Wheat Harvest underway in Hansford County

10 Days Early

Hansford County Wheat Producers, who have some 150,000 acres of grain in fields, started the 1985 harvest this week—a harvest that is 10 days to two weeks ahead of normal.

Prospects for the crops have dimmed some in the last 30 days.

Forecasts earlier this spring had grain producers anticipating a wheat crop that would approach 1983 production -- a year which saw Hansford County ranked as the #1 Wheat Producer in the State of Texas.

This year's forecast was based on ample winter rains across Hansford County and ideal spring growing conditions for the crop.

Since May 1, the wheat crop in Hansford County has been hit with a fungus leaf rust, and stressed by hot, dry winds and temperatures approaching 100 degrees.

Most grain elevator managers anticipate that Hansford County will have three different wheat harvest.

Wheat growers began cutting dry land this week. Harvest of the "semi-irrigated" wheat will begin in mid-June, and irrigated wheat, the latter part of the month.

Most farmers plan to harvest dry land this week if the weather remains dry. This is good drying temperatures with temperatures in the high 90s. Farmers say that the dry land crop "looks good where it caught the spring showers" and yields may be 20 bushel an acre or higher.

"You never know how good the crop is until you cut it, however,"

declares the Hansford County Farmers. Much of the irrigated wheat will not be ready for the combines for another 10 days to two weeks.

Farmers who sprayed their wheat for rust early figure it was worth the expense. The leaf fungus developed rapidly in Hansford County in mid-May when humidities were high and temperatures were below normal. The latter part of May turned hot and dry, stressing the fungus-damaged crop.

"The prospect for the crop is not the same as it was two weeks ago," declares elevator managers and farmers. Many believe that yields will be 20 percent less than what we expected. Wheat harvest in Hansford County generally begins in the middle of June and is completed in three to four weeks. This year, however, the crop has matured early.

Harvest plans were delayed by heavy rains. Harvest will begin in the middle of the week. Fields need a week to 10 days of sunshine to dry.

"Overall the wheat crop looks good." "We really won't know the extent of the rust damage until it is cut. No one has a good barometer to estimate damage." "We are going to have three harvests this year - dryland, semi-irrigated, and full irrigated.

The dryland harvest is underway, followed by grain which has had an irrigation or two, and then the fully-irrigated.

Survivors include four daughters, Mrs. Alma Walker of Gruver, Mrs. Pauline Fischer of Optima, Okla., Viola Monroe of Springfield, Colo., and Adeline Berkenkamp of Amarillo, a son, Elmo of Gruver; two sisters, Jessie Sparte of Yakima, Wash. and Jennie Hill of Guyton, 13 grandchildren; and 14 great grandchildren.

10 elevators closed by TDA

(AUSTIN)—Due to a combination of circumstances, the 10 Oles Grain Company elevators in the Texas Panhandle have been closed by the Texas Department of Agriculture, and no grain will be moved into or out of those facilities without agency permission. TDA was required to take this action because owner David Oles has not obtained the required licensing bond, and two of the facilities were short of their stated grain inventory.

"We closed two of the facilities, at Perryton and Spearman, when TDA inspectors found each of the elevators to be between 8-10 percent short of the grain reportedly in storage," said Darrell Ketchum, director of TDA's Grain Warehouse Licensing Division. "The other eight facilities were shut down, and the elevator doors sealed, because Mr. Oles did not obtain a new Grain Warehouse Bond by the June 1 licensing date, as required by state law."

According to Ketchum, Oles Grain Company needs a \$500,000 bond, the maximum which TDA can, by state law, require to cover any grain losses for the licensing year which begins June 1, 1985 and continues through May 31, 1986.

In addition, three of Oles Grain Company's creditors on Wednesday filed an involuntary bankruptcy petition against the firm at federal court in Lubbock. Filing that lawsuit were Republic Bank of Dallas, Collingwood Grain Company of Kansas, and the trustee of Hipp Inc. of Lubbock.

"TDA will attempt to intervene in the bankruptcy proceeding on behalf of public depositors, to urge an immediate return of the grain to which those depositors are entitled. Further, TDA plans to be present at the hearing before a federal

bankruptcy judge in Lubbock at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, July 11," said TDA General Counsel Sam Biscoe.

