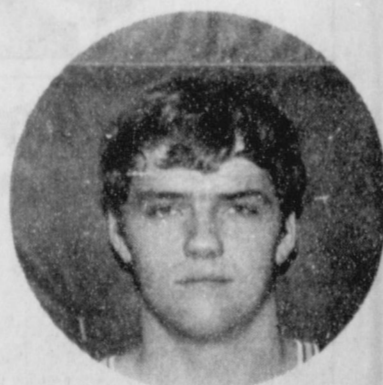

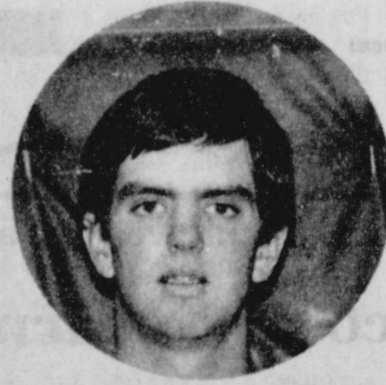

Greyhounds drop heartbreaker!

Gruver loses to Nazareth 45 - 40

The Gruver Greyhounds lost their bid for a state championship trophy to Nazareth in the regional tournament at Texan Dome last Friday. The Swifts beat Gruver 45-40 in what many called the best two class A teams north of Dallas. Actually, the Greyhounds led most of the way. Gruver scored 19 field goals to

Nazareth's 18, but the Swifts managed to keep the Greyhounds off the free throw line. The Swifts were 9 and 11 from the free throw line Friday while Gruver got only two chances at the line, converting both. It was the closest game of the season against a class 1A opponent for the 25-5 Swifts. The game was tied seven times.

Gruver, which ended the season 18-3, jumped to a 10-2 lead as the Greyhounds tight 2-3 zone kept the Swifts on the perimeter.

With a little less than two minutes left in the first quarter, the Swifts cut the lead to 10-7. The Swifts then began hitting most of their points from the far corners.

Nazareth took the lead for the first time, 18-16, on a Randy Leavitt jumper from the lane and ended the half with a 22-20 advantage.

Gruver regained the lead 32-30 by the end of the third quarter. The Greyhounds and Swifts were both magnificent. The game witnessed by many Hansford County basketball fans was in doubt until the last minute.

Kelon Morley led the Greyhounds with 16 points and the Hounds as we said before, were in the lead 32-30 at the end of the third quarter.

Nazareth went ahead to win the regional tournament and felt extremely fortunate to survive the excellent play of the Gruver team.

Basketball fans all agree that Gruver, which ended the season 18-3, could have gone to state had they played as many games as Nazareth. The Swifts have played a total of 30 games this year.

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Board seeks reservoir funding

SPEARMAN — The Palo Duro Water Authority is asking the Texas Water Development Board in Austin to purchase about \$10 million worth of water storage to help build a reservoir at the junction of Horse Creek and Palo Duro River.

Johnnie Lee, PDWA general manager, met with the board during the weekend, and he said Monday what money PDWA would receive if its application is approved is not a grant.

"What they do is buy storage. They could buy as much as \$10 million worth in the reservoir," he said. "You can buy that storage back when you get ready for the water."

Lee said the purpose of having the water board buy storage is to save interest on what amounts to a loan.

"That's what we're trying to do, just save a few interest dollars," he said.

Plans for the project include construction of a 150-foot-high, 4,900-foot-long dam that would create a lake about nine and one-half miles north of Spearman.

The lake would cover about 2,500 acres and hold more than 69,000 acre feet of water. An acre foot is the amount of water required to cover one acre with one foot of water. A pipeline and water treatment plant are part of the project.

An average of about 7.8 million gallons would be pumped daily from the lake to municipalities, about 8,700 acre feet annually, Lee said.

The project could range in cost from as much as \$55 million to less than the \$47 million, Lee said.

The Legislature created Palo Duro Water Authority in 1973. The cities of Dumas, Sunray and Cactus voted Jan. 19 in Moore County along with the city of Stinnett to become members of PDWA.

Ochiltree County may vote soon on whether to join the authority. An earlier petition to conduct a vote in Ochiltree County was put on hold during the January election because it appeared not enough people were interested, Lee said.

But 27 civic leaders and representatives from Perryton, Ochiltree County's seat, have met with Lee and expressed a desire to have an election on joining PDWA.

The PDWA board has not decided on a timetable for the project, Lee said.

