School & City Election Results

A light turn-out of voters went to the polls Saturday, April 5 and cast their votes in the school board and city council election. George Jackson received 226 votes and Bill Partridge 220 in the school election. A total of 273 cast their ballots including 4 absentee votes.

In the city election, the three winners were James G. Jackson with 204, Jim Nicholson with 204 and A Ron Ellsworth with 142. James K. Hicks, incumbent received 12, Don Denham 110, James Brown 94. Votes cast in the city election were 303 with 15 absentee.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC: Please do not call the schools during storm periods. The school officials and police need the lines open to communicate. Of course if you want to pick your children up for any reason you may, but the telephone lines must be kept open during storm periods.

Tornado Season At Hand

COLLEGE STATION--Texas had the dubious honor of leading the nation in the number of tornadoes last year with 116. And another tornado season is at hand.

"Most tornadoes occur during April, May and June during the late afternoon although they can occur at any time during the year or any time during the day," points out Wayne Keese, agriculture engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Most tornadoes occur in South and between the Rockies and the Appalachians.

"With a total of 944 reported tornadoes in the United States last year and 361 resulting deaths, 1974 was the worst year for tornadoes since 1925," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Although the average annual number of tornadoes reported has quadrupled in the past three decades, the number of tornado fatalities has been decreasing. This is probably due to better methods of sighting tornadoes, warning systems and advance preparation for tornadoes, notes Keese.

Tornadoes usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about 10 minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour but wind speeds in the funnel of a tornado get up to 300 miles per hour.

"Because tornadoes are so erratic, it's hard to tell just where or when they will occur," points out the engineer.

He stresses the importance of having a well rehearsed plan for quick action if a tornado is sighted.

The National Weather Service issues a "tornado watch" when atmospheric conditions are favorable for tornadoes. A "tornado warning" is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar.

"If a tornado watch is announced, stay tuned to a radio or television for weather advisories. A tornado warning demands action, so you should quickly move to a basement, cellar or civil defense shelter," advises Keese. "Keep a battery-powered radio handy in case power is lost.

If your home doesn't have a basement or cellar, go to the lowest level in the center of the home or get in a closet or small room or under heavy furniture, suggests the engineer. Open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes.

"Stay away from windows and buildings such as gymnasiums and auditoriums with wide free-span roofs. If you live in a mobile home, move to a shelter area. If you are caught in open country, move away from the tornado at a right angle to its path or lie flat in a ditch or ravine," he adds. "Do not stay in your car if you cannot safely evade the tornado by driving away from it or at right angles to its path."

If you sight a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law enforcement officer, but do not tie up the phone with unnecessary calls.

"After a tornado, always wear thick-soled shoes and gloves to clean up work and watch for broken gas pipes and downed electrical wires,"

warns Keese. Don't light matches or smoke in or near a building that has been hit by a tornado until you are sure there are no gas leaks. "Furthermore, stay away from disaster areas unless you're helping with rescue and cleanup operations."

As coordinator, Rinker will assist the alcoholism drug abuse coordinating board in providing Regional leadership for the orderly development of services relating to alcoholism and drug abuse.

PRPC also provides technical assistance to service providers in initiating and maintenance of training services, client services elements, occupational programming, criminal justice and special target group programs.

Following graduation from Oklahoma State University, Rinker opened a veterinary practice in Peyton and was also a private consultant.

Currently, he is an instructor at Frank Phillips College and an adjunct professor, preceptor, and research associate, Oklahoma State University through 1974.

Activities include board of directors, Yucca Girl Scout Council, Chairman Youth Activities Spearman Chamber of Commerce, Cub Scout Master, Past President Academy of Veterinary Consultants.

A resident of Spearman, Dr. Rinker and his wife and five children will move to Amarillo in June.

Dr. Rinker replaces Betty O'Rourke, the temporary coordinator, administrative assistant with the PRPC Health Council.

Church Sets Revival

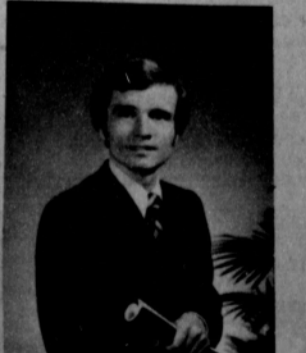
Revival services April 20-27 are scheduled at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. at First Baptist Church.

Glaucoma Test Scheduled

A FREE glaucoma screening will be held at the First United Methodist Church, Fellowship Hall, 407 S. Haney Street, Spearman, from 7 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Thursday evening, April 24, 1975, in an attempt to track down unknown cases of glaucoma, a blinding eye disease.

The free tests screening program is open to all residents of Spearman and surrounding areas, thirty-five years of age and over.

It will be sponsored by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Spearman Lions Club in cooperation with members of the Top O' Texas Medical Society. The program has been approved by the Top O' Texas Medical Society, the Spearman City Health Department and the Hansford County Health Department.

