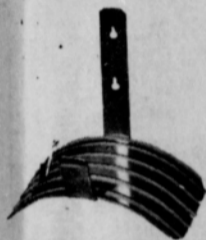

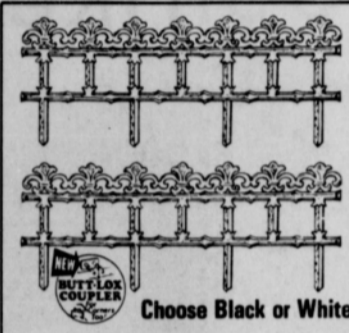

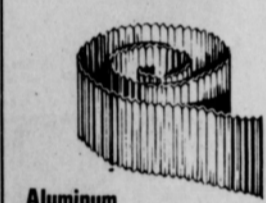

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT IRVING P. KRICK, INC. OF TEXAS, of Suite 216, 411 South Fain Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, California 92262, who holds License No. 76-3 of the State of Texas, is now applying for a permit to engage in operations and to locate ground-based dispensers in certain counties in the State of Texas for the purpose of augmenting precipitation on behalf of farmers and ranchers located in the State of Oklahoma. These operations shall be by means of ground dispensers as follows:

1. Area in which equipment will be operated is the following: Counties in Texas consisting of Dallas, El Paso, Garza, Hill, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochsler, Roberts, Sherman and Wheeler.
2. The target area will be the farm and ranch lands within counties in the State of Oklahoma consisting of Beaver, Ellis, Harper, Kiowa, Texas, Woods and Woodward.
3. The areas adjacent to target area which may be subject to effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and to general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intended effect is in the target, but some downward effect may occur in Oklahoma adjacent to the immediate neighborhood of target. There would be no significant effect in Texas from the operation of any of these proposed dispensers. It is important to note that this notice is simply to apply for permission to install dispensers in Texas, not to increase rainfall in Texas, and for the sole purpose of increasing rainfall in the target areas located in the State of Oklahoma.
4. The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric are ground-based dispensers that have an output in the range of 1/2 to 2 grams per hour per dispenser.
5. Persons who will be in charge of these operations is Mr. Newton C. Stone.
6. The operations will be performed in the State of Oklahoma for the following clients: HENRY C. Monthly Rebate of City Sales Taxes

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Friday that monthly rebates of city sales taxes will start April 15.

"Nothing stand in our way but the U.S. Postal service," Bullock said.

This first-ever monthly payment will replace the old quarterly payment system with its 90-day lag time which had been in effect since the city sales tax was passed in 1967.

Bullock said that junking the quarterly system "means we've quit burying the cities' money in the backyard in fruit jars for three months at a time."

"Now it will be interesting to see what the cities do with it," Bullock said.

Payments to 800 towns and cities which have the one per cent tax total more than \$200 million a year.

The April 15 payments will cover taxes collected by the Comptroller between Feb. 17, the cutoff date for the tax payment, and April 4. Future monthly payments will be made at mid-month, Bullock said.

Bullock said that cities can expect every third month's check to be larger than the other two, reflecting the peak of quarterly tax payments sent in by merchants.

"When you're talking about money, hard ends ware," Bullock observed.

Texas Legislative Report By Bob Close

Here is a status report on some of the legislation in the 64th Texas Legislature through the tenth week.

Senate Bill 3 - Railroad Commission to control out of state sales of natural gas produced from state lands passed Senate and has passed House.

Senate Bill 59 - Prohibition of smoking in certain public places; passed Senate, pending in House Committee.

Senate Bill 89 - Raises truck weight limits; passed both Houses, signed into law by Governor.

Senate Bill 125 - Creates

Texas Commission on Status of Women; passed Senate, pending in House Committee.

Senate Bill 300 - Permanent voters registration system; passed Senate, pending in House.

House Bill 84 - Referendum on daylight savings time; passed House, pending in Senate.

House Bill 139 - Extending 55 mph speed limit; passed both Houses with amendment in conference committee.

House Bill 226 - Terminates state support for county school superintendents and county school administration; passed House, pending in Senate.

House Bill 528 - \$25 fine from 55 mph to 70 mph speeding violations;

passed House, pending in Senate.

House Bill 679 - Presidential Preference Primary Bill; passed House, pending in Senate.

Some legislation passed by the House this week include:

House Bill 34 - Permits microfilming of public records by cities.

House Bill 365 - Gives State Land Board limited authority to trade interests in real estate.

House Bill 438 - Permits silent prayer or meditation in public schools.

House Bill 542 - Permits absentee voting by qualified voters in jail.

House Bill 985-1 - Provides certain amendments to the Palo Duro River Authority which permits annexation of Moore County and other territory under certain conditions, limits tax rate to secure bonds and provides a procedure to detach territory. Was presented to the House Committee on Natural Resources on Tuesday evening, March 25th. The proposed amendments were explained to the Committee and the General Manager of the Authority, Craig Davidson from Spearman, testified in support of bill. After the public hearing, the Committee voted a favorable recommendation to the house of Representatives and voted that it do pass.

The House of Representatives is to adjourn for Easter after the session on Thursday, March 27th and to return on Tuesday, April 1st. We are past the mid point of the session now and it appears that the work will be virtually day and night until the session is completed on June 2nd.

