# McGlaun to manage Spearman Cattle Feeders, Inc.

**35 people employed—  
40,000 head on feed**

Spearman Cattle Feeders, Inc. announced this week that Gene McGlaun, vice president, will be in charge of the cattle department at the local feedlot.

The feedlot was formerly known as Colberf Cattle Feeders.

The feeders presently has 40,000 head of cattle on feed with 35 people employed to run the lot.

The new vice president, Gene McGlaun, is from Decatur, Tx. and has spent much of his time in the Panhandle area.

McGlaun was cattle kill coordinator for 2½ years for Texas Meat Packers, Dallas. He began work there in 1953 and was assistant packer buyer advancing to packer and frozen cattle buyer before leaving the company in 1965.

In 1965-66 he was head packer buyer, for American Beef Packers, Fort Morgan, Col.

In 1967-1970 he was assistant manager of Chow-Tex Feedlot,

Muleshoe, Tx. advancing to general manager of 20,000 head feed lot.

From 1971-73 he was self employed as an order buyer at Clovis, N.M.

In 1974 and 1984 he was kill coordinator for Hitch Enterprises, Garden City, Kansas, and Booker Packers.

He was fat cattle buyer and salesman at a 50,000 head lot. He was assistant manager and resident general manager and advanced to head cattle buyer for Hitch Enterprises.

He retired in 1984.

In 1984 and 1985 he was self employed in the cattle and real estate business.

McGlaun is vice president and assist general manager in charge of the cattle department; responsible for purchasing, sales, customer relations and coordination of all cattle activities at Spearman Cattle Feeders, Inc.

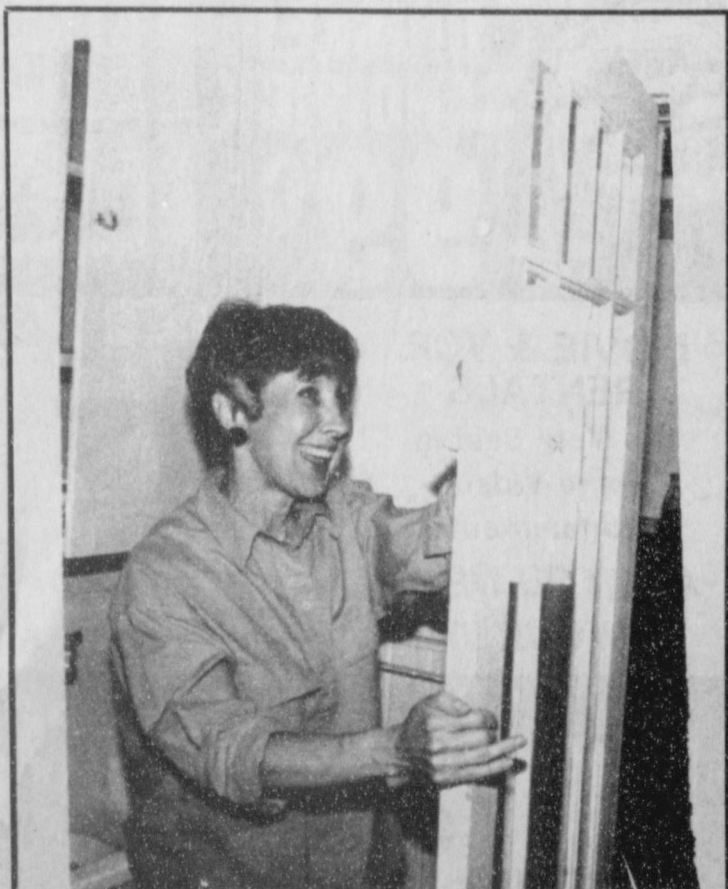

## Be alert — school's out!

With school out, motorists are asked to be especially mindful of kids playing in or around the public streets.

