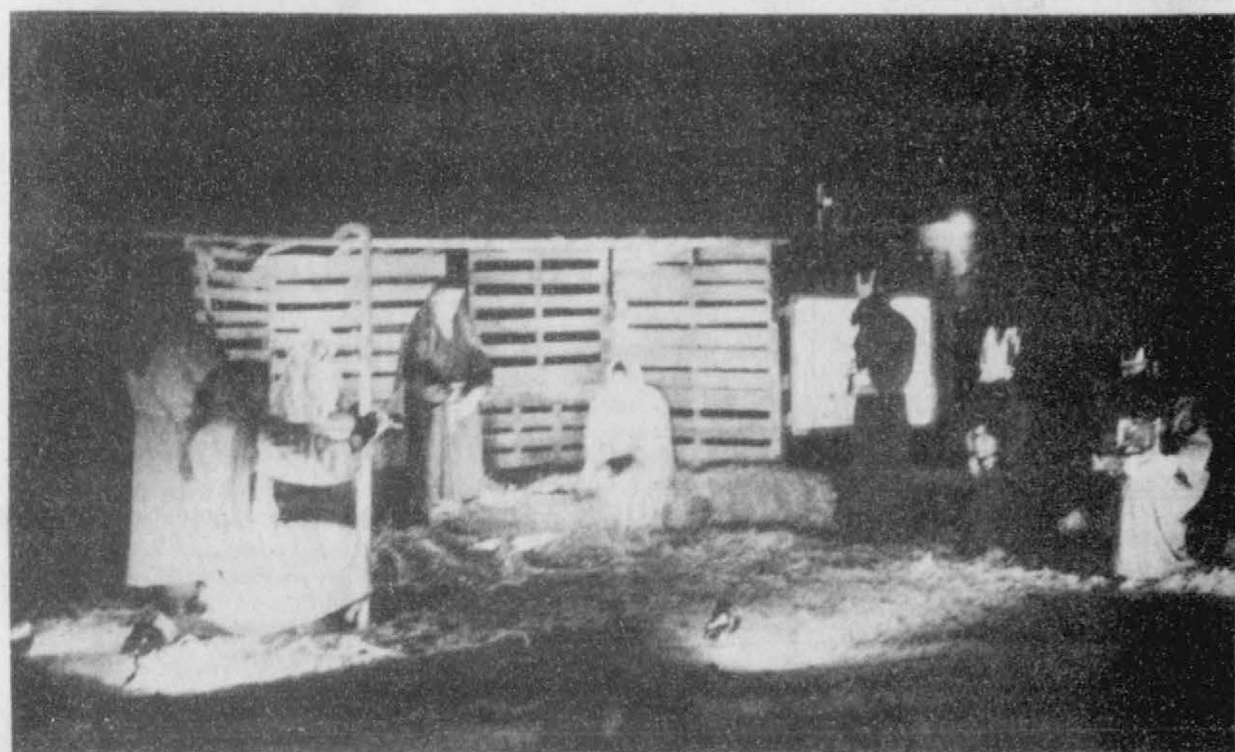

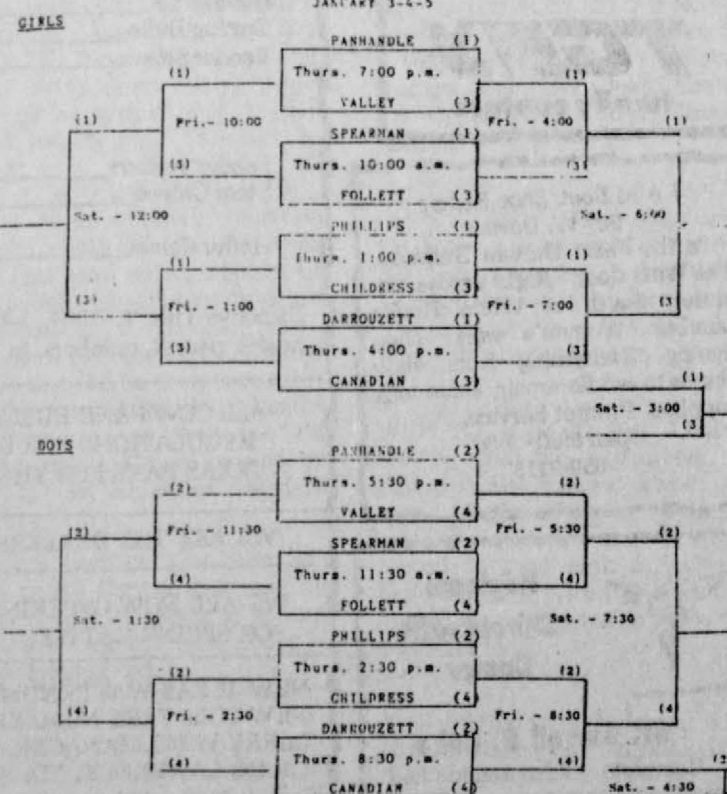

### Senior Update

After December 1, 1984, there will be a Medicare Participating Physician Directory available. You will be able to see this Directory at Social Security, Railroad Retirement or Area Agency on Aging offices, and senior citizen organizations. You can also see or buy it through the U.S. Department of Human Services, Washington, D.C. or your own local Human Services office.

A participating physician is one who will accept assignment on all Medicare claims meaning that they will accept Medicare's approved charge as full payment on all claims.

Remember that there is a freeze on doctor's Medicare charges from now until September 30, 1985. This rule began in July, 1984.

More states need to take a leaf from Pennsylvania. The funds collected in their state lottery goes to the senior citizens of the state. Although millions of dollars go to the lucky winners, the seniors are the greatest beneficiaries.

The lottery monies paid over eight million to area agencies on aging. Older Pennsylvania Americans also receive property tax and rent rebates, inflation dividends, free transportation, and a low-cost pharmaceutical assistance program.

Because of the income from the lottery, Agencies on Aging have been able to enlarge their programs and are reaching many more citizens. Social Services now include domiciliary care programs. There has been expanded in-home care and a successful senior employment program.

This is a wonderful idea and we congratulate Pennsylvania Governor Dick Thornburgh and his administration for the forethought to provide continuing thought and care for the

seniors in his state. Last year Americans lost over \$150 million to credit card fraud through Visa and Master Card alone. California, Florida and New York showed the most fraud activity. These suggestions may help you from becoming a victim of this game and keep you from receiving a surprise charge that can run from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

