Lesley, driving a 1986 Chevrolet pickup truck, was westbound along hiway 15 about five miles west of Perryton when he lost control of his vehicle and collided with a boat trailer being pulled by a van traveling east the DPS reported.

The Lesley's pickup crashed head-on into a pickup behind the trailer which was carrying the three Dalhart residents investigating officers said.

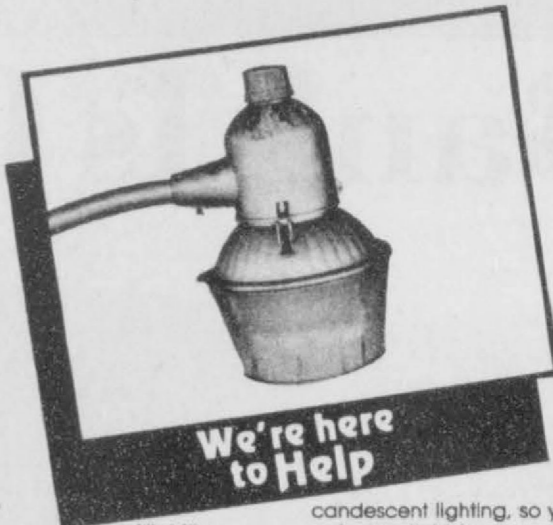

The Community Concert Association of Borger will present the American Boychoir with James Litton, music director, at the Borger High School Auditorium Saturday, April 26 at 8 P.M.

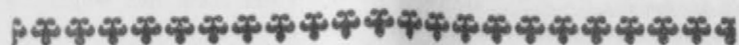

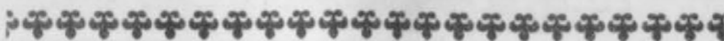

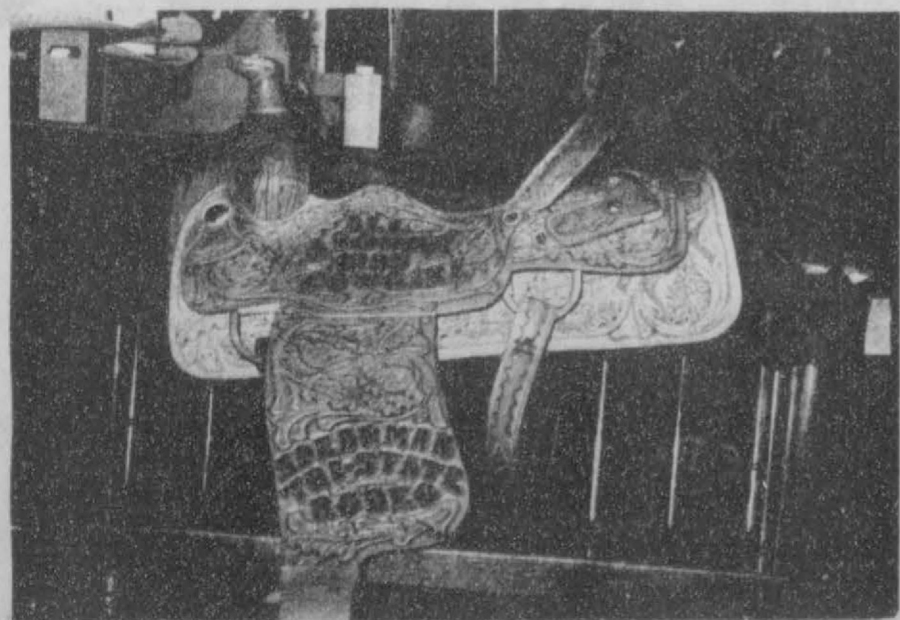

What is Obesity?

WHAT IS OBESITY?

The National Institutes of Health defines obesity as "an excess of body fat frequently resulting in a significant impairment of health." Simple measurements of height, weight and skinfold thickness can indicate obesity. In addition, the distribution of body fat in the abdomen, rather than the hips and thighs, is an important predictor of the health hazards of obesity. A level of 20% or more above desirable body weight is associated with sufficient risk to justify medical intervention.