Serving as volunteers in the program will be members of the Spearman Lions Club and their wives, members of the Texas Graduate Nurses Association, and members of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce.

The test, which is simple and painless, will be administered as a public service by local medical doctors, members of the Top O' Texas Medical Society.

Just what is glaucoma? It is the leading cause of permanent blindness in the nation, according to the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

Glaucoma is a disease where damage cannot be undone once it progresses to a point of impairing vision. There is, however, effective treatment to arrest the disease, in most cases, if detected and sight saved.

Early detection of this insidious disease is the main purpose of glaucoma screenings such as the one scheduled in Spearman, Thursday evening, April 24, 1975.

The test, which will be given to anyone thirty-five years of age and over, simply measures the pressure within the eyeball. To measure the pressure, the doctor will put a few drops of a mild anesthetic in the eyes, and place a tonometer, a special device which gauges pressure by the hardness of the eyeball.

The test takes only a few minutes, is completely painless and does not affect your vision for driving afterwards.

Remember, a few minutes of your time on Thursday night, April 24, 1975, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. could save your sight.

FLBA Manager Attends Meet

Bob Williams of Pampa, has just returned from Houston where he represented the Spearman-Pampa Federal Land Bank Association at the annual stockholders meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston.

The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 66 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were about 500 persons in attendance.

George W. Cunningham, President, in his annual report to stockholders, reported that 1974 was another record year for new business with \$269,000,000 in loans closed. This was the largest year in loan volume in the bank's 58 year history and also in 1974, the bank reached \$1 billion in loans outstanding. W. Malcolm Harding, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration and Dr. James R. Gibbs, Vice President and Economist of the Texas Commerce Bank in Houston, also addressed stockholders and guests during the meeting.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston make long term loans on farms and ranches throughout Texas and currently has 35,000 loans for more than \$1 billion outstanding.

The Spearman-Pampa Federal Land Bank Association of Pampa makes and service loans in this area, and are currently servicing 458 loans for more than \$18 million outstanding. 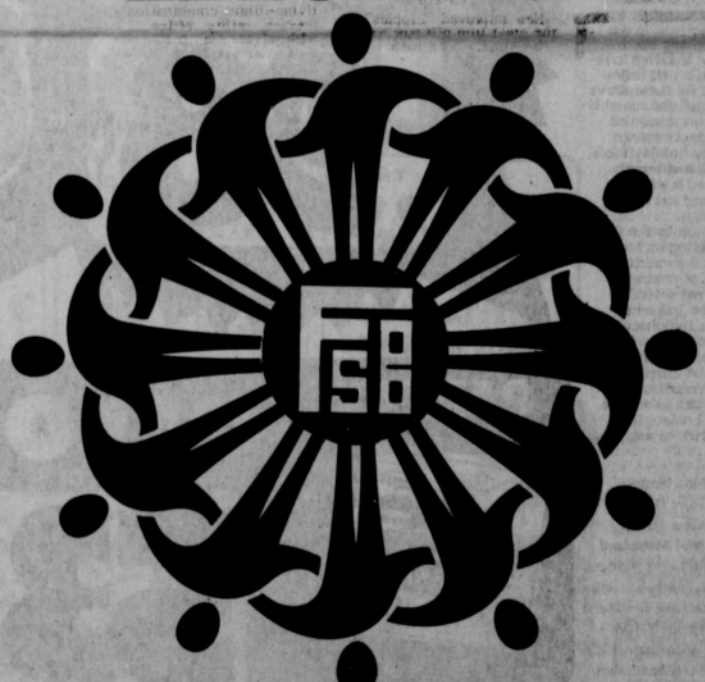

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giving the tumors a good case of frostbite. And many treated tumors slough off or just fade away.

After the cow is restrained the affected eye is treated with a liquid nitrogen spray unit. If the tumor is located on the eyeball the area is anesthetized before the nitrogen is applied. No anesthesia is needed for tumors on eyelids.

Regardless of its location a tumor is frozen along with a slight margin of surrounding normal tissue. Allowed to slowly thaw, it is immediately refrozen for a second treatment.

Usually this is sufficient for small cancers, although larger growths generally require a second session, University of Arkansas veterinarians say.

"Preliminary results have been very encouraging. We are following up on cattle that have already been treated to see how they are making out." The experimental treatment isn't a cure-all,

however, Arkansas scientists say advanced cases of cancer eye, where extensive tissue damage has taken place, don't respond well to cryotherapy. Early diagnosis and treatment are extremely important to insure success in healing the growth, they emphasize.

Garden season is fast approaching. The County Extension office has received a lot of information that makes for good reading on gardening this year. If you have questions or just want to read up on some of the recommended garden practices, come by the Extension office in the Courthouse basement, and browse through our bulletin rack.

Using a combination fertilizer and weed killer on your lawn can create more work than it saves.

Applying a fertilizer-herbicide mixture to the lawn can endanger desirable plants such as trees, shrubs and vines in the area. Many trees such as oak, mulberry and sycamore

are highly susceptible to weed killers.