"We certainly regret taking this action," said Ketchum, "but did it to protect the Panhandle farmers who are holding warehouse receipts for grain they had stored in an Oles elevator. As always, we want to settle this matter as quickly as possible, so those farmers can again have access to the grain which is rightfully theirs."

"We also want to assure those farmers who have used Oles Grain Company in the past that, if necessary, the bond which expired on May 31 should cover any shortages on grain that was stored in those elevators during the life of that bond."

The 10 facilities, with a total capacity of approximately six million bushels of grain, are located at Amarillo, Bunker Hill, Exum, Kress, Nazareth, Perryton, Spearman, Tulia, Vega and Vigo Park. Oles also owns a grain warehouse in Oklahoma.

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

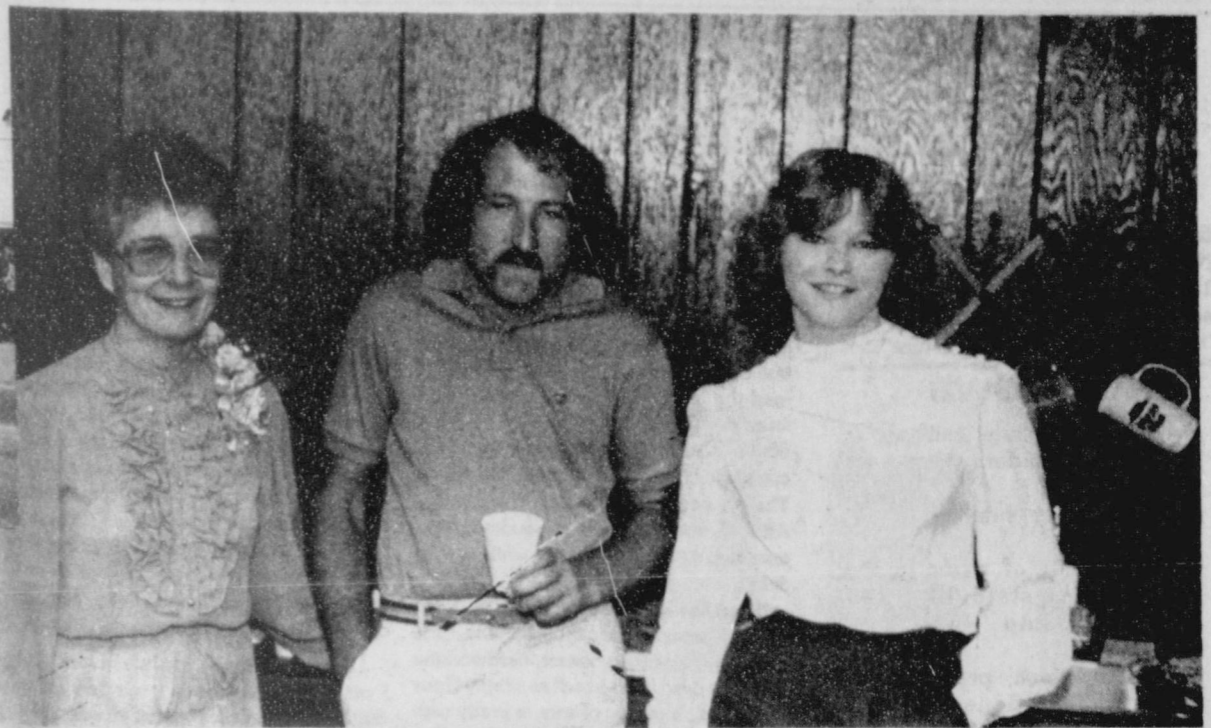

HBO Unveils Plan To Sell Its Services To Home Dish Owners

 NEW YORK CITY—Home Box Office Inc. last week announced its plans to sell HBO and Cinemax to some 800,000 owners of home satellite dishes.

HBO said its cable system affiliates will act as sales agents within their franchises. Each cable system will set its own monthly retail rate for the services and will be in charge of all billing and collections.