"It's that time of year we all have to readjust our thinking," said Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, Chief D.J. Alberts and Steve Gaines, of Gruver. "For nine months, we have become accustomed to seeing an influx of children in the mornings and midafternoons walking to and from school. Now, the kids are everywhere and all through the day, not just the hours they're going to and from school. Saturday signalled the beginning of summer fun for the kids. And their play patterns change with the nice weather."

Sheriff McFarlin, Chief Alberts, and Steve Gaines, of Gruver, said residential neighborhoods throughout Spearman and Gruver can be playground havens. "Kids will be out from morning to nearly dark. Pay particular attention to areas around the swimming pool, city parks, and tennis courts. But you've also got to watch out as soon as you leave the driveway. To a youngster, chasing after a ball or

frisbee out into the street, is not unnatural. We also see a lot of kids riding bikes and some of these young bicyclists land up in the street."

Sheriff McFarlin, Chief Alberts, and Steve Gaines, of Gruver, notes that young people on bicycles need to be aware of laws regulating their using the public streets or highways and that parents should take the time to make sure their children understand this. In a nutshell, bicyclists are required to obey all the laws that drivers of cars have to obey - such as stopping at stop signs and red lights, yielding at yield signs, and riding in the same direction as vehicular traffic.

Sheriff McFarlin, Chief Alberts, and Steve Gaines, of Gruver, also alert parents to perennial problems that come with the beginning of summer. Vandalisms are apt to pick up, as young people have more time on their hands. Bicycle thefts, too, will probably be a problem. Sheriff McFarlin, Chief Alberts, and Steve Gaines, of Gruver, also said downtown parking lots will be congregating places for young people in the evenings and it will

be a time of substance and alcohol abuse for many.

"We'd like to remind youth and parents that the legal age to drink in the state of Texas is 19. And that may go to 21. If a young person is under the ages of 19, he or she can be charged with minor in possession. If they're caught drinking with someone 19 or older, the adult will be charged with making alcohol available to a minor. Both sides of the fence are jailable offenses."

Sheriff McFarlin, Chief Alberts, and Steve Gaines have seen a reduction of three-wheel traffic in town and hopes this will continue through the summer months. "We've received less reports in the past month or six weeks. We think part of that is a result of apathy on the part of the public, thinking there is nothing that can really be done, as well as an actual reduction in three-wheel traffic. Several children already have been hurt on the machines and we would like to impress upon people that these bikes are not safe unless they're ridden under adult supervision."

# Export program worth \$127.6 million

WASHINGTON - U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm and Agriculture Secretary John Block have announced a \$2 billion program aimed at drastically expanding the export of American agricultural products.

"This action will breathe new life into our export program," Gramm said, noting that the Texas share

will amount to at least \$127.6 million with the possibility of that figure climbing much higher.

The Export Enhancement Program, which will provide government-owned surplus commodities as bonuses to exporters who arrange sales of American agricultural products to foreign markets, begins

June 1.

"The EEP is designed not to replace current sales, but to be used as an incentive to increase competition," Gramm explained. "This program will place American agriculture on a more even footing with our foreign competitors. It will be aimed directly at opening mar-

kets which have been taken over by nations which use unfair trade practices."

"This program should prove particularly helpful in regaining foreign markets for Texas agricultural products," he said.

The Export Enhancement Program, long anticipated by Texas farmers and agricultural exporters, will be administered by the Department of Agriculture.

"Regaining markets and opening new markets for Texas farmers and ranchers will go a long way toward making rural America not just a good place to live, but a good place to make a living again," Senator Gramm said.

### Cagle Kendrick elected chairman of TWB

Cagle Kendrick, who farms and lives northwest of Stratford, in Sherman County, was elected chairman of the state-wide Texas Wheat Producers Board at the regularly scheduled annual meeting and officers election in Amarillo yesterday, according to Otis Harman, outgoing chairman who had completed the Board's self-imposed

two-year limit on officers in one position. Other officers elected were: Kenneth Keisling, Dumas, Moore County, Vice Chairman; Keith Spears, Vernon, Hardeman County, Secretary; and C.L. Edwards, Panhandle, Carson County, Treasurer. The treasurer's term is not limited and is for annual re-election in order to be of maximum assistance to the admini-

strator as the Board's liaison in all financial matters.

