First National Bank of Spearman (in organization) announces hiring of new president



DON TOWNSEN, new president

The organizing directors of the First National Bank of Spearman are pleased to announce the election of Don Townsen as President and Chief Executive Officer of the bank in organization. Don is currently Vice President and head of the Agricultural Department for the Bank of Oklahoma. He will assume his new position in Spearman April 1, 1985.

Don, his wife Barbara, and their five children live at Perryton and plan on moving to Spearman as soon as housing arrangements have been made.

Don and Barbara are both natives of the high plains of Texas. They moved to Perryton from Lubbock, Texas in 1974, where Don had been employed with the First National Bank of Lubbock and was a 1970 graduate of Texas Tech University with a degree in Agricultural Economics. Don was then elected an officer of the First National Bank of Perryton and served as a commercial loan officer until 1979. In early 1979, he accepted a Vice President position with the Bank of Oklahoma, Tulsa, Oklahoma and began managing their agricultural lending office in Guymon, Oklahoma. The next year, Don was named Ag. Department manager of the large Oklahoma Bank and has been serving in that capacity for the last five years.

The Townsens lived in Guymon for two years but have been in Perryton for the last four years. The children in the family are Tamri age 11, Kimbre and Clint 9 year old twins, Kara age 7 and Jamie age 5.

When asked about the move to Spearman, Don commented, "We are very excited about moving into the Spearman community. We have a lot of friends in Spearman and Hansford County and are looking forward to meeting new friends and making Spearman our home."

He further commented about the new bank and his new position: "Spearman and Hansford County are fortunate to have strong leadership and the type of people who are willing to invest their time and money to improve the economic stability and the quality of life for this area. The organizers of the First National Bank of Spearman have exhibited tremendous confidence in the support for this community and its future. I am proud to be joining with the organizing directors to establish a new bank that will become a very important asset to the community."

The directors are not allowed to announce an opening date until all

pre-opening duties have been completed and the Comptroller of the Currency has completed a pre-opening examination a few weeks prior to granting final approval for opening. It is anticipated by the directors, however, that final approval will be granted in late March or early April and the new bank will be approved to open for business in mid-April.

The new First National Bank will be located at 729 West 7th.

Felma Evans is one of the organizers and will be Vice President and Cashier of the new bank. She has been a well known banker in the community for many years.

Initial Capital of the Bank is planned at \$2 million. The organizing group will contribute most of the capital, but some stock will be offered to investors in the community. Interested individuals are invited to pick up the First National Bank stock Prospectus at the Bank's temporary office in the Pittman-Shieldknight building or contact one of the directors for information.

Up With People concert draws near

The Up With People Show, seen by 8 million people in 47 countries, is coming to Perryton, live in concert this coming Saturday, February 9 at 7 p.m. in the Perryton high school auditorium.

terests and culture and often learning new languages.
In specially arranged community involvement programs, local high school and college students accompany the Up With People cast members in visits to nursing homes, hospitals and other institutions. Developed under a grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, the goal of this program is to provide these young with an insight into the community's needs.

Each cast member assists in the day-to-day logistics of operating the cast including show promotion and stage work. College credit can be earned in a variety of subjects through the University of Arizona.
Seven thousand students have taken part in Up With People since it was founded in 1968 by its president, J. Blanton Belk, as a non-profit, apolitical, non-sectarian, educational program.

As many as 1,000 young people apply each month for the 550 openings available annually. Although musical talent and technical knowledge are assets, students are accepted on the basis of their motivation, maturity and potential to participate fully in a demanding program.

Up With People has a distinguished board of directors and international advisory board which provide independent direction for the organization's growth and development.

The worldwide activities of Up With People are financed from ticket and product sales, show sponsors, student tuition fees, individual and corporate gifts, as well as foundation grants. Gifts for scholarships, endowment funds and operating expenses are tax deductible.

"Our purpose is to give young men and women a learning experience which prepares them for a swiftly changing world," explained Belk.

"The show is their statement of hope and enthusiasm for the future," he added.

"Think what might happen if students from the People's Republic of China, the Soviet Union, the United States and the other countries of the world had a year together in Up With People," Belk said. "Maybe it would sow a seed for future understanding and harmony in the world."

