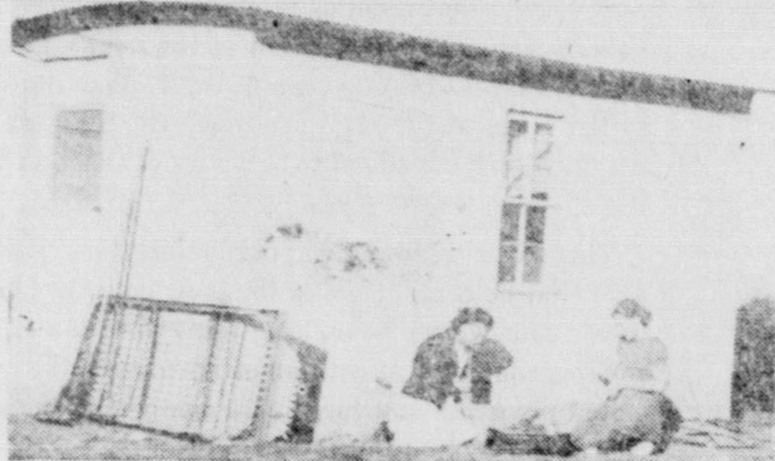

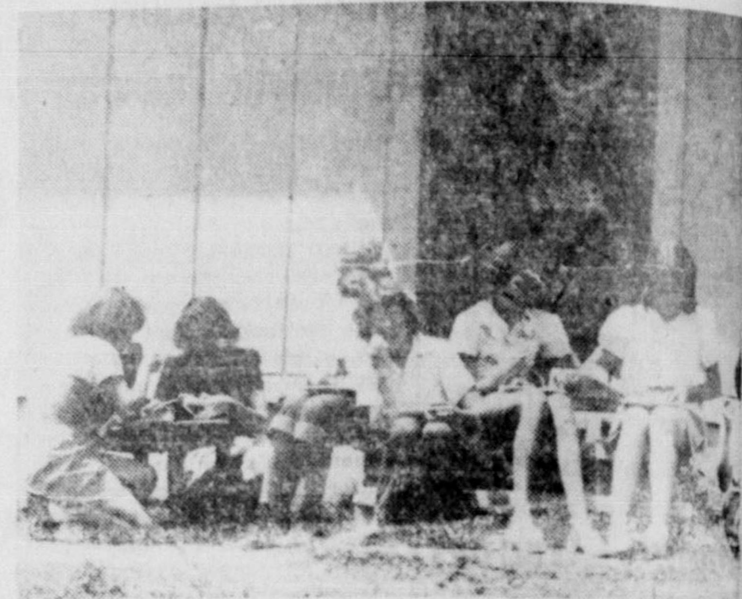

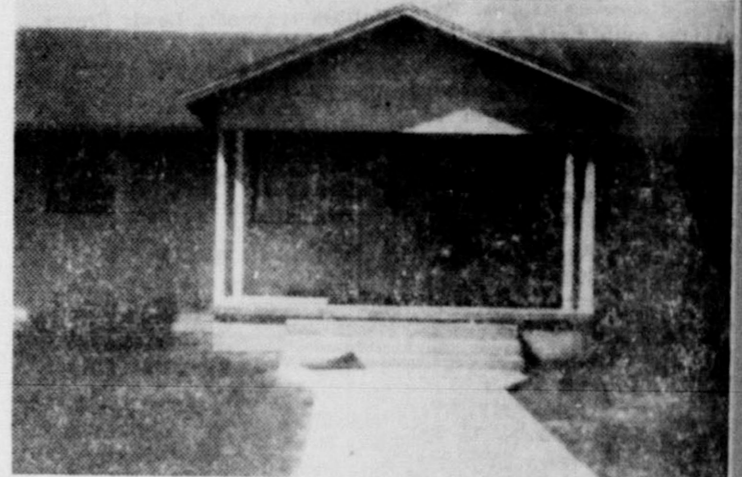

Bike Regulations For Youths Urged To Make Future Drivers Safety Conscious

Thousands of youngsters take to their bicycles every year, swelling the ranks of America's cyclists to well over 9,000,000. On the basis of past records it seems tragically certain that unless measures are taken for their protection more than 25,000 cycling youngsters will be killed or injured—some of them crippled for life—in the coming yr.

The responsibility for the chaotic state of bicycle traffic does not rest on any single agent, nor can it be shifted about from one set of shoulders to another. The responsibility is ours, parents, teachers, motorists, and the power too, is ours to eliminate these accidents. Legislation and education are the weapons by which this war against tragedy must be waged.

