The video scenes were taken from television videos of punk rock music being shown on the Houston channels. ''Money is the reason these are on the air'', Warren


"A Houston newspaper stated some station received as many as 12 million new subscribers when they switched to punk rock music."


He completed requirements for his Masters Degree in 1959. In 1968 he was selected for

Krick, Inc. of Texas, 748 Vella Road, Palm Springs, California 92264, has filed an application with the Texas Department of Water Resources for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.

2. Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas has a valid Texas weather modification license that was issued in 1972 and renewed each subsequent year, most

recently on October 9, 1984.

3. The purpose of the weather operation is to increase rainfall to affect and benefit rangeland and agricultural interests of the client. The period of the permit is for one year from about March 1, 1985, with options for continuation of the program during similar periods beginning March 1, of 1986, 1987, and 1988.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Hitch Agri-Business, Inc., P.O. Box 1308, Guymon, Oklahoma 73942, for the Hitch Ranch area in Texas County, Oklahoma.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described by the Texas counties of Dallam, Hansford, Moore, Ochiltree and Sherman, and the Oklahoma counties of Cimarron and Texas.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as that portion of Texas County, Oklahoma that is within the rectangular area bounded on the east by a 12 mile north-south line which extends from the State line through Hitchland, Oklahoma to State Highway No. 3, then to a point 7 miles west along the highway, then 12 miles due south to the State line,

A.W. Rasor on growers panel

Amarillo--New ideas for improving irrigation efficiency will highlight the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference set for January 17 in Amarillo.

Participants will hear how growers are using surge and LEPA irrigation systems to improve efficiency and cut fuel costs. Exhibits of the improved irrigation equipment will be on hand and shown by manufacturers and area dealers.

The conference will be held at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard, West.

Registration and display of equipment starts at 8:30 a.m. and the program concludes at 3:00 p.m.

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The conference is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Panhandle Economic Program.

A new feature of the conference this year is a discussion by a panel of equipment dealers.

James Mitchell of Wolfforth will discuss the development and use of surge valves and control units. Mitchell who farms and operates Controlled Surge Irrigation, Inc. will also discuss the value of furrow dikes in his farming operation.

Dick Cook, manager of Ulysses Irrigation in Dumas and Stratford will tell how to properly design center pivots for convenient use and maximum efficiency.

Dick Laursen who operates

Southwestern Irrigation Equipment Supply House in Stephenville will discuss nozzle and LEPA packages for center pivots.

Also a highlight of the conference this year will be a discussion of waterissues in Texes by S.M. True of Plainview and President of the Texas Farm Bureau. True is a Hale County farmer who understands the value of irrigation to West Texas growers.

Managing furrow irrigation will be addressed by Jack Musick, a veteran agricultural engineer headquartered at the USDA Research Station at Bushland.

Leon New, Extension agricultural engineer and coordinator of the conference will discuss Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) with center pivots.

The conference will conclude with a trio of High Plains growers who will share their irrigation and soil moisture practices with the audience.

The growers panel is always popular at the conference, say New, and the group this year will be good, too. They are Willie Wieck from Moore County, A.W. Rasor of Gruver, and Tom Dennis of Panhandle.

awarded each fall.







Sanford-Fritch cagers sweep Spearman

FRITCH - When an opponent plays the Sanford-Fritch boys' basketball team, it can't help but notice the big guy wearing No. 24. But as Spearman discovered Tuesday night, the Eagles' 6-8 Ed Cunningham may stand alone, but he doesn't play

The Eagles displayed an aggressive man-to-man defense and held Spearman to three field goals in the critical third quarter to take a 78-45 District 1-2A win before 900 fans - and Arizona State basketball coach Henry Bibby.

The Eagles left halftime with a 32-20 lead, but Cunningham and point guard James Cunningham (no relation) each had four fouls. But despite the foul trouble, the two paced Fritch to an 18-point third quarter, and were the main cogs in Spearman's 3 of 14 shooting effort in that

"We just hit a cold third quarter," said longtime Spearman coach F.G. Crofford, whose team fell to 12-5 overall, and 2-1 in district play. "Our game plan was to be patient, and we kinda got out of that. I told the kids if we could hold Eddie around 30, we might have a chance to win."

Ed Cunningham, one of the most recruited football/basketball athletes in Texas, didn't get his 30 points. The Lynx constantly surrounded the Fritch post with two and three players, but what saddled Cunningham even more was his fourth five seconds to play in the first

Curringham did tie for the game's ng guard Ross Donahue, both of whom had 20 points. But it wasn't a spectacular

20 as Cunningham was just 4 of 14 from the the playoffs." free-throw line.

"It does get old having all those players around you, but that's just part of it," said Cunningham, who's scored 35 or more points in an eight-game span earlier this season. "I got the four fouls, and I just couldn't play my game. But we've got a lot of other good ballplayers who can play the

The Fritch record proves Cunningham true as the Eagles are now 20-0 overall, and 3-0 in district play

What frustrated Spearman as much as Cunningham was the outside shooting of forwards Jeff Hatfield and Sean Rich. Add the point-guard play of James Cunningham and the defense of Kevin McIntire and Fritch proves it's not a one-dimensional

Hatfield scored 18 points while Rich, who missed a month of the season from an illness and is just now recovering, added

"If people worry about Eddie all the time, they'll get beat," said Fritch coach Bill Duncan. "We came out in the third quarter and just did a magnificent job of playing defense. That type of thing is what championship teams do.

While the third quarter was the key to Fritch's win, the Eagles took the lead for good with 3:35 left in the first quarter on an Eddie Cunningham three-footer for an 8-7 lead. Spearman's patient offense early kept the score close, but after trailing by 12 at halftime, the Lynx were outscored 12-3 in the first 5:06 of the second half.

"You have to give Coach Crofford some scoring honors with Spearman's hot-shoot- credit for the job he's doing," Duncan said. "Spearman has a very good team, and I wouldn't be surprised to see them in

Another team seemingly headed for the playoffs is the Fritch girls as the Eaglettes survived a 42-38 scare from the Lynxettes. Paced by guard Deanna Shelton's 18 points and Lindy Morgan's 13, the Eag-lettes hit four free throws in the last 1:16 of

the contest to take the four-point win.

The victory improved Fritch to 16-3 overall, and 3-0 in district. Spearman, led by Shannon Jenkins' 15 points, dropped to 15-13 and 0-3 in league play.

The game was a see-saw battle, and Fritch did not take the lead for good until 3:14 remained in the game as Miss She tossed in a running six-footer to give the Eaglettes a 37-35 lead. Spearman had heid the lead the entire first half and didn't trail until 30 seconds were left in the third

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


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
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