Your County Agent Says

We have certainly had our share of late winter weather lately. If your fruit trees have not yet bloomed, then your fruit probably hasn't been frozen yet. I was in Wheeler last Sunday and heard that most of their fruit crop had survived the freezes of late week.

I have noticed some dandelions and bindweed starting to come out and grow recently. Now would be a good time to give these two pesky weeds a good spraying of 2, 4-D. Most other broadleaf trees, shrubs and flowers have not yet leafed out. This would be a good time to give them a good application of 2, 4-D than later on in the spring or summer.

However, you should use caution when applying 2, 4-D and follow the directions on the label, particularly if any close-by shrubs or flowers are now leafed out.

Now is also a good time to fertilize your lawn with a complete fertilizer, containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. Fertilizer should be applied to apply about 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. This means that a fertilizer containing 20-10-5 or 20 percent nitrogen means that 10 pounds of this fertilizer should be applied per 1,000 square feet. Three or four applications of fertilizer may be needed per growing season, particularly for cool season grasses.

According to the USDA Quarterly Pig Crop report, the number of hogs and pigs on farms March 1, 1975 in the 14 Quarterly States are estimated at 40.3 million head, down 17 percent from a year earlier and 15 percent below March 1, 1973. Number kept for breeding at 6.1 million head is down 20 percent from each of the last two years. Market hogs and pigs, at 34.3 million head are 16 percent below March 1, 1974, and 14 percent below March 1, 1973. The all hogs and pigs inventory in the 10 corn belt States at 35.4 million head is the lowest for this date since the series began in 1960.

The 14 Quarterly States pig crop December 1974 through February 1975 totaled 12.5 million head, down 20 percent from the previous year and 22 percent below the same period two years ago. During the period, 1.8 million sows farrowed, 21 percent below a year earlier and down 22 percent from December 1972-February 1973. Pigs per litter averaged 7.05 compared with 8.90 for the December 1973-February 1974 period.

Producers in the 14 Quarterly States intend to farrow 2.6 million sows during the March-May 1975 period.

If realized, farrowings would be 21 percent below March-May 1974 and 23 percent below the same period in 1973.

Intentions in the 14 States are to farrow 2.9 million sows during June through August 1975, down 17 percent from farrowings for June-August 1974. This would be 20 percent below the same period two years earlier.

Another USDA release shows that Commercial production of red meat in the United States totaled 2.9 billion pounds in Feb., 8 percent above a year ago, and 6 percent above Feb. 1973. Commercial meat production includes slaughter in Federally inspected and other slaughter plants but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

Beef production totaled 1.6 billion pounds, an increase of 15 percent from Feb. 1974 and 10 percent from Feb. 1973. Cattle kill totaled 3,082,300 head, up 21 percent from a year ago and 15 percent above Feb. 1973. Liveweight per head averaged 1,021 pounds 43 pounds less than last year and 26 pounds under Feb. 1973.

There were 50 million pounds of veal produced in Feb., twice the 25 million pounds produced in Feb. 1974. Calf slaughter at 329,600 head was up 78 percent from last year and 60 percent above Feb. 1973. Liveweight per head averaged 270 pounds compared with 235 lbs. for Feb. 1974 and 258 lbs. for Feb. 1973.

Purchase the right quantity to fit the family's needs. As a rule, larger quantities of staples may be cheaper. But if they spoil before using them, they're no bargain.

One important consideration in making a plan of action is family preference.

The plan should be flexible enough to meet the needs of the changing market also.

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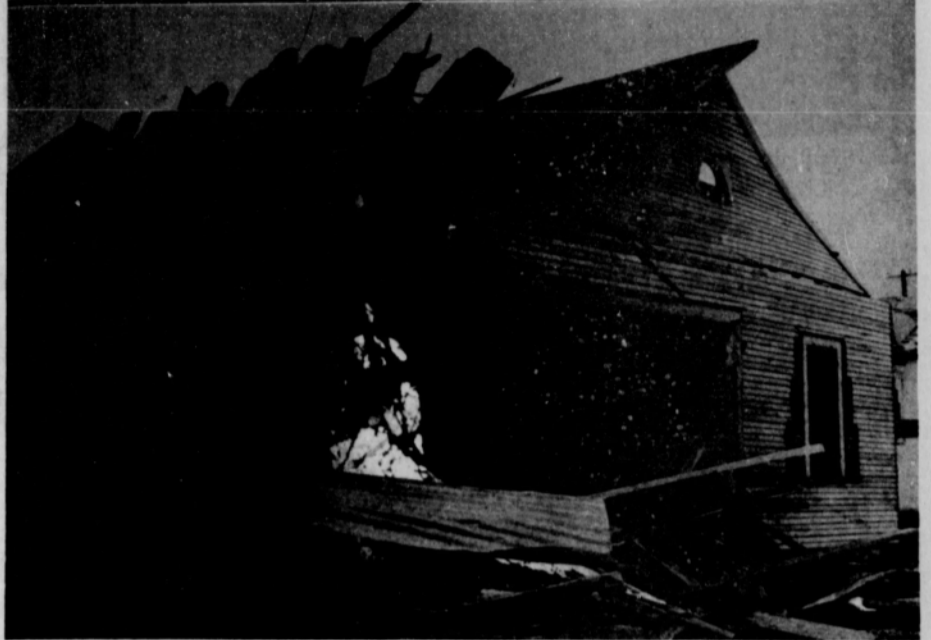

Another home destroyed, near the square, or North of the square.