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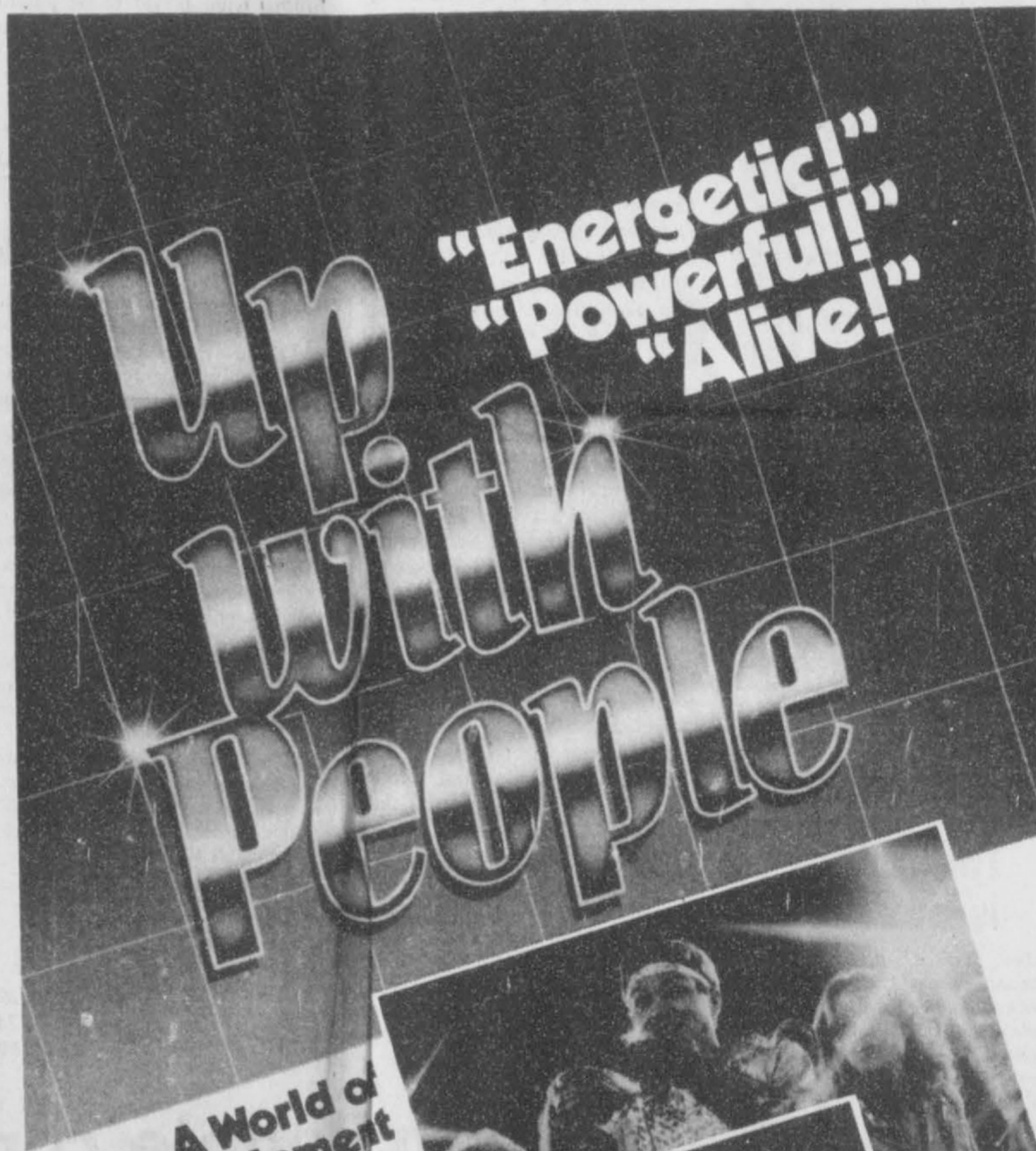
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"A Note of Thanks"

DOES YOUR RATTLER TAKE REGULAR OR UNLEADED GAS?

Are you bored with life? Are you looking for something different, interesting, and exciting? How about some rattlesnake hunting?

