitionist, is usually figured to tail the gubernatorial sweepstakes race. Tom Hunter who made a very creditable race two years ago, and Lieutenant Governor Edgar Witt, who got the largest vote ever cast for anyone for state office are uncertain factors."

All this just goes to prove, though, that the Governor's race is badly mixed." So says the Gainesville Signal, anyway, which polishes things up with this resigned opinion: "It looks like no one will know who the Governor is going to be until the votes are counted."

POTTER ROOTS DEEP IN PUBLIC TROUGH, AS CARSON GETS ONLY .715 PER CAPITA.

Editors note:

The management of this publication is reprinting the article below from the Panhandle, Texas, Herald. The comparison as made by the editor of the Herald relative to Carson county is more pronounced respecting Hansford county because the population of Hansford county is smaller than Carson county. Surely there is a real injustice in the Relief Administration when the apparently richest county in West Texas receives anywhere from ten to 25 times as much relief per capita than the other counties of the Panhandle.

Potter county has rooted deep in the public trough in getting public funds from the Texas relief commission and the Federal Government, according to the report of the state auditor, which was made recently at the instance of the state legislature.

Amarillo and Potter county managed to rank second in amount of receipts, based on population, stated this report which included December, 1933, January and February, 1934. Potter county's average was \$2,917 per capita, while Carson county averaged only .715. Only Loving county with \$6,656 per capita exceeding Potter county's relief funds.

Travis county developed, averaging \$2,544 per capita, while most of the other counties in the Panhandle received less than \$1,000 per capita.

For instance, Potter county received \$1,542,411 in relief funds, based on population, but they only have 40,000 to 60,000 people. Potter county's population is less than that of 18 counties in its population class.

Potter county received \$2,773,341 in relief funds in December, \$1,542,411 in January and \$1,224,200 in February, for a total of \$5,539,999. Potter county's population is less than that of 18 counties in its population class.

Potter county's population is less than that of 18 counties in its population class. The relief funds received by Potter county are based on population. Local people say that other Plains counties are in much harder shape than Potter county, but they don't know how to drag out the money.

excessive relief funds and it has been predicted that with more than 1600 workers on the rolls now actually drawing money that the mid-winter prosperity will return there.

Other Panhandle counties should get on the job and try to increase their per capita allotment and share more in the general prosperity to come through relief funds, it has been pointed out. The State and Federal Government spent \$6,413,792.22 in these three months and apparently the money gets to the counties fighting like the devil for it.

Already it is said that more than 100 Texas counties have been put in emergency relief areas. Unless the election gets over in a hurry, it is said that the remainder of the Texas counties will be thus listed, a man high in Texas affairs said while he was in Panhandle the other day.

Funds given some of the other Panhandle counties during this three months period, based per capita, are: Deaf Smith \$1,036. Donley .615; Armstrong .693. Childress \$1,148; Gray .479; Hartley \$1,215; Dallam \$1,445; Hemphill .991; Hutchinson .536; Hansford \$1,629; Ochiltree \$1,976; Oldham \$1,25. Randall .635. Roberts .641; Sherman \$1,757.

The bulk of Carson County's wholesale money goes to Amarillo, one person said, so it would be desirable to try to get more local funds—thus, Amarillo would be benefited by the relief commission providing more employment in this county.

Drouth Relief Loans Are Now Available

Checks covering drouth relief loans from the \$100,000,000 drouth relief appropriation recently made available by Congress direct to farmers and ranchmen for the purchase of feed for farm and range livestock and to plant forage crops in primary drouth areas in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, of which Hansford county is included, are being written, according to announcement made today by Charles W. Sherrill, Regional Manager of the Southwestern Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office of the Farm Credit Administration at Dallas. Checks will reach applicants in the least possible time after the forms are sent to the Dallas Office in proper form.

Loans will be advanced in monthly installments, with a supplemental application necessary for each month's requirements.

