Young Lynxette team should do well in track

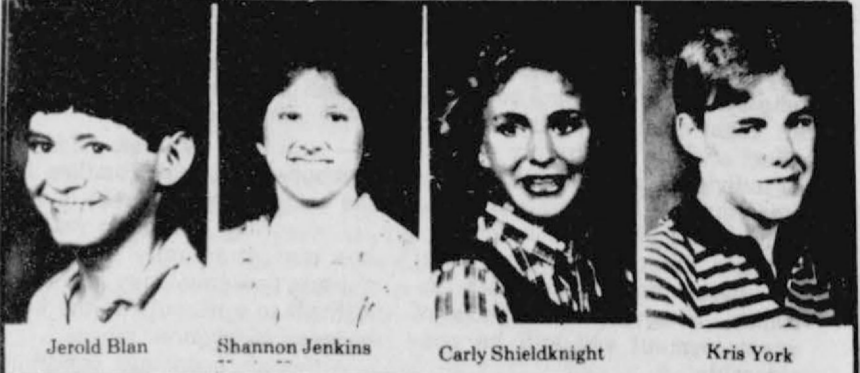

No family wants to be in financial crisis. That's why we try to prevent it by learning about budgeting and family financial management.

But there are many factors which can force almost any family into financial straits - at least temporarily. The Texas families facing financial problems include:

-Farm families. Economic conditions in agriculture have placed a severe financial strain on some farmers. Not only does the farm enterprise suffer, but the family finances feel the squeeze too.

-Unemployed families. Practically every family experiences unemployment at one time or another. Plant closings or layoffs can affect a whole community as well as individual families. Unemployment may be buffered somewhat in two-paycheck families. When a family's lifestyle and debt level are based on having both incomes, however, the effects of unemployment will still be considerable.

-High debt families. To buy a home, many families have taken on debts that consume a fourth to a third of their incomes. In addition, the availability of credit for almost every type of purchase has increased the debt level of many families. Families deep in debt may not have the resources to meet a financial emergency, such as unemployment. Some have faced foreclosure on their homes.

-Fixed income elderly. Faced with rising medical costs and

other expenses and fixed incomes, many older families experience difficult economic times. Even families that planned carefully for retirement may face a period of adjustment as they downscale their lifestyle to fit their retirement income.

-Single heads of households. Figures show that divorce typically means a substantial drop in income and standard of living - especially for mothers who have custody of the children.

-Remarriage families. A person who remarries after being divorced may financial obligations to children from a previous marriage as well as children and a spouse in the current marriage.

-Military families. Enlisted personnel and their families face the extra financial strain of moving often and becoming resettled in a new community. Spouses of military personnel may also find it difficult to work outside the home because of frequent moves.

Although economic conditions can't be controlled, families facing a financial crisis can make good use of money management skills to make the best of their situation.

Since financial problems produce stress that affects all family members, learning how to deal with stress is equally important.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas agricultural extension service serve people of all ages, regardless of social economic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

Hansford County reported an increase of 11.54% in sales taxes for March as reported to the comptroller by April 20th.

Net payment this period in Gruver is 5,020.49 compared to 5,075.38 last year, for the month of March. 1986 payments to date are up 11.54% over this time last year.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$108.1 million in local sales tax to the 1,015 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston's check was the largest—\$17.7 million—bringing total payments in 1986 to \$64.8 million, down 2 percent over 1985. Dallas received \$12.5 million for a total of \$46.1 million in total payments for this year, a decrease of 5 percent.

San Antonio's payment of \$6.9 million increased that city's 1986 payment to a total of \$25.1 million, up 5 percent over last year. Austin's check for \$4.9 million pushed payments to \$18.5 million for 1986.

Fort Worth received \$4.1 million for a 1986 total of \$15.5 million, up 8 percent increase over last year's payment.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$51.1 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA check for \$21.2 million pushed 1986 payments to \$75.5 million. Dallas' DART payment of \$19.2 million brought its total to \$70.8 million this year. Austin's Capitol Metro received a \$4.9 million check for \$886,800 increasing total payments this year to \$1.6 million. Fort Worth's MTA Payment for \$1 million increased the city's 1986 total to \$3.6 million.

