

# City To Call Bond Election

At the regular city council meeting May 10 in city hall, minutes were reviewed of the April 26, regular council meeting, the April 26 special city council meeting and May 7 special city council meeting.

Consideration of Park and Recreation Board's Recommendations was held. A new board member was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Brad Beedy. The new member will be announced upon acceptance. The summer recreation program was discussed and a complete story of this program will be found in this newspaper.

The council discussed the railroad commission hearing. At the last hearing, High Plains Gas Company took up all the allotted time with their testimony, and were cross examined by attorneys for the City of Spearman. Mayor Ralph Blodgett, city attorney J. E. Blackburn and city manager Mark Neff left Spearman at noon Tuesday for Austin where the hearings will resume Wednesday and Thursday. Spearman will present their side of the controversy at this time.

The gas company's position is that their cost of gas has gone up and that they are not receiving an adequate rate of return on their system investment. They are asking for a rate increase to 95¢ mcf for gas while the city is now paying an average of 63¢ mcf per month with the new pass through contract that was put into effect about four months ago.

Other cities involved in the hearings are Perryton, Booker, Higgins, Mobeetie, and Canadian, and all unincorporated communities being served by the company.

A discussion of the municipal court docket and monthly report was held. The court docket has been greatly reduced since the notice that all traffic violations are to be heard each Tuesday from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and each Thursday from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the city hall has run in the newspaper. Anyone with tickets not yet heard must appear before the city judge before May 21 or necessary action will be taken to compel attendance.

A special meeting has been called for Monday, May 17 at 1 p.m. for the purpose of calling a bond election to provide local matching funds for the EDA grant to rework the gas and water systems to the city. The bond election will be for \$265,000 which will pay the \$217,000 matching funds and for \$48,000.00 for additional repairs to the water system. The \$48,000 will be used for cathodic protection, repairs and painting of both overhead water storage tanks in the city. This formula is expected to last for 15 years as compared to the 5 years that is the ordinary life of repairs. The bond election is expected to be called for June 15.

The EDA grant of \$322,000 which is 60% of the cost and the money received from the bond issue if the citizens pass it, will total \$585,000. Approximately \$400,000 will be spent on the gas system. The city estimates that they lost \$35,000 of gas consumption this past year due to leaks in the present system. This past month which was a light month in gas usage, the estimate of loss was \$1,000. Before some of the gas lines were repaired last year the city estimated that they were losing some \$90,000 in gas yearly as well as the hazard that exists. The other \$137,000 part of the grant will be spent on the water system, drilling an additional water well in the south part of town, probably in the Rocket Slide Park, building a transmission line to tie into the south gate of the water system, and installing a 1.5 million gallon ground level storage tanks. This will give the city 1.5 million gallons ground level storage plus 1 million gallon overhead storage for water.

At the present time the city does not have enough water according to state law to fight a major fire if one should occur.

Monthly police, fire and ambulance reports were heard. Bills payable were presented to the council and the City Manager gave his report on systems, taxes and cash position.

At 2 p.m. a dedication ceremony will be held for the Stationmaster's House Museum.

The Fiddler's Contest will be at 3:30 at the Community Building.

The Miss Hansford County Beauty Pageant will be held at 7 p.m. at the Spearman High School Auditorium. Miss America 1975, Miss Shirley Cochran, will be the emcee and moderator. The pageant is sponsored by the Spearman Lions Club. The Spearman High School Swing Band and Lion Rick Kirk will provide the music. A rodeo dance will climax activities. The dance will be at the Community Building from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. and will feature "All Most Country" from Guymon. Cost for the dance is \$4.00 stag and \$7.00 for couples.

There will be a wild cow riding, head and heeling, calf roping, and barrel racing. Entry fees in all of these categories is \$30 plus \$2 office call except head and heeling which is \$30 plus \$5 stock charge.

