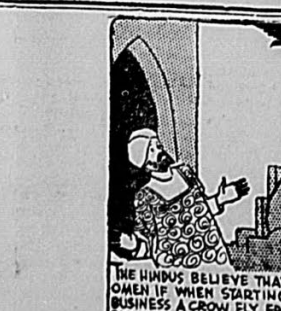
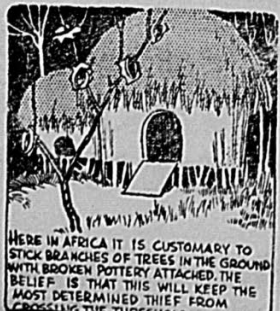

## Production Credit Loan Association To Reduce Interest Rates

Earl L. Shelton, secretary-treasurer of the Amarillo Production Credit Association has just received word from Governor W. H. Myers of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D. C., that the interest rate on new loans from production credit associations has been reduced from 5 1-2 to 5 per cent.

According to Mr. Shelton, the new 5 per cent interest rate becomes effective immediately on all new loans and advances made by the association and will be applicable until further notice.

"The new interest rate of 5 per cent will not affect loans already advanced in full," Mr. Shelton said. "These will continue to bear the rate of interest prevailing at the time the loan was closed. The interest charges on loans from the association are collected when the loans mature. The Amarillo Association is now making loans on acceptable crop and chattel security to farmers in Armstrong, Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hansford, Hartley, Hutchinson, Moore, Oldham, Potter, Randall and Sherman counties.

"The reduction of the interest to 5 per cent on new loans," Mr. Shelton continued, "is made possible by a recent sale of Federal intermediate credit bank debentures to investors at an unusually low rate of interest. The association gets money to lend farmers from the Federal intermediate credit bank of Houston."

"The lowering of the interest rate on new loans to 5 per cent is the second reduction in two months, the rate having been reduced from 6 to 5 1-2 per cent on March 16.

"According to Governor Myers" said Mr. Shelton, the Federal Intermediate credit bank is passing on immediately to farmer-borrowers from production credit associations the saving made possible by lower cost of getting money. The confidence of investors in the security of the intermediate credit banks has been such that the banks are able to get money to lend at the lowest discount rate in their history. Governor Myers says that the resulting low rate of interest on production credit association loans is enabling farmer-borrowers to save thousands of dollars on the cost of their farming operations this year. If the associations make sound loans and loans that are collectible, an adequate supply of low cost money will continue to be available."

Hansford County property owners will want to take advantage of the huge savings possible by paying their delinquent taxes before July 1st, 1934, at which time extreme penalties and interest will be added to all unpaid taxes. Below is a notice to all tax collectors concerning the penalties and interest that will be added at that time.

### NOTICE

TO THE TAX COLLECTORS:

You will recall that from time to time since 1930, the Legislature has been suspending interest and penalties on delinquent taxes.

Last May the last measure of this kind was enacted, which provided a two per cent penalty on all Ad Valorem Taxes delinquent on February 1st, 1933, (later they included the split tax payments which became delinquent on July 1st, 1933,) if paid by December 30th, 1933, and four per cent penalty if paid by March 31, 1934; and 6 per cent if paid by June 30th, 1934; after this June 30th, 1934, expiration date, the old law prescribing 10 per cent penalties and 6 per cent interest per year, will be in force.

This means that on and after July 1, 1934, this year, the penalty and interest you will be required to charge will not be 6 per cent, but will include 6 per cent interest per annum the date it was first delinquent, plus 10 per cent penalty.

80 per cent will be added to 1930 delinquent taxes.  
24 per cent will be added to 1931 delinquent taxes.  
18 per cent will be added to 1932 delinquent taxes.  
(A delinquent cost will also accrue in addition to the above.)

In as much as the tax paying public may not understand the law I suggest that you give this matter as much publicity as possible, in order to bring to the attention of the tax payer the great saving, if they take advantage of the remaining period, which expires on June 30th, 1934.

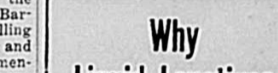

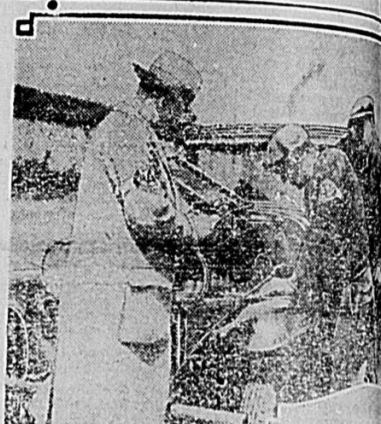

## Production Credit Loan Association To Reduce Interest Rates

Earl L. Shelton, secretary-treasurer of the Amarillo Production Credit Association has just received word from Governor W. I. Myers of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D. C., that the interest rate on new loans from production credit associations has been reduced from 5 1-2 to 5 per cent.