May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.

Everyone come and help us celebrate this event. Presstime -Gotta go folks-

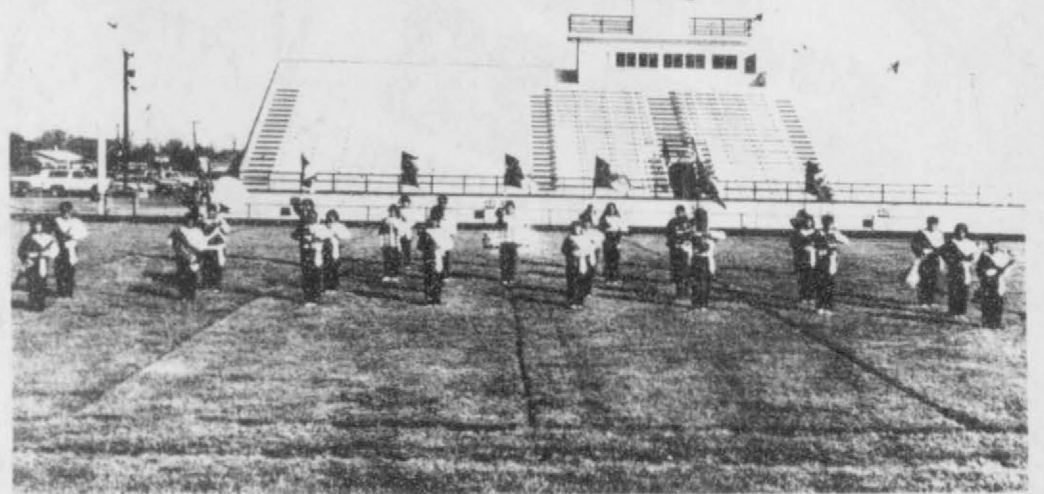

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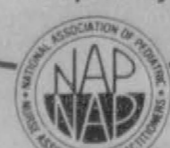

Waco Postal Employees Busted

U. S. Postal Inspectors arrested five Waco area postal employees today, culminating a nine-month long investigation into the suspected sale of illegal drugs, including marijuana, cocaine, and methamphetamine, at the Waco main postal facility at 430 West State Highway 6, Waco, TX.

Complaints against the five were filed on Monday, May 5, and Postal Inspectors obtained arrest warrants from U.S. Magistrate Dennis Greene, Assistant U. S. Attorney Richard Camp, who is handling the cases, said the following employees were arrested:

Vernon R. Clark, 38, of 2100 Dan Rowe, Waco, TX, Joe D. Rosas, Jr., 29, of 2713 S. 25th, Waco, TX, Drury L. Singleton, Jr., 29, of Rt. 1, Box 610, Axtell, TX, Fred L. Smith, 40, of 3117 Ethel, Waco, TX, Rudy Torres, 30, of 808E. Fourth St., Waco, TX

The five have Postal Service experience ranging from seven to thirteen years. All but Clark are distribution clerks at the Waco facility. Clark held the position of Management Trainee.

North Texas Sheriff Arrested in Child Pornography Investigation

Harry James Walker, age 37, Sheriff Montague County, TX, was arrested on May 1, 1986, by postal inspectors and agents of the FBI after signing for a certified parcel at the Bowie, TX, Post office. The parcel contained child pornography which had been addressed to an alias name used by Walker. Walker had previously mailed polaroid photographs and magazines depicting child pornography to undercover postal inspectors in Houston and Fort Worth, and had mailed photocopies of child pornography to an undercover FBI agent at Tulsa, Ok.

According to D.C. Strader, Postal Inspector in charge of the

Fort Worth Division, a federal search warrant was executed on Walker's residence after his arrest. The search resulted in the seizure of numerous child pornography magazines, photographs, and undercover correspondence. The arrest of Walker and search of his home is the culmination of more than four months of investigation by postal inspectors and FBI agents, said Strader.

Walker had been sheriff of Montague County, which is located on the Red River just east of Wichita Falls, since January, 1985, when he defeated the incumbent Sheriff. Walker worked in Montague County for the Bowie, TX.
