

# COMMISSIONERS CALL FOR BEER ELECTION AUGUST STATE CAMPAIGN WAGED FOR BOND AMENDMENT

## County Officials and Other Prominent Men of State Hold Bond Mass Meeting

AUSTIN MASS MEETING HELD

Austin, Texas, Aug. 11, 1933.—Mayors, County Judges and representative citizens from the four corners of Texas gathered here last Friday in response to the governor's proclamation to discuss the relief situation. After four or five principal talks the meeting was turned into a round table discussion in which one county judge after another stated that his county would be unable to feed the unemployed if Federal funds are cut off.

A dark picture of the future was painted by Jim Ferguson, speaking for the governor, who predicted that mobs of hungry men and women will take possession of grocery stores, that rioting will run rampant and bloodshed might follow failure of the people to authorize the legislature to issue bonds for the relief of the hungry. It was pointed out that more than 60,000 are destitute in San Antonio, Dallas, Ft. Worth and Houston, but that in the rural districts the proportion is just as big. In the drought areas of the Panhandle it was shown that much higher percentage of destitution exists, some counties having more than half the total population on the relief rolls now.

Col. Lawrence Westbrook, director of the Texas Rehabilitation and Relief Commission, pointed out that less than half the unemployed are on the relief rolls, and that in a national industrial recovery those on the relief rolls would naturally be first reabsorbed into work. He predicted that the cotton picking would offer some relief in September, but that in October the upward trend would start again, and the peak of relief demands would not be reached before December or January.

General Jacob F. Wolters told the audience that in the event of food riots he would favor confiscation of food for distribution to the hungry and let the owners collect from the state.

More than a score of county judges told the meeting that but for the federal aid already extended their unemployed would have long ago been in desperate straits. They implored those present to use all their influence to secure adoption of the proposed amendment.

In discussion it was brought out that the federal government has sent thirteen million to Texas for relief work already and that if the state votes the proposed bond issue and that should not be enough the Federal government will furnish all other funds needed. It was stressed that if the issue is defeated it will be equivalent to telling Washington that we do not need federal aid. This might result in the state losing several proposed public works projects.

Saul Proves His Leadership

1 Sam. 11. The Ammonites, a fierce desert tribe east of Palestine, attacked Jabesh-gilead, an Israelite town west of the Jordan sixty or seventy miles away from Saul's home at Gibeath. The besieging army threatened to put out the right eyes of all in the town, and gave them only a week's respite in which to obtain aid. It looked like a hopeless case, but with magnificent energy Saul sent out a swift courier threatening with death all that did not join him instantly in the rescue. No fewer than 300,000 warriors hastened from Judah and 300,000 from the nearby tribes. This great host fell on the Ammonites and put them utterly to rout. Thereupon Samuel called the people together once more at Gilgal, where they made joyful sacrificial offerings to Jehovah.

Saul's First Disobedience

1 Sam. 13:1-15. Saul's next campaign was against the Philistines. At the very outset of the campaign Saul was guilty of an irreligious act which brought down upon him the awful condemnation of Samuel. The rendezvous of the Israelites was at the ancient camping field, Gilgal, near Jericho, and there Samuel bade him wait for seven days for him to offer sacrifice before the fighting. But terror seized upon the people, for the Philistines were coming up in vast numbers not far away, and Saul's forces began to desert, and to hide themselves in caves and thickets and pits. The seven days passed, and still Samuel did not come. Saul could not endure to watch his army diminishing and at length he dared to assume priestly functions, and impiously offered the sacrifices himself. Hardly had he finished, however, before Samuel appeared. Saul made his excuses readily, but Samuel could not accept them. "The Lord," he said, "sought a man after his own heart, but you have shown by this disobedience to God that you are not such a man. Now your Kingdom shall not continue." So Samuel sadly left Saul to go his own headstrong way.

Saul's Second Disobedience

1 Sam. 15:1-16. The Amalekites were a wandering desert tribe originally roaming through the wilderness of Canaan, though by Saul's time they had spread also east of the Jordan. Through all the centuries they had harassed the Israelites. For all their wicked deeds...

...LORD had decreed that the king sought to shift the responsibility from his own shoulders to that of the people: "They have brought them," v. 15. "The people spared the best," and the purpose he said was a good one—"to sacrifice unto the Lord thy God," and for himself he claimed—"the rest we have utterly destroyed." Thus also Adam shifted his responsibility upon Eve and Aaron claimed to make the golden calf in response to popular demand, but neither nor Saul nor any one else could evade individual responsibility.

Saul's Excuses For His Sin

"The people spared the best of the sheep and of the oxen," Saul is not manly enough to take the blame himself, but throws it in the people, whose commander he was. We are all skilled in throwing off our sins upon others, but they will not stay there. "To sacrifice unto Jehovah thy God," Saul has the effrontery to allege a religious motive for disobeying God. So a man will save his conscience for oppression and robbery and trickery by giving...

A Lesson for All Christians

The lesson for Christian people from the story of Saul is that to obey God is better than sacrifice, or anything else. A religious ceremony which expresses a yearning for Godly character is wholesome for the soul. But when we offer to God these ceremonies in lieu of righteous conduct, then our...

...religious acts harm our souls. Jesus condemned people who scrupulously tithed their mint, anise and cummin, but neglected the weightier matters of the law; justice, mercy and faith. One may be very religious and yet unrighteous. (Cp. Amos 5:21-27.)

Saul and Samuel—a Contrast

"From this time the spirit of the Lord departs from Saul, and an evil spirit from the Lord troubles him, making the residue of his life a tangled web of intrigue, discord, and lost faith seeking refuge in necromancy and witchcraft.

Saul's death was indescribably touching. A presentiment of disaster had meanwhile crept over Saul's heart, and in his excitement he sought the aid of unholy arts for counsel. The strange episode of his visit to Endor fitly led the way to the catastrophe. It the battle that followed, his heroic son Jonathan and two other sons...

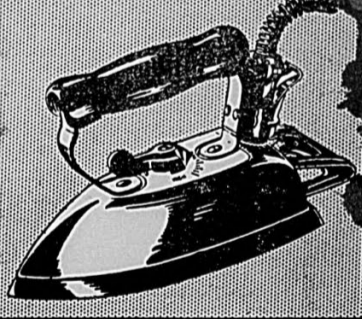
