





The old Bridge of Spain is called "the mother of Manila's bridges." The original bridge was built of pontoons sometime between the years 1590 and 1600, being known as the Bridge of Boats. The stone bridge shown bove was built about 1630. It was twice damaged by earthquakes, and was once partly demolished by a flood.





Section 1. Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, and Section 24 of Article 3 of the constitution of the State of Texas, shall be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of all such charters, unless otherwise ex-pressly directed by law, and give legal advise in writing to the Governor or other executive officers, when re-quested by them, and perform such

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and permitting either the husband or the wife to pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt thereof, and permitting the Legis-lature to authorize absentee voting. Be it resolved by the Legislature of

The State of Texas: SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Aricle 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizens of the United States and who hall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that electors living in any unorganized county may votit any election precinct in the county nich such county is attache judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of th State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next pre-ceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

SEC. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the

state at an election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to author-ize absentee voting." 


