Schools participating are Gruver, Canadian, Stinnett, Phillips, White Deer, Channing, Fritch and Spearman, the host team.

The Spearman Lions Club will cook the hamburgers for the two

day meet. Boss Lion Frosty Hicker-son and his Lion cooks plan to serve hamburgers both days to all who wish to eat at the track meet. The money from the hamburgers will go to Lions Club projects in the area. The public as well as those participating in the track meet is invited to eat both days with the Lions Club.

Highlighting the track meet for the local Lynx, Steve Burke will be featured in the shot put and discus throw. Allan Mires, also of Spearman, will perform as one of the area's best high jumpers. Bob Cook of Spearman will be featured as a pole vaulter for the Lynx. Mack McLain has an outside chance of setting some school records for the Lynx.

In the girls' activities, Jill McLain once again is featured as one of the area's best high jumpers here. Jill is also excellent in the hurdles. The Spearman relay team is rated very high in the track competition.

Many of the track and field events will be closely contested and fans will enjoy attending the track meet. We remind fans once again that the meet begins at 2:30 Friday and resumes again at 9 a.m. Saturday.

In a near record turn out for city and school elections Saturday 325 persons voted in the city councilman election. Burl Buchanan, incumbent, was reelected with 264 votes, Wilson McClellan, incumbent, was reelected with 185 votes, and Mike Cudd was elected with 231 votes. Robert

Queener and Donald Reed each got 170 votes.

In the school election, Mike Garnett had 356 votes and was re-elected. Kent Guthrie, incumbent, received 160 votes, and Joe Clement received 322 votes to be elected to the board. (Approximately 400 votes were cast in the school election.)

SIMPLIFYING MAKES HOUSEWORK EASIER

You can't make housework go away, but you can simplify your home care routine so it saves time, energy and effort.

Start your "work simplification" by eliminating unnecessary details and removing clutter. That means throwing or giving away household items that are not used. Then combine or streamline motions and activities and rearrange the sequence in which you perform jobs to reduce movement and exertion. For easy access, arrange all equipment at its point of first use. For example, store all baking items such as mixing bowls, mixer and dry ingredients, within a small radius. Developing an assembly line approach to your tasks will also allow you to do more in less time.

Establish correct work heights for your household tasks. Proper heights eliminate excessive reaching, bending and stooping. The proper counter height for standing work should be two inches below the bent elbow.

Let your body work for you, not against you, as you do household tasks. Reduce exertion by using motions that are swinging, smooth and rhythmic rather than jerking. Use both hands when possible. Keep feet a shoulder-width apart with one foot slightly in front of the other to provide better stability.

When sitting, standing, walking or climbing stairs, stay as erect as possible. When you lift, push or pull a heavy object, bend your knees, not your back. And never

twist while lifting. Instead, pick up the item, hold it close to your body and then pivot.

And try working to music - pleasant surroundings will help reduce fatigue and make your chores go faster.

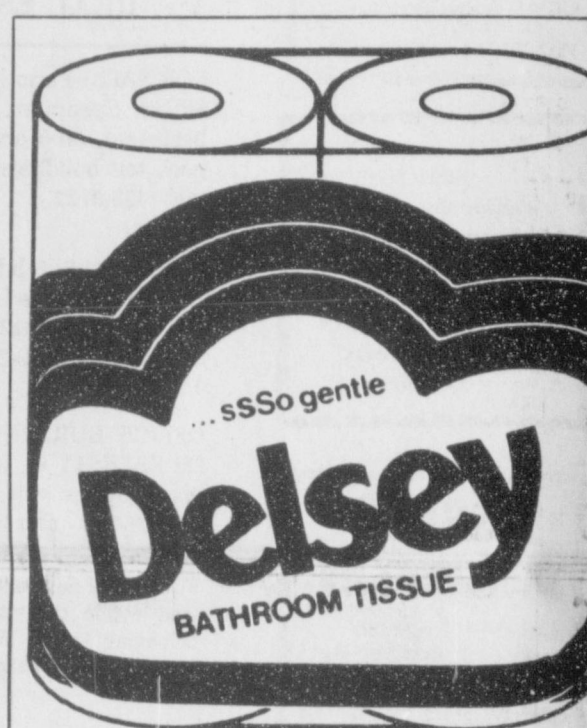

Cholesterol, saturated and unsaturated fats, low density lipoprotein (LDL), high density lipoprotein (HDL)—these are all buzz words of the 1970's and 1980's! The culprit often included in information concerning these words seems to be the all popular BEEF, a major industry in our area. The Calico CowBelles and the local chapter of the American Heart Association are combining forces to present new findings from the United States Department of Agriculture on Monday night April 15 at 8:00 p.m. at the Perryton "Expo