Destroy old credit cards by cutting them into several pieces; sign your new card immediately; open all credit card bills at once and check for suspicious charges - if any, report immediately; watch what happens to your card when in a store and make certain only one sales ticket is run and that you receive your own card and sales receipt back

from the merchant; don't give your card number over the phone to solicitors; try to take the carbon paper receipts with you to protect your account number and expiration date and never leave your card in a car or unattended in a shop.

APPROXIMATE TIME: DEPENDS ON CHAIR

1. Refer to your notes made during the stripping to know where the edge rolls should be installed. Usual places are across the front of the seat, around exposed edges of the arms, and around the frame of the back. This, however, varies, depending on the design of the chair.
2. When placing an edge roll, position it so that it overhangs the outside of the rail by 1/4 in.
3. Be careful not to drive the tacks which hold the edge roll too close to the edge of the wood, or the wood may split.
4. In round-seated chairs, the edge roll is positioned to cover the edge of the front rail, and the padding of the seat fills in the depression behind it.
5. In flat-seated chairs, the edge roll is applied to the spring edge.
6. The edge roll at the front is usually sewn in place.

### HOW TO PAD THE WOOD WITH EDGE ROLLS

An upholsterer never allows fabric to stretch across any unpadding wood frame. To avoid this, an edge roll is tacked in place so as to cover the frame edge. Edge rolls can be saved as you strip a chair, and reused, or you can buy new ready-made edge rolls at upholstery stores. An edge roll is a roll of animal hair covered with fabric, with a tab of fabric to allow tacking. You can buy edge rolls in different diameters, by the foot or yard.