Stock contractor for the rodeo is Triple M Rodeo, James Martin of Spearman, owner. Announcer will be Scott Stutzman of Ulysses, Kansas. Clown will be Mike McFarland and Curges Low of Canyon.

Admission is \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children. 25% of the profit from the rodeo will go to Girls town.

## Commissioners and city officials meet with Army Corps of Engineers

The Commissioners court, city officials including Mayor Ralph Blodgett, and several local interested people were on hand Friday afternoon to discuss the Palo Duro River project, located some 10 miles North of Spearman, Texas.

Three men from the Army Corps were on hand, and they gave a complete report, including details, on the possibility of getting the dam project started. The men stated that they would survey the entire area, including visits with farmers, and local people, and check all of the details on the location, and feasibility of the Palo Duro project.

Many farmers and ranchers were on hand at the meeting Friday. A great deal of enthusiasm was generated at the meeting, and the court along with the city, seems to be more enthusiastic than ever to get the dam started. Like all projects, the army engineers stated that "public reaction" and enthusiasm for the dam, is the thing that really counts! The engineers know that we have two outstanding dam sites, and plenty of adequate water

for the dam, it is just a matter of the people deciding whether they "really" want a dam or not.

We at the newspaper appreciated Judge Lee and Court, and city officials who have looked into this worthy project. No one knows how badly we need adequate water; Lake Meredith is now supplying several cities with adequate water, and business men will not develop a community unless adequate water is available. Every person in the county is excited about the prospects of getting a Palo Duro dam, and now is the time to let our commissioners and city officials know that we are behing them 100%.