The original 34-county TWPB area in its recent election, re-elected Leo Witkowski, Hereford, Deaf Smith County and Wiley Tabor, Quanah, Hardeman County to additional six-year terms. Scott McGarraugh, Perryton, Ochiltree County was elected to an initial six-year term, replacing Robert

Graves, Perryton who did not run for re-election.

In the two-hundred-twenty county "new territory", remainder of the state, added to the Boards' jurisdiction in the recent April 22 producer referendum and election of members to fill six new Board seats, the members drew for 2, 4, and 6 year terms and were seated on the expanded fifteen-man Board. The Board members include: Randy Justiss, Lancaster,

Dallas County, 2-year term; Dennis Rabbe, Crawford, Coryell County, 2-year term; Jack Norman, Howe, Grayson County, 4-year term; Billy Vinson, Abilene, Jones County, 4-year term; and Bob Beakley, Ennis, Ellis County, 6-year term; Ben Scholz, Wylie, Collin County 6-year term.

During the business session the Board adopted a \$375,315 budget for fiscal 1985/86—up from \$276,650, in 1984/85. Over one-third of the total budget is marked for

direct expenditure for market development with other indirect market development-related activities such as foreign trade mission hosting along with staff and Board member travel for market development purposes. Other activities extended included co-sponsorship of disease and insect projects and new varieties and hybrid development.

The TWPB is supported by a 1/2 cent per bushel state-wide self-assessment for the above purposes.

