The Amarillo News Globe, under the heading "Amarillo man directs all loans to farmers from 200 million fund" has the following to say:

"An Amarillo man to receive an important Federal appointment in the Roosevelt administration is C. W. (Kit) Carson, former Amarillo banker, who now is on the job at Washington in charge of all Federal loans being made in the nation.

Mr. Carson has written friends that he is enjoying his new work but that there is a tremendous volume of business in administering the loans to farmers through the various federal agencies. Mr. Carson and family left Amarillo several weeks ago.

Upon reaching Washington, Mr. Carson was made assistant farm loan commissioner and has charge of the direct loans through the department of agriculture from the \$200,000,000 fund to be loaned to farmers. District agents are located in each of the 12 Federal Reserve districts, but Mr. Carson is directly in charge of the entire loan making machinery.

In his new duties, he is the "right hand man" of Henry Morgenthau, Jr., assistant secretary of agriculture and one of President Roosevelt's advisers. Mr. Carson is widely known throughout the Panhandle, having lived at Spearman where he was in the banking business before moving to Amarillo several years ago."

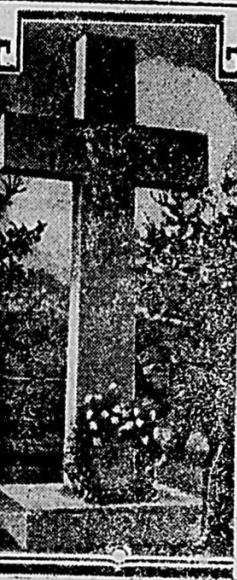

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## BOY SCOUTS HOLD SUCCESSFUL 3 DAY CAMPOREE

Eighteen Spearman scouts together with their scoutmaster Charles Chambers and Prof. Finley met with the twenty five other troops of the Adobe Walls council last week for a three days camporee, held at Near to Nature Park.

This year the camp was the most successful in the history of Panhandle scout work. Three hundred scouts and forty three adult supervisors composed the personnel of the camp.

For two days the boys had regular contests in swimming, archery knot tying, and other scout activities. At the end of the second day all competitive drills and contests had been judged, and Follett scouts were awarded the first honors of the camp, and a beautiful trophy, which they will get to keep until some other troop wins it from them. If the same troop wins the prize three times in succession it becomes theirs permanently. 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## MRS. M. K. KROMER TELLS OF FLOOD CONDITION ON PALO DURO CREEK

By Mrs. M. K. Kromer I have been asked to write a story about the miniature flood in our neighborhood, but as I lay no claim for literary talents your sage and writer of Nature Park Items will just have to do her best.

The first rain causing little loss to farmers and ranchers living along the Palo Duro came on Wednesday I believe it was, but was not in such quantity to cause much of a rise in our creek at the ranch, here, however farther down the creek it was some higher.

Then on Thursday morning early a regular water spout emptied into the creeks, and about 9 o'clock I looked out the window and saw a solid sheet of water moving down the valley out of Hart's pasture. Never having seen a head rise before, it was some time before I realized just what was happening. My first thoughts was about a lister of Mr. May's that we had been using and had left standing in the field but knew there was no use "beating around the bush" at this instance for it would have to stand the consequence, Mr. Kromer was in the West pasture at the time and he said the water seemed to have the entire Hart ranch flooded.

In a few minutes the whole bottom of our ranch was undated and the lister turned over only to be saved from going in the creek by the wire fence.

We phoned the news of high water to the Cators, Joneses, Lackeys, and Mr. Kromer rode to the park to warn Mr. and Mrs. Noble and Mr. and Mrs. Alan Smith of the danger of the rising waters. By that time the water was so close behind him that they had not time to protect their household things and much damage was done to them, and one of Gid's boots washed out the door and I guess by now the fish have started housekeeping in it.

Aside from the damage to their household goods, several of the park cabins were almost turned over by the water only to be saved from washing away by trees. Mrs. Noble's trunk containing many valuable clothes, linens and valuable keep sakes was turned over and flooded. She had been ironing and freshly ironed clothes hanging on a chair back were soiled and damaged by the high water. This recent rise gives us a mere idea of what people in the flood areas along the Mississippi Valley go through with from time to time.

