POLL TAXES DUE BEFORE FEB. FIRST

City, county and state elections of this year will give rise to an unusual interest in politics, but only those persons who pay their poll taxes or secure exemptions may have a part in selection of public officers and determination of public issues.

In order to be a qualified voter one must be a citizen of the United States, 21 years of age, a resident of the state 12 months and of the county in which he offers to vote six months, and must have paid a poll tax prior to February 1st...

The voter must be 21 years of age at the time he goes to the polls, whether for the city election, primary elections or general election. Every person between the ages of 21 and 60 years who reside in Texas on January of the year preceding its levy, is subject to a poll tax...

Persons over sixty years of age, Indians, insane persons, blind, deaf or dumb, and those who have lost a hand or a foot, or who are permanently disabled, are exempt from poll taxes.

A poll tax can be paid at any time after the 30th day of September of the year for which it is levied. It must be paid prior to the first day of February of the following year, or the subject thereof will be deprived of the right to vote.

Your poll tax must be paid in the county in which you reside on the first day of January for the year for which it was levied. For example, in order to vote in the election in July of 1934 the voter must have paid his poll tax in the county in which he resided on January 1st, 1933.

If you do not live in a city of 10,000 inhabitants or more you may either appear in person before the tax collector, and pay your poll tax, or you may appoint in writing, an agent to pay the tax for you. The written appointment must bear the signature of the voter and must contain all the information necessary for making out the receipt.

If you live in a city of 10,000 inhabitants or more, your poll tax cannot be paid by an agent unless you intend to leave your town and remain away during the whole period in which poll taxes can be paid. You cannot pay your poll tax by sending money through the mail, you must appear in person.

No voter can name a candidate for office as your agent, nor can you name the tax collector or any of his deputies.

Those exempt by law from payment of poll taxes must secure an exemption receipt if they reside in a city of 10,000 or more. May Make Affidavit If a citizen after receiving a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, moves to another county or another precinct in the same county, he may vote in an election in the precinct of his new residence by presenting the poll tax receipt or certificate...

If after paying your poll tax, you move to a city of 10,000 inhabitants or more, it is necessary for you to present to the tax collector of your new residence your tax receipts or exemption certificate not less than four days prior to an election, or to certify as to its loss. The tax collector certifies your new place of residence to the presiding officer of the election in your new residence.

Willard and John L. Taylor whose names and addresses are unknown by making publication of this Alias Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in the nearest county where a newspaper is published, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Hansford County, to be held at the Court House thereof, in Spearman, Texas, on the 25th day of March, A. D. 1934, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 25th day of September, A. D. 1933, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court as No. 193, wherein

the Plaintiff, and Nelson W. Willard and John L. Taylor and heirs and legal representatives of said Nelson W. Willard and John L. Taylor whose names and addresses are unknown, are Defendants, and said petition alleges:

That the City of Spearman in Hansford County, Texas, is duly incorporated under the Commission form of government pertaining to cities of less than 5,000 population and more than 1,000, and was so at all times hereafter mentioned, with all powers incident thereto, and March 10, 1931, said City determined to pave, grade, and improve certain streets within its corporate limits including Davis Street, especially that portion abutting Lot One, Block Eighteen, in said City, according to plans and specifications therefore filed and adopted, and on April 7, 1931, entered into a contract with Plaintiff to make said improvement according to same at unit prices. In said contract it was agreed that City would set a date for hearing and give proper notice thereof to all parties of interest, owners or interested in the property, especially such lot, and that at said hearing it would be determined whether or not the proposed assessable costs would be not greater than the enhanced value, and if not greater, to assess the owner and persons interested therein personally for the same and place said costs as first lien upon the property; that the said costs would be payable in five equal annual payments providing for eight per cent annual interest, for accelerated maturity, and reasonable attorney's fees if incurred, all of which should be a lien and debt; the first installment due one year from acceptance, and the whole evidence by a certificate as provided by statute and that the certificate should be prima facie evidence of the legality of all proceedings. That such notice was given and the hearing had on the 25th of April, 1931, at which it was determined that the assessable costs and lien against the owner of the lot mentioned would be the sum of \$190.62, and the assessment duly levied; that thereafter the plaintiff completed its contract according to plan and specifications, which was accepted by the City of said City and a certificate issued on August 19, 1931, in said sum of \$190.62, with all conditions as provided for. That the first and second installments are past due, as well as interest, and wholly unpaid, and plaintiff has elected to mature the whole, has placed same with attorney for collection, and has caused suit to be instituted, and \$75.00 as reasonable fee for its prosecution. Plaintiff says that either Nelson W. Willard or John L. Taylor or their heirs or legal representatives was the owner of the lot at time of said determination to pay, that it is not able to say which, but the said Willard claims Taylor is the owner under him.

Plaintiff prays for judgment for its debts, damages and costs, the same being a judgment against the owner of said lot at said time; that such be decreed a lien on the lot, and lien foreclosed and sold to satisfy plaintiff's judgment.

Herein Fail Not, and have you before said Court at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

1934 CHEVROLET HAS "KNEE-ACTION" WHEELS
By independent front wheel suspension is meant the attachment of the front wheels directly to the frame without the use of a front axle. In the conventional type of springing it was necessary to have very stiff front springs because these springs had to hold the axle and wheels in place. Independent springing relieves the front springs of the task and permits the use of a front spring which has a soft, velvety action, just as soft in fact as the rear springs. The car, by this system of suspension has front and rear springs of equal tension and there is no tendency for the car to bounce and jolt along the road. The rear of the car, in other words, is not harshly catapulted into the air whenever the front wheels encounter an irregularity of the road, be it a chuck hole or raised object. The front wheels, when they encounter such an irregularity, move up and down in a vertical position—they follow the irregularities of the road, so to speak.

In design the front spring unit is neat, compact and efficient. The entire coil spring mechanism and shock absorbers are encased in a sturdy weatherweight steel housing and the mechanism itself works in a bath of oil. The front wheel is supported by two strong arms extending from the spring units. The units themselves are rigidly bolted to the frame by means of a king pin support.

The improved riding qualities of the 1934 Chevrolet due to the "knee-action" wheels, combined with other features, is present at all speeds and under all road conditions, but the greatest improvement is noticeable at high speeds and on rough roads.

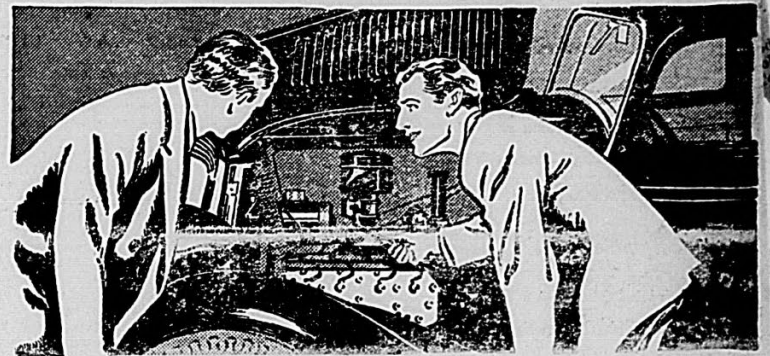

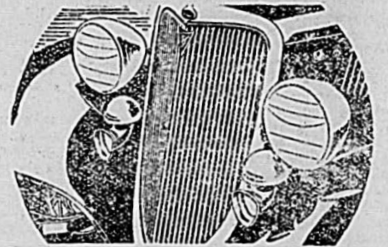