Applications must be submitted to the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Committee for the county in which the applicant's livestock is located or forage crops to be planted. Quarters for the county loan committee will be at the office of the local Federal Relief Administrator who will serve as a member of the county committee. In Hansford county applications will be made at the Hansford County Relief office.

**THE VOICE OF GOD**  
 In the cave of Horeb in the mountains of Sinai about 906 B. C. Elijah heard God's voice. 1 Kings 19.

1. The voice of authority.—"Stand upon the mount before Jehovah." v. 11.

2. The voice of Attention.—"What doest thou here, Elijah?" v. 13.

3. The voice of Action.—"Go return. . . Anoint." v. 15.

4. The voice of Assurance.—"The sword. . . seven thousand." vs. 17, 18.

Thus Jehovah revived Elijah's downcast spirit and pointed out to him the path to future service.

**The Aim of the Lesson**  
 As important as it is for us to speak to God, it is of equal importance that we allow God to speak to us. Before he can speak to us, however, we must be willing to listen. By listening we shall hear God's voice, by hearing we shall learn what he wills for our lives, and by learning we shall be able to do whatever he commands. To train our ears to recognize God's voice, to quicken our minds to understand God's ways, and to encourage our wills to follow God's plans is the three-fold aim of this lesson.

**Elijah at Horeb. 1 Kings 19:14**  
 This is the only time after Moses and the Exodus, that we are taken back in Bible history to Sinai's sacred solitudes. And the greatest prophet since Moses goes back there into the very presence of the Eternal. Elijah stood on the awful mountainside, among the boulders of eternal granite. A hurricane howled through the gorges, toppling over the towering boulders. But not in that hurricane could he discern God. Next a mighty earthquake rocked the mountain, but it brought him no revelation of Jehovah. Afterward the hill flashed and flamed with lightning fire; but God did not come to him in that fire. Finally a great stillness settled over the mountain; and from that stillness God spake to him; not in wind, fire or rocking earth, but with a still small voice.

**Elijah's Despondency. 1 Kings 19:14.**  
 "I, even I only, am left; and they seek my life, to take it away. v. 14." At times we are disposed to think that all things are degenerating, in business, government, and religion. The world has been wrecked in the greatest war of

history, and it carried down all things in a universal cataclysm. The church has been weakened and piety is declining. "When the son of man cometh, shall he find faith on earth?" Yes. The faithful in all lands are more in number than we know, and the purpose of God is ever widening with the process of the suns.—James H. Snowden.

**Elijah Sent Back To His Work. v. 15**  
 "Go, return on thy way to the wilderness of Damascus." v. 15.

The scene is now suddenly shifted from Horeb to the North again. Elijah goes to Damascus and there encourages a certain Hazael, by anointing him, to usurp the throne of the Syrian King Benhadad II.

Hazael is punishing the Baal worshippers of Israel. In the same manner he prepares the Israelitish general Jehu ultimately to be the king of Israel. For God was done with Ahab and his dynasty! Elijah is also reminded that his own course is almost run, by the injunction to pick out his own successor. He had been told that God had no lack of faithful followers. This Elisha is one of them. His home was in the Jordan Valley, not far from Bethshean. His father must have been a very well to do farmer to possess so many oxen. The prophet's hair-cloth mantle, v. 19, with which the consecration was accomplished was a garment distinctive of and distinguishing the prophetic office.

**The Calling of Elisha**  
 This stormy chapter closes with a calm and lovely scene, the summoning of Elisha to the prophetic calling. Elijah found the young man—whose family was evidently one of substance—plowing with no less than 12 yoke of oxen. With no words Elijah cast his sheepskin mantle over the young farmer's shoulders. Elisha at once understood what the symbolic act signified, that he was to succeed the great religious leader whose wonderful deeds were known all over Israel. At once he kissed his father and mother goodbye, slew a yoke of oxen as a sacrifice to Jehovah, roasted them over a fire made of his wooden plow, yokes, and the stick with which he drove the animals, and made a sacrificial feast for his relatives and friends. Then he followed after Elijah, and from that day was his faithful assistant. The young man, so gracious and serviceable, must have been a wonderful comfort to the aged prophet, and Elijah must have rejoiced to know that so worthy and able a successor was ready to take up his work.