OFFICE OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

H. J. R. NO. 43

IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That subsection (a) of Section 20, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:—

"(a). The manufacture, sale, barter or exchange in the State of Texas of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated wines, capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicating beverage, except vinous malt liquor, shall be prohibited. The Legislature shall enact laws to enforce this Section, and may from time to time prescribe regulations and limitations relative to the manufacture, sale, barter, exchange or possession for sale of vinous or malt liquor of not more than three and two tenths per cent (3.2 per cent) alcoholic content by weight; provided the Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice precinct, town or city may by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale for beverage purpose of vinous or malt liquors containing not more than three and two tenths per cent (3.2 per cent) alcohol by weight shall be prohibited within the prescribed limits; and provided further that in all counties in the State of Texas and in all political subdivisions thereof, wherein the sale of intoxicating liquor had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange such liquor or in any such political subdivision thereof, any vinous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated wines, capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicating beverage, unless a majority of the qualified voters in said county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine it to be lawful to manufacture, sell, barter and exchange in said county or political subdivision thereof vinous or malt liquors containing not more than three and two tenths per cent (3.2 per cent) alcoholic content by weight."

Section 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1933, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of Texas, authorizing the sale of vinous or malt liquors of not more than three and two tenths per cent (3.2 per cent) alcoholic content by weight." Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of Texas, authorizing the sale of vinous or malt liquors of not more than three and two tenths per cent (3.2 per cent) alcoholic content by weight."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and Amendments thereto.

NOTICE OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

S. J. R. No. 30

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 51a, which shall read as follows: Section 51a. The Legislature shall have power to authorize by law the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed the sum of Twenty Million (\$20,000,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four and one-half (4 and 1/2 per cent) per annum; and payable serially or otherwise not more than ten (10) years from their date, and said bonds shall be sold for not less than par and accrued interest and no form of commission shall be allowed in any transaction involving said bonds. The proceeds of the sale of such bonds to be used in furnishing relief and work relief to needy and distressed people and relieving the hardships resulting from unemployment, but to be fairly distributed over the State and upon such terms and conditions as may be provided by law and the Legislature shall make such appropriations as are necessary to pay the interest and principal of such bonds as the same become due. The power hereby granted to the Legislature to issue bonds hereunder is expressly limited to the amount stated and to two years from and after the adoption of this grant of power by the people. Provided that the Legislature shall provide for the payment of the interest and redemption of any bond issue under the terms hereof from some source other than a tax on real property and the indebtedness as evidenced by such bonds shall never become a charge against or lien upon any property, real or personal, within this State.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas on the Twenty sixth day of August, A. D., 1933, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that the Legislature may authorize the issuance of bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed Twenty Million (\$20,000,000.00) Dollars for relieving the hardships of unemployment and for the necessary appropriations to pay said bonds;" those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that the Legislature may authorize the issuance of bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed Twenty Million (\$20,000,000.00) Dollars, for relieving the hardships of unemployment and for the necessary appropriations to pay said bonds."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

"Article VIII, Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes; provided that this exemption shall not be applicable to that portion of the State ad valorem taxes levied for State purposes remitted within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of taxes, until the expiration of such period of remission as is provided in the laws of the State before the expiration of the clean air act, or until the regular session. NOTICE OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

S. J. R. No. 3

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto a section to be Section 3, which shall provide:

"Section 3. (1) Holding the belief that the highest degree of local self government which is consistent with the efficient conduct of those affairs by necessity lodged in the Nation and the State will prove most responsive to the will of the people, and result to reward their diligence and intelligence by greater economy and efficiency in their local governmental affairs, it hereby is ordained:

"(2) Any county having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more according to the then last Federal Census may adopt a county home rule charter, to embrace those powers appropriated heretofore, within the specific limitations hereinafter provided. It is further provided that the Legislature, by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the total membership of both the Senate and the House of Representatives, may authorize any county, having a population of less than that above specified, to proceed hereunder for the adoption of a Charter, however, as a condition for such authorization, it is required that notice of the intent to seek legislative authority hereunder must be published in one or more newspapers, to give general circulation in the county affected, not less than once per week for four (4) consecutive weeks, and the first of such publications shall appear not less than thirty (30) days next prior to the time an Act making proposal hereunder may be introduced in the Legislature. No County Home Rule Charter may be adopted by any county save upon a favorable vote of the resident qualified electors of the affected county. In elections submitting to the voters a proposal to adopt a Charter (unless otherwise provided by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of each House of the Legislature) the votes cast by the qualified electors residing within the limits of all the incorporated cities and towns of the county shall be separately kept but collectively counted and the votes of the qualified electors of the county who do not reside within the limits of any incorporated city or town likewise shall be separately kept and separately counted, and unless there be a favorable majority of the votes cast within and a favorable majority of the votes cast without such collective cities and towns, the Charter shall not be adopted. It is expressly forbidden that any such Charter may in any way affect the operation of the general laws of the state relating to the judicial, tax, fiscal, educational, police, highway and health systems, or any other department of the State's superior government. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the adoption of a Charter provision inimical to or inconsistent with the sovereignty of established public policies of this state and no provision having such vice shall have validity against the State. No Charter provision may operate to impair the exemption of homestead as established by this Constitution and the statutes relating thereto.

