







### Democratic Convention Split Is Fight To Get More Power At Chicago

The split at the State Democratic Convention at Austin Tuesday, May 23, has been emphasized in the Associated Press dispatches items concerning the Panhandle will be emphasized more in this review of the Austin proceedings.

The regular convention drove what seems a hard bargain to have some power at the National convention at Chicago beginning July 19.

The Democrats want the National convention to return to the two thirds rule instead of a majority to nominate a president and vice president. They want the support of the North to keep the primary a white man's party in the South.

They want to have a part in the nomination of a vice president, as they are convinced that President Roosevelt will be renominated if he wishes to accept the nomination for a fourth term.

#### Wallace Not Popular

Although Texans did not endorse Speaker Sam Rayburn for vice president, it is believed they have no objection to him. Many convention delegates are bitterly opposed to Vice President Henry A. Wallace and do not want him for a running mate with the presidential nominee.

Most delegates are opposed to the presidential electors not voting in the electoral college, despite the resolutions passed at the Austin convention.

Myron G. Blalock, national committeeman, was elected by both groups and he has stated that he hopes to get the two factions together by the time the convention meets at Chicago.

Delegates elected to the Chicago convention were: Charles C. Gibson of Amarillo, member of the state executive committee from the 31st Senatorial district, and J. E. King, Memphis, a former committeeman of the district.

Mrs. Clifford Braly of Pampa, committeewoman from the 31st district, and H. G. Hamrick of Amarillo, living in Austin as a member of the State Industrial Accident Board, were named Alternates.

David M. Warren of Panhandle was the only person from the 18th congressional district to be elected a delegate at large. It was generally understood that R. D. Holt of Wheeler will be the first proxy if any of these five persons cannot attend the convention.

T. S. Jones, Canadian rancher, was named to represent the 18th congressional district in the electoral college.

Members serving on state committees were: Warren, nomination of delegates and alternates; resolutions, T. S. Jones; permanent organization, Mrs. Oma Link Rowley, Amarillo; credentials, Hamrick.

Gibson was given authority to appoint these committee members

and presided at the congressional caucus.

### Convention Sidelights

Among those at the convention were: Fred Brandt, Spearman; H. C. Coffey, W. J. Smith and Ruel Smith, Pampa; L. A. Manzer and John Purvear, Wellington; J. Ross Ball, Childress; J. M. Oakes and R. D. Chase, Amarillo; J. L. Briggs, Borger. These were there in addition to those previously mentioned.

Fred Brandt of Spearman traveled the farthest from Northwest Texas to attend the convention.

Lee Satterwhite of Austin, who formerly owned the Panhandle Herald and who recently announced for lieutenant governor, is well pleased at the progress his campaign is making. He hopes to make a visit to the Panhandle in a short time. He has asked Asbery A. Callaghan of Panhandle to spend the last four or five weeks of the campaign in the Austin office, if it is possible. Callaghan wrote him that it seemed he could not accept the invitation because of the heavy farm loan payments at that season of the year.

J. M. Oakes, veteran clerk of the seventh court of civil appeals, Amarillo, was a guest of A. J. Folley, former justice, who is now on the commission to the supreme court. Folley has been in Austin about six months and is enjoying his new work.

Col. Ernest O. Thompson, member of the railroad commission, was at the convention at the hotel greeting his many friends. He sat with the 18th district delegates.

J. L. Briggs, Borger, Hutchinson County chairman, took advantage of the convention to visit his daughter, who lives at Austin.

C. C. Gibson, district committeeman, was chairman of the committee to recommend the temporary organization of the convention.

Gibson invited several of the delegates from the district to the state executive committee dinner Monday evening before the convention. Gov. Coke Stevenson was the principal guest. Other honored guests were Chairman and Mrs. Blalock.

## THINGS TO CHECK

--before calling a refrigerator serviceman

Sometimes a service call can be avoided if a few simple checks are made first. With servicemen extra busy these days, each owner can be of extreme help, under present wartime conditions, by avoiding unnecessary calls which use up precious time, tires and gasoline. If trouble develops, check these things:



#### IF REFRIGERATOR UNIT DOES NOT RUN:

- 1 Check to see if plug is making contact in wall outlet.
- 2 If plug is in outlet, check outlet with light cord and bulb to see if current is on.
- 3 If current is not on at outlet, check for blown fuse in house-fuse panel or block.

#### IF MECHANISM RUNS TOO MUCH:

- 1 Make sure door seal is tight.
- 2 Clean the condenser.
- 3 Temperature control may be set for too cold a temperature.

#### IF MECHANISM RUNS... but there is little or no refrigeration:

- 1 Stop mechanism by turning off switch or removing wall plug.
- 2 Allow all frost to be melted off cooling unit.
- 3 Start once more and see if cooling unit gets cold.

#### IF IT TAKES TOO LONG TO MAKE ICE:

- 1 Check temperature control. It may be set on warm position.
- 2 If in wintertime and refrigerator is in cold location, it may not operate long enough to make ice.

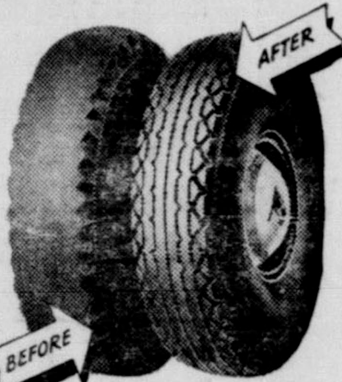