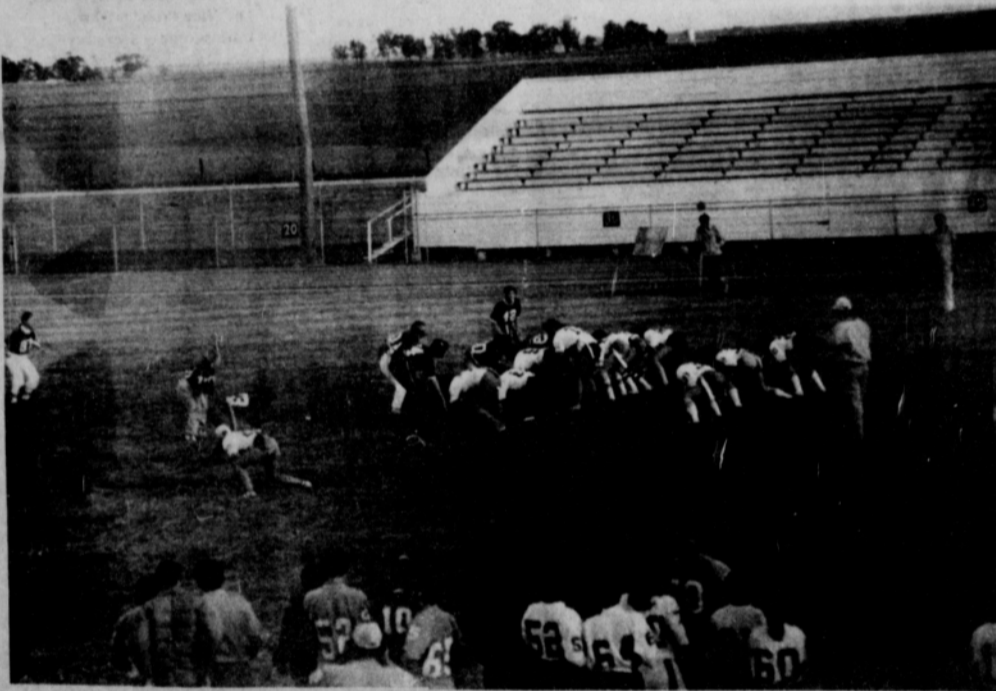

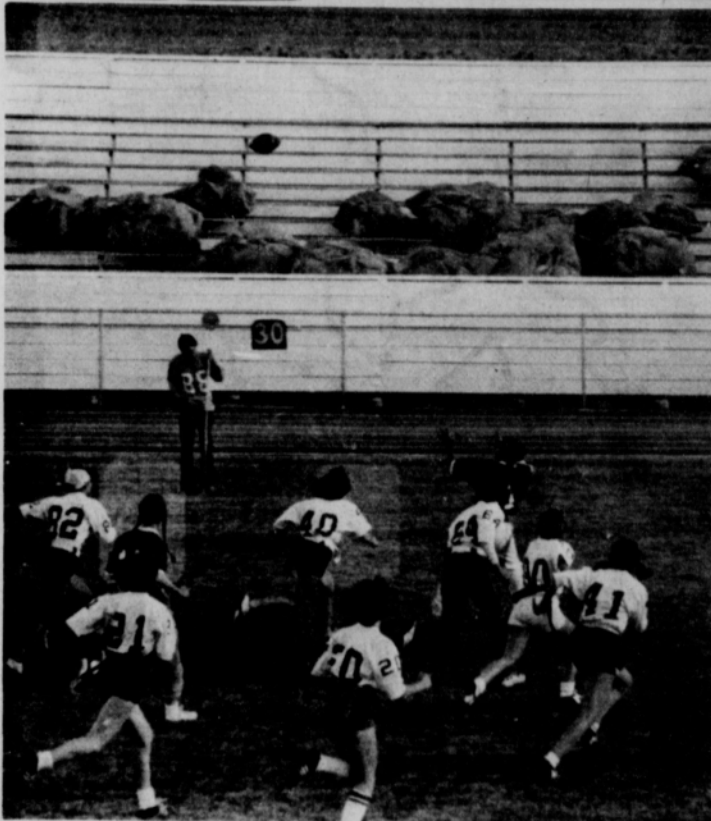

**Corn Borers Reduce Yield**

Southwestern corn borers cause more damage than previously expected. These were results of research in 1975 conducted by N. E. Daniels, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Entomologist at Bushland. Previously, it was surmised that Southwestern corn borer damage was limited to lodged plants which could not be harvested with mechanical pickers.

In 1975, unlogged corn 100 percent infested with Southwestern corn borer yielded 90 bushels per acre in the same field where uninfested plants made 100 bushels per acre. When infested plants lodged and were hand harvested, yields were reduced 20 bushels per acre. Daniels pointed out that these new results do need for an effective insecticide program when Southwestern corn borers threaten corn. In conjunction with his research on Southwestern corn borer damage, the scientist also conducted an insecticide control program at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center.

Daniels said that Southwestern corn borer has been a long time resident of the United States and Mexico. It was first observed in Mexico in 1911 and reported in the United States 2 years later. As far back as 1929, five corn fields in Lamb and Bailey counties were 95 to 100 percent infested. This observation indicates that Southwestern corn borer will be a threat wherever and whenever corn is grown in Texas.

Previous research showed that corn borer control caused modest yield increases. The problem has been knowing when to apply insecticides to obtain maximum benefit. In 1972, one spray application of carboufuran applied July 25 was as effective as 4 applications applied at weekly intervals in late July and early August. In 1973, it took two applications on July 16 and July 30 to do the best job of control.

In 1975, the scientist applied both foliar and soil treatments. Foliar sprays were applied on July 30, August 5 and August 13 when temperatures were 90 to 95 degrees and wind velocities were less than 15 miles per hour. Another experiment was conducted to compare foliar application of flowable and granular carboufuran. Soil treatments compared effectiveness of granular insecticides applied in the furrow at planting or side-

ressed when corn was 16 to 18 inches tall.

The best corn borer control with foliar sprays came on August 13. There was a combination of late second and early third generation of the borers in the field at the time. August 5 applications were less effective but in turn more effective than those made July 30. There were not enough borers present on July 30 to affect the even-

tual buildup which occurred later.