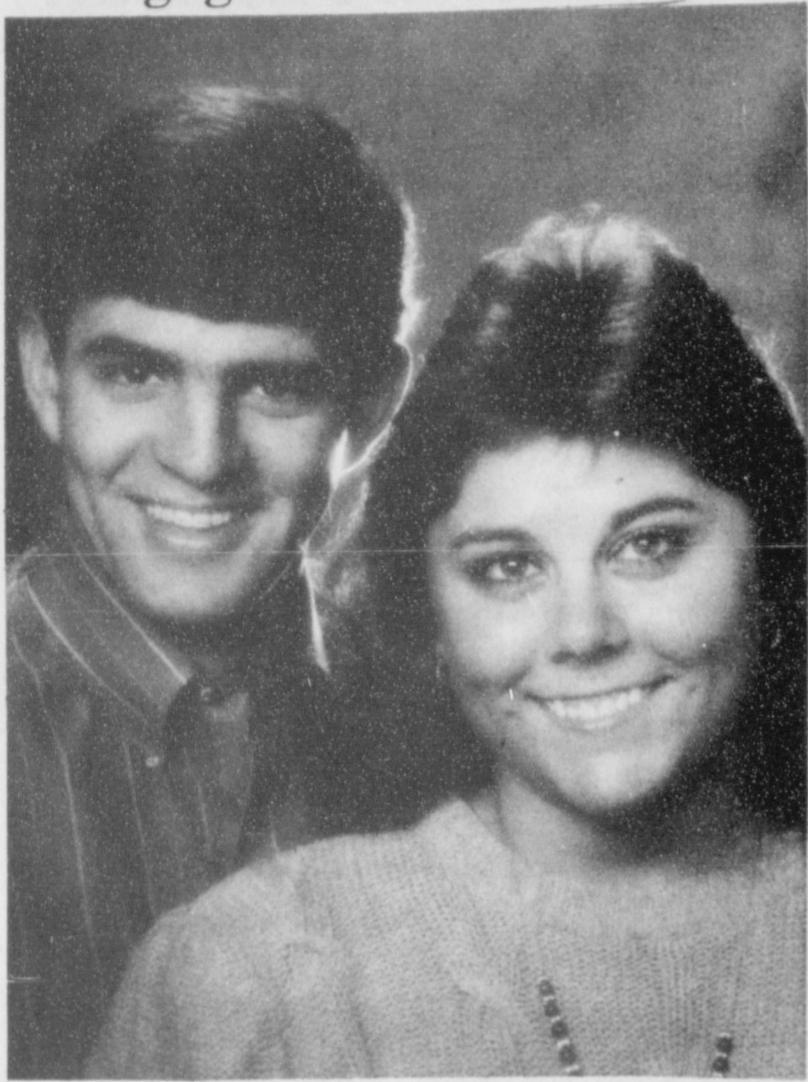

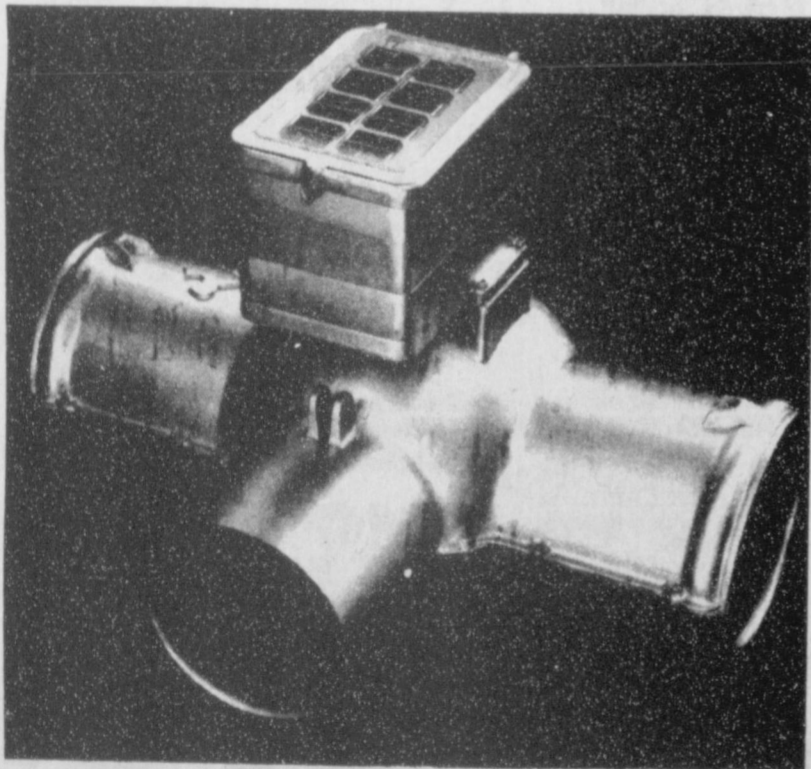
The race is part of the festivities during the Hansford County Roundup which will be held May 31-June 1, 1985.

**Surge valve irrigation**

This in turn reduces the chances of irrigation water percolating below the root zone of the irrigated crop which would be of no use to the crop and therefore wasted.

P&R Surge Systems of Lubbock has donated a solar powered surge controller valve to the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District for use on farm demonstrations.

Soil Conservation Service personnel will use the valve to compare the surge system to the convention furrow irrigation systems found in the county.

Irrigated farmers interested in trying this type system on their farms should contact the SCS office at 659-2330 to schedule an on-farm demonstration.

Irrigation system efficiency increases of 10-20% can be expected by using a surge valve controller on some soils in Hansford County.

The greatest efficiency increases usually occur on the lighter soils or those with a lower clay content. However, a 10% efficiency improvement on silty clay loam soils found in the county is quite common.

The surge valve controller is placed between the underground irrigation pipeline outlet and two sets of gated aluminum pipe. The irrigation water is then delivered to the two sets of gated pipe on an alternating basis. These surges of water condition the furrow and allow for a faster rate of advance for the next surge of water.