Lee said the board probably would have to raise money to build

the pipeline and treatment plant through either bond financing or a guarantee on bonds.

Building just the dam will cost about \$22 million, Lee said, so even if the Water Board buys \$10 million worth of storage, PDWA will still have to raise about \$12 million through a tax revenue bond election.

The application from PDWA will have to be voted on by the Texas water board before any money is distributed, Lee said.

"They do have some money that might be available," he said Monday. "But if this Texas water plan goes through, that would be better for us."

Lee said a plan before the Legislature would guarantee about \$200 million to water authorities interested in building projects. The plan also would guarantee bonds at a lower interest rate, he said.

The PDWA board may delay the project until the Legislature votes on the water plan, Lee said. A state-wide referendum would take place on the plan, probably in November.

But if the Texas water board agrees to buy storage, Lee said, the PDWA probably will go ahead with construction of at least the dam, regardless of action on the water plan.

Sarpalius introduces bill to give cities more DWI money

AUSTIN—Sen. Bill Sarpalius today introduced a bill that will give Texas' cities a bigger slice of fines that result from Driving While Intoxicated convictions.

Sarpalius' measure, Senate Bill 628, will change the current practice of giving counties all proceeds from DWI fines. The new bill will give cities 40 percent of those fines, with counties retaining the other 60 percent.

"We believe this bill will accomplish two things," Sarpalius, D-Canyon, said during a Capitol press conference here. "First, it will allow DWI fines to more accurately reflect the work that goes into the convictions. Cities make the lion's share of initial arrests and do most of the initial paperwork while the counties handle most of the prosecution."

"Secondly, we think this bill will give city police forces more incentive to make DWI arrests. They don't have any real incentive right now, other than their own professionalism. Financially, it's more beneficial for them to make Public Intoxication arrests," he said.

With Sarpalius at the press conference was Ted Willis, executive director of the Texas Municipal League. Willis said S.B. 628 would give a financial boost to most of the state's cities. Marinelle Timmons, state president of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), also attended the press conference to express her organization's support for the measure.

Sarpalius initially considered splitting DWI fines in 1983 when he passed his landmark bill toughening Texas' DWI laws. However, he decided to review the situation after his bill passed before pushing the fine-split concept.

"One look at the DPS' 1983 statistics and I was convinced that something needed to be done," he said. "Cities weren't getting any money, yet they were doing a

whole lot of the work."

The DPSD statistics, he said, indicated that Dallas police make 103 DWI arrests for every one DWI arrest made by the Dallas County Sheriff's Office. The ratio is 16 to one in Fort Worth and 10 to one in Houston.

He also said those same statistics indicate that an unusually high number of Public Intoxication arrests are being made by some police departments.

"We're not saying that some cities are doing anything wrong," Sarpalius said. "We're just saying they could be a little more aggressive in their DWI work. There's one city in Texas where the police department makes six public intoxication arrests for every one DWI arrest. We don't think that's a very good ratio."

Sarpalius also indicated the bill might generate some unexpected benefits for the counties.

"It may take a little money from them at first, but we think it'll give them money in the long run," he said. "The police are going to have an additional incentive to make DWI arrests, which will result in more convictions and more fine money."

Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration

AUSTIN— The Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration in 1986 will be by and for all Texans — even temporary ones! And now, plans have been made to involve a very special group of "temporary" Texans, the Winter Texans from the northern United States who travel south to the Rio Grande Valley for the winter months.

The Winter Texas Sesquicentennial Association is a newly-created organization of such "snowbirds," and has planned some very exciting activities for 1986. The Association was officially sanctioned by the Sesquicentennial Commission on February 13, and is already encouraging Winter Texans to make their "temporary Texan" status more permanent — by seceding from their home cities!

These Winter Texans will give their cities one "out" before breaking the home ties. They will ask their city governments to become affiliated with the sesquicentennial as Texas Independence Communities. If the cities refuse, the Winter Texans will "secede" from their home communities' "negative attitudes" and petition the Governor of Texas to be admitted as Texas citizens. If enough Winter Texans secede, they may organize as a collective Texas Independence Community.

Central to the Association's plans are two caravans which are expected to bring thousands of Winter Texans to the state in the

fall and winter of 1985, one leaving in late October and the other leaving in December. Both will begin at three of the northernmost points in the United States — Emerson, North Dakota; International Falls, Minnesota; and Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. The branches of each caravan will eventually join at the Alamo in San Antonio, and the combined group will continue down to the Rio Grande Valley in Texas.