### Saunas, Steamroom and Sweat

Saunas and steamrooms are used frequently in health clubs and spas because many people believe excessive sweating is good for their health. However, there are many factors which disprove this theory. Water serves many purposes in the body. It maintains an adequate level of hydration for blood volume, it plays a part in body temperature control, it acts as a catalyst in many chemical reactions in the body, and it transports nutrients to various parts of the body (as well as being a nutrient itself). Did you know that the body is made up of over 60% water? That's over half of what the body is composed of!

The old adage of "too much of anything is a bad thing" is totally true. The purpose of sweating is to keep the body temperature controlled by preventing overheating through water evaporation from the skin. The greater the humidity, the more difficult it is for the body to cool itself. Sweat evaporates slowly, and cooling is decreased. Excess water loss can cause several dangerous consequences such as heat cramps, heat exhaustion, heat stroke or death. Water loss also causes chemical imbalances in the body and heart problems. The best way to measure water loss is to weigh yourself before and after entering the sauna or steamroom. A loss of greater than 3% total body weight should invoke caution; a loss of greater than 5% indicates high risk; and a loss of greater than 7% is very dangerous. Therefore, it is important to drink fluids after using the sauna to replace the water weight loss.

People with heart problems can be in the limelight for trouble since saunas and steambaths put excessive stress on the heart. Profuse sweating may also lead to a decrease in blood volume. If the water is not replaced, failure of parts of the circulatory system may occur. The fad of wearing rubber suits to lose weight is unhealthy because it increases heat production at the same time. As internal heat increases, sweating occurs, but evaporation is prevented. An already high internal temperature has no method of being lowered through evaporation. This causes great stress on the heart and lack of adequate circulation may occur. Don't enter a sauna right after exercising vigorously because the lack of a cool-down period and high heat causes dangerous internal temperatures.

Jumping into cold water or into snow after using a sauna is a popular practice in some areas of the world. There is no particular health benefit to this practice, and there is a potential for cardiovascular shock. Another popular notion is a sauna or steamroom will clean the skin, but soap and water are just as effective.

Saunas and steambaths have potential recreational benefits. They are safe if used with respect, caution, and for a brief period of time. The most important points to remember are to cool down after exercise or before entering a sauna, avoid the sauna if any heart problems are known, and drink enough water after emerging to replace the water weight loss.

### Camping Family Style

The man drove to the mountains by himself, planning to spend the next three days hunting. He had a travel trailer based at a campground there, and he was looking forward to three days of solitude.

Arriving early in the morning on the first day, he stowed most of his gear in the trailer, then drove to where he planned to hunt. He spent the entire day hiking through the woods, returning to his car as it was getting dark. He drove to a nearby diner to have dinner, then returned to his trailer.

Bone weary from the day's hiking, the man lit the pilot light on his trailer's propane heater, then waited till it fired up and began to warm the trailer. He set the thermostat for 60 degrees so he'd have a comfortable night's sleep, then turned in, looking forward to another day in the woods.

When the man failed to return home the evening of the third day, his anxious wife called the police. They found the man in his trailer, still in bed. He had died of carbon monoxide poisoning in the sealed-in trailer. He had neglected to open one or two windows slightly, which would have given him the fresh air ventilation he needed.

The grieving wife said that her husband had stayed in the trailer by himself hundreds of times. She could only speculate that his weariness had caused him to forget that all burning appliances require ventilation when in operation.

This true story that happened to an acquaintance of ours should serve as a warning to campers that all camping stoves, lanterns and heaters — whether powered by liquid fuel or propane — consume oxygen in the air and replace it with deadly carbon monoxide. When operated in a confined space, they require ventilation.

This also applies to built-in heaters and stoves in a recreation vehicle, which may be vented but still require a replacement of oxygen inside the living unit when they're in use. It even applies to kerosene heaters, which have become so popular in homes. And, yes, even flameless catalytic heaters.

Carbon monoxide poisoning is a silent killer because the victim is unaware that it is happening. There is no odor. A victim may experience a headache, irritability, nausea and even vomiting before he collapses and unconsciously.

So the rule is: "When you light up, open up." When you light any camping appliance, providing adequate ventilation can save your life.