The West Texas Wool market continues to be draggy, however, several thousand pounds have been moved recently on consignment with advance of 20 cents per pound being paid.

The Building & Loan Association paid a dividend last week of four per cent for six months business, and the Coleman National Bank declared a five per cent dividend to stockholders at Coleman. A loan of \$75,000 to the Pecos Valley Conservatory district by the PWA has been made and will be used in plugging leaking wells in the artesian basin around Roswell, N. M.

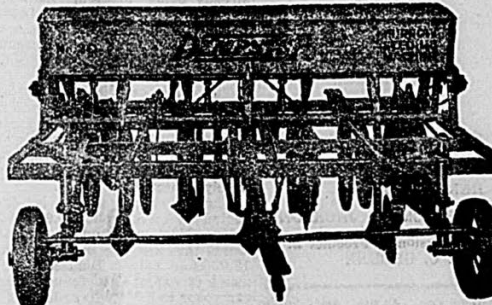

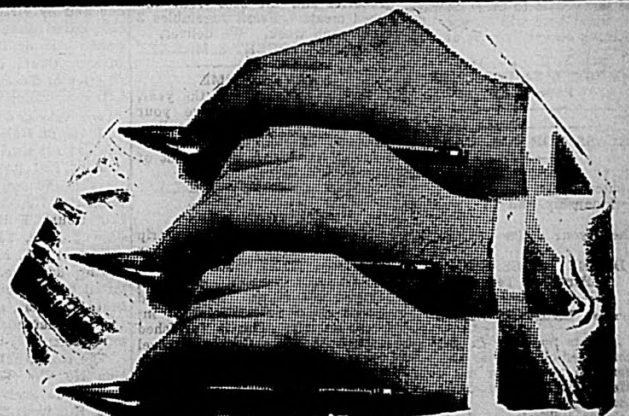

Drought To Cause Several Changes In Farm Program

Washington.—Changing conditions are necessitating corresponding alterations in the program of the farm administration.

Developments of the season, with a widespread drought as the principal influence, have brought five changes into contemplation.

Abandonment of control over livestock production. An increased production of wheat and cotton over the figures for the current year.

Institution of a single education contract to cover all feed grains subject to curtailment.

Establishment of a plan for storing grain on farms, with loans made against it. Probably the grain would be placed under government seal.

A broad milk program for the eastern section of the country with many milk marketing agreements condensed into one adjustment program.

Officials are veering to the opinion that live stock production can best be restricted by controlling the output of feed grains. Raising the latter and raising live stock are closely allied and generally carried on the same farm.

Usually a farmer raises no more live stock than he can feed with the produce of his own fields.

In addition it is expected that live stock surpluses will be virtually eliminated this year. A survey showed a 27 per cent reduction in pigs as of June 1, and drought relief plans call for the purchase of 5,000,000 cattle and an equal number of sheep.

A group contract for grains is already being drafted, marking the first step toward a broad system of bringing all crops under a blanket curtailment agreement. The contract covers corn, rye, barley and grain sorghums.

The wheat crop is estimated at about 500,000,000 bushels with a reduction in the carryover from this year's 260,000,000 bushels to about 12,000,000. A relaxation in the present 15 per cent cut is widely expected.

The year's cotton crop is expected to total about 10,000,000 bales. Next year under present plans, this will be increased to 13,000,000 bales. Domestic demand is expected to reduce the carryover to 6,000,000 bales which is about normal, and cause plantings of 35,000,000 acres next year as compared to 25,000,000 this year.

The New Mexico sales tax recently inaugurated in that state, brought in \$11,875.37 from the gross sales for May, the first month of its operation, according to the state treasurer's announcement last week.