The most effective insecticides were Zolone, LS 71-187, and Lomban. Carboufuran applied to foliage either as a spray or granules was also effective in controlling corn borers. In this study, untreated corn yielded 84 bushels per acre and the highest yield was 102 bushels per acre from 3 pounds per acre of zolone wettable powder. Lodging

was decreased from 20 percent on untreated plots to 7 percent where 3 pounds per acre of Zolone were applied.

Furrow or sidedress treatments of granular insecticides did not increase grain yield, but decreased lodging. There was an 80 mph wind on November 29, but treated plants did not lodge. About 20 percent of the plants lodged in untreated plots. Apparently, corn borers did more lodging damage in plants that were not treated making them more susceptible to lodging. Although yields were not increased with hand harvesting methods used, treatments were valuable because some lodged plants would not have been picked up by mechanical harvesters.

(Washington, D.C.)-- Congressman Jack Hightower today said he was deeply pleased with favorable congressional action for the second time this week on bills that are important to farmers and ranchers in the 13th Congressional District. The House of Representatives this afternoon passed the Packers and Stockyards Act, only three days after it had passed the Conference Report on the Beef Research and Information Act. Hightower was co-sponsor of both bills and was author of one of the principal amendments to the Packers and Stockyards Act. The Initial Packers and Stockyards bill approved

March 31 by the House Agriculture Committee contained an amendment sponsored by the Congressman that would require prompt payment by purchasers of livestock for slaughter. During consideration of the bill today on the House floor Hightower further amended the prompt-payment provisions to clarify the point that the purchaser may use the U.S. mail to send a check to the seller if the seller had not been present at the point of transfer of possession to demand payment within the specified time. The House-approved bill provides for payment by the close of business on the

second day. In a speech delivered on the House floor the Congressman said the bill was intended to be neither producer nor pro-packer, but was intended to produce a safe and assured market for producer, packer and consumer. Hightower said the benefits to the producer are obvious and that the bill would be beneficial for packers by providing uniformity to the multiplicity of state bonding laws that now confront them. He said the almost unanimous support shown by the House of Representatives for the bill should assure passage by the Senate.

## Oil Industry Heavy Borrower

Much has been made of the continued weakness in demand for business loans. At less than \$180 billion in February, bank loans to business were off considerably from a year before. They were, in fact, holding at roughly the same level as last summer, when the recovery was still just getting underway. And changes at weekly reporting banks indicate business loans were probably off another \$2 billion in March. But in the Southwest, business loans have been on the increase for several months.

In March, commercial and industrial loans at weekly reporting banks in the Eleventh Federal Reserve District were up nearly 9 percent over a year before. Although off slightly from the four-year high reached in February, at nearly \$5.4 billion, business loans at these banks totaled close to 40 percent more than in early 1973.

These banks, mostly in Texas, account for about three-fourths of the banking business done in the state. The strongest demand for loans has been from the petroleum industry. Oil and gas producers have been especially heavy bank borrowers--and not just since business conditions began to improve.

With the growing emphasis on expanding domestic sources of energy, oil and gas producers in the Southwest began increasing their demands for credit about two years ago.

After trending generally upward from early 1974 on, petroleum loans at reporting banks expanded sharply in December and January, hitting a pace that by March had carried the total well over the billion mark. At \$1.062 billion, petroleum loans in March totaled nearly half again more than a year before.

Although nothing else was in the league with petroleum loans, several other types of businesses had loan demands that helped set the state decidedly apart from the country as a whole. Outside petroleum, the strongest showings were in trade and the manufacturing of nondurable goods.

When allowances are made for the importance of petroleum in Texas, differences between demand for business loans in the state and the rest of the country begin to shrink. Most of the strength in demand has been petroleum related.

Not only has the search for oil and gas created a continuing demand for bank credit, but so has the renewed interest in reworking existing wells to improve their flows. As this demand continued largely unabated throughout the recession, it can be expected to continue during the expansion.
