Varsity Lynx Basketball Coach F. G. Crofford announced his retirement, which will take effect at the end of the 1984-85 school term.

Coach Crofford was born and raised on a farm near Clarendon, Texas. He took part in all sports during his junior high and high school years.

Coach Crofford attended Clarendon Jr. College for ½ a year before entering the army during World War II. He served under General Patton in Europe and was in several major battles. He was wounded twice in combat. General Patton visited the wounded at the hospital during one of his stays.

After serving two years, Coach Crofford returned home, where he married Bonnie Drake. He went back to Clarendon Jr. College where he was a starter on the College Basketball Team. After finishing Clarendon Jr. College,

he went to West Texas State University, where he received his B.S. Degree in 1951 in Physical Education. He also received his Masters Degree in Education at W.T.S.U.

Coach Crofford and his wife,

Bonnie, are both teachers. They have twin daughters, who are also teachers. One daughter, Sharon Mills and her family live in Amarillo, the other daughter, K aren Floyd and her family live in Canadian. The Croffords have three granddaughters and two grandsons.

Coach Crofford taught one year in Sunray as Head Coach for football and boys basketball. He also was Head Coach for football and boys and girls basketball at Pettit, Texas for one year. He was Assistant Coach for football and basketball for one year at Whiteface.

He coached at Claude from 1956 through 1967, during which time he was coach for all grades of football and boys and girls basketball and track. During these years of coaching, his teams went to

County judges & commissioners conference Feb. 28

COLLEGE STATION -- County judges and commissioners from across Texas who will be meeting here for their annual conference, Feb. 26-28, will be putting a lot of emphasis on continuing education.

"Continuing Education -- The Key to the Courthouse" will be the theme of the 27th annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference, which will be held at the Ramada Inn.

Gov. Mark White has been invited to address the conference at 11:30 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 28.

State Rep. Gary Thompson of Abilene will address the county officials earlier that morning. Thompson is chairman of the House Committee on County Affairs and will have some members of his committee on hand for an open forum and question-andanswer session.

The County Affairs Committee is studying a number of critical issues during the current legislative session, including optional ordinance-making authority, indigent health care and alternative sources of income.

Thompson and members of his committee will also take part in a review of legislation affecting counties.

Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, will open the conference with an official weld

come. The annual conference is conducted by the Extension Service's Institute of County Government for the purpose of helping Texas' elected county officials serve more effectively and efficiently.

Major areas of discussions during the three-day conference will deal with "Administrative Responsibilities of Commissioners Courts" and "Relationships in County Government." In addition, the roles of various officials will be discussed, including the county judge, county commissioner, county clerk, district clerk, county treasurer, county auditor, county tax assessor-collector, county and district attorney, justices of the peace and constables, sheriff and county Extension agent. Other discussions will deal with

legal liabilities of county officials, revenue sharing and new handicap access regulations, county hospital administration, county subdivision regulations, rural fire prevention districts, emergency medical service and county ambulance service, weight limits for bridges, lubricants for heavy equipment, county personnel systems, preparing a county budget, and soil stabilization and dust control on county roads.





The minutes of January 10, 1985 were read and approved in a motion made by Dwight Hutchinson and seconded by John Trindle.

The monthly financial statement was presented for the Board's consideration. Leslie Barkley made a motion to approve the bills for payment. John Trindle seconded and the motion was passed by all present.

Jason Frye Suit: Three letters from John L. Hutchison as to activity on the Jason Frye lawsuit was submitted for the Board's information with no action being taken at this time.

A list of specific deliquent accounts for purpose of lawsuits for collection was submitted to the Board. Dwight Hutchinson made a motion that the list be accepted as submitted. Seconded by Jerry Hunt and passed by all Board members present.

The following action was presented to the Board from the Medical Staff minutes of their last meeting. It reads as follows:

The administrator presented to the Medical Staff the proposed amendment for the bylaws for the purpose of malpractice insurance requirements for staff members which reads as follows:

Each member of the medical staff shall be required to present a current certificate of insurance, from an insurance company licensed or approved to do business in the state of Texas, to verify malpractice liability coverage with a minimum of at least \$200,000/

600,000 limits of coverage per claim or medical incident.