## Trinity Bible classes to start

A program of disciplined Bible study for laymen, emphasizing "Knowing what the Bible says as a basis for what it means" begins January 6, 6:30 at First Christian Church, Spearman.

"We believe that the time is right for a systematic and thorough Bible study for our churches" said Dr. Frank Warden, author of the new program. There are excellent studies now, but these are usually of books or portions of the Bible.

Trinity Bible Studies gives a frame of reference and a total Biblical point of view. For more than five years we studied the methods offering this kind of perspective on the whole Bible, and Trinity Bible Studies is the result. It has now grown to more than 120,000 students from Korea to India.

The plan of the course looks toward ten semesters, each ten weeks in length. The first two are surveys of the Old and New

Testaments, followed by depth studies of every word of the Bible.

Not intended as "mere devotional or occasional" material, these studies call for a disciplined commitment. The student is expected to attend weekly classes, complete daily assignments and prepare for examinations. However, the approach is neither heavy nor scholastic. Unique visual learning aids, cartoons and memory techniques present abstract Biblical concepts in memor-

able form. "The Hebrews know how to use visual aids—they are scattered throughout the Bible. We believe these are in good taste, and they will fix the important personalities and events in the mind."

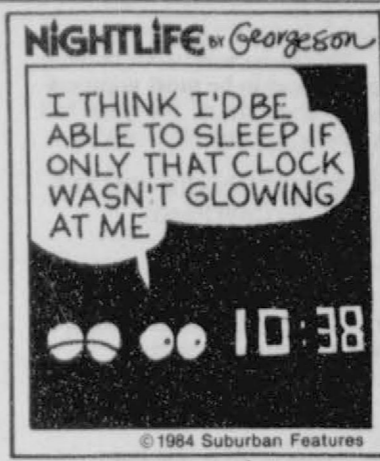
## Hansford County residents have tax refunds due

With the giving season, and the Internal Revenue Service is trying to give 194 taxpayers in the North Texas area the refunds it has been unable to deliver to them. "The total owed in this year's undelivered refund program is \$1,913,913," said Whitburg, Chief of the Dallas IRS Taxpayer Service Division. "That's an average refund of \$456.35, although the range goes all the way from \$22,416!"

Ms. Whittenburg said that the most common reason for IRS' inability to deliver the refunds is attributable to taxpayers' moving after they've filed their returns and neglecting to notify IRS and the post office of their new address. "Even moving from one apartment to another in the same complex could be the reason for the snafu," she explained. "We're asking the news media to publish lists of those to whom we owe

checks in hopes that the taxpayers themselves, or maybe friends or relatives, will spot their names and contact us with their correct address. Last year, a relative of a Texas man, who was on a missionary assignment in Africa, discovered his name on our list published in a local newspaper. Within 2 weeks, the missionary had sent in his claim for his overdue refund check. I doubt that we could have found this taxpayer any other

way." If your name is on the list below, call the IRS at 742-2440 in Dallas; 335-1370 in Fort Worth; or 1-800-424-1040 elsewhere in Texas. The following persons from Hansford County have a refund due: Joel Olivares Spearman, Texas, and Bobby D. and Jimmy L. Ortega Gruver, Texas.

### Social Security tax for first time

People may owe income tax on part of their Social Security benefits if they had substantial income in 1984 in addition to Social Security. It is estimated that only one out of 10 Social Security beneficiaries will owe tax on their benefits, and in no case will more than one half of annual benefits be subject to tax.

According to Jim Talbot, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, this new tax provision is one part of the 1983 law passed to put the Social Security system on a sound financial footing. Talbot said taxes collected under the new law will be returned to the Social Security trust funds, providing new revenue to help assure the ability of the system to pay future benefits.

In January, all those who received Social Security payments in 1984 will be sent a statement showing the amount of benefits received that year. Retired and disabled workers, eligible spouses, widows and the caretakers of child beneficiaries will get Form SSA-1099 sometime in January 1985, Talbot said. The information on the Form SSA-1099 is also provided to the Internal Revenue Service.

