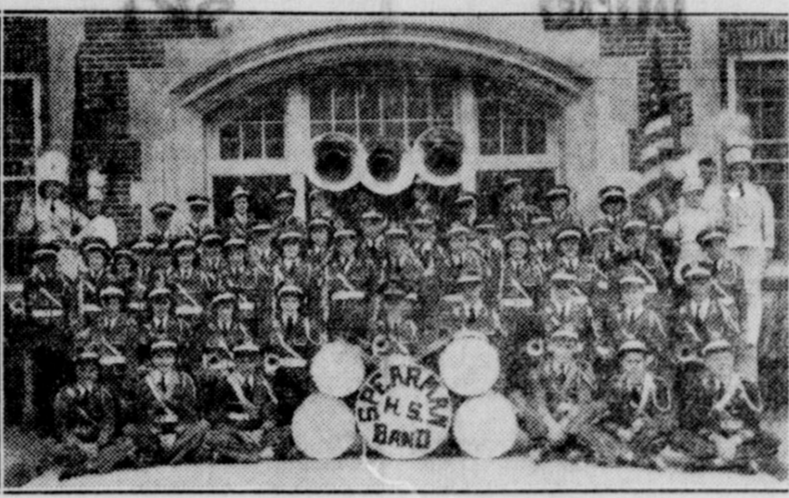

I. BILL OF RIGHTS

The so called G. I. Bill of Rights, now under consideration by the House of Representatives, and already passed by the Senate, appears to be the most practical solution of the war problems for returning soldiers. This legislation is not the typical raid on the treasurer of the nation. It is a well balanced program that takes care of all the soldiers, regardless of their status. The bill was suggested by the national organizations of the ex-service men and provides for education for returning service people. A copy of the bill is in the hands of the local editor, having been sent him by our congressman Eugene Worley. In addition to provide education for returning service men, who are to be paid \$50.00 to \$75.00 per month while completing their education, the bill provides for loans to be made ex-service people to build homes, to improve homes, to buy farms, to improve farms, to buy farm machinery, to purchase their business machinery and equipment other than farms. The provisions as passed by the senate provides for one year of interest and 3 per cent interest on loans after the first year, with a long time amortization plan for liquidating of the indebtedness. Surely this should satisfy the people who are trying to work their heads off about our boys and not giving enough attention to winning the war.

II. WE WILL TAKE CARE OF THEMSELVES

It is amusing at the mad scramble to do something for the returning soldiers. As a matter of fact, the returning soldiers will take over this government and the main part of the business when they have returned and had time to adjust themselves. This is true because it is logical. In the first place the potential as well as literal leaders of the country are now in the armed services. Naturally, when you take the cream of the manpower between the ages of 18 and 38 years, you have the people who will run the government and the business during the next decade. So we older people that are spouting off at the mouth and broadcasting every conceivable scheme that we can think of for the boys when they return, will live to learn that they will outline their own program, when they have WON THE WAR. I venture to say that a liberal per cent of the wealth of the nation is now represented in the armed forces of the nation. We know that a large per cent of the trained personnel and outstanding personalities of the nation is in the services. So why not forget the boys until we have won the war.

HOW COULD WE BE DEFEATED?

A radio comment from both army and navy leaders tell us that the only way we can fail to win this war is for the people at home to get cross-wise with our armed personnel. In other words, if we begin to dig too deep into politics and start in demanding this privilege and that, and continue the program of passive resistance to the government regulations—Bureaucratic or not—we can lose this war. I believe this writer has suffered as many disappointments and hardships as results of some of the full regulations that are plastered on the public as the average man. We civilians are in a dig up thousands of disagreeable mistakes that have been and are being made by the Bureaucratic government... but I believe... we are winning the war... and we can KICK OUT WHO EVER WE WANT TO after the war is won. Army men offer a great deal from mistakes that are made by the government. They KNOW that this is not the time to make changes in the leadership of the nation... even if the leadership was a great deal more inefficient that it is. If you as an individual feel that it is an easy job to take a peaceful nation and build it into a war machine that competes with foreign nations who have studied war and fought wars for several generations, then you are mistaken. When you are one to demand all the privileges that you are really entitled to, just bear in mind that your son, brother, father or buddies in the fox holes can't have 'em... and he is enduring more discomfort than you are. Let's all get behind the government, and carry the war to a successful finish without standing on personnel privileges, and without making too much fuss about errors that are bound to be made at the pace we live in this day and time.

