





#### **NCUA Honors Credit Union**

STINNETT-- The H & H School Employees Federal Credit Union, Stinnett, earned its fifth consecutive Thrift Honor Award for its success in stimulating savings, according to Paul A. Trylko, regional director of the National Credit Union Administration.

The Federal credit union attained a morthly rate of growth of 3.1 percent in whare accounts \$20,000 and under. This growth rate was above the average for Federal credit unions of similar size, according to Trylko.

On Nov. 30, 1974, the credit union had 687 members who had saved a total of \$552,467. The credit union primarily serves employees of public schools in Hutchison and

Hansford Counties, Texas.

was chartered in Dec. 1963.

The National Credit Union Administration conducts its Thrift Honor Award Program to provide at incentive for officials of Federal credit unions to encourage members with small accounts to save regularly as part of their family financial management plans.

Herman Nickerson Jr., heads up the administration which is responsible for chartering, supervising, and intention to the program. There are approximately 13,000 federally chartered credit unions.



tions to the City Council concerning the establishment of minimum safeguards in the erection and construction of buildings to protect the citizens from fire, and other hazards, as well as the protection of their health and safety.

The Citizens Advisory Committee, headed by Mrs. Joel Lee Lackey, will encourage efforts of property owners and residents to ench

ench enhance their property and enhance their property and protect desirable features of their environment and submit their recommendations at the March 6 meeting.

The Commission plans to re-examine the comprehen sive plan and the codes and ordinances at least once a year and consider possible amendments in order to ke-

ip policies fresh in the minds of citizens and city officials and to modify certain policies in view of new developments and increasing technologies, and to keep instruments current with the City Council's thinking. The Planning and Zoning Commission has taken an inventory of the city's gas, water, and sewage systems, and has discovered that these utilities have been constructed at various locations by verbal consent of property owners. This has interfered with the placing of some buildings and inconvenienced property owners. In order to correct this inconvenience, legal documents have been prepared for property owners to sign. Property owners to sign. Property owners should understand that a "dedications" or "easement" is

nothing more nor less than a gift, by the property own er, of a right for the city to use the land for utility and maintenance purposes. These "dedications" or "easements" must be recorded with the deed to you account of the control of the contro

property.

The property owners involved will be notified by rolved will be notified by mail, and are encouraged to assist in this problem. When notified, the property owner should go to the City Hall to sign the proper documents for City records. Any "easement or "dedication" should then be recorded with your deed to the property. This will make possible the avoidance and costly inconvenience to property owners in the future. The next planning meeting is scheduled for March 6 at 3 p.m. at City Hall.




