Rains soak Hansford

Instead of a heavy, drifting snow, Hansford County grain growers last week got warm spring like rains up to 3 inches in some areas—boosting prospects for both dryland and irrigated wheat.

The rain also thawed frozen fields, raising sub-surface temperatures from 30 degrees or less to as high as 40 degrees.

While the moisture was beneficial and warmed up the ground, farmers report that the rains stopped land preparation for corn and milo plantings.

Corn will be planted in Hansford County in a month to 6 weeks. The planting season for Milo is in April and May.

Farmers reported from 1.50 inches to 3 inches late Wednesday and early Thursday. Other moisture fell over the weekend including some snow on Saturday.

This rain was a free watering for wheat most farmers stated. Farmers note that the unseasonable rains, just like those in April or May will give grain growers a break from starting irrigation motors which have been turned off all winter.

Normally irrigation farmers begin cranking up irrigation systems in late February or early March to water wheat and prepare for planting feed grain.

With the rains last week, farm and ranch land in the county is saturated with moisture from a depth of 14 inches, to as much as 4 feet in parts of the county.

Agriculture experts believe the rain last week will carry the wheat crop till late April without an irrigation and greatly help summer crops such as corn, grain sorghum, and soybeans.

This time of year, normally our driest, is when farmers in Hansford County get ready for spring crops. But a good rain now is just hard to beat. Hansford County farmers are comparing the moisture reserve in the ground to those experienced during the winter of 1982-83 when some Panhandle counties recorded 50 inches of snow.

The outlook right now is probably as good as we have ever had farmers say. Many don't remember things looking any better the last of February.

Seed, chemical, fertilizer, and feed representatives will be there to answer any specific questions that the farmer would have about the 1985 crop. Remember, if you are involved in agriculture you are invited to attend.

