Additionally, he said, the mumber must be correct to rensure that the targayer will get full credit for his or her contributions under the social security and medicare programs. For this reason any name change should be reported to the local Social Security Administration office. One way for targayers to be sure their return is correc-ty numbered is to use the pre-addressed label on the tars, package sent out by the RS. Double check the

numbers, Archer said, and if there is a mistake it should be corrected on the label

be corrected on the label itself. "The pre-addressed labels help us keep the numbers straight," Archer said, "and they speed the processing of the returns. At this point in the filing season a labeled return with the correct social scourity numbers can produce a refund for the taxpayer within five weeks. As A pril 15 approaches, the wait for the refund could be as lond as twelve weeks. My advice sto file early and make sure the numbers are correct.