A satellite home owner living in a franchised area, however, may obtain a descrambler either from the cable system itself or from a satellite dealer in the area, but must contact the local cable operator to arrange for descrambler activation. The descramblers will be supplied by M/A-Com Inc., which developed the satellite signal scrambling technology being used by HBO.

In uncabled rural areas, the dish owner will contact HBO directly to activate the descrambler. HBO will charge \$12.95 for each service if taken separately or \$19.95 for the package.

HBO said it will place advertisements in about nine satellite trade publications in order to generate business. Moreover, M/A-Com will be responsible for all marketing activities involving distribution of the hardware.

Descramblers will be made available to households in rural areas through satellite distributors and dealers or direct from M/A-Com, which will be responsible for distributing the units as

broadly as possible.

After obtaining a descrambler, which will retail for about \$400, the satellite owner will contact HBO directly through a toll-free 800 telephone number. HBO itself will take the order and obtain the necessary customer information for billing purposes. HBO will then authorize the customer for service through a computerized operation developed by

M/A-Com. The computer is electronically linked to HBO's Long Island-based uplink center and will have the ability to turn each individual consumer descrambler on and off through a special addressable code that will be encoded in the HBO and Cinemax satellite transmissions.

The computerized facility developed by M/A-Com will be the standard for all programmers who chose the M/A-Com technology and will enable the reception of up to 50 channels with just one decoder. The Videocipher 2000 E is also capable of providing impulse pay-per-view, electronic mail and text service distribution. Showtime/The Movie Channel has also chosen the M/A-Com scrambling system and to date is the only other programmer to announce plans to scramble.

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Direct federal spending declines

Direct federal spending in Hansford County declined by 15.7% from \$16,568,000. in fiscal 1983 to \$13,970,000. during fiscal 1984 according to a report recently issued by the Department of Commerce. The federal government's fiscal 1984 began on October 1, 1983 and ended on September 30, 1984. Direct federal spending nationally increased by 4.2% while direct federal spending in Texas increased by 5.8%.

Per capita (per person) direct federal expenditures in Hansford County were \$2,174. during fiscal 1984 having fallen from \$2,668. or by 18.5% since fiscal 1983. Direct per capita federal expenditures in Texas during fiscal 1984 were \$2,606. or 1.5% less than in fiscal 1983. National per capita federal expenditures in fiscal 1984 amounted to \$3,108. or 1.9% greater than during fiscal 1983.

Direct payments to individuals were the largest single source of federal spending in Hansford County during fiscal 1984. These amounted to \$6,743,000. during that year. Of this total, \$5,087,000. consisted of retirement and disability benefits for individuals. These include Social Security retirement and disability pension payments, retired civil service and military pensions, veterans' benefits and allowances, expenditures for medicare, as well as most of the other forms of federal assistance for individuals which are usually termed "transfer payments" or "entitlements".

Direct payments to individuals have been the largest single item in the federal budget since 1971. These accounted for 44.6% of all direct federal spending during fiscal 1984. Direct payments to individuals were 43.8% of federal expenditures in Texas during in fiscal 1984 and 48.3% of direct federal spending in Hansford County during that period.

There has been and continues to be considerable controversy regarding increases in defense spending by the federal government. Total federal defense expenditures were \$209.7 billion during fiscal 1984 or 7.2% greater than those of fiscal 1983. Defense spending in Texas had increased by 13.8% from \$12.3 billion in fiscal 1983 to \$14.3 billion during fiscal 1984. Defense spending in Hansford County had declined to \$68,000. in fiscal 1984 or by 4.2%.

Not including grant funds which account for a substantial portion of total federal spending, other departments and agencies of the federal government including the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Housing and Urban Development, Interior, and Transportation and the Environmental Protection Agency disbursed \$6,455,000. in Hansford County during fiscal 1984. While the federal government does not provide a breakdown of these figures in Hansford County, other sources indicate that the Department of Agriculture was one of the largest sources of these funds in Hansford County during fiscal 1984.

Other federal spending in Hansford County during the fiscal year included \$294,000. in grant awards. Specific details on all local grants were not provided. However, besides general revenue sharing grants, the largest sources for grant funds in most counties are the Departments of Agriculture, Education, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, Labor, and Transportation.

