as the farm hand was greasing the shaft. If the necessary precautions had not been taken the wheel or tail could swing around, knocking the person to the ground. The mills had two tails, a large one to direct the wheel into the wind, and a small one, a governor of sorts, to deflect the wheel when the wind current got too strong.

Climate was its enemy; dust and grime filled its workings and the dry humidity caused damage to the wooden parts, turning them brittle, weakening them. Fierce winds often shattered the mills to splinters. The Eclipse was con-stantly in need of repair. The mills were cussed, criticized and even joked about but the truth is most farmers or ranchers would not have tried to manage any sizable spread without one. The Eclipse gave way, however, to the more modern type of mill with enclosed gear boxes, all metal parts, and more efficient mechanical works, but part of the real beauty of windmills disappeared when the Eelipse went out of general use.

(S.J.R. No. 3) Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to: Trovide for the revision and consolidation of pro-visions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to pro-vide that all general laws that have established retire-ment systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and offi-cers in effect at the time of the adoption of this con-ritutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature. 



FARMERS MUST BE "FU EL CONSCIOUS" - Farmers and ranchers must be "fuel conscious" and stay abreast of the changing fuel situa-tion if they expect to op-erate as efficiently as pos-sible in 1975, points out an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-vice. Agricultural producers are mainly concerned with shottages of natural gas and LP gas. Low prices of both these fuels have encouraged consumption while depre-ssing supplies. Producers are advised to keep in con-tact with a reliable supplier, keep on-farm storage filled, keep the supplier advised of future fuel needs and changes, and schedule machine work to avoid rush seasons.