"(3) a. A Charter hereunder may provide: the continuance of a County Commissioners' Court, as now constituted, to serve as the governing body of a county to operate hereunder; or, may provide for a governing body otherwise constituted, which shall be elective, and service therein shall be upon such qualifications, for such terms, under such plan of representation, and upon such conditions of tenure and compensation as may be fixed by any such charter. The terms for service in such governing body may exceed two (2) years, but shall not exceed six (6) years. In any event, in addition to the powers and duties provided by any such Charter, such governing body shall exercise all powers, and discharge all duties which, in the absence of the provisions hereof, would devolve by law on County Commissioners' Court. Further, any such charter may provide for the organization, reorganization, establishment and administration of the government of the county, including the control and regulation of the performance and compensation for all duties required in the conduct of the county affairs, subject to the limitations herein provided.

b. A charter hereunder may provide that Judges of County Courts (including that County Court designated in this Constitution), and Justices of the Peace be compensated upon a salary basis in lieu of fees. The jurisdiction of the County Court designated in this Constitution, and the duties of the Judges thereof, may be confined to that general jurisdiction of a probate court which elsewhere is defined in this Constitution. The office of Justice of the Peace may be

ed, no such charter shall provide for altering the jurisdiction or procedure of any court. The duties of District Attorney and county attorney may be confined to representing the state in civil cases to which the state is a party and to enforcement of the State's penal code and the compensation of said attorney may be fixed on a salary basis in lieu of fees.

"c. Save as hereinabove and hereinafter otherwise provided, such charters, within the limits expressed therein, may invest the governing body to be established for any county electing to operate hereunder with the power to create, consolidate or abolish any office or department, whether created by other provisions of the constitution or by statute, define the duties thereof, fix the compensation for service therein, make the same elective or appointive and prescribe the time, qualifications and conditions for tenure in any such office; save that no such charter other than as hereinbefore authorized, shall provide to regulate the status, service, duties or compensation of members of the Legislature, Judges of the courts, District Attorneys, County Attorneys, or any office whatever by the law of the State required to be filled by an election embracing more than one county. Excepting herefrom nominations, elections or appointments to offices, the terms whereof may not have expired prior to the adoption of this Amendment to the Constitution, at such time as a charter provision adopted hereunder may be in effect (save as to those offices which must continue to be elective, as hereinbefore specified), all terms of the county officers and all contracts for the giving of service by deputies and such officers may be subject to termination by the administrative body of the county, under an adopted charter so providing, and there shall be no liability by reason thereof.

"d. Any county electing to operate hereunder shall have the power, by charter provision, to levy, assess and collect taxes, and to fix the maximum rate for ad valorem taxes to be levied for specific purposes, in accordance with the Constitution and laws of this State, provided, however, that the limit of the aggregate taxes which may be levied, assessed and collected hereunder shall not exceed the limit or total fixed, or hereafter to be fixed by this Constitution to county, and the annual assessment upon property, both real and personal and mixed, shall be a first superior and prior lien thereon.

"e. In addition to the powers herein provided, and in addition to powers included in County Home Rule Charters, any county may, by a majority vote of the qualified electors of said county, amend its charter to include other powers, functions, duties and rights which now are hereafter may be provided by this Constitution and the statutes of the State for counties.