While the total of direct federal spending in Hansford County is substantial, as noted, it does not include another extremely important

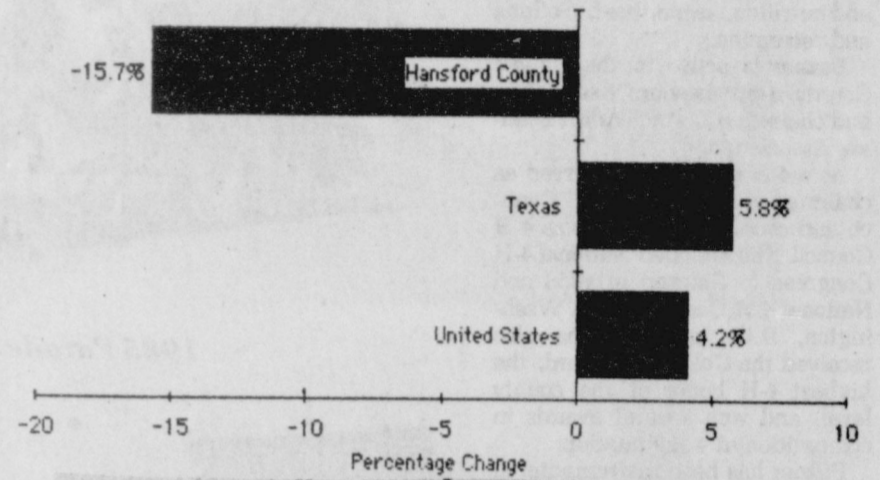
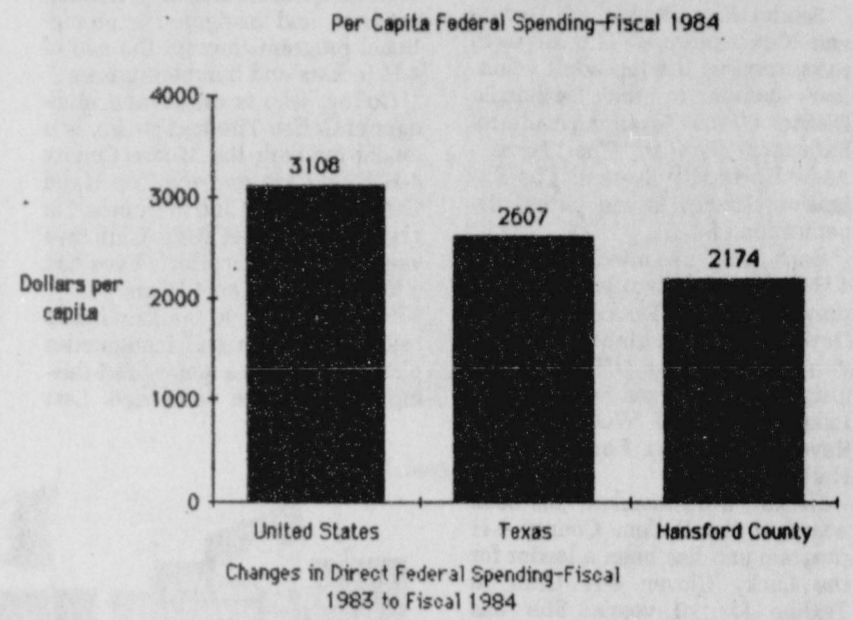
source of federal money in the county: federal loans and federally guaranteed loans. These are not included in direct federal spending figures because, as loans, it is presumed that these funds will eventually be repaid to the federal government.

Federal loans and federally guaranteed loans encompass a variety of programs. These include emergency farm disaster loans, rural electric loans and loan guarantees, Small Business Administration loans, student loans for higher education, community development loans, many of the various housing loan programs, as well as others.

Direct federal loans in Hansford County were only \$4,416,000. during fiscal 1984; however, federally guaranteed loans in the county amounted to \$2,892,000. The Department of Agriculture's loan programs were among the larger sources of federally guaranteed loans in Hansford County during that year. The Department of Agriculture's loan programs include a number of low and moderate income housing loan programs as well as various farm loan programs.