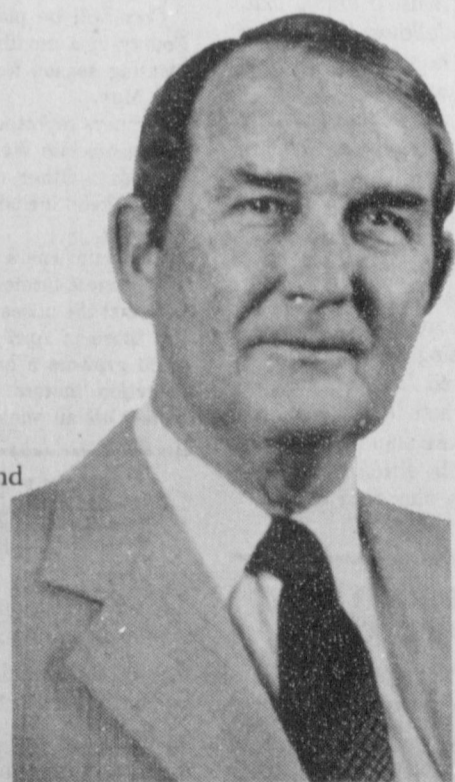

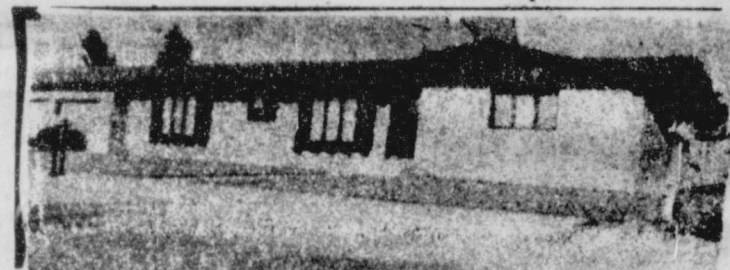

Yvonda Pipkin Stokes to serve as chairman

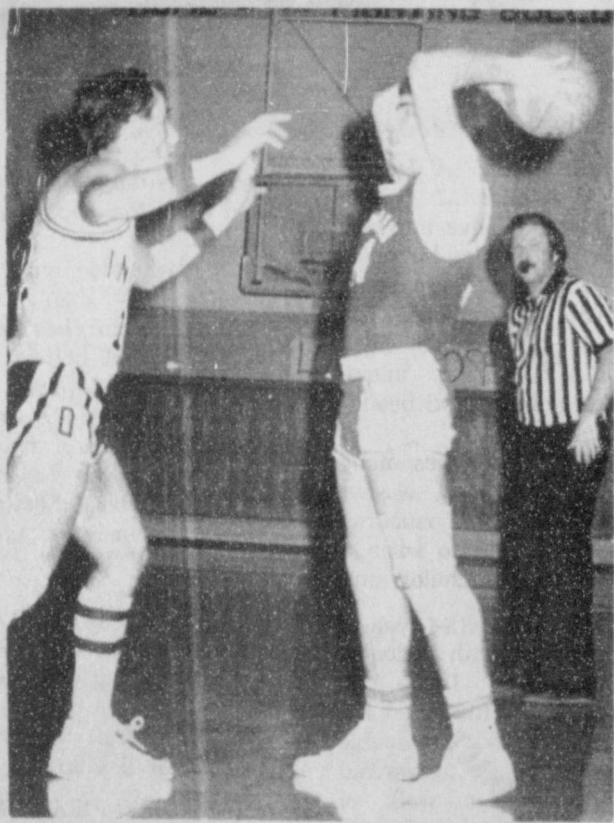

New information on Reye Syndrome

In the midst of the flu season, important new information has become available about the development -- in teens and children with flu -- of Reye syndrome, a rare but serious condition that kills 20 to 30 percent of its young victims and leaves many survivors brain-damaged.

The new information comes from a U.S. Public Health Service pilot study of a possible link seen in four earlier state studies between the use of aspirin in treating flu or chicken pox and an increased risk of Reye syndrome.

The Institute of Medicine of the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control will continue the study through next winter, the Institute of Medicine advised that the federal government not wait to inform and protect the public.

As a result, Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret M. Heckler has asked manufacturers to remove any recommended use in flu and chicken pox from aspirin-containing products aimed at children -- and to add a warning to all

aspirin-containing products against use for flu and chicken pox in children and teens.

The pilot study looked at the histories of drug treatments and other factors of 29 young people who got Reye syndrome last year. Use of aspirin for flu or chicken pox symptoms was the common thread shown in 28 of the 29 (whereas ordinarily less than half the young people with flu or chicken pox would be expected to take aspirin.)

U. S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, M.D., has said that most childhood illnesses are self-limiting and usually don't require any medication at all. Doctors often suggest that a child with fever simply be made comfortable with cool compresses.

Of course, physicians continue to find aspirin useful and safe for adult, teen and childhood arthritis and other conditions.

Reye syndrome is a rare condition -- a few hundred cases a year. It was named in 1963 for an Australian pathologist who described it as a swelling of the brain, combined with liver malfunction

and blood chemistry disorders leading in most cases to death.

Improved recognition and early treatment of the disease has helped reduce the death rate, but still about one out of four reported cases are fatal.

It is crucial to take action quickly if Reye's symptoms occur -- whether or not aspirin or an aspirin-containing product has been used. The first sign is generally persistent vomiting. The young person may be sleepy and lethargic, but still responsive. Within half a day, he or she can become disoriented, combative and delirious.

Untreated, the teenager or child can go into a coma and die.

Thus, Reye is a medical emergency. A child with Reye syndrome symptoms must be taken immediately to a hospital, where blood and body fluids can be monitored and a respirator used if breathing fails. Surgery may be needed, in some cases, to relieve pressure on the swollen brain. Therefore, act promptly if you suspect Reye syndrome.

Treasury Tax Plan Questioned By Boulter

At a hearing of the House Budget Committee today, new Treasury Secretary James Baker agreed to meet with Congressman Beau Boulter (R13) and a group of his constituents, to discuss the effect of the Treasury Department's tax plan on the oil and gas industry.

"Throughout the course of the hearing," Boulter explained, "Secretary Baker had made clear that he was interested in a viable domestic energy industry. So, I asked him to meet with some oil and gas producers to have them explain what his Department's tax plan would do to that industry, and he agreed to meet. We've held the

same type of meeting with under-secretaries at Treasury and Energy. They were good, productive exchanges, and I hope to do the same thing with Secretary Baker."

In previous meetings, arranged by Boulter, representatives of the oil and gas industry met with officials from the Departments of Treasury and Energy, as well as several other members of the House and Senate, to discuss the tax plan provision that would repeal the expansion of intangible drilling costs. "The first set of meetings," Boulter stated, "provided the industry folks the chance to explain that the tax plan would be a real blow to independent drillers. We made our point with

them, and I will continue in my efforts to abolish that provision."

Boulter also used the budget hearing to request assurances from Secretary Baker that the current plight of farmers will be recognized by the Administration and, as Boulter suggested, that "long term solutions, not drastic changes, must be the objective." Baker voiced Administration support for a move toward an open market.

Boulter, who agreed with the open market policy in principle, reiterated his concern that "no permanent damage" be done to "good, productive farmers who are going through a bad time."