Due to weakened condition of trees and dry weather, the citrus crop shipment from the Rio Grande valley this year will be nine or ten thousand car loads, which is considerably below the average.

The \$4,000 reward offered for the capture or killing of Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker has been awarded to the six officers who did the killing, but after expenses were taken out there was only about \$1,500 of the sum left as a reward.

No clue has been discovered to the robbery of Mrs. Mattie Bolling, San Antonio, who last week was robbed of \$60,000 in cash and diamonds, \$30,000 in Liberty bonds and \$17,000 in other bonds. The loot was taken while the family was away from home.

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This Week In Washington

It is President Roosevelt's hope and expectation that in the course of the next six months—that is, before the new Congress meets in January—he will have got the whole of the complicated machinery of Government working in unison to a single end, and will have found able men to replace several who are definitely on the way out because they have not made good in their jobs.

How he is going to do this without disturbing the morale of the Administration is his worry. And Mr. Roosevelt doesn't worry much about anything. He comes pretty close to obeying the Biblical injunction about letting tomorrow take care of itself. However, a lot of other folks are doing considerable worrying.

Johnson Under Discussion Perhaps the biggest source of worry in the Administration is General Hugh Johnson. Personally everybody likes General Johnson. In starting the Blue Eagle and the NRA off on a wave of popular enthusiasm he did a magnificent job of propaganda. He is still the great propagandist, but as an administrator, it is beginning to be realized in Administration circles as it has long been realized by the business men with whom he has had to deal, he is decidedly not a success.

How to ease General Johnson out without stirring up too much trouble is one of the President's chief difficulties. He must have the right man to slip into his place before he acts. Business interests are beginning to talk of Clay Williams, head of the Reynolds Tobacco Company, as the ideal man for the job. There has been no intimation from the White House as to who may be the next head of the NRA, but a change is regarded as certain.

Housing Act Moving Harry Hopkins, head of the Emergency Relief, and not John Fahy, head of the Home Loan Board, will be made the administrator of the new Housing Act. A campaign of propaganda to fix up the old house is to be begun soon. The hope is to get activity in the building trades started off this year, and a big building boom in 1935.

What is still lacking is confidence on the part of private business and industry. It is realized that something must be done to assure business that if it puts its money to work now there will be no further radical legislation or administrative actions to impair the stability of investments.

No word has been forthcoming on what the President will do under the Silver Act. Secretary Morgenthau declares that he will administer it "enthusiastically," but that does not satisfy conservatives. There is a strong belief here, backed up by statements from financiers who usually know what they are talking about, that the amendments to the Securities Act now make it reasonably possible for the flotation of new stock and bond issues to provide working capital, which is badly needed, for many large industries.

Business confidence is not being helped any by the continuous threats of strikes in major industries. The American Federation of Labor has declared its intention to devote the summer to the complete organization of the automobile industry, preparatory to making demands next Fall which it will back up by a general strike in the automobile factories if they are not granted.

The outlook as seen by impartial observers here is for a slight falling off of business during the summer, which does not now look as promising as 1933, with increased governmental spending to take up the slack while business men and financiers are studying and analyzing the probable effects and benefits, or otherwise, of the things which have been undertaken by the government, before making very long commitments.

One of the things which will come in for a great deal of hard study will be the National Debt. It is now 27 billion dollars—27 thousand millions. That is the highest point our national debt has ever reached.

Nobody worries much about paying off a national debt—nobody but Andrew Mellon, that is, Mr. Mellon approached the public debt as a banker does all debts, as something to be paid. Statesmen look at debts as something to of-