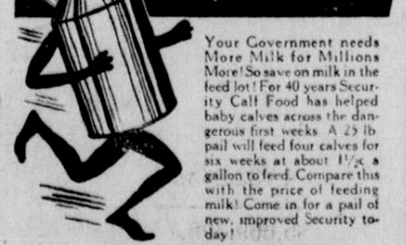

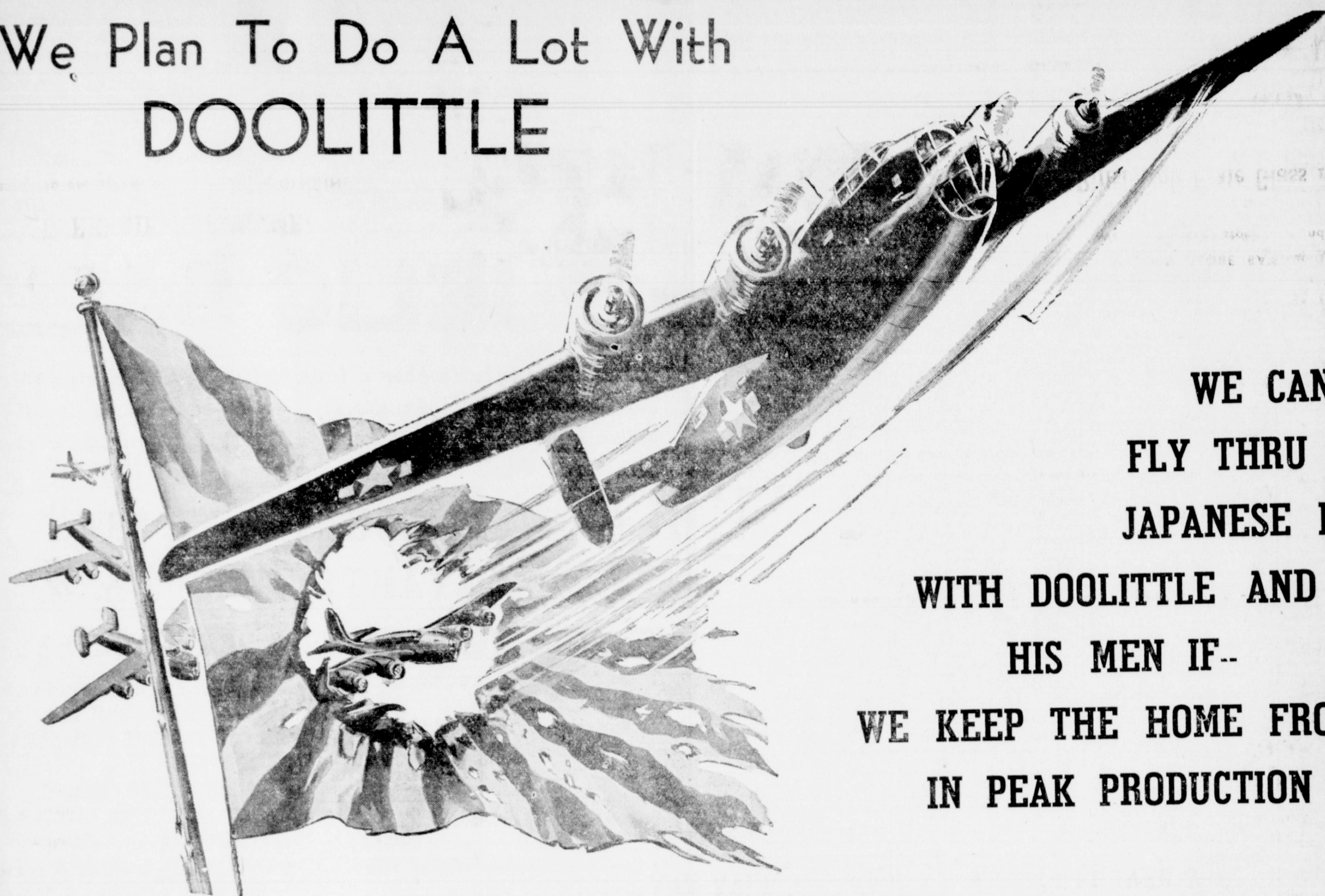

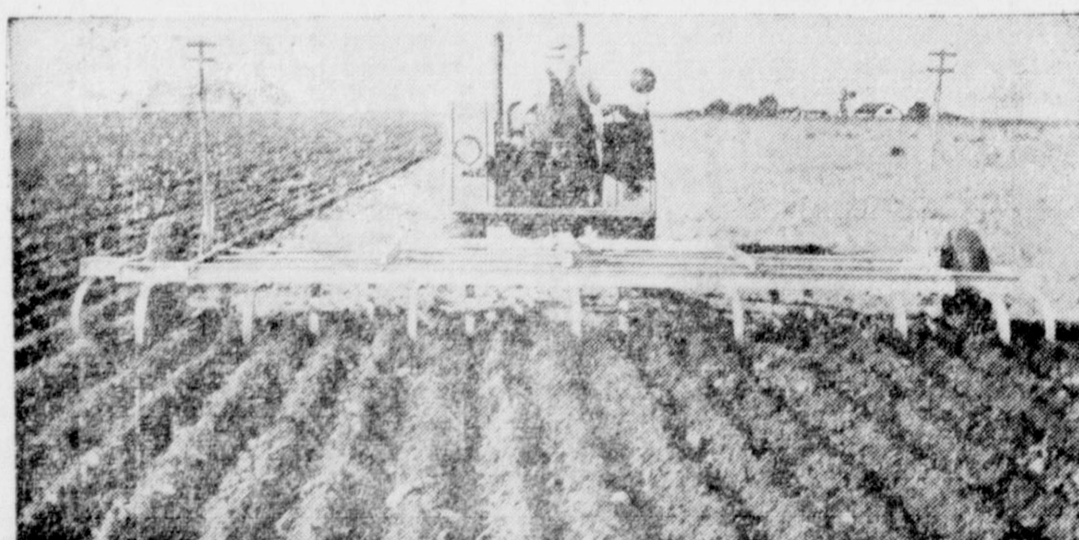