None of the federal spending totals in Hansford County include expenditures made through the United States Postal Service in Hansford County. The Postal Service's expenditures are no longer considered a part of the federal budget since the Postal Service is considered a separate corporation. Postal Service expenditures in Hansford County for fiscal 1984 are not presently available.

The total of direct and indirect federal spending in Hansford County was \$21,278,000. during fiscal 1984. It is apparent that federal spending provided one of the largest sources of funds for the economy of Hansford County during that time.

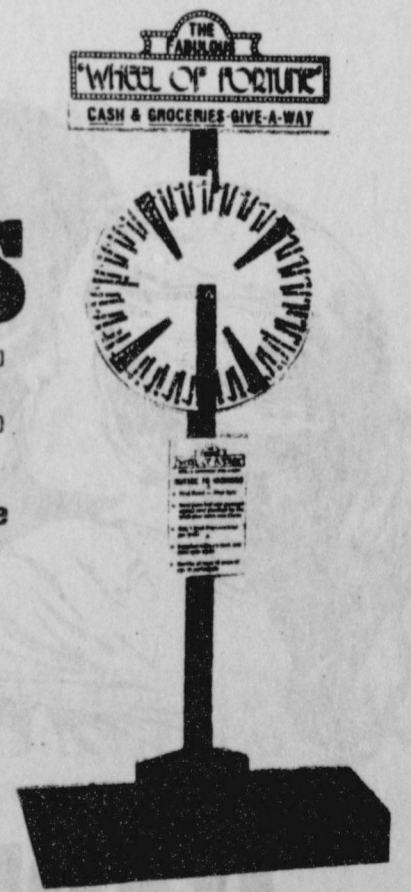
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Two 4-H leaders among top 28

RR Commission request retesting of wells

AUSTIN, Texas, May 14—The Railroad Commission Monday signed an order requiring retesting of all wells in 11 Panhandle oil and gas fields that are now equipped with low temperature or high pressure separating equipment.

The tests would be used to determine whether the wells should be classified as oil or gas wells, a matter of dispute between various oil operators in the Panhandle region.

The Commission order, which becomes final in 15 days unless a request for rehearing is filed, requires operators of wells using the separators to retest the wells within 75 days of the date the order becomes final. Tests must be scheduled with the director of the Commission's district office in Pampa and must be witnessed by Commission personnel.

A key finding in the Commission order is that the Commission's Rule 79(7), which defines gas wells and oil wells, applies to the Panhandle fields. The order says "hydrocarbon liquids which are not in the liquid phase in the reservoir

under current conditions, liquid in the well bore, and liquid at the surface shall not be counted as crude oil in calculating the gas-oil ratio for purposes of classifying a well as an oil well or a gas well in the Panhandle fields."

Under state law, wells that produce one barrel or more of hydrocarbon liquids per 100,000 cubic feet of gas are considered oil wells. Wells that produce less than a barrel of the liquids per 100,000 cubic feet of gas are considered gas wells.

In retesting the Panhandle wells in question, operators may not count liquids produced by the separators in measuring the gas-oil ratio unless they can prove the liquids were liquid in the formation, in the well bore, and at the surface.

Any wells reclassified as gas wells after the mandatory classification tests will not be allowed to produce until operators prove they meet spacing and other requirements of Panhandle gas field rules.

Parties in the case have up to 15 days to file a motion for rehearing

asking the Commission to reconsider its order. Unless a motion is filed within that period, the order becomes final. The Commission has 45 days to consider a motion for rehearing once it is filed. It may extend that time an additional 45 days on its own motion. If rehearing is denied, the order becomes final and parties may appeal the Commission decision to state district court.

Phillips Petroleum brought the case to the Commission in Sept. 1981, asking that Panhandle field rules be changed to prohibit natural gas liquids recovered from casinghead gas (oil well gas) from being classified as crude oil production. Monday's order says current Commission rules do this already and changes to the field rules aren't necessary.