Like an annual statement from a bank showing the amount of interest earned in a year, Form SSA-1099 is a record of income which may be subject to federal income tax, and it should be kept with other tax records. The form should not be returned to Social Security, nor be sent to IRS with a person's tax returns. The Form SSA-1099 includes an explanation of the figures shown and a toll-free number to call for more information.

Along with the Form SSA-1099, Social Security beneficiaries will receive a worksheet, IRS Notice 703, to help them find out quickly if part of their benefits may be subject to tax. Most people will not owe any tax on their benefits, Talbot stressed. If more information is needed, a free booklet-

Publication 915, Tax Information on Social Security and Railroad Retirement Benefits—is available at any Social Security or Internal Revenue Service office, Talbot said. He also suggested watching for more articles in the newspaper about the income amounts which determine whether or not Social Security benefits are subject to tax, and the amount of benefits subject to tax.

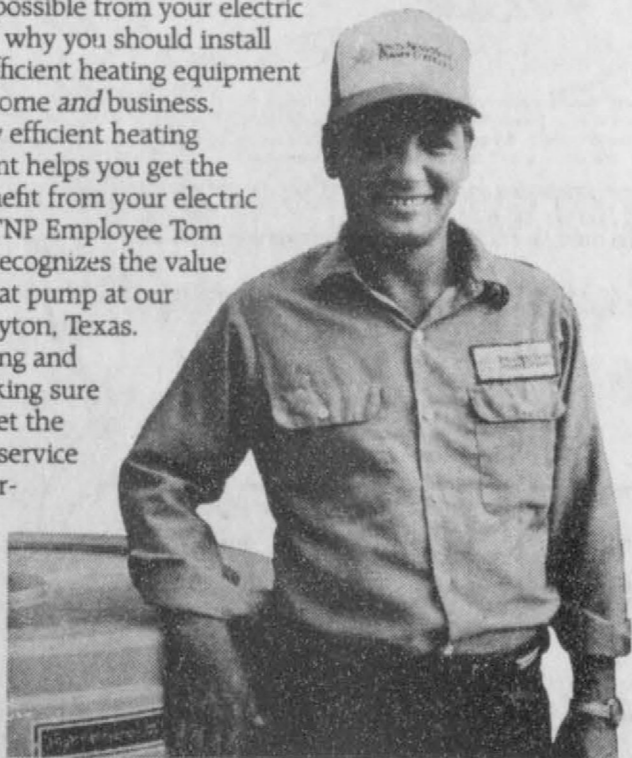

When they are bad, I no longer start into an immediate screaming tirade, as I was previously prone to do. I calmly stop what I am doing, hold them by the shoulders, look them in the eye, and explain why I don't like a behavior. "When you shout and interrupt, I can't hear the news. I really like to hear the news. It lets me know important things that are happening in the world." Then I hug them and say I'm sure they won't shout and interrupt again. I don't know how long it will last,

but it's been almost a month now since I started this program in my house. We are all so much happier, I just had to share it with you.

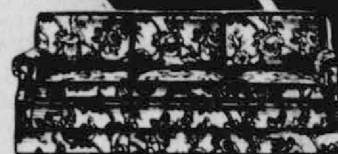

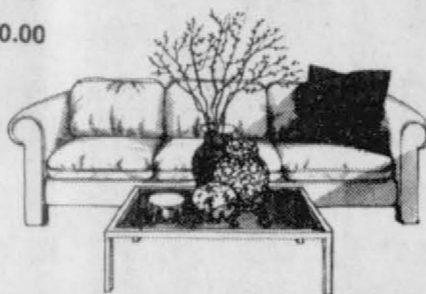

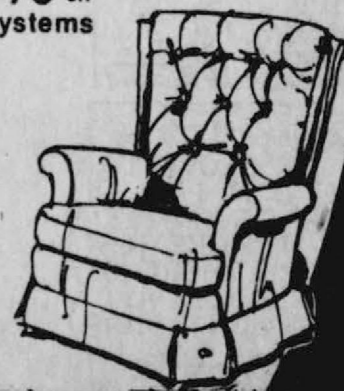