Too many drivers automatically label the boy or girl behind the handlebars a nuisance, with no rights on the streets. Thoughtless motorists tend to consider the highways their own private domain, and would deprive bicycle operators of the rights and courtesies to which they are fairly entitled.

Many cyclists, too, consider themselves privileged characters, entitled to ride on the wrong side of the street, to zigzag in and out of traffic, to violate traffic lights and to ride on the highways at night without adequate lights.

Today's careful cyclist is tomorrow's safe driver; and, conversely, today's ill-informed, irresponsible bicycle operator is today's or tomorrow's casualty.

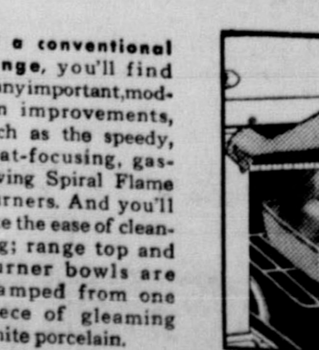

Hot-Machine Drinks

Soon to be introduced is a refrigerated coin-vending machine that dispenses six kinds of chilled fruit and vegetable drinks for 10 cents a can. The machine holds 50 six-ounce cans in each of its six racks, 300 cans in all. The customer inserts a dime in the coin chute, presses a button under the flavor he wants and a can of juice is delivered to his hand. On one side of the machine a knife-type can opener kept at 100 degrees for sanitation makes a clean incision in the can top just big enough to admit a straw. These vending machines will be installed at industrial plants, bus terminals, airline and airway waiting rooms and recreation centers.

Landing Gear for Planes

Aircraft ground loops may be eliminated almost entirely within the next 5 to 10 years with the so-called castor landing gear developed under sponsorship of Civil Aeronautics Administration, it is predicted by Marshall E. Beeman. The wheels of the landing gear, instead of being in the usual fixed position, are allowed to swivel from side to side in an arc of 70 degrees. The tension is such that the wheels stay straight until any abnormal stress is placed on the landing gear. First planes equipped with an approved castor wheel landing gear are expected to appear this year.

Court Orders Hearing For Bond Election

Petitions were presented the Commissioner's court Tuesday morning of this week signed by qualified voters from precinct No. 4 asking for an election to vote a bond issue of \$200,000.00 for the precinct.

Commissioners of the county gave assurance from the state highway department that a 19 mile road extending from Morse to Gruver and 3 miles East from Gruver to connect with the 282 highway via Gruver Cemetery road, will be built if the precinct votes the bonds and contributes the share necessary for the state to assume the responsibility to build the highway.

As result of the petitions presented Tuesday the court has ordered a public hearing to be held

Friday May 13th. A legal notice governing the hearing is published in this issue of the paper.