Fields involved in the case include the Panhandle oil fields in Carson, Collingsworth, Gray, Hutchinson, Moore, Wheeler, and Potter counties. Also involved are the Panhandle East, Panhandle West, and Albany-Dolomite gas fields.

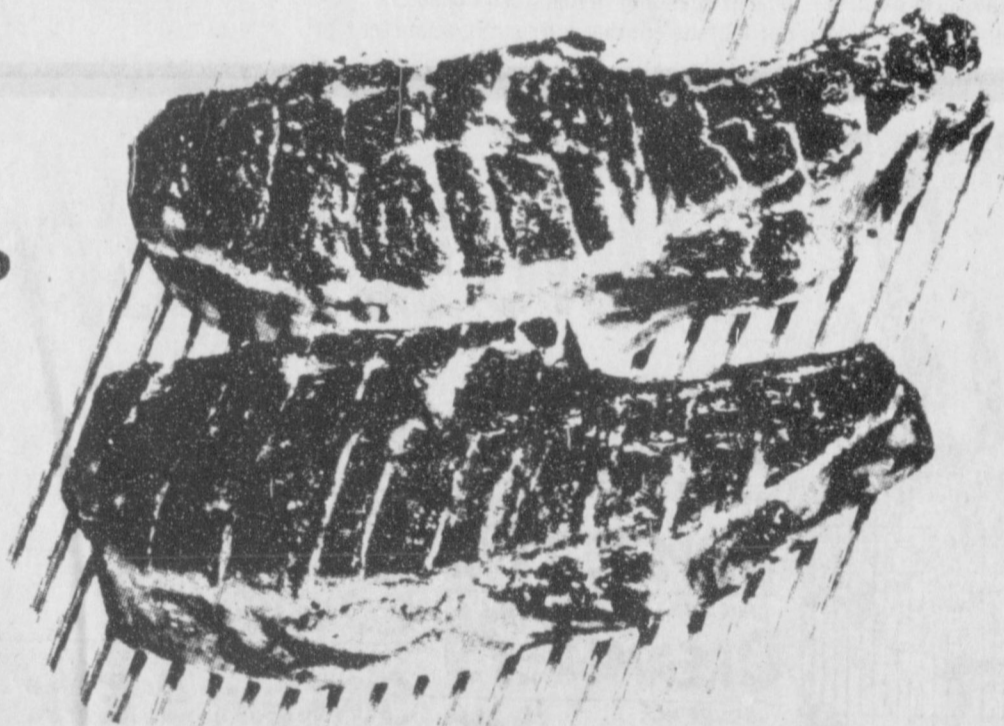

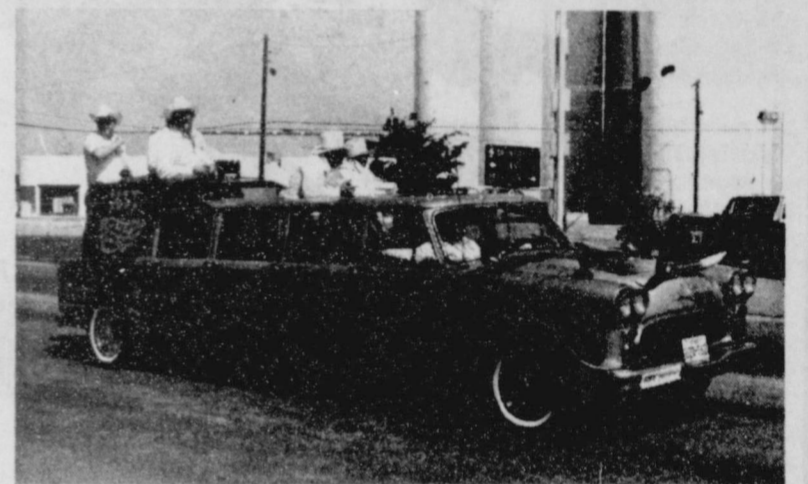

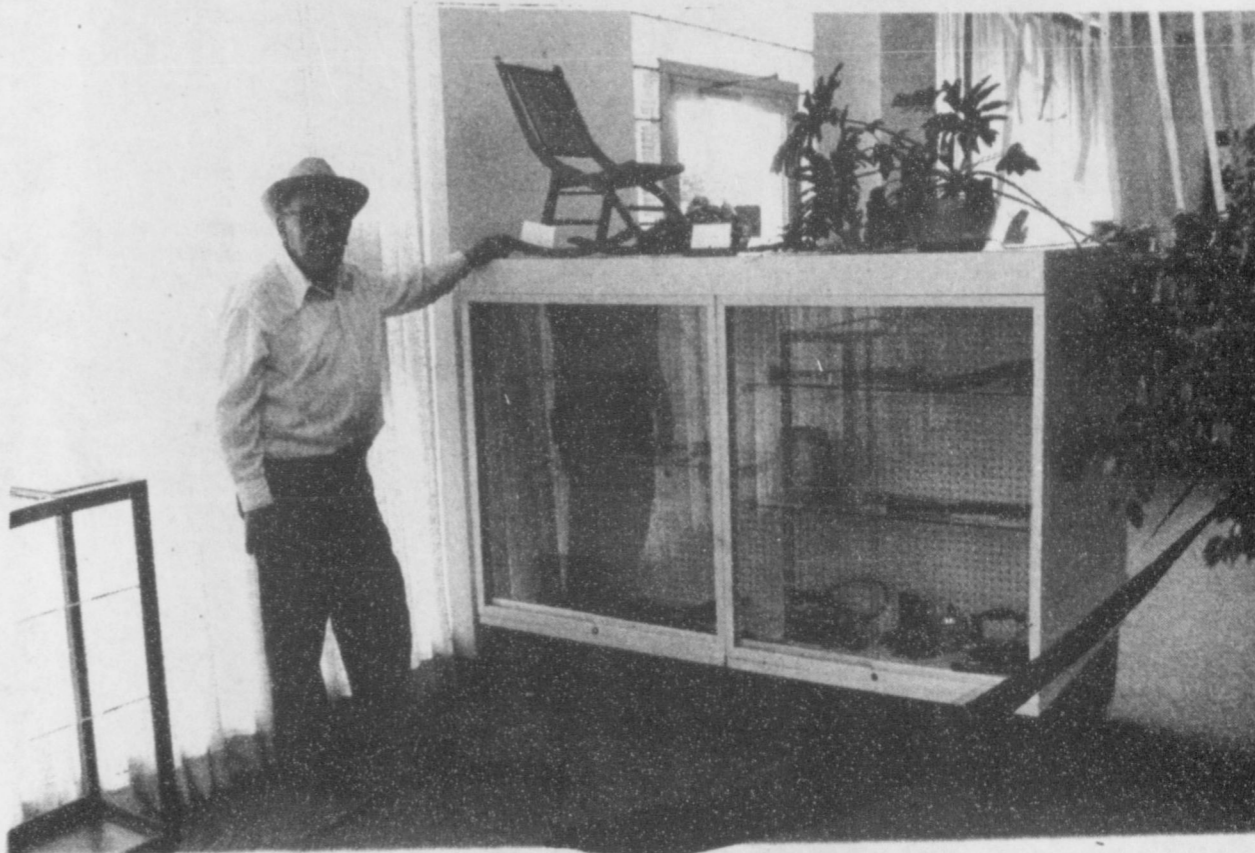

The "overlock" sewing machine has been used industrially for decades, but a home version was introduced just last fall. It's being compared to the microwave oven, since it's a new item that supplements a traditional household appliance.

Industry representatives are now forecasting that the overlock machine will account for ten percent of the sewing machine business within five years.

Just what does this machine do? Basically, it's a finishing machine that joins together seams, overlocks and trims excess seam allowance. Depending on the make and model it can do rolled hems, pin tucks, decorative edgings, blind hems, decorative braids and in some cases, sew entire garments.

Every major sewing machine company offers at least one model of the overlock machine, and sells them primarily in fabric stores. The basic types of overlocks include:

- * One needle/two threads trims and overcasts the seams but is not as strong as models with additional threads.

- * One needle/three threads especially recommended for knits because it has stretch built in, is strong and does rolled hems and other functions.

- * Two needle/four threads overlocks, chain stitches and sews several other stitches. It's very strong, but not recommended for knits as there is not stretch built in.