Any Winter Texan can participate in our caravans," said Rev. Michael Zilligen, Association organizer. "Since many Winter Texans will be traveling the same routes as the caravan, participation is expected to send a strong message to the State of Texas that Winter Texans are indeed an important part of the Lone Star State's celebration."

"This is the first organization of "snowbirds" anywhere, that we know of, and we're very pleased and proud to have them aboard," said Richard Franck, program manager for the Texas 1986 Sesquicentennial Commission. "Since about a half a million Winter Texans come to our state every year, they represent a very significant portion of the Texas population — one that we're glad to be able to involve in the Sesquicentennial."

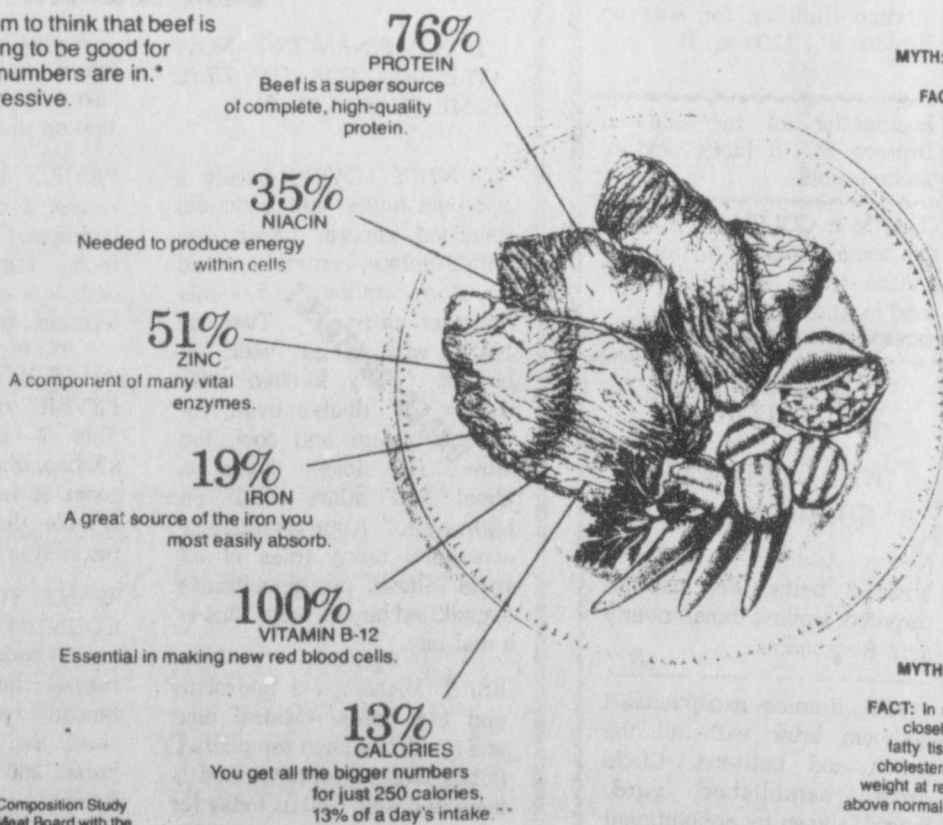

MYTH: Heart disease risk can be reduced by reducing intake of saturated fat and cholesterol.

FACT: The current trend in the scientific literature is away from thinking that reducing heart disease risk is simply a matter of cutting down on foods high in saturated fatty acids and cholesterol. More scientists are now saying that more scientific answers are needed before marked changes in diets can be recommended for the general population.

MYTH: Dietary cholesterol has a direct effect on blood cholesterol level.

FACT: In most persons, dietary cholesterol and blood cholesterol are not closely related. In fact, in most persons, heredity and weight or amount of fatty tissue in the body are more important than diet, including dietary cholesterol, in determining blood cholesterol level. If a person keeps his weight at recommended levels, odds are that his blood cholesterol will not be above normal.

No, they're not a band of religious fanatics that go through life without indulging in the finer cuisines. Vegetarians may be a whole lot healthier than the rest of us. Death rates from cancer, heart disease and diabetes are lower among vegetarians than among the non-vegetarian populations.

Vegetarians generally fall into three categories based on the animal foods left in their diet. Pure vegetarians consume only plant foods. Lacto-vegetarians eat dairy products as well as plant foods. Lacto-ovo vegetarians tolerate eggs, dairy products and plant foods.