You may say, "are you crazy, the snakes won't come out until Spring." Well you certainly can change that. On a warm day of 45 to 55 degrees it would be easy and safe to catch some rattlers, instead of waiting until summer. The time to get those rattlers is during their hibernation in winter or early spring. There are several reasons. All the rattlers will be in their dens instead of being scattered across the county. Once the rattlers leave their den forget about them. You may only see a few. But I have known hunters who have taken as much as 200 rattlers from one den!

Another reason to hunt rattlers during the winter or spring is that it is safe. When the rattlers come out of their dens they are slow and

sluggish. They can not react as they would in the summer months. It is like starting your car in the winter. Your chances of getting bit are reduced tremendously!

Well then how does a person get the rattlers out? Go and get a weed killer container. Attach about a 20-20 foot hollow copper/magnesium tubing to the container. This is necessary in order to reach the rattlers in their dens. And go to a gas station and fill the container up with a low octane gasoline such as no lead. Then go and find a snake den. Take the tubing and lead it into the den slowly following the course of the den. Once you feel that you may have hit the end of the den start pumping the container to build up the pressure and then turn on the gas. A few squirts is all you need.

(Don't Bother With The Windshield)

In about 15 to 25 minutes the rattlers will start coming out. If they don't there are usually two reasons. There are no snakes in that particular den or the tubing was not placed in far enough. If that happens the snakes will move back to the end of the den and will die from the gas fumes. If you are careful and feeling the tube as it goes in the den you may feel the tube hitting or pushing the rattlers aside. But that takes a lot of experience. But again when you have felt this continue to push/lead the tubing to the end of the den, and again, then give the rattlers a few squirts. Let me tell you they hate gas fumes. When the rattlers come out herd them

into a burlap bag or a plastic garbage container (the tall ones).

In trying this method do not give up. It is the best and the safest way to catch rattlers. The rattlesnake roundup at Sweetwater, Texas, (the second weekend in March) has been using this method since the beginning of their roundups. And they of course prefer this as to the open air method which is used at Mangum, Oklahoma where you would walk and hunt for the rattlers on the rocks or in the bush etc.

Either way I believe that hunting rattlers is fun! It is exciting and it is dangerous. What more could a person ask for?

holds interest rates

The Texas Veterans Land Board this week announced it has been able to hold interest rates for the Veterans Land Program below 10 percent, despite earlier action by the board to raise the rate above the 10 percent level.

The VLB staff said falling market interest rates made it possible to set the new interest rate at 9.97 percent.

The old rate for Veterans Land Program loans was 9.25 percent, but that rate has been adjusted to 9.97 percent effective January 29, 1985--identical to the rate now offered under the Veterans Housing Assistance Program. This rate increase will mean a \$10 per month increase in payments for Veterans land loans made after this date, but the increase does not apply to Veterans with loan applications already being processed.

Another resurrection is that found in II Chronicles 7:14. There is promised to any nation that all turn and look to the God of Heaven a revival for that nation. 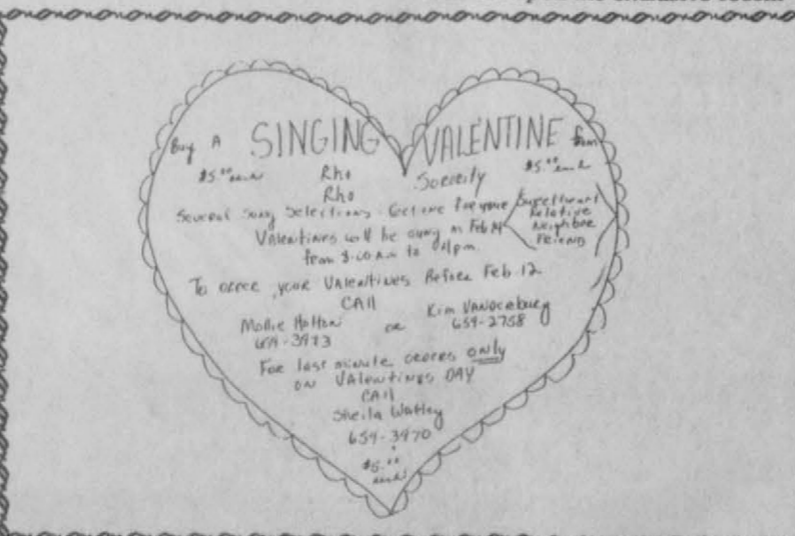