All voting members of the medical staff voted in favor of the proposed amendment on February 12,1985 and recommended that this proposal be forwarded to the Board of Directors for their approval. John Trindle made a motion that

the amendment to the Medical Staff Bylaws be accepted as submitted. Dwight Hutchinson seconded and passed by all present.

Next an Employee Annuities Program was submitted to the Board, via letter from Mr. Bob Barnett, Representing Great American Reserve Insurance Company. 

FAMILY INFLUENCE ON THE SWEET TOOTH Do your children seem to

television tend to eat sweet foods more often because they are bombarded with commercials for highly sweetened foods, especially

'live' on candy, cookies, popsicles, sugared cereal and cola? Like many parents, you may be worried that too much refined sugar is leading to tooth decay and reducing the nutritional quality of ycur childrens' diets.

You may be able to do something about the problem, especially if your children are still young. But it could require changing some of your habits and attitudes as well as theirs.

Children come by their desire for sweets honestly. Studies have shown that infants are born with a preference for sweetened liquids over plain liquids. This preference will continue, especially if children have continued positive experiences with sweets.

As parents we create many of these positive experiences by offering sweets to comfort or reward our child, to express affection and to celebrate special occasions. We sometimes use sweets to compensate when we're busy or tired, or to keep the children distracted or quiet.

But that doesn't mean we need to give up birthday cakes, or put carrots in the Christmas stockings. In fact, some recent research from Cornell University shows that giving children sweets in "positive contexts," is not the only reason for their attraction to sugared foods.

Far more important, according to the research study, is how often children actually eat sweets. And this is determined mostly by the parents' own consumption of sweets, and how much television the family watches.

What and how parents eat has a powerful effect on children. Children learn to be sweet-eaters from their parents, just as they learn many other food preferences, such as liking meat or disliking vegetables.

The researchers also suggest that children who watch more

during Saturday morning toons. Because they watch at least some of the shows their children see, parents may become more familiar with the foods advertised and more receptive toward eating the foods themselves and serving them to their children.

So if you really want to change some of the sweet-eating habits of your young children, you will probably need to cut back yourself. You may also need to talk with them about the differences in the variety of foods we eat for good health in "real life" and what they see in the make-believe world of television.

Jolly Green Thumb BY MARY FUREY CRYMES

Showoffs, showpieces, the plant you just have to show — that's Staghorn fern. The strange and strangely-shaped member of the large family of epiphytes has become associated forever with Tropical jungle displays. Nicely, though, you don't have to inhabit a rain forest in an unpronounceable country to own one. Begin a show-stopping collection by seeking out and purchasing small "stags"

They're known botanically as Platycerium, and there are about 18

at a nursery

known species. All are distinguished by those antler-like leaves, that range in size from the prongs of a small stag to the bigger blades of the Alaskan moose. Purchasing plantlets will give their owners a chance to observe the fascinating growth patterns of the tropical oddities. Like less complex forms of fern, they require loose soil, good drainage and an occasional feeding with a weak fish emulsion. Cold blasts and bursts of hot air are damaging to "stags," and watering is by touch saturate when growth medium feels dry to the touch.

It's the how of plant display that gets the attention from all comers. You can use ordinary clay pots — nice, but not adequate for the excitement these ferns can generate. Mount one on a piece of cedar, redwood or cypress bark to really show it off. Garden centers have bark blocks and the sphagnum moss you need to grow the plant. To make a bark planter, staple one end of a piece of chicken mesh to the back of the bark piece. Being careful of roots, wrap fern with unmilled sphagnum, then place on front, or "show" side of the block. Carefully pull mesh from back side to form a pocket to hold fern. Cover any mesh that shows with more moss, then

hang plant, or place it horizontally. As the fern grows, it can look as though it's growing from a wall or up through a table. The planter tends to recede visually and the effect is attentiongetting. Later, a dyed-in-the-wool "Stag" fan, you can get into propagation and become a renowned collector. © 1985 Suburban Features