Actually, a diet without meat does not differ markedly from an average Western diet. The main difference is that meat is replaced with legumes, cereals, nuts, seeds, milk and milk products, and eggs. Meat analogs, also an alternative, are prepared from the above ingredients and flavored to taste like meat.

Meat provides high quality protein, and this is required throughout life. Protein furnishes the building blocks for muscle and tissue, and these essential amino acids cannot be made by the body in the proportions and quantities needed.

In order to obtain the same balance of essential amino acids as in meats, plant foods need to be eaten in combinations. Grains fill in the missing amino acids in legumes or beans. Nuts and seeds compliment cereals while dairy products and eggs compliment any group.

A well chosen and varied lacto-vegetarian diet is adequate for the needs of all ages including the stressful periods of adolescence and pregnancy. The recommended number of servings for each food group remains the same for vegetarians as meat eaters. Four or more servings from both the fruit and vegetable and the bread and cereal groups. Two servings from the protein group and two servings from the milk group.

Pure vegetarians may need supplements of vitamin B-12, iron and zinc. Infants raised as pure vegetarians also may require vitamin D.

The vegetarian diet offers advantages beyond those cited earlier. It provides a diet where protein, carbohydrate and fat are in better proportions. Fat intake is much lower than typical American diets, especially if low-fat milk products are chosen. Vegetarian diets contribute an abundance of vitamins and minerals. Foods that contain more fiber are usually consumed.

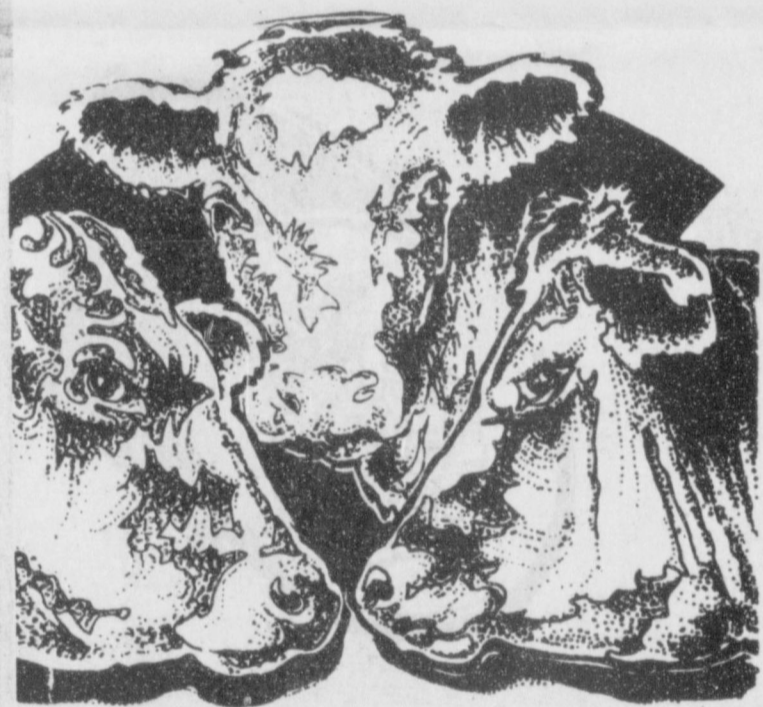

New Law Defines Resident Aliens

In an attempt to eliminate confusion over the income tax status of aliens, the Tax Reform Act of 1984 has provided some specific rules for determination of resident alien status. They will become effective January 1, 1985.

Aliens who are lawful, permanent residents at any time during the year, or who meet the requirements of the substantial presence test will be treated as resident aliens, the Internal Revenue Service said. All other aliens will be treated as non-resident aliens. Resident aliens are taxed on worldwide income, and non-resident aliens are taxed only on income that is from the United States sources or connected with a United States trade or business.

Lawful, permanent residents have passed the so-called green card test. That is, they have received, and retain, immigrant status with permission to remain in the U.S. permanently.

The substantial presence test is based on presence in the U. S. for specified periods of time over a three-year period. Students, teachers, and persons related to foreign governments may not qualify for this test. Also, persons with a foreign tax home and close foreign ties will not qualify.

These rules affect classification of aliens for income tax purposes only. They do not affect gift and estate tax law or immigration regulations.