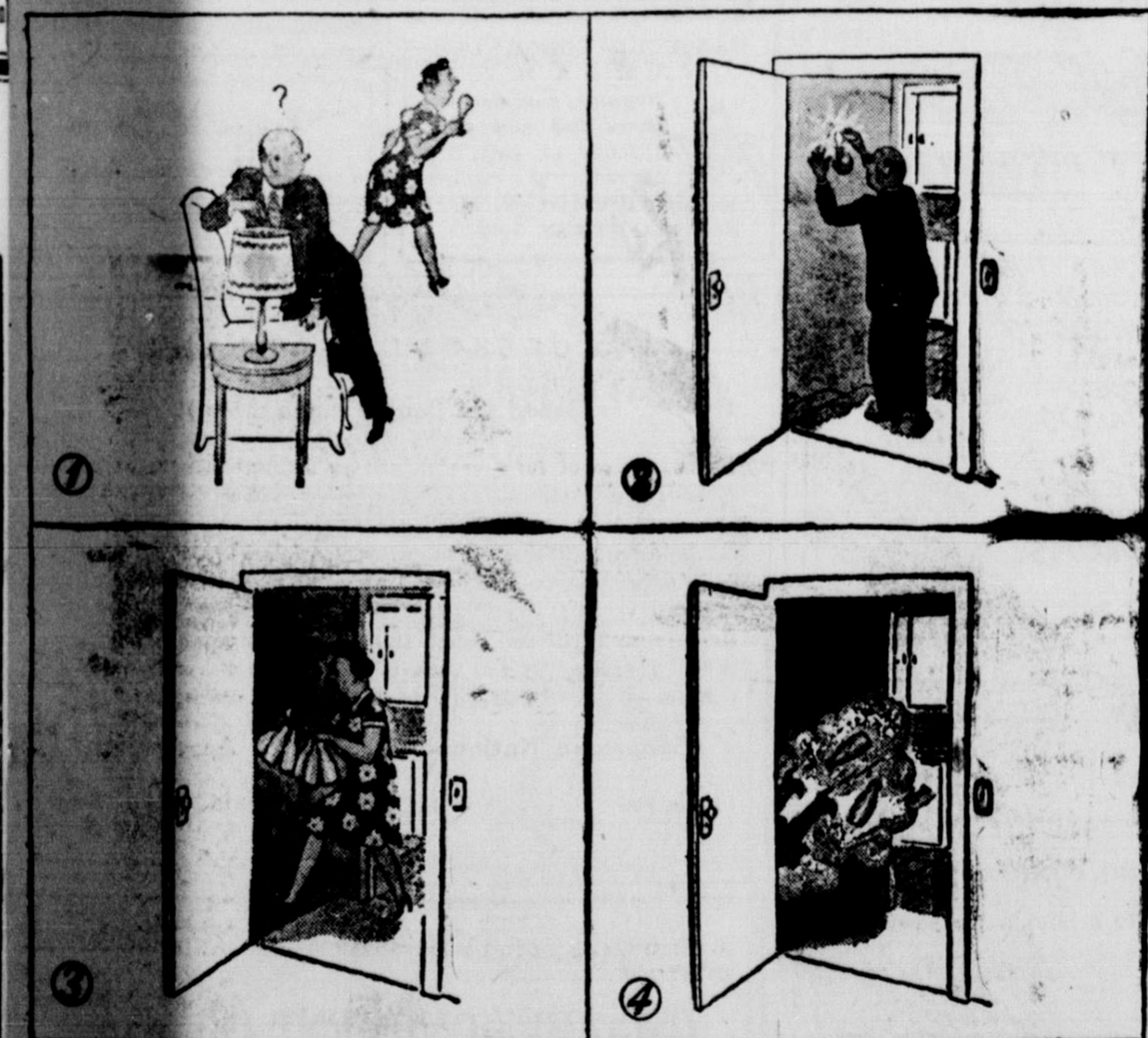

Said notice shall also be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the district if a newspaper is published therein, one time, and at least five days prior to such hearing. If no newspaper is published in such district then such notice shall be published in some newspaper in the county if there be one. The duties herein imposed on the Clerk may be performed by the clerk in person or by a deputy. 5. Said hearing shall be conducted under the provisions of Chap. 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the Thirty Ninth Legislature.

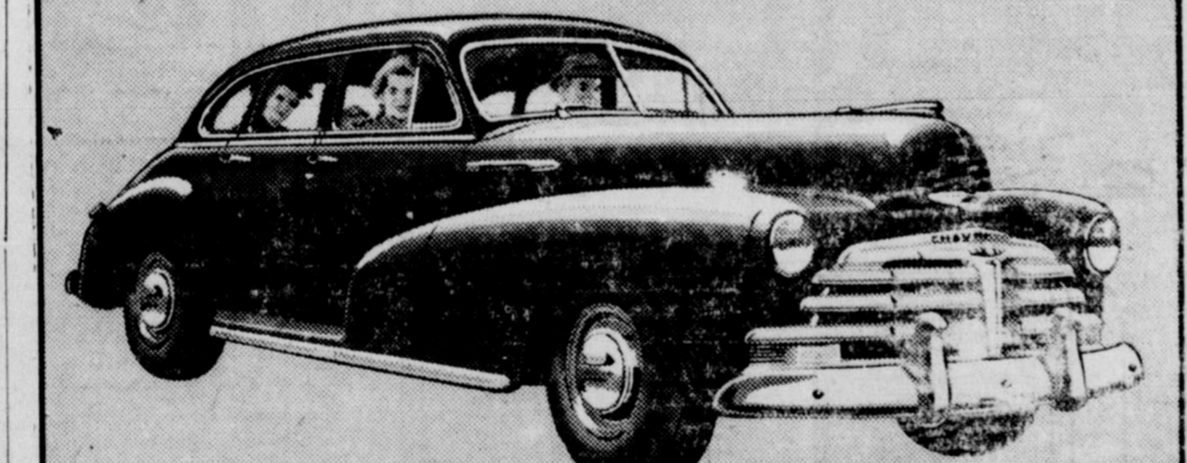
