## Power Commission Extends Gas Priority

HARVEST CONTINUED AT  
A SLOW PACE WEDNESDAY:  
Dry land wheat av. about 10

Waco--Texas Farm Bureau President Carol Chaloupka has thanked the Federal Power Commission for extending emergency interim relief on natural gas used for irrigation fuel until June 15, 1976.

"This is a welcome reprieve for thousands of our agricultural producers who could not obtain adequate financing under a lower priority status," Chaloupka said in a message Friday to FPC Chairman John N. Nassikas.

Chaloupka said the Texas Farm Bureau wants the No. 2 priority made permanent. The Commission order extended the "interim deferral to June 15, 1976, or until a final Commission decision has been issued."

The FPC decided June 9 to extend a priority 2 status for irrigation use of natural gas. Previously, on March 21, the Commission had extended the relief until Sept. 20, 1975, until a series of hearings were held last month in Phoenix, Albuquerque and Lubbock.

Irrigation farmers testified at the hearings that changing to other sources of power was economically impractical. They further stated that adequate supplies of other fuels were not available.

Bankers told the hearings that they could not extend financing to many farmers under a No. 3 priority curtailment plan. Chaloupka told Nassikas

that 60,000 irrigation pumps in Texas are fueled by natural gas, representing more than 40 percent of all irrigation pumps in the state. He pointed out that the "vast majority" of pumps on the Texas High Plains use natural gas.

If irrigation use is later given a lower No. 3 priority under a curtailment plan, future shortages of natural gas could wreck the entire agricultural and business economy of West Texas," Chaloupka said. "Farmers must plan for a crop far in advance of planting time," he said. "For that reason, we are anxious for the Commission to decide on a permanent No. 2 priority for irrigation use."

El Paso Natural Gas Co. is the major supplier for the natural gas that is used for irrigation pumps.

In its June 9 order, the FPC said, "The severity of El Paso's projected priority 3 curtailment during the 1975-76 winter season (over 160 days of partial priority 3 curtailment and over 25 days of total priority 3 curtailment) justifies some fear of inadequate irrigation through the winter."

The Commission said, "Sufficient evidence of probable irreparable injury to southwestern growers exists to justify the emergency extension of the deferral of interim irrigation pumping use curtailment until June 15, 1976."

### Autograph Party to Honor Susie Allen

The occasion will feature her just-published book of poetry "Prairie Profiles" which in most part is memories of Old Hansford as she recalls it. Susie was reared in Hansford County and has a great love for the plains. She has written songs and poems and many historical articles about Hansford County and its pioneers. "The Story of Aunt Rhoda" (Mrs. A. M. Wilbanks, Sr.) won a prize in an essay contest at WTSU and is on file in the Historical Library of the Museum at Canyon, Texas.

The author and poet was born in Johnson County, Texas and moved to Hansford with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Pierce, Sr. in 1908.

Her first school was a dugout school called Happy Jack. Later she attended the Hansford Public School at Old Hansford in the years before the town was moved to the present site of Spearman.

She was a senior in Spearman High school when she married Henry Dacus in 1924. She enrolled at West Texas State Teachers College and attended that school for several semesters.

They made Spearman their home and their daughters Mary Lee and Patsy attended their intermediate and high school years in the Spearman Public schools.

During World War II the family moved to Amarillo. Henry Dacus died in 1963. She is married to C. C. Allen and lives at 3600 N. E. 21st street in Amarillo.

Mrs. Allen is a nurse and was awarded an orchid by the Amarillo Rotary Club during their program "orchid to you" for outstanding Christian service to tubercular children. Currently she maintains

a home for the aged at her residence address.

She is a member of Panhandle Penwomen and is a charter member of High Plains Poetry Association.

All her many friends in this community are invited to come to the Hansford Library Thursday, June 26 and visit with her on the occasion of her new book. The book will be on sale.

Typical of her many memories and visions of the first time she saw the plains (she was 4 years old) is the following verse: EDGE OF THE FRONTIER

I first saw the prairie from the high seat of a covered wagon. Thistles were leaping in a raw wintry wind Across an ocean Of grey brown prairie grass.

Not many years before Vast herds of buffalo Roamed the plain. Their bones lay bleaching In the pale sunlight Grim reminders Of The last frontier.

The prairie has given birth To plowed fields and waving grain. Oil wells dot the earth That once was stamping ground And hunting ground Of Indians and their herds.

Now, when the winds blow And thistles go, Me thinks I hear the echoes Of creaking harness and wagon wheels That brought the Plainsmen To the edge of the last frontier.