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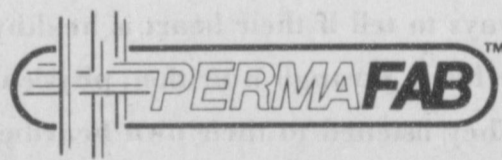

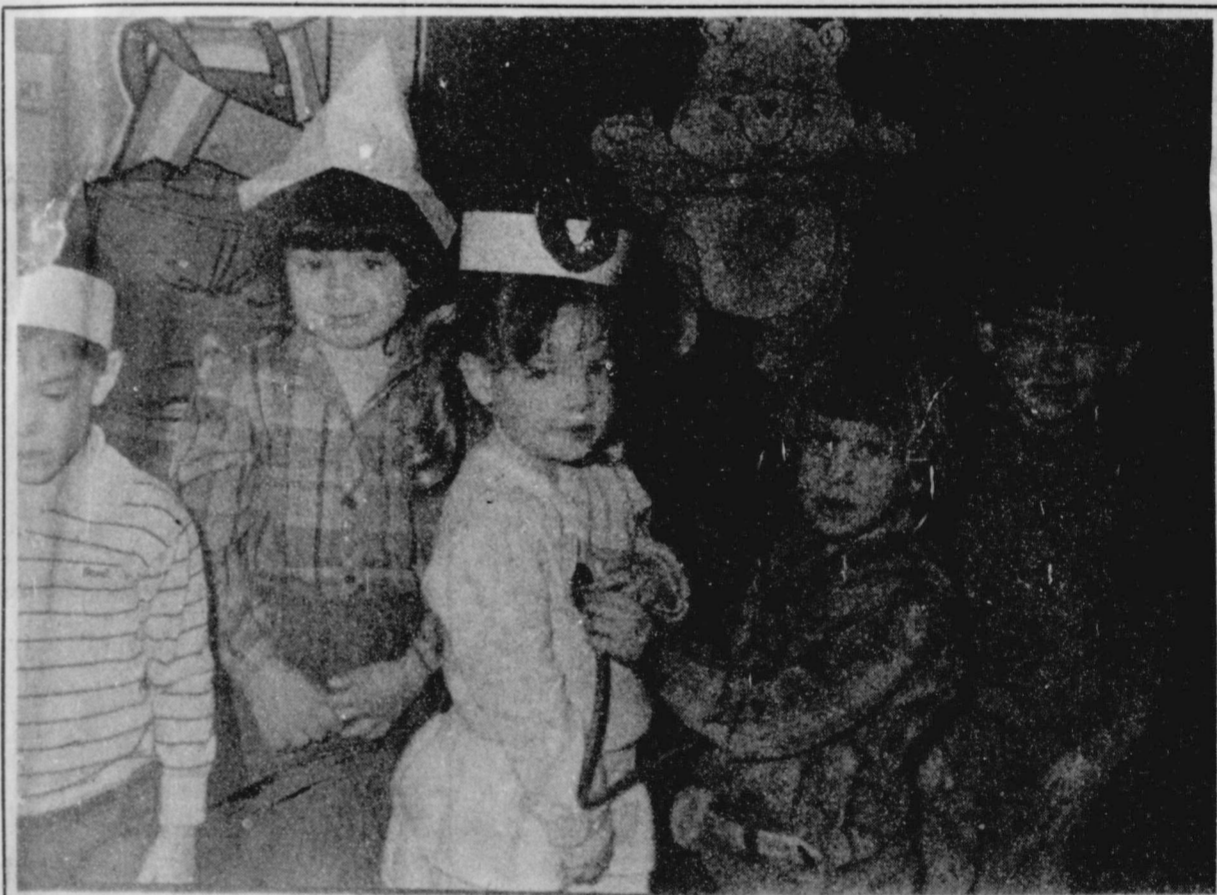

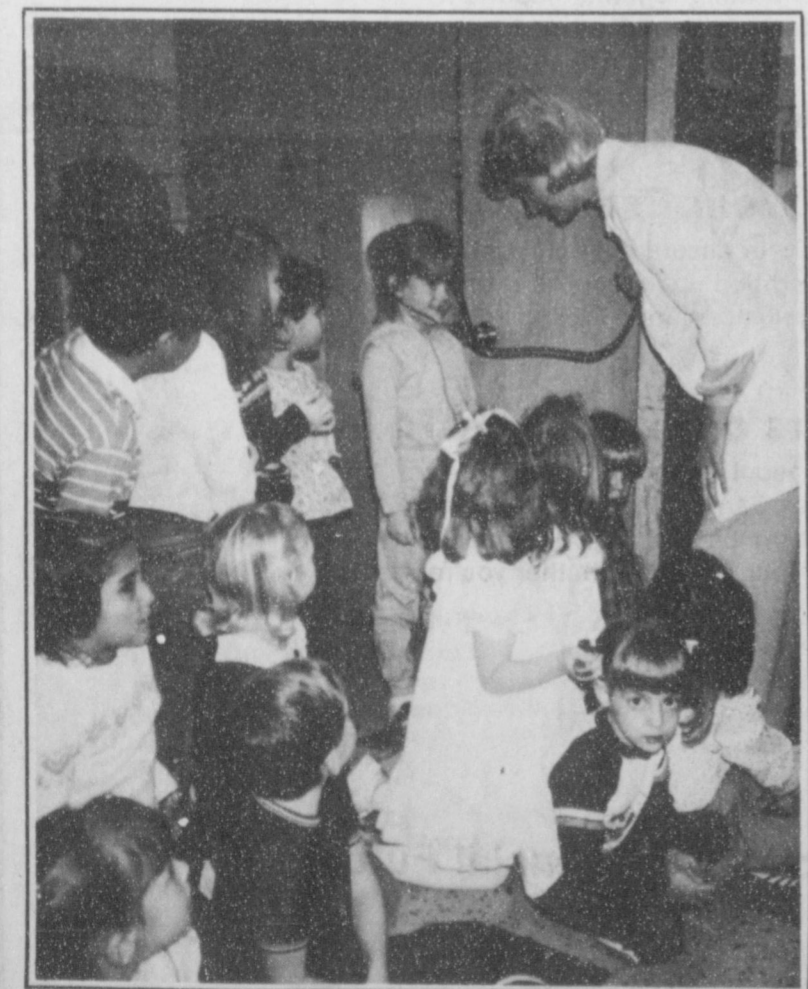

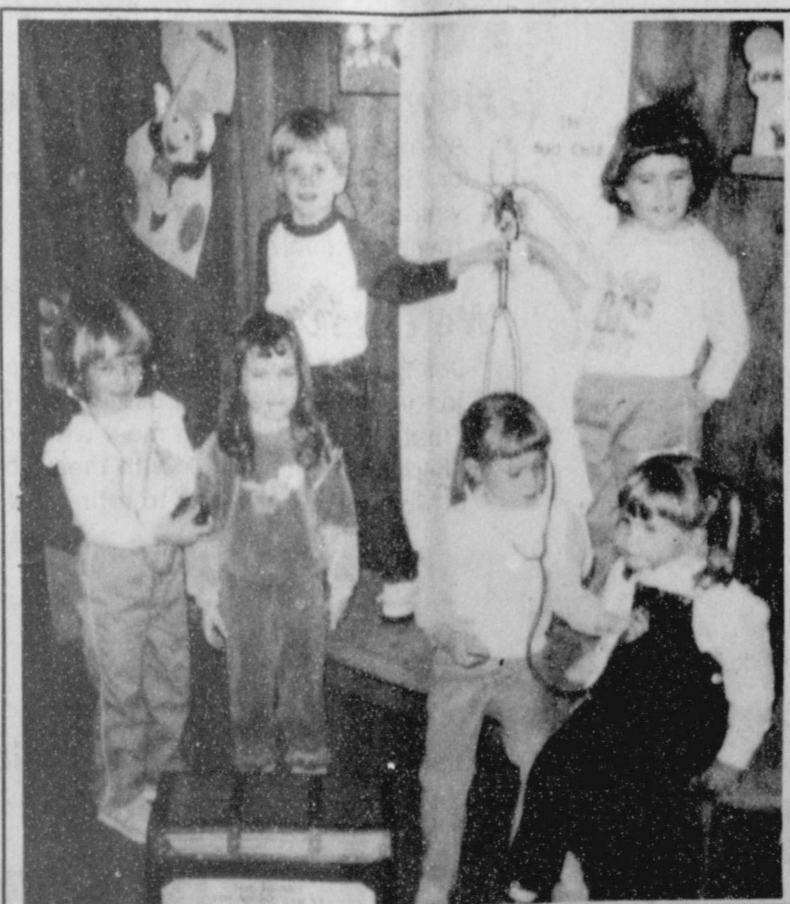