"(4) Any county operating hereunder shall have the power to borrow money for all purposes lawful under its charter, to include the refunding of a lawful debt, in a manner conforming to the general laws of the State, and may issue therefor its obligations. Such obligations, other than those to refund a lawful debt, shall not be valid unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by those resident qualified voters of the area affected by the taxes required to retire such obligations, who may vote thereon. In case of county obligations, maturing after a period of five (5) years, the same shall be issued to mature serially, fixing the first maturity of principal at a time not to exceed two (2) years next after the date of the issuance of such obligations. Such obligations may pledge the full faith and credit of the county; but in no event shall the aggregate obligations so issued, in principal amount outstanding at any one time, exceed the then existing Constitutional limits for such obligations, and such indebtedness and its supporting tax shall constitute a first and superior lien upon the property taxable in such county. No obligations issued hereunder shall be valid unless prior to the time of the issuance thereof there be levied a tax sufficient to retire the same as it matures, which tax shall not exceed the then existing Constitutional limits.

"(5) Such charter may authorize the governing body of a county operating hereunder to prescribe the schedule of fees to be charged by the officers of the county for specified service, to be in lieu of the schedule for such fees prescribed by the general laws of the State; and, to appropriate such fees to such fees to such funds as the charter may prescribe; provided, however, no fee for a specified service shall exceed in amount the fee fixed by general laws for that same service. Such charters as to all judicial officers, other than district judges, may prescribe the qualifications for services, provided the standards therefor be not lower than those fixed by general laws of the state.

"(6) a. Subject to the express limitations upon the exercise of powers by this subdivision to be authorized, such charters may provide (or omit to provide) that the governmental and or proprietary functions of any

ing the boundaries of such cities and towns, such boundaries may be extended only to include those areas contiguous to such cities as are urban in character; and as to such cities or towns and for the benefit thereof the county, in addition to the primary city and county tax herein authorized and any other lawful district tax, may levy and collect taxes upon the property taxable within such city or town as defined or redefined within the limits authorized by Sections 4 and 5 of Article XI of this constitution, (or any amendments thereof) for incorporated cities according to the population, provided that no tax greater than that existing at the time of the merger or for any added purpose shall be imposed upon any such city or town unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by the resident qualified voters of such city or town.

"d. Areas urban in character though not incorporated, under appropriate charter provision may be defined as such by the governing body of the county, provided, however, that no portion of the county shall be defined as an urban area unless it has sufficient population to entitle it to incorporate under the then existing laws of the State; and no such urban area, when created, shall be vested with any taxing or bonding power which it would not possess if it were operating as a separate, incorporated unit under the then existing Constitutional and statutory provisions of this state; and provided further, that the governing body of the county for the gov. of such areas shall have and exercise all powers and authority granted by law to the governing bodies of similar areas when separately incorporated as a city or town, and such areas shall be subject to additional taxation within the same constitutional limits as control taxation for a city or town or like population. Likewise such charter may provide for the governing board of the county subject to existing constitutional and statutory provisions to define, create and administer districts, and have and exercise the power and authority granted by the constitution and laws relative to the same.

"(7). No provision of this constitution inconsistent with the provisions of this section 3, of Article IX, shall be held to control the provisions of a charter adopted hereunder, and conforming herewith. Charters adopted hereunder shall make appropriate provisions for the amendment, revocation, and amendment thereof, subject only to the requirements that there must be a favorable majority of the vote cast upon such a proposal, by the qualified resident electors of the county, and no charter may forbid amend-

ments thereof for a time greater than two (2) years. The provisions hereof shall be self-executing, subject only to the duty of the Legislature to pass all laws (consistent herewith) which may be necessary to carry out the intent and purpose hereof. Further, the Legislature shall prescribe a procedure for submitting to decision, by a majority vote of the electors voting thereon, proposed alternate and elective charter provisions."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1933, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas, adding Section 3, providing authority for the adoption of a Home Rule Charter by the voters in counties having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more, to effect more sufficient and economical government within such counties, and to authorize mergers of separate governmental agencies within such counties as may from time to time be authorized by vote of the people therein."

"Against the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas, adding Section 3, providing authority for the adoption of a Home Rule Charter by the voters in counties having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more, to effect more efficient and economical government within such counties, and to authorize mergers of separate governmental agencies within such counties as may from time to time be authorized by vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall scratch out one of the above listed clauses on such ballot, leaving unscratched that particular clause which expresses his vote on the proposed Amendment to which it relates.

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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## The Outlook For Peace

That Europe has been for the past two years on the verge of another war has been one of the things which has delayed recovery from the world wide depression. Everyone familiar with the subject has pointed out that before there can be any real adjustment nations must cease trying to rival each other in arguments.

