World Ag Production Levels Off lion tons.

During the past two years, the upward trend of world agricultural products began to level off after enjoying an unprecedented two decade climb. Prime cause of the new figures was attributed to decreased output in the United States, Canada, the Soviet Union, and in South-

Depressed economic conditions, high unemployment rates, along with the oil crisis, strikes, and inflation have hit most of the developed countries while in the world's under-developed areas agricultural production climbed in 1974 but per capita production declined.

Asia's rice crop is estima ted at 101 million tons, a decline of more than five percent. A frica's output is estimated up four percent while agricultural production in Eastern Europe remains the same as 1973. The USSR has had a per capita decline in total production -her grain crop is estimated at 200 million tons with

Tobacco production is expected to increase sligh-tly along with sugar produc-tion while world wide cotton production continues steadily to increase (From "Foreign Agriculture", Decem-ber, 1974.) ber, 1974.) Older people need about the same amount of vita-mins as young adults, However, calorie needs are less due to a slower metabolic rate and decr-eased activity, according to Sally Springer, foods and nutrition specialize with the Texas Agricul-tural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The fun-sharing, happy, lilting Irish people are generous in having extend-ed to the rest of the earthbound people an invitation to participate in the observance of St. Patrick's Day, ordinarily marked for March 17 but in this day of hurry and scurry, to be noted this year (at least in Shamrock, Texas) and other fair cities the 15th of March. St. Patrick's Day is a many-faceted holiday, a religious, political, and fun-loving affair full of the events tending toward good fellowship and conviviality. As for St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, his birthdate and birthplace are matters of great confusion with the date of his birth sometimes being noted in the fifth century and sometimes A. D. 373, 386. One Irish legend has it that he died at the age of one ndred and twenty and his birthplace varies with the teller from England, to France and Wales but apparently not Ireland! Though St. Patrick never claimed the performance of a miracle in his own writing, tales of his miraculous exploits against the troublesome ruling Druids abound. His persistance and final victory over them won him the right to preach Christianity through-

out the land. One of the stories about St. Patrick which is often judged authentic (no doub due to its simplicity and out the land. basis in human ingenuity) is the tale of the shamrood nd the Trinity. The doc

trine of Three Gods in One. each separate and distinct, yet each totally God, is claimed by Christians to be a mystery and is accept-ed on faith. St. Patrick, in trying to teach his peo-ple about the Trinity, held up a shamrock explaining that the three leaves represented the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit while the stem was the Godhead itself from which they proceeded. This is the origin supposedly of the use of the sharrock which is worn on St. Patrick's Day for good fortune! The expulsion of all the makes from Ireland is a most popular story told about St. Patrick. Accord-ing to one story told about ing to one story told about the last snake in Ireland which was an old troublesome serpent who lived in Lake Dilveen and every Monday he comes to the surface, searches to the surface, searches the area with his beady eyes and says, "It's been a long Mon-day, Patrick". St. Patrick's Day in Ire-

land is not the great holi-day it is in New York and other spots throughout the United States. It is primarily a religious obser-vance. Today, it is celebrated wherever there are Irishmen or descendents of Irishmen...and not even limited to Irishmen... for according to an Americanism, "Everybody's a little bit Irish on St. Patrick's Day." In America, the first secular celebration of St. Patrick's Day appears to have been in 1737 when the char-itable Irish Society of Bos-

ton was founded. This was a Protestant organization. The Friendly Sons of St. Patrick in Philadelphia celebrated the day in 1780 and in 1784 the New York branch of that society was formed by Irish veterans of the Revolutionary War, composed of both Catholics and Presbyterians and its first president was a Presbyterian. Today, businesses and factories take on a green hue as employees sharmrocks and green clothing and parades are staged in many cities, towns, and hamlets with the biggest parade being in New York City.

City. Whatever the background, enjoy the wearing of the green (else you might be pinched) and assume some of the luck of Irish on St. Patrick's Day 1975 (when-ever it might be!)