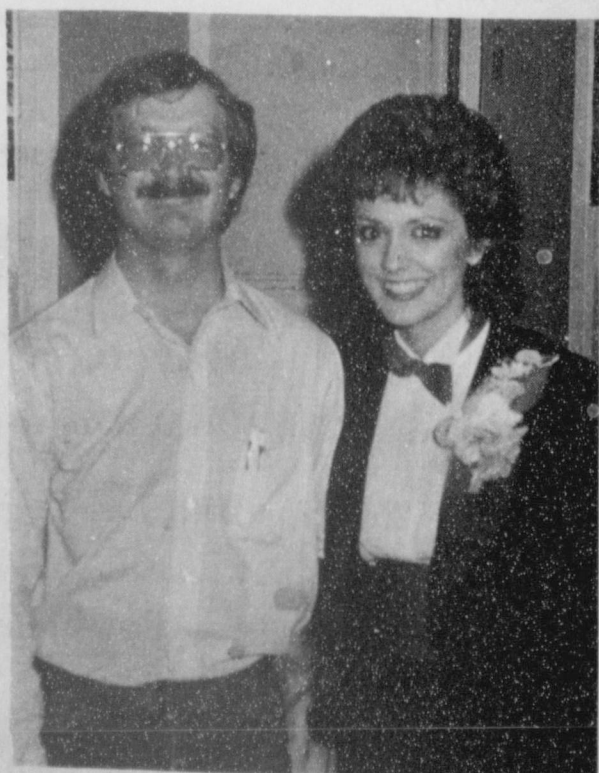
Survivors include her husband; a son, Elbre of Spearman; and a sister, Gracie Buchanan of Fort Worth.

The season's not quite ready yet, but if you look closely, you'll spy the ever-eager gardener, lurking about the plot, picking up bits of winter debris, and peering anxiously at the soil. Most likely it's healthy — the soil, as well as the activity — but experts say even the best garden loam can lack certain nutrients. Looking won't tell you much. Try testing instead.

To avoid planting in the dark — figuratively, unless you use the old "full moon" theory of the Farmers' Almanac, get a soil sampling and either take it off for testing or do it yourself. Garden centers and plant shops have several different kinds of kits to help you discover what's in your soil, and what's not. If you decide to let the pros have a go at diagnosis, look in the phone book under "county agent," "extension service" (can be a University listing) or governmental agricultural center. Call around and you'll locate the right person(s) to test your soil — either free or at very low cost. You can help them by taking a correct sample.

The experts prefer a sampling from 5 or 6 points in the garden plot. Use a spade free of other soil, and dig a scattered pattern. Go for a slice about an inch thick, six or seven inches deep. Put these in a clean pail and mix. Take out a pint or so for testing, bag it and label with date and pertinent location. Avoid touching sample with hands or tools.

Hopefully, the soil you have tested will show need for only a minimal amount of added nutrients. A quick refresher course on these — every plant requires 16 nutrients to flourish. Amounts required vary from plant to plant, and four of them — oxygen, hydrogen, carbon and chlorine — come from air. Lack of the remaining dozen can cause garden problems — and their absence shows up in poor and sickly plants. It's one of the miracles of the plant world that the lack of nutrients causes the same results regardless of area or climate. Another nice point — the same experts that analyze the soil can come up with the exact right formula to improve it. In most cases, a dressing of a good commercial fertilizer will make it right.

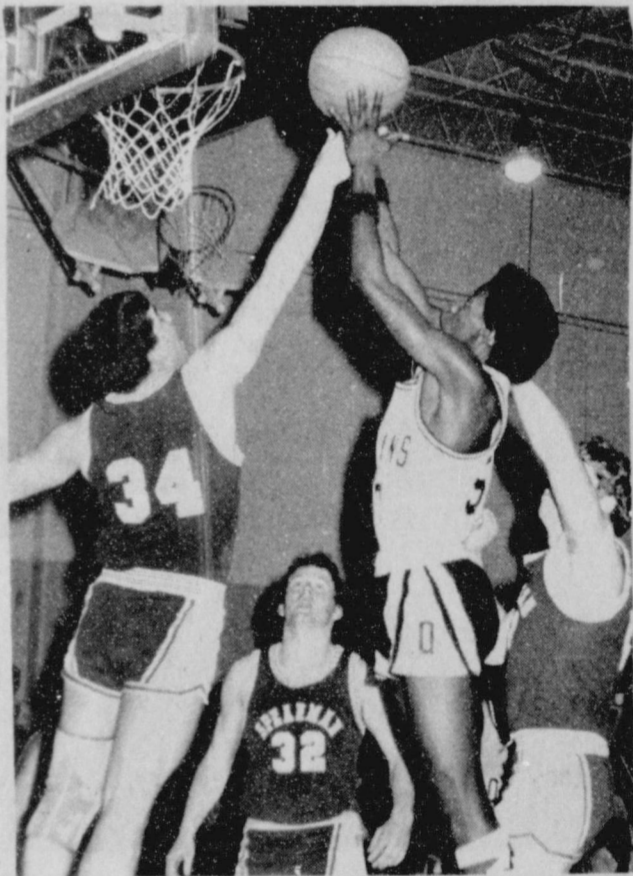

Hansford ACS Holds Meeting

Members of the Hansford Unit of the American Cancer Society held a noon meeting at the B & B Hospitality Room with the Spearman group serving delectable pizza and cheese cake prior to the business meeting which was conducted by Mrs. Clementine Renner in the absence of the president, Mrs. Mozelle McClellan.

