of Dimes, turned its attention to birth defects in
recent years after its marked success in the war against
polio.

Primary aim of the campaign against birth defects
is to prevent them as far as
possible, or when that is
not possible to reverse or
mitigate the damaging
effects.

The nation's most precious resource is our children. Each year, however, about 150,000 babies born alive in this country have some kind of birth defect. In the first year of life, birth defects are a leading cause of death.

has a birth defect is devastating to parents. In some families, however, the probability that a specific birth defect will occur can be predicted with some accuracy.

Some defects can be diagnosed before, at, or shortly after birth. A lmost as many are discovered during the first year of life. A few do not become evident until years later. Some defects can be corrected during the earliest months of life, but others unfortunately result in lifelong handicaps and are irreversible. Some defects not are severe and some are so mild that they can be overcome with specialized medical management.

Birth defects occur in families in every social, economic, racial, and educational level. The problems preserted by these defects today are different than they were 10 years ago. De mage caused to an unborn infant by the German measles vaccine. Further reductions in other birth defects can be made using knowledge already available. Good prenatal care from the earliest weeks of pregnancy, or, better yet, even before pregnancy, can help protect the pregnare woman and her unborn child from potential factors known to cause these tragic defects. In addition, new information about genetics and the effects of drugs taken by a pregnant woman upon the developing child is being used to prevent



We are expecting sizable runs for every Friday through April II. The bulk of the cat-tle grazing on wheat pasture "all over" our large trade area are going to move. Most Ranchers and Farmers are "hopeful" of harvesting a wheat crop-so arrange your con-signment-large or small-for any FRIDAY, as far in advance as possible.



\$460 Per Capita To Run Local Govt.

detailed study of local finances, gathered from every county in the United States. The study, entitled Govern ment Finances, is the first made since fiscal 1967. They are conducted every five years. For people living in Hansford County, the figures show, the total cost of local governmental operations came to \$460 per capita in the year. In the rest of the nation the average was \$511 per

capita and, in the State of Texas, \$406.

It took a total of \$106.5 billion to operate the various county, township, municipal and district governments in the country and provide the public with services in the fields of health, welfare, roads, sanitation, housing, police and fire protection, education and the like.

The \$106.5 billion outlay represented an increase

of \$47 billion in a period of five years. In some communities, the amount spent for local governmental operations was adequately covered by revenues. In many others, however, more was spent than was taken in.

more was spent than was taken in.

The figures for Hansford County show that the direct expenditures, \$460 per capita, were offset by general revenue receipts equivalent to \$489 per capita. Some \$418 of this revenue came from local taxes and charges and the remainder from Federal and state sources.

In order to finance their expenditures for capital improvements and provide their residents with neces-

their residents with necessary services, many communities have been forced to go deeper into debt. Hansford County's ourstanding debt is placed at \$265 per capita in the report. Nationally, the debt of local governments averaged \$580 per capita. Throughout the state it was \$528.



The urgency here according to the various proponents of pay raises is to "save" the taxpayers the cost of a second statewide election. Another example is the proposal by Joe Wyatt of Victoria to establish in the Constitution a "Texas Capital Improvement Fund". This proposal would amend Article III of the Texas Constitution and provide for the transfer from the General Revenue Fund \$250 million on September 1, 1976, The income from this fund would be used to finance the acquisition of real external

million on September 1, 1976. The income from this fund would be used to finance the acquisition of real estate and construction, repair or rehabilitation of permanent improvements for state supported school and colleges and other agencies of the state. I favor this concept which would hold back a portion of the surplus and create in effect, a savings account for the state, the income from which would finance capital expenditures. These expenditures must now be appropriated from the General Revenue Fund and must be raised by taxes. Here again, the sponsors of this legislation urge immediate passage so this question can also be put on the April ballot and the legislature can be guided accordingly.

A frequent motion here is "Mr. Speaker, I move that we declare an emergency and suspend all mecessary rules to take up this matter for immediate commoderatopm" which usually requires a 4/5 vote.