According to Mr. Shelton, the new 5 per cent interest rate becomes effective immediately on all new loans and advances made by the association and will be applicable until further notice.

"The new interest rate of 5 per cent will not affect loans already advanced in full," Mr. Shelton said. "These will continue to bear the rate of interest prevailing at the time the loan was closed. The interest charges on loans from the association are collected when the loans mature. The Amarillo Association is now making loans on acceptable crop and chattel security to farmers in Armstrong, Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hansford, Hartley, Hutchinson, Moore, Oldham, Potter, Randall and Sherman counties.

"The reduction of the interest to 5 per cent on new loans," Mr. Shelton continued, "is made possible by a recent sale of Federal intermediate credit bank debentures to investors at an unusually low rate of interest. The association gets money to lend farmers from the Federal intermediate credit bank of Houston."

"The lowering of the interest rate on new loans to 5 per cent is the second reduction in two months, the rate having been reduced from 6 to 5 1-2 per cent on March 16.

"According to Governor Myers" said Mr. Shelton, the Federal Intermediate credit bank is passing on immediately to farmer-borrowers from production credit associations the saving made possible by lower cost of getting money. The confidence of investors in the security of the intermediate credit banks has been such that the banks are able to get money to lend at the lowest discount rate in their history. Governor Myers says that the resulting low rate of interest on production credit association loans is enabling farmer-borrowers to save thousands of dollars on the cost of their farming operations this year. If the associations make sound loans and loans that are collectible, an adequate supply of low cost money will continue to be available."

Below is a notice to all tax collectors concerning the penalties and interest that will be added at that time.

## NOTICE

TO THE TAX COLLECTORS:

You will recall that from time to time since 1930, the Legislature has been suspending interest and penalties on Delinquent Taxes.

Last May the last measure of this kind was enacted, which provided a two per cent penalty on all Ad Valorem Taxes delinquent on February 1st, 1933, (later they included the split tax payments which became delinquent on July 1st, 1933), if paid by December 30th, 1933, and four per cent penalty if paid by March 31, 1934; and 6 per cent if paid by June 30th, 1934; after this June 30th, 1934, expiration date, the old law prescribing 10 per cent penalties and 6 per cent interest per year, will be in force.

This means that on and after July 1, 1934, this year, the penalty and interest you will be required to charge will not be 6 per cent, but will include 6 per cent interest per annum the date it was first delinquent, plus 10 per cent penalty.

30 per cent will be added to 1930 delinquent taxes.  
24 per cent will be added to 1931 delinquent taxes.  
18 per cent will be added to 1932 delinquent taxes.  
(A delinquent cost will also accrue in addition to the above.)

In as much as the tax paying public may not understand the law I suggest that you give this matter as much publicity as possible, in order to bring to the attention of the tax payer the great saving, if they take advantage of the remaining period, which expires on June 30th, 1934.

### SERMON BRIEF

Note:—Through the courtesy of the Spearman Reporter we have been given sufficient space to publish a few of the high points of one of the very fine sermons that Brother Wiseman presented during the past week. We do not, however, wish to use any more space than is absolutely necessary and for that reason we have summarized the sermon as much as possible and of course it will be necessary for you to study your Bible in connection with the outline below in order to understand the subject under consideration. In selecting this subject we do so hoping that someone may be better able to distinguish between "The Church" and "a church," between the church "that Christ built" and the churches that men established.

**The Church That Christ Built**

1. It was built upon a rock. Mat. 16:18. Hence it was an enduring foundation. That rock was the great fundamental truth expressed by the Apostle Peter when he stated the Jesus was "the Christ, the son of the living God."
2. No other foundation can be laid. Head 1. Cor. 3:11. "for other foundations can no man lay, than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ."
3. Notice that Jesus did not say upon this rock I will build my "churches." It was always spoken of in the singular tense.
4. The Church that Christ built is the oldest one in existence to day. Trace the source of the leading denominations and you will find this to be true. The most of the denominations have been established after the sixteenth century. In Acts, the second chapter is recorded the account of the establishment of the Church that Christ Built.
5. There is not a single record in the Bible of anyone ever "joining" a church. Christ adds people to his church when they obey him in hearing the Gospel, Believing the Gospel, in repenting of their sins, in confessing Christ before men; and in being baptized for the remission of their sins.

When Christ adds people to his Church they should not want to become members of any "man-made" religious organization. To do so is to do it without faith, "and whatsoever is not of faith is sin," Rom. 14:23.
