But entertaining the confined child takes planning. Since play is a vital part of every child's life, toys are usually as important to an ill child's happiness and well-being as when he is well.

well. Parents could consider Parents could consider these points when selecting toys for convalescent days. --Choose toys that require quiet play and use little energy. --Provide a wide variety because attention span is shorter when a child is ill.

--Avoid play materials that spill, turn over, or get lost in bed linens. --Avoid toys that cause

--Avoid toys that cause eye-strain.

--Select toys that can be played by one or two people.

--Choose toys easier than those he enjoys when well.

--Choose a toy with your child's interest in mind.

Specific toys sick children usually enjoy are dolls and stuffed animals, picture and drawing books, balloons tied to bed, modeling clay or dough, simple dress-up props, manipulative dolls or animals, simple handcraft projects of hand puppets.

Toys that fit the child's play needs will keep him entertained and his mind off himself. And the contented child is less likely to demand his parent's constant attention.

Cattle Scabies Confirmed

Dallas, Texas--Officials of the Internal Revenue Service's Dallas District office say that, so far in the 1976 filing season, the most common errors showing up on tax returns are those caused by a

misunderstanding of the \$30 tax credit for each personal exemption.

"Apparently, many tax-payers are confusing the \$30 tax credit with the \$750 personal exemption deduction," A. W. Mc Canless, district directors of the IRS for North Texas, said today. "They wind up thinking each personal exemption is worth one deduction of \$780."

The two are not related, however. Mr. McCanless said that taxpayers should compute their tax liability in the normal manner before dealing with the \$30 tax credit. When the normal tax is computed, the taxpayer is then entitled to subtract \$30 from the total tax liability for each personal exemption claimed on the return. For example, a married couple with two children would claim four personal exemptions on a joint return and come up with the certain amount of tax due. They would then

the actual amount of tax due."

He also pointed out that, while extra exemptions are allowed for blind taxpayers and those over 65, these people do not receive extra tax credits.

General Telephone Customer Policy

General Telephone's customer policy explained, Paul Farrar, Perryton Customer Service Manager for General Telephone, today explained the company's deposit policy as "a protection of revenues" and an obligation the company has to customers. He explained that control of bad pay accounts protects the majority of customers who are good credit risks since the cost of uncollectibles evenually becomes a cost of doing business.

Farrar said an applicant is considered a good credit risk when ability and willingness to pay for services are shown.

The service manager said customers requesting service are assigned a

credit classification based on a company investigation. The investigation normally reveals present or previous telephone service and record of payments. Business applicants usually indicate the type of organization, years in business and product or services offered. Residential customers provided information concerning employment including both husband and wife where applicable. He added that some deposits on file are required because the applicant has not had previous telephone service, has not had previous credit experience, employment is seasonal or temporary, applicant is new on the job, or is unable to give references.

He said the company basically has five credit classifications. The first is assigned to an account when special treatment is desired. This includes government offices, large business, community offices such as chambers of commerce and hospitals. The second class is assigned to good paying customers.

The third class includes applicants whose credit records reverl inability or unwillingness to pay regularly, insufficient information to assign a classification or no investigation can be made.

The fourth class is assigned to high risk accounts. Some accounts in this group receive semimonthly billing in addition to the deposit requirement.
In addition, there is a fifth class established by a policy that is of particular interest around election time. It is the policy issued in 1971 by the Federal Communica-

Local Families Heavily Insured

A sign of the times, for the average Hansford Co-unty family, is the ex-tent to which it has pro-tected itself against the economic uncertainties

cected itsen against the conomic uncertainties of the day,
It has health insurance, accident insurance, unemployment insurance, social security and life insurance, to mention the major safeguards.

Backing these up are such assets as private pension

plans, savings and equity in real estate.

With respect to its life insurance protection, it is more heavily covered at the present time than it has ever been. Over the past ten years the average local family has doubled its holdings, the figures indicate.

This is so despite the fact that 1975 was a nogrowth year generally, as far as sales of life insurance were concerned. It was the first time in 25 years that there was virtually no gain, Economic conditions are cited as the cause.

Nevertheless, there is a tremendous amount of insurance in force in the United States - \$2 trillion, according to the Institute of Life Insurance.

On the basis of its findings, it is estimated that residents of Hansford County are now insured to the tune of approximately \$84, 324, 000, an all-time high.

Throughout the State of Texas, the total in force is placed at \$111, 534 million. Ten years before, by way of comparison it was \$39, 421 million.

And this, it is noted, is exclusive of insurance provided for veterans and others by the Federal government.

others by the Federal government.

In terms of the individual family, the extent of its coverage is almost directly proportional to its income, the figures show. In general, the more a family eams the more insurance it has.

The average family in the state carries an amount of insurance that is equal to about 25.1 months of its net income, after taxes.

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



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