OVERWEIGHT OR UNDER-ACTIVE?
The average person gains 15 to 25 pounds between the ages of 25 and 50. Most of this weight is gained gradually, a pound or two a year.

The good news for people who like to eat is that this weight gain typically does not result from overeating.

The bad news for people who don't like to exercise, is that extra pounds most often result from our decreasing physical activity and lower calorie needs as we get older.

To maintain your weight, the calories you burn through physical activity has to equal the calories you consume. If you stick to certain eating habits, but become less and less active, those extra calories will be stored as fat.

So the key to losing those extra pounds is becoming more physically active. That can be a tough problem for people who work at sedentary jobs, and don't have the time or money for exercise classes or equipment.

But added physical activity doesn't have to be time or money consuming. It can be as simple as taking the stairs instead of the elevator at work; walking around the block while you wait for the kids instead of sitting in the car; or taking a bike ride instead of watching television after dinner.

- 1 T butter

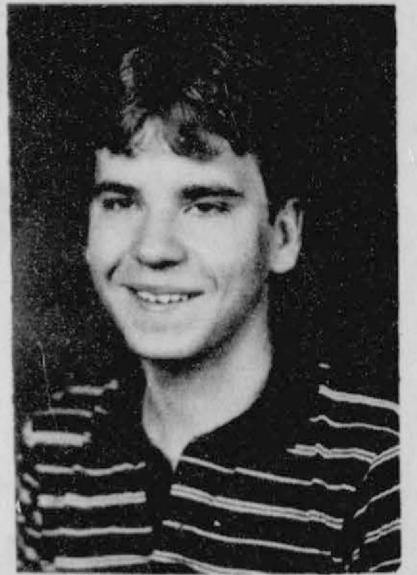

The starting salary for a Distribution Clerk or City Carrier is \$9.64 per hour and salaries for Rural Carriers range from \$17,210 upward depending on the length and character of the route. Farm Bureau Is Concerned

The Hansford County Farm Bureau Board of Directors are deeply concerned with the future of Hansford County, Texas. We are seeking help and support in our efforts to stop the proposed PCB landfill that ANR Pipeline Company has applied for with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). We feel strongly that the proposed dump site would have a detrimental effect on the future human health, the environment of the tri-state area, the probable contamination of the life-giving Ogallala Aquifer, the water formation which feeds several states, and the almost certain contamination of the rich agricultural land and wildlife. We are frustrated and angered at the little regard given to our cherished resources. Within the contents of the 1986 State Policies of the Texas Farm Bureau, the environmental section, page 29, lines 29-47, outlines the Texas Farm Bureau's opposition of implementation of toxic landfills.

Hansford County Farm Bureau has given their support to a community committee which is opposing this landfill. The CAPP (Citizens Against Poisonous Pollutants) Committee was formed on December 15, 1985, after an article concerning the dump site was printed in the Amarillo Daily News. This article was the first time the citizens of Hansford County were aware that any plans for a dump site were being planned in Hansford County.

The ANR Pipeline Company has filed an application with the EPA to build a 2 1/2 acre above ground PCB monofill, or landfill. This dump site is to be shipped from 16 sites, from six different states. This site is expected to be open for a period of four(4) years, and is expected to be in operation by early summer, 1986.

ANR Pipeline Company owns forty(40) acres at the E.G. Hill site in Hansford County. It has an evaporation pit that has contained PCB's for approximately thirty(30) years. This is from the old Michigan-Wisconsin piping station. ANR states this PCB contamination is below 500 parts per million.

On December 20, 1985, the Hansford County Commissioners met in Spearman, Texas with ANR representatives. Over 100 residents attended the four hour meeting. There were tapes of the meeting made which have been transcribed and are now public records at the courthouse. The County Commissioners, at the end of the meeting, adopted a resolution opposing the proposed dump site. This resolution is also on record.

A member of the CAPP committee, Lynn Stedje, and a Dallas geologist, Jack Doege, had a meeting in Dallas with three (3) representatives of the EPA. Jim Sales and Phil Charles were two of the representatives to meet with Mr. Stedje and Mr. Doege. Upon their return, they reported to the committee as having a negative feeling about their meeting.