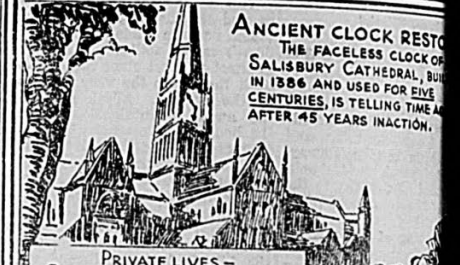

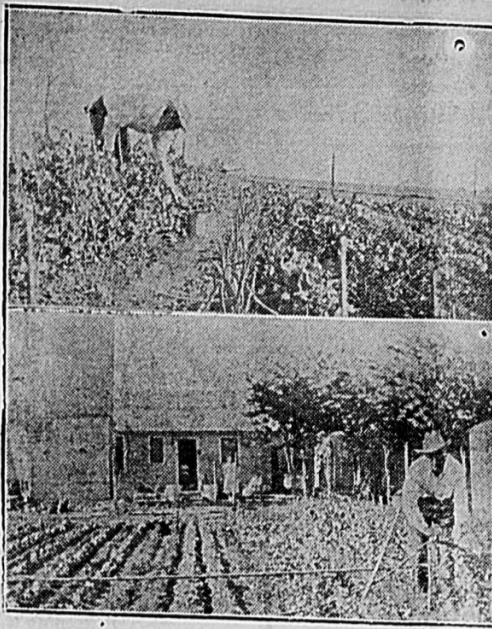

## YOUTH BLEEDS TO DEATH AS CHURCH COMPANY ONLY PRAYS

The above headline of news item which describes the recent tragedy occurring at Texarkana, Arkansas, where a sixteen year old boy died of stab wounds inflicted by another boy; the death being due to the lack of medical attention,—should cause people to arouse themselves to do some serious thinking.

Quoting the article, "Instead of taking the boy immediately to a doctor, worshippers at a pentecostal meeting prayed over him last night as he lay bleeding to death on the ground."

Can you picture anything anymore barbarous. Even animals show more consideration and intelligence in care of their injured young. They did not even so much as make his last hour more comfortable by moving him to a bed on which to lie, according to the report.

Suppose a group of gangsters had failed to render aid to a dying youth. Why the entire nation would hear of it and command that they be punished. But this is different, because this was done by a religious organization. Oh yes! "All denominations are all right, it does not matter which one you belong just so you are sincere." This is the popular idea today. And it is popular because many of the preachers teach that to be the truth.

And when such acts as this occurs these people shut their eyes to the facts and continue to fellowship, and be members of, the organizations which harbor and promulgate such vicious practices. It has not been long, about a year since two preachers murdered a little girl, in the home of her parents, by choking her to death. You remember the story how that, in the trial, one of them testified that it was revealed to him that "God told him to choke her, but that later he found out that it was the Devil." And if "God is Love," a great many people are going to find out that it is the Devil who is leading them, when they fellowship and are members of organizations who do such awful things.

Think of this seriously. If these people could actually do what they claim, that is, heal by prayer alone, then they are evidently the coldest, most cruel people on earth. With all of the suffering humanity filling our hospitals, our slums and in our own community; and these people refusing to heal them.

It is small wonder that the World at large is skeptical of religious interests. Infidels have for their strongest defense the proof that denominations do not practice nor believe all of the Bible teachings themselves.

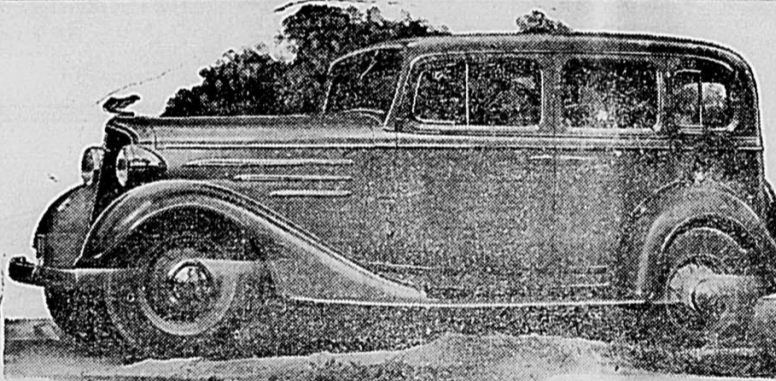