Highlighting the meet were excerpts from the recent editorial "Who Is Getting Rich Off 'Cancer?'" by the well-known syndicated columnist Sylvia Porter. Following is the editorial as it appeared in the most recent copy of "Cancer News".

The American Cancer Society, funded solely by private contributions, leads the voluntary organizations in the field of cancer research and control.

The ACS has 58 Divisions and nearly 3,100 Units nationwide.

Entering the cancer field in burgeoning numbers—to take advantage of the American peoples' generosity and concern—are entrepreneurs whose objectives are suspect.

Do not mistake one group for another. Just because a group calls itself "American" or "National" doesn't guarantee it is more than a local two-person operation with a mailing list. Nor does it mean the operation has any official standing.

It is no accident that groups such as the "American Institute for Cancer Research" and the "National Foundation for Cancer Research" are headquartered in the Washington, D.C., area. It doesn't repel potential contributors to these organizations if by name and location they appear to be linked to the government's National Institutes of Health and the National Cancer Institute.

"The American Institute for Cancer Research"

In 1983, the American Institute for Cancer Research mailed more than ten million people a "Census on Diet and Breast Cancer," as a "public service," asking questions about how much bacon, bologna, coffee and other foods they consumed, as well as about their smoking and drinking habits.

The "census" included an appeal for funds for research into the link between diet and breast cancer, and a promise that contributors would receive a "free analysis of the good things you are eating that may help prevent cancer."

It did not mention that AICR was created in 1982, by two professional fund-raisers, whose private firm was then hired by AICR to raise its money.

Nor did it mention that roughly 75 percent of the first \$1.2 million so raised would be spent on a second barrage of appeals, which have continued into 1984.

To date, the AICR has not reported the results of its "census," which could have little, if any, scientific value.

AICR's activities had initially fallen short of standards established by two major watchdog agencies: the National Charities Information Bureau and the Philanthropic Advisory Service of the Council of Better Business Bureaus (CBBB).

These standards require "reasonable" fund-raising expenses and impose strict rules on conflicts of interest and accuracy of solicitation materials.

In at least two states, AICR had not registered with the appropriate state agencies and had been raising funds illegally.

To its credit—and to avoid disciplinary action by government regulatory agencies—AICR is apparently attempting to change its operations. However, until there is complete disclosure of its finances, it can't be claimed that it has rectified its practices.

"The National Foundation for Cancer Research"—Is it a business?

The National Foundation for Cancer Research, founded in 1974 to research cancer and nutrition-related theories, raises about \$15 million annually, mostly by direct mail, and has received negative evaluations from both watchdog agencies. NFCR sued the CBBB for libel and lost. The court ruled that evaluations and opinions about charitable organizations are not actionable.

The National Charities Information Bureau says that the group is a "family affair," with the executive director, his wife and a son all on the payroll.

The NFCR has appealed its case to the Supreme Court and has stopped providing financial or other information on its activities to the agencies. It contends that it is not a charity but a business, and hence should be rated by Dun & Bradstreet.

"Project Cure"—a lobby

Project Cure is another new group actively soliciting funds "for cancer research."

Its mailings include "notarized" forms to send to your congressman and senator petitioning a full-scale investigation into what the group says is the medical "establishment and their refusal to use proven nutritional treatments to prevent and control cancer."

Project Cure which is not a charity, but a lobbying group, uses the same direct mail fund-raising firm used by AICR. Contributions to it aren't tax-deductible.

Also, despite Project Cure's Washington, D.C., mailing address, all three of its principals reside in Connecticut. □

It was noted by those present that only this past week there had been communications from the "National Foundation for Cancer Research" with a plea for donations — this, among other recent mailings just as dangerous.

At the noon meet plans were made for the 1985 American Cancer Society Crusade with the next meeting to be held at noon March 28th at the B & B Hospitality Room to compile the Crusade packets for the Neighborhood Workers. Plans were also discussed for a Kick-Off Coffee to be held in Gruver and Spearman to mark the beginning of the April Crusade in Hansford County.