Center" located on Highway 15 West. Anne Ilse Anderson, of Austin, the Texas Coordinator of the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board will duplicate a presentation made to the American Heart Association National Officers. The title of this program is "Beef's Role in a Healthy Heart."

The purpose of this presentation is to separate fact from misinformation. The general public is cordially invited to attend, with a special invitation being offered to the medically related professions in the area. There is no charge. If you

have specific questions concerning diet-health issues. Ms. Anderson is fully qualified to answer them.

A 4-H leader is many things -- an artist making a float for the 4th of July, a doctor prescribing for an underfed calf, a counselor at camp, a lawyer filling out forms, and a shoulder to cry on when that dress just won't fit.

Nobody else has so much fun with so many boys and girls as does a 4-H leader.

4-H leaders are angels in aprons, saints in striped, three-piece suits. Their only reward is the love of the kids and the respect of the community. But when they look around them at the skills they have taught and the youth they have built, there

is an inner voice from somewhere that says, "Well done!"

For more information on how to become involved in your community as a 4-H leader, contact the county Extension office, notes Harruff.

Thursday, April 18, 1935

Tried awfully hard to quit thinking about the biggest and worst dust storm in history.

Positively everything that one hears on the street this week is concerning experiences that were had during the Sunday dust storm. My own experience was mild and rather thrilling. Started home from Panhandle and was within 14 miles of home met the duster and turned back, beat it all the way to Panhandle, where I remained until Monday morning.

The most pitiful case I have heard of comes first. Mrs. H. G. Frisbee was at her home with her six month old baby. She attempted to get to the home of R. C. Chase during the dust storm, where her husband was visiting. Mr. Chase and Mr. Frisbee found her after she had been in the storm for more than an hour. She suffered a nervous breakdown and Mr. Frisbee carried her to her relatives in Missouri Tuesday morning.

Have not been able to verify the statement but understand that one of the lady school teachers of Morse stranded in her car during the storm, abandoned the car and followed the wire fence to the nearest home. She was terribly upset from her experience and her hands were badly cut from tracing her course via the barb wire fence.

Mr. Meek tells of a lady at Stinnett who was rather heavy set and past middle age, who started out to reach her boy located at a pumping station near Stinnett. She followed the road for four miles finally reaching the pumping station. She was able to keep her course by feeling the hard surface of the road bed often getting off the pavement but returning.

Frank Allen and his family were stranded near the Jess Edwards home and air became so thick that Frank got out and wet handkerchiefs out of the radiator of the car so that the members of the family might breathe.

Mr. and Mrs. R. V. Converse and Ray Vallett attempted to beat the storm home and were caught after they had turned East on the road home. They were in their truck, having come to Spearman for a truck load of water. The three sat in the seat of the truck for nearly two hours before they could get over the road to their home.

We are informed that 150 people living in the Stinnett neighborhood spent the night in the court house.

Many other cases were reported, but space and the nature of the stories prevent recording them at this time.

Among the humorous incidents: It is said that "Friday" had taken a nap, awakened and looked out the window to see a beautiful sunshiny day-he decided it was entirely too pretty to stay in the house and proceeded to dress. He stretched, yawned and closed his eyes for a half minute. When he opened his eyes he was in utter darkness. He was temporarily looney-so his friends say.

Jimmie Jackson claims the storm blew a six weeks old pig into the house and that he found the porker and a bulldog playing when he got up Monday morning.

Dwight Holland claims the storm blew in a one-dollar bill. He praises himself for finding the money and is keeping it. He states his wife made him clean up after the storm, and the finders are keepers.

Deputy Sheriff Fred Linn made a bet of a sack of potatoes with Bob Morton last Tuesday morning that Spearman would not have more than two more sand storms. Bob

stated Monday that after considerable argument Mr. Lynn finally agreed that the little flurry of dust Sunday was one of these two.