### Mrs. Porter Resumes Duties in San Antonio

Mrs. June Porter moved to San Antonio on Monday, June 16th, to resume duties as competitive speech director for Southwest Senior High School of San Antonio. Southwest is a Triple A (AAA) High School with a little over 1,000 students. Southwest did not have a competitive speech program and Mrs. Porter will organize this as she did in Spearman in 1963.

Mrs. Porter will miss students and School Staff in Spearman but feels this new challenge in a larger school system is a professional promotion she could not refuse.

### Recreation Program Continues

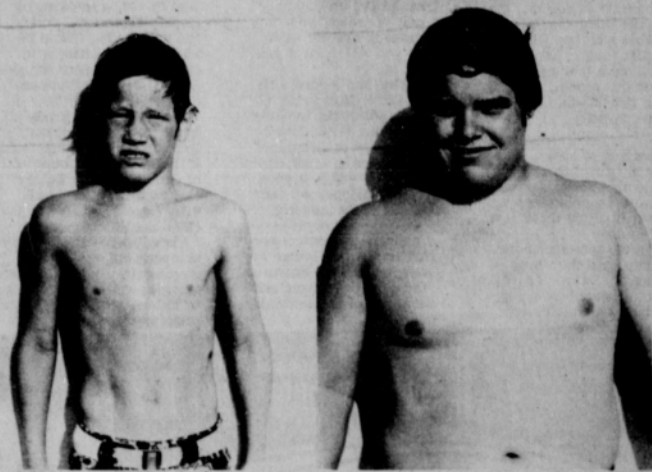

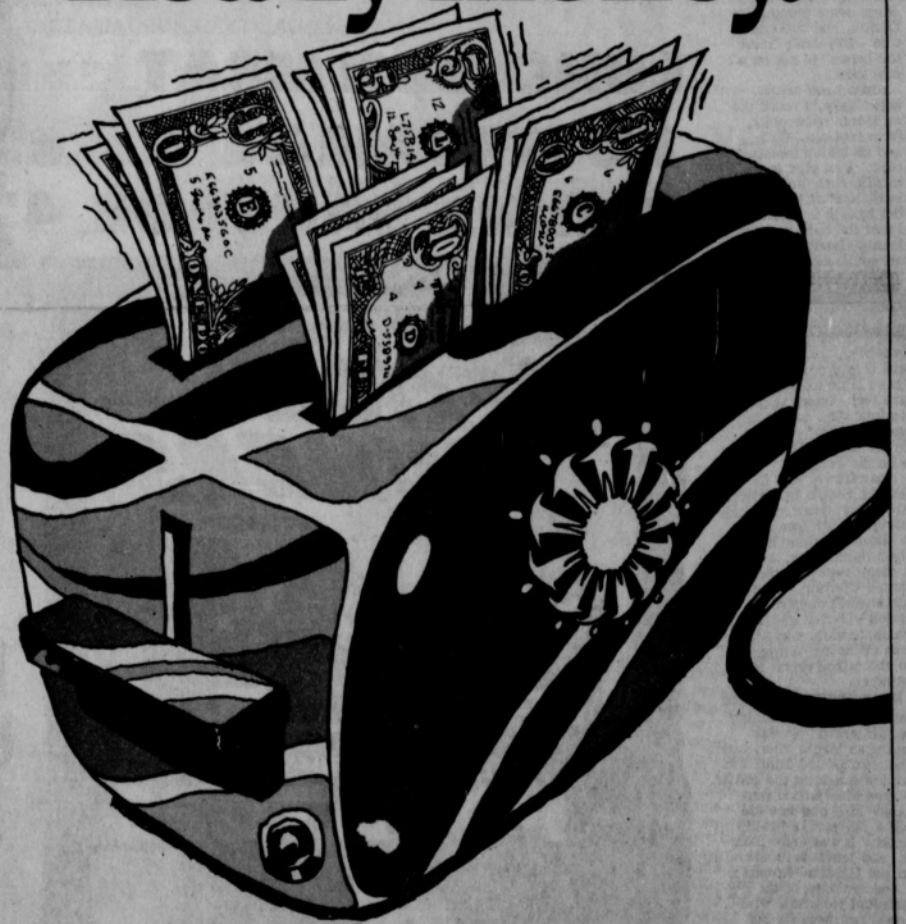

### Co. Extension Agent News

Summer is vacation time. Packing for vacation probably isn't high on anyone's list of "to do's"—and a baby may seem to complicate matters. However, being organized and refusing to take more than is needed will simplify both packing and traveling.

First consider where you are going, for how long and how you will get there. Then make a list by categories of things baby will need. Try to put items aside in advance. Keep a separate list of things to pack at the last minute, such as vitamin drops and a favorite toy.