CAPP has also tried to keep Representatives, Congressmen, and Senators informed. Representative Buck Buchanan has become actively involved. He has attended a closed meeting with ANR and CAPP in January, 1986. In this meeting, ANR had three (3) representatives and Mr. Dames, their attorney, present. Moore, the consulting firm, had one (1) in attendance. Very little was accomplished.

The same day ANR met with Beau Boulter's office and Commissioners from Texas County, Oklahoma. The Texas County Commissioners adopted a resolution against the dump site. Congressman Beau Boulter has taken a "definite" stand against the site.

The North Plains Water District Board of Directors have adopted a resolution prohibiting any dumping of toxic wastes above the Ogallala Aquifer in their district. Their attorney, Bob Lemon, of Perryton, Texas, has a copy of this letter.

CAPP has obtained legal advise from Stuart Henry, an attorney from Austin, Texas. CAPP hopes he can help in gaining more information in the stopping of the landfill.

Information has been gathered from many sources. Among these are the Railroad Commission of Texas, ANR, EPA (always through Beau Boulter's office), the Huber Corporation of Borger, Texas, Citizen's Clearing House, Oklahoma Department of Health, as well as individual doctors, magazines, and newspapers.

Your support in opposing this dump site could be our future!!!

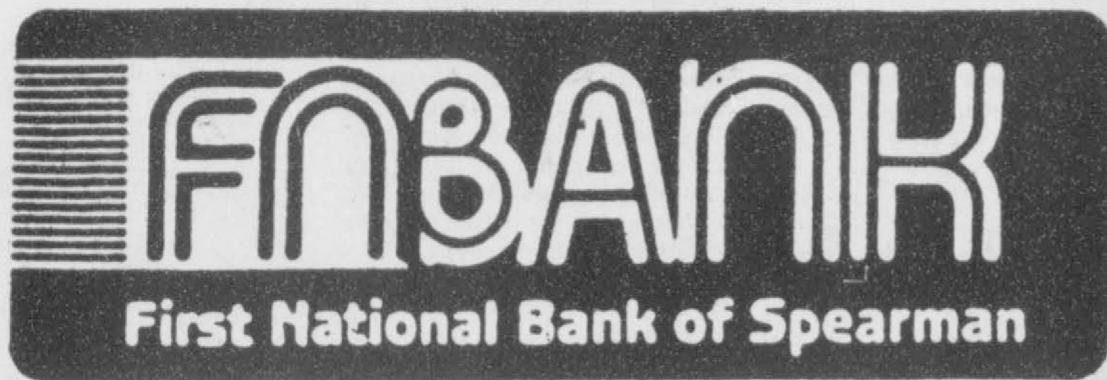

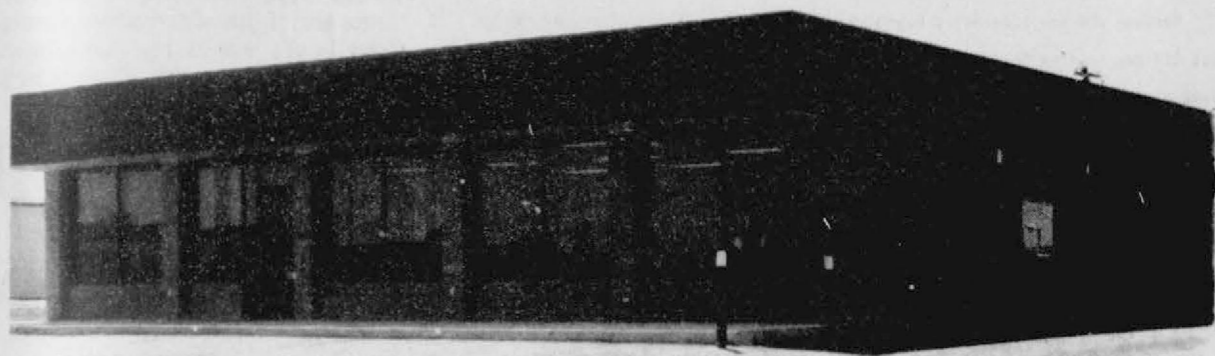