Before selecting an overlock model, consider what you want to accomplish, what types of fabrics you sew on, how often and how long the machine will be used and if you'll need it for both seaming and overcasting.

Overlocks are not without their drawbacks for home sewers. The sewer must carefully fit the garment before finishing seams with the overlock since extra seam allowances are cut off. This means a garment can't be let out after overlocking.

Home sewers may also have some initial difficulties dealing with the complex threading system. Tensions must also be set for different threads and fabrics. Overlocks require more thread because of the use of multiple threads, so it's recommended that basic colors be bought in cones. Some machines also require special needles while others use regular machine needles.

Many retail stores are offering seminars and demonstrations of the overlock machine. Since the cost of an overlock can equal or exceed the cost of a regular sewing machine, however, carefully consider your sewing needs before you buy.

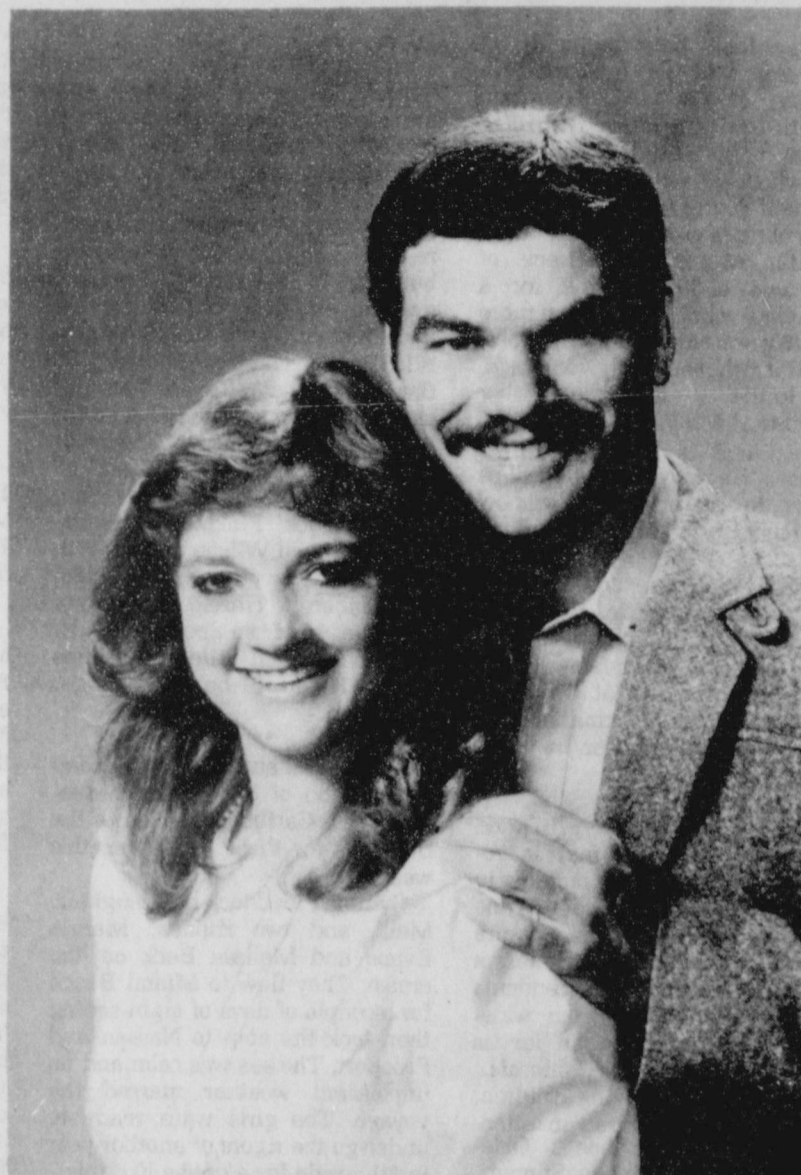

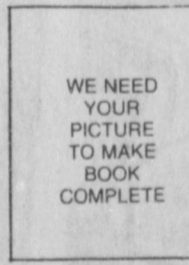