Now it begins to look as if real disarmament is at hand. The three men who hold the greatest power in the world have agreed upon it. They are President Roosevelt of the United States of America, Chancellor Hitler of the German Republic and Premier Mussolini of the Kingdom of Italy. Each of these men is today, in a very real sense, the "boss" of his country.

Roosevelt spoke first when he addressed an identical message to every one of the 54 nations of the world urging them all to agree to abolish "Offensive" weapons and limit themselves to defensive armament; further, to agree never to send an armed force across their borders for purposes of aggression.

The whole world applauded. Then Hitler spoke. With President Roosevelt's message before him he declared that Germany asked no more than to be recognized as an equal among the nations, and that she did not dream of war nor ask for anything more than the right to defend herself.

Now it was Mussolini's turn. The leader of Italy called a conference of representatives of the British Empire, France, Germany and his own country, and, to the surprise of the world, they agreed unequivocally, to back up the disarmament program and, what was more to the point, to engage in no war in Europe for at least ten years!

That leaves Japan as the only nation threatening world peace. Japan has withdrawn from the League of Nations. President Roosevelt's message to the nations suggested the economic boycott of any nation which should persist in aggressive war. What may come of that we cannot guess but we feel certain that the cloud of impending war, which threatened the safety of the entire world, has been lifted.

They learn that the government settled off with their salaried employees (white collar clerks), shipbuilders etc., that had been drawing anywhere from \$5 to \$15 per day while they risked their lives at \$1—(out of which they bought many liberty bonds to sell later at a loss)—we say this younger generation is rather observing—and while their dad went to war to make the world safe for democracy, they observe that he failed to do a good job, and further that he is to be the last of a long list of purely beneficiaries - (R F C Loans to every project under the sun) to receive consideration—the chances are that by the time the bonus is considered the government will be so far in debt that repudiation will be the only way to settle part of the indebtedness—you say that sounds harsh and unlikely—but keep posted, and name it what ever you will—the method finally used to settle the debts of the nations of the entire world. —

—In-the-mean-time do not criticize the younger generation too severely for a proper lack of patriotism—they may be smart.

## Memorial To the Living

On May 30th, it is the custom throughout the United States to observe the day as a memorial to the heroes of our nation who gave their lives for its defense. In many states this or some near-by date is observed as a memorial to the soldiers of the Army of the Confederacy who made the supreme sacrifice for the cause in which they believed.

It is meet and proper that the gallant dead of all wars of our nation, should be held forever in fond remembrance. For they were brave men who did not hesitate to risk their lives that their beloved homeland might live.

But it is also meet and proper, it seems to us, to consider whether the youth of today are as ready as these sacred dead were, to fight and die, if necessary, for their principles. We seem to sense a slackening among the youths of our land of the fervent patriotism which was America's chiefest glory in the days when our nation was younger. We hear young men say that they would not risk their lives for their country as their father did. We have noted the polls of students in our great Universities in which an appalling number have declared that they would not take up arms in defense of America.

If such feeling is general among the youth of our land, then it is a far more serious matter than mere unemployment or financial stress. If through some failure on the part of our institutions, our

schools, our churches, our home training, we are raising a generation which feels no such devotion to the principles of liberty and independence than as once made every young American eager to go to war in their defense, then our nation is in a sorry case.

Most emphatically the writer believes that the rather unpatriotic sentiment germinating in the minds of our younger generation is nothing more or less than a reflection of the government on the bonus question. It is hardly likely that the observing youth who sees every organization and creed under the paternal protection of the United States Government receiving lavished funds (R F C) which many do not expect to repay, and the government refusing to advance the payment of a debt to the soldiers, that logic proves would save the nation dollars and cents, and at the same time give a ray of hope to countless thousands of ex-service men, who have no other resource other than their bonus certificate to look for ready cash.

