



Consumer Food News

If you get a good harvest from your garden this summer, and might want to freeze some of it, so your favorite fruits and vegetables can be "in season" year

Freezing is quick and

easy. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor, and gutritive values of most fruits and vegetables. And the U. S. Department of Agriculture has a booklet with tips on choosing ingredients and equipment; preparing, packaging, freezing and suggestion for use. For a copy of HOME FREEZ ING OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES send 65 cents to Consumer Information, Dept. 37,

Pueblo, Colorado 31009. The following information is included:

To keep your foods well frozen, use packaging that will prevent evaporation. Materials that are moisture-vapor-proof in-clude glass, metal and rigid plastic. Most bags, wrapping material and waxed cartons made especially for freezing are

moisture-vapor resistant, . All containers should be easy to seal. Also, be sure to choose packaging that won't crack from brittleness at low temperatures.

Freeze fruits and vegetables soon after they are packed. Be sure to put no more unfrozen food into a some freezer than it will freeze within 24 hours. Usually this will be about 2 or 3 pounds of food to

each cubic foot of its capacity. Overloading slows down the rate of freezing, slowly may lose quality or spoil.

. Some fruits and veg-etables don't freeze well-included are green onions, lettuce and other salad greens, radishes, and tomatoes (except as juice or cooked).