There is always danger of applying too much herbicide. While an overdose of fertilizer is not necessarily harmful, too much herbicide can ruin vegetation.

Another drawback of using a combination fertilizer-herbicide is that the most effective time to apply fertilizer is not always the most effective time to apply herbicide. Each type of herbicide must be used at a certain rate and time to be effective.

There is also the chance that a leftover mixture of fertilizer and herbicide may be mistaken for fertilizer and used for that purpose. This can do irreparable damage to the landscape.

By mowing your yard regularly and fertilizing, watering and providing good drainage, weeds will be less of a problem and you probably will not have to use a herbicide. If you do decide to use a combi-

ination fertilizer and herbicide, be sure to read all the precautions on the label.

County FB Presidents Go To Washington

WACO--A large group of local Texas agricultural leaders will be traveling to Washington, D.C., later this month for an unusual version of the Annual Texas Farm Bureau conference for county FB presidents, according to Carrol Chaloupka, TFB president.

Some 225 persons, including wives of some of the farm leaders, from 130 counties are expected to go. They will fly from Houston and Dallas April 22 and will return April 24.

Chaloupka said the purpose of the trip is to give the local leaders a first-hand look at the governing processes on the national level. They will also have the opportunity of becoming better acquainted with their elected representatives in the U.S. House and Senate, he said.

The Texas farmers and ranchers will have breakfast with the Texas delegation in the House on the morning of April 23. They will later meet that day with Senators John Tower and Lyod Berman.

Besides making contacts with legislators, the Texans will be feted to a banquet featuring American Farm Bureau Federation President William Kuhfus and the Washington office staff of the AFB in a discussion of "The Washington Situation."

They will be conducted on a special guided tour of the Department of Agriculture and will meet with Earl Butz and his staff. In addition, they will see the usual sights including Ford's Theatre; the Federal Triangle; the Capitol Building; the Supreme Court Building; the Library of Congress; the White House; the Washington, Jefferson, and Lincoln Monuments; the Cherry Trees; the Smithsonian Museum; the National Gallery of Art; and Arlington National Cemetery.

Plans for the trip were approved by the TFB Board of Directors early this year. It was made contingent on the state farm organization reaching certain membership goals. In order to send a representative, a county Farm Bureau had to have 55 per cent of its last year's new members enrolled by March 31. In addition, TFB had to have 85,000 members enrolled and 100 qualified counties by that date.

When membership figures were tabulated, it was found that some 130 counties had qualified and total new members transmitted to the Waco headquarters since November 1 (beginning of the organization's fiscal year) exceeded 92,000.

Cattle Numbers Up, Feeding Down

COLLEGE STATION--Cattle feeding is down in Texas but the number of cows and calves is up. While cattle feeding has remained under pressure during the past two years, the breeding herd should be under pressure to be reduced in 1975, according to a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"In Texas cattle feeding on Feb. 1 was 47 per cent below levels last year," points out Dr. Ed Uvacek. "At the same time feeding levels were down 37 per cent in the seven major cattle feeding states." Uvacek says that placement of cattle and calves into Texas feedlots has also dropped considerably -- being down 56 per cent in Jan. compared to the same month a year ago. Placements were down 43 per cent in the seven major feeding states.

The program includes discussion sessions on the World Food Situation, Predicting Tomorrow's Beef, Non Fed VS Fed Beef, Beef Research for you. All of these should be of interest to cattlemen. Money spent or invested in research continue to return dividends. I ran across this example last week on treating cancer eye in cattle. Taking advantage of a recently developed technique in human health care--

cryogenic surgery--veterinarians with the Arkansas Agricultural Experiment Station and University of Arkansas Medical Center at Little Rock have been able to successfully arrest eye tumors in more than 50 cows.

Treatment has been effective with cancers on both the eyeball and eyelid.

In cattle cryosurgery, tumorous tissue is destroyed by quick freezing with liquid nitrogen, somewhat akin to the method of treatment used with Parkinson's disease in humans.

For many years cancer eye in cattle has been troublesome, causing economic loss, reducing the salvage value of animals and sometimes shortening their lives.

The most common method of treating cancer eye has been to surgically remove the effected tissue and usually the entire eyeball if it is involved. Since cancer eye is a superficial tumor it's easily frozen. University of Arkansas scientists are literally

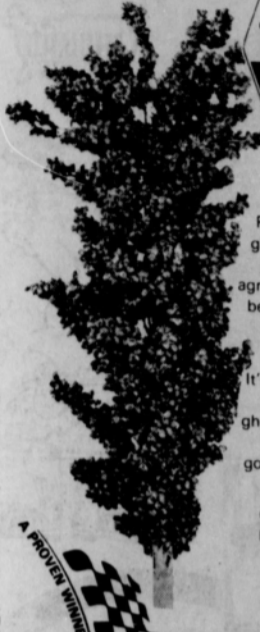

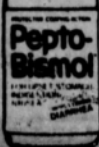