You older men who have sacrificed but have not risked your life in the service of your country—just pause and give thought to just what has happened to the heroes that are living the same as those that are dead. First you must know that England, France, Germany and practically all the nations that have borrowed from the United States have settled with their soldiers IN CASH, for

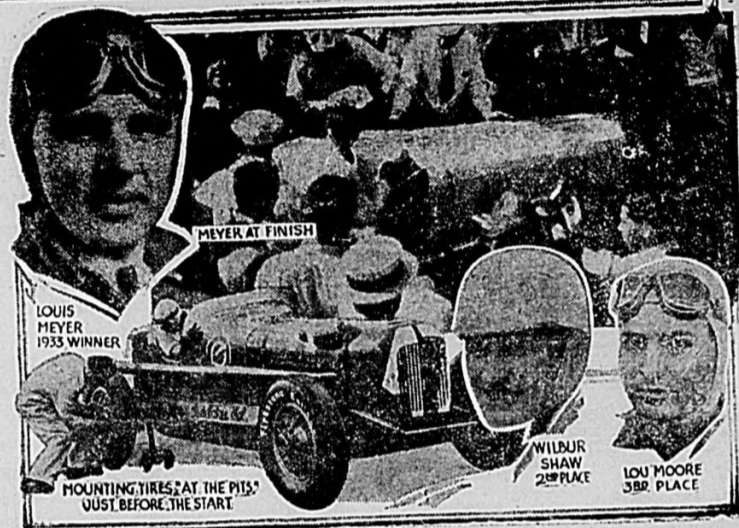

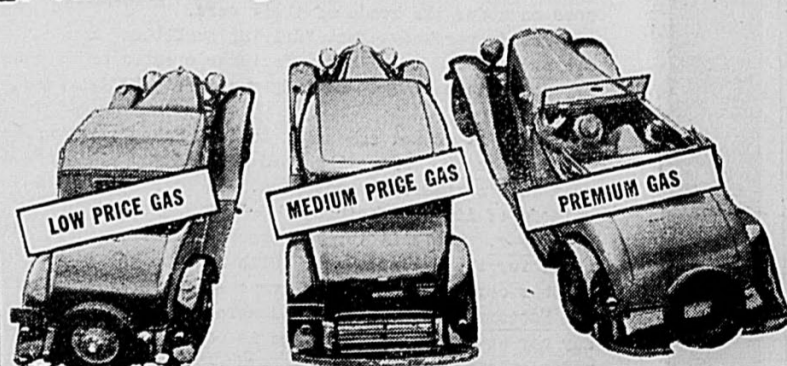

## THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

One of the first things which Mr. Roosevelt wants to do is to start his great program of public work to give men employment and stimulate business. To do this will take, it is estimated, about three billion three hundred million dollars. To get that much money the Government will have to borrow it from the investing public.

It is a lot of money, but there is no doubt about the government's ability to borrow it provided the lenders have some assurance as to where the money is coming from to pay the interest on it.

It will take about 220 million dollars a year to pay interest and service charges on a three billion dollar bond issue. A sales tax calculated to raise that much is now for the first time being discussed seriously. Congressional opposition, however, may result in the new tax taking some other form, such as a "breakfast table" tax on coffee, tea, sugar, spices and chocolate. Whatever the tax is levied upon, it will be spoken of as a "re-employment tax."

Bernard M. Baruch, who was chairman of the War Industrial Board in President Wilson's Administration, is said to be the man picked to head up the new industrial control board. The law has not yet been passed to set up the government's control of business and industry. The draft of the bill had not been presented to Congress as this is written. Yet so smoothly does the machinery here operate that it is only necessary for the President to say that he is going to submit a bill, when it is taken for granted that the bill will become a law in short order, and the picking out of the personnel to administer it begins at once! Nothing of the sort has been here since war times.

Whether Mr. Baruch actually heads the control board, he certainly pulls a strong oar in administration affairs. Mr. Peek, who heads the farm control board, is his protege.

The scheme of industrial control is beginning to appear more clearly. Each trade industry will be required to organize itself into a trade or industry association, and agree within itself on trade practices, prices, hours of labor and wages. The number of automobiles or typewriters or what not that can be manufactured in a given year will be determined by agreement, as well as the price the price at which they are to be sold and the conditions under which they are to be made.

After the trade association has made its agreement to the government, which either ratifies it or demands revisions. If no agreement can be reached by the men in the industry, the government is to step in and decide for them on the disputed points.

Those who have gone deepest into what is in the administrations mind believe that this is the become to an agreement it must begin of a new Nationalistic era. Taken with the control if agriculture and the effort to restrict farm production to what our domestic market can absorb, it may easily result in making the United States a completely self-contained nation, such as the European Nations are striving to become.