Purchase containers of powder, lotion, cream, cotton and other necessities enough to last the whole trip. Discuss with the doctor any medications

you should have on hand and prepare a "first aid" kit for baby. Be sure to include a thermometer and baby aspirin—just in case. Take clothing that is comfortable, washable either in a basin of suds or at a laundrette and requires no ironing. Doing mini-laundry frequently is better than packing many outfits.

Generally speaking, it is wise to use the same products on the road as at home to avoid any possible reactions. This is especially true with formula and food. Plan to take an adequate supply for baby to allow for any unforeseen delay in arriving at your destination. If traveling light is a factor, try to check in advance if the brand of formula is available at your vacation spot.

Disposables—diapers in particular—are a boon to traveling with a baby. Moist towelettes are also useful.

Pack a diaper bag or large over-the-shoulder type bag with the things baby will need for the trip itself. Include changes of clothing along with diapers, medications, toiletries, food, a toy or two, waterproof pad and "burp" cloths.

Traveling by car allows space for extras, such as a portable crib. However, be sure you have and use a safety seat for baby. If traveling by air, alert the airline in advance. They generally make special efforts to help with boarding and deplaning as well as providing feeding and changing facilities. For train and bus travel, ask about accommodations and rest stops.

Summer vacations also often result in abused hair! Dry brittle and discolored hair is a common summer complaint. This condition

is due to overexposure to sun, salt water and chlorine, all of which play havoc with tender locks.

One preventative is to protect hair with a scarf or wide-brimmed hat. Some hair sprays contain sunscreens which may also protect hair. Always shampoo and rinse hair thoroughly, after swimming and active participation in sports. Wash, too, when hair shows signs of oiliness. If hair is already damaged, a trim might be the best solution. Brushing with a soft natural-bristle brush and using conditioners and rinses are also beneficial.

A handy gadget to look for is one which quickly pulls unsightly snags in knitted or woven fabrics to the underside. Several brands are available on the market, according to Beverly Rhoades, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Some 55,000 Americans require hospital care each year due to injuries from the use of power lawn mowers. Yet, most lawn mower accidents can be prevented if a few safety rules are followed, says an agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. First of all, become familiar with the operation of the machine. Clear the lawn of sticks, stones, wire and other debris. Keep pets and children out of the mowing area. Start the mower in neutral. Stop the engine when leaving the mower and always disconnect the spark plug wire when working on the machine. Never refuel when the engine is hot.

Use as little water as possible when boiling potatoes to prevent loss of important vitamins and minerals. Save the liquid to be used as part of the liquid ingredients when making cakes, quick breads and other baked goods, advises Mrs. Mary Sweetser, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

### News For Veterans

Noting that 855,000 veterans died during fiscal year 1974 and that 208,000 of these deaths were World War II veterans, Jack Colver, Veterans Administration Regional Director, issued a reminder to veterans to make certain their survivors know what VA benefits they may be entitled to when death comes.

"Not only should the veteran and his wife discuss the subject of death," Colver stressed, "they should make known locations of important family documents, and make sure they are protected from fire, theft and damage." Also, survivors should be briefed on what to do in cases of the veteran's death.

The veteran should tell his family about possible survivor's benefits such as VA's dependency and indemnity compensation for service-connected death, or non-service-connected death pensions for widows or for children when there is no widow, or when a widow is ineligible because of excessive income.

Burial benefits for wartime and certain peacetime veterans should not be overlooked. These include a maximum \$250 burial allowance, plus a plot allowance not exceeding \$150 for veterans buried outside national cemeteries. For veterans who die of service-connected disabilities, in lieu of the other benefits, there is an \$800 burial allowance.

"One of the most productive benefits paid by Social Security is the monthly benefit paid to students between the ages of 18 - 22 because of the retirement, disability, or death of the parent," Howard L. Weatherly, manager of the Pampa Social Security office stated. "In this age of ever increasing costs for education, these monthly benefits enable many students to continue their schooling," Mr. Weatherly continued.

However, even with this help, many students must work to finish paying for their education, and this fact serves to remind us that some students who draw social security will need to report their work to their social security office. Students can work and earn \$2520 in 1975 without it affecting their monthly benefits. This is an increase over the \$2400 persons were allowed to make in 1974. If the beneficiary earns over \$2520, then \$1 of their social security student benefit must be withheld for every \$2 earned over the \$2520 limit. However, even if the student makes over \$2520, he will still get his full social security check for any month that he does not earn wages of over \$210 and is not performing substantial services in self-employment.
